

Keynote Address

Tuesday, April 6, 2010 7:00pm Main Library, Auditorium

Dr. Christopher Metress, English Professor and Director of the University Fellows Program at Samford University, will present "The Adventures of Tom Sawyer: Mark Twain and America's Perpetual Adolescence".

When Mark Twain completed his first draft of Tom Sawyer, he mailed it to his friend and fellow-novelist William Dean Howells, proclaiming, "It is not a boy's book, at all. It will only be read by adults." After finishing the novel, Howell's disagreed, telling Twain that Tom Sawyer was "a boy's story" and convincing him to rewrite it as such. This exchange between these two great writers unintentionally highlights a major question raised by Twain's first novel: just how do children



and adults differ? Although for many readers Tom Sawyer celebrates the innocence of children and condemns the hypocrisy of adults, a closer look at the novel reveals that Twain's message is not so simple. A more careful reading of Tom's adventures discovers a world where children and adults are more similar than different, perhaps suggesting why this "boy's book" has long appealed to both young and old alike.

Dr. Mattie Thomas, Chair of the Department of English, will give a lecture entitled," Tom Sawyer: Mark Twain's Good-Bad Boy." Daniel Peck claims that Mark Twain wrote Tom Sawyer in the context of the "good boy-bad boy" moralistic literature such as Thomas Bailey Aldrich's The Story of a Bad Boy. The bad boy tradition, according to Peck, follows several paradigms of youthful behavior. There is the

good boy" represented by Sid, Tom's half brother, and the "bad boy" represented by Tom. Tom, however, is a combination of the "bad boy" and the "good boy." In Tom Sawyer, Twain has a "bad boy," but not an outsider like Huckleberry Finn. He is both an outsider and an insider who is able to challenge his society while working within it.
