

Learn about cyber security

You use your debit card at the grocery store. You buy a book online. You chat with friends on social media. Your personal information is out there, and it faces a wide range of risks in our internet world. You can learn about these risks and ways to guard against them at your library.

In support of the National Cyber Summit, held June 7-9 in Huntsville, HMCPL compiled a list of resources to help you understand the risks of identity theft and online interactions, and become more cyber secure. You can find the information on our website, hmcpl.org/cyber.

Our list cites cyber security education programs at Calhoun Community College and the University of Alabama in Huntsville plus governmental resources. The Department of Homeland Security's parent and educator resources include tip cards and presentations to help parents and educators start the conversation with kids about internet safety. StaySafeOnline.org (powered by the National Cyber Security Alliance) offers business owners information on keeping customers safe, assessing risks, monitoring threats, and reporting cyber attacks, as well as steps to take when implementing a cyber security plan.
