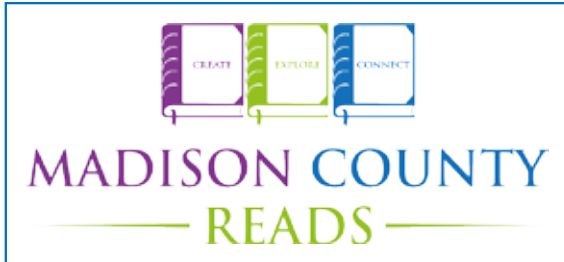

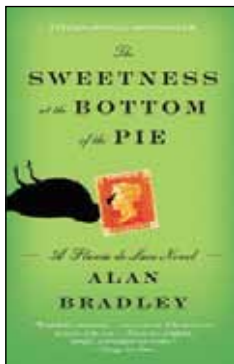

Have you stopped by the Downtown Huntsville Friends of the Library Bookstore lately? Although we sold a lot of books at our February 25-cent sale, store shelves are still bulging with bargains. You will find gently used novels, cookbooks, magazines, DVDs, videos, CDs, and audiobooks at hard-to-resist prices. It is a wonderful place to browse for your next "good read."

Do you need to make room for new items on your own bookshelves? Consider bringing your old treasures to the Friends Bookstore during our operating hours. We can provide a dolly to help unload your items. The bookstore, operated by more than 150 volunteers, generates significant annual income for the library. You will find the store behind the double glass doors inside the Downtown Huntsville Library foyer. It's open every day: Monday through Thursday, noon to 6 p.m.; Friday, noon to 4 p.m.; Saturday, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., and Sunday, 1 to 4 p.m.

You won't want to miss the next Hertha Heller Forum presented by Friends of the Library. On Sunday, April 3, at 2 p.m. in the Downtown Huntsville Library auditorium, Christel Ludewig McCanless will tell her intriguing story, "Lady Roofer to Librarian: From East Germany to Russia or America?" You will learn how an upside-down stamp delivered a crucial message and how an accordion played a role in her escape through the Communist border. The story of the Ludewig family, before and after they joined fellow German scientists in Huntsville, is part of the rich fabric of our city's history.

New plan for North Huntsville



The City of Huntsville is growing, and the Huntsville-Madison County Public Library has to keep up with that growth. That's why the city and the library system have big plans for the small Bessie K. Russell Branch Library at 3011-C Sparkman Drive. The library is set to move into the former Berachah Academy building when its current occupant, the Huntsville Police Academy Public Safety Training Center, moves out. But before the library gets a new home, the building has to be renovated.

As part of the BIG Picture planning process for the New North Huntsville Library, the public was invited to a planning meeting on Tuesday, Feb. 9, at 6 p.m. at Berachah gymnasium to help shape a vision for the future of the library and the rest of the Berachah campus. City of Huntsville planners and library personnel sought input from community members to start

developing a master plan for the site. Participants were asked to rate a wide variety of features for the library and the larger site.

Here are some of the options that were most popular with participants:

- Artwork inside and outside the library
- Study rooms
- Meeting rooms
- Garden
- Performance space
- Café
- Public computers and computer training lab
- Interactive learning elements

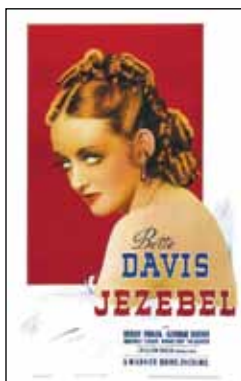

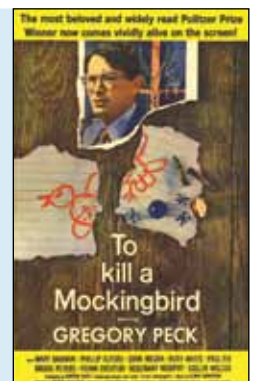

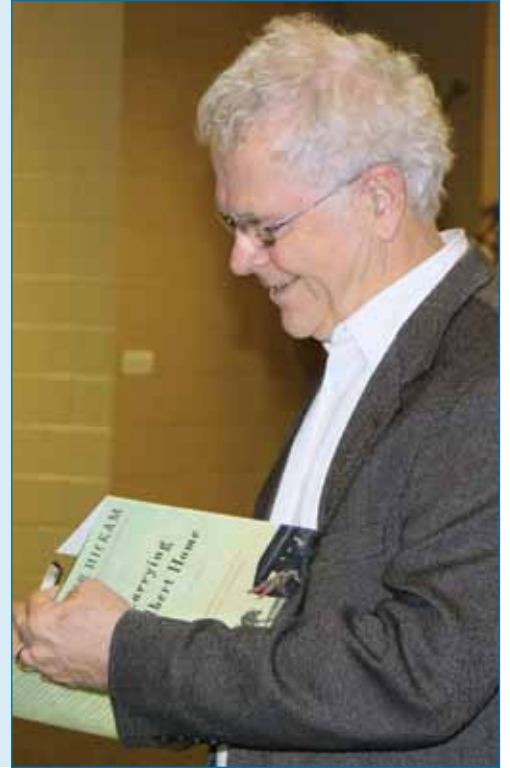
