# **Celebrate Black History Month:**

Civil rights pioneer U.S. Rep. John Lewis will speak at the Main Library

A famed civil rights pioneer kicks off the Huntsville-Madison County Public Library's celebration of February as Black History Month. U.S. Rep. John Lewis, D-Ga., (pictured at right) will share his perspective of the civil rights movement on Saturday, Feb. 2, at 2 p.m. in the auditorium of the Main Library.

Music will be a big part of the month-long commemoration. We'll start early with the Martin Luther King Musical Celebration on Thursday, Jan. 17, at 6 p.m. in the Main Library Atrium. Performers include the Aspire String Quartet, First Missionary Baptist Church Choir, and Sandy Kinslow. More African-American musicians will be featured each Thursday night throughout Black History Month – Feb. 7, 14, 21 and 28 – also at 6 p.m. in the Atrium.



Searching for your African-American ancestors? Resident genealogy expert Richard White will explain how to find them, using the library's genealogy resources and technology each Thursday in February: Feb. 7 and 28 at 10 a.m., Feb. 14 at 2 p.m. and Feb. 21 at 6 p.m. in the Main Library's Heritage Room. Help the HMCPL Archives build our African-American historical photograph collection and preserve your own memories at the same time during public scan days on Saturdays, Feb. 9 and 23, from 9 a.m. to noon in the Archives department of the Main Library.

The Main Library will host a panel discussion on the significance of local educator William Hooper Councill and Councill High School in local and national African-American history on Tuesday, Feb. 5, at 6:30 p.m. in the Atrium. Dr. Michael Smith will discuss Huntsville's historically African-American business district, before and after desegregation, on Tuesday, Feb. 12, at 6:30 p.m. in the Atrium.

The Elizabeth Carpenter Public Library in New Hope will hold a Black History Month program on the famous Gee's Bend quilts on Tuesday, Feb. 12, at 6 p.m. The program is for adults and will focus on the history of the Gee's Bend quilting community and quilting as a craft. Quilt samples will be on display.

# **Enhance your job skills with MOS certification**

Set yourself apart from the competition in today's job market. Prove your computer skills to prospective employers with Microsoft Office Specialist certification in Microsoft Word 2010, Excel 2010, PowerPoint 2010, OneNote 2010, Access 2010 and SharePoint 2010.

Generous grants from Alabama state Rep. Phil Williams and the Daniel Foundation of Alabama have allowed the Huntsville-Madison County Public Library to purchase up to 100 certification exams and offer exams to qualified patrons free of charge. If you're looking for a job, this certification can help you land one. If you're already employed, this knowledge can increase your productivity and value to your employer.

Ty Fauscett, general manager of NETWORx of Huntsville, was the first person to pass an MOS exam at the library. Fauscett, whose company provides Internet technology support to local small businesses, was certified as an expert in Microsoft Word. Now he can offer better support skills to his customers.

For Brandon Dauphinais, a data modeler for Calibre, passing the MOS exam meant more money in his paycheck. His secret to success? "I studied like crazy, and I use it every day."

Idasia Sellers, a student at Virginia College, came to the library on the recommendation of her teacher. Passing the test is one more step on her path to a degree in administrative office management. She plans to keep studying hard and take more MOS exams.

To qualify for the exam, call 256-532-2356 to make an appointment for a free practice test and a short interview/survey. # Out on a branch: Monrovia Library

Spanish/English Conversation Circle aims to break down language barriers

Celebramos is Spanish for "we celebrate." Manager Cindy Hewitt and her staff at the Monrovia Public Library have much celebrar (to celebrate) – not the least of which is the library's new Spanish/English Conversation Circle.

"There is a large Latino community here, and they don't always realize the resources we have if they don't speak our language well," Cindy (pictured at right) said. "We have children come in here who speak English well, but their parents don't. We want to cross that barrier. We're trying to build community connections; this is a community library."

The Spanish/English Conversation Circle, which meets at the library on the third Thursday of each month at 6:30 p.m., aims to help Spanish speakers improve their English and English speakers improve their Spanish. During a focus on cultural celebrations a week before Thanksgiving, native Spanish speakers discussed ways their language differs from country to country. Corn on the cob, for example, is *elote* in Mexico but la mazorca in Colombia. The native English speakers learned much. Every-



one laughed much as they talked about their favorite holidays and festive foods.

The Monrovia Library, housed in the Woody Anderson Learning Center at 254 Allen Drake Drive, has lots of other regular events on its calendar: Lunch and Love Romance Book Club, first Tuesdays at 11 a.m.; Teen Night with crafts, games, food and fun, second Mondays at 6:30 p.m.; Preschool Story Time, every Monday and Thursday at 10:30 a.m.; Home School Story Time, second Tuesdays at 1 p.m.; Tuesday Night Book Club, third Tuesdays at 6:30 p.m. There are also movie nights and craft nights. ## **Archives contributes to Abolitionist Map of America**

The Huntsville-Madison County Public Library Archives is partnering with the PBS series *American Experience* on the Abolitionist Map of America, an interactive website that explores events, characters and locations connected to the anti-slavery movement. The map is an extension of the three-part series *The Abolitionists*, set to air Tuesdays, Jan. 8, 15 and 22, on PBS.

Library Archivist Susanna Leberman added information about James G. Birney to the map. In the early 1800s, Birney was a local landowner and slaveholder who was elected mayor of Huntsville, but he was strongly encouraged to leave town after becoming an abolitionist. He moved north in 1832 and became a leading figure in the anti-slavery movement. In modern times, his descendants returned to Huntsville; he is the great-great-grandfather of Huntsville Board of Education member Topper Birney.
