

St. John A. M. E. Church was organized by Dr. William Hooper Councill, one of the nation's outstanding educators and founder of Alabama A&M University. Between 1883 and 1900, Dr. Councill was appointed a minister in the A. M. E. Conference and delivered the first sermon from a barber shop on the corner of Miller and West Holmes Streets.

In 1900, the first building was erected on Church Street. In 1920, twenty years after completion of the building, under the leadership of Rev. Patterson, the mortgage was burned. Ministers serving St. John besides Dr. Councill and Rev. Patterson include: Reverends Shelton, Goodlow, Williams, Todd, Brooks, Newell, Evans, Hill, Brice, Douglas, Cook, Thompson, Oliver, Woods, Lamar, Hughes, Howard, Stone, Dennis, Foxx, Hereford, and our present pastor, Dr. H. L. McCall. We pay tribute to these outstanding leaders for having the love, insight, determination, and dedication to guide this church where it is today.



History of St. John A.M.E. Church

St. John A.M.E. Church was organized by Dr. William Hooper Councill, one of the nation's outstanding educators, and founder of Alabama A & M University. Between 1883 and 1900, Dr. Councill was appointed a minister in the A.M.E. Church Conference and delivered the first sermon from a barber shop on the corner of Miller and West Holmes Streets in Huntsville, Alabama.

In 1900, the first building was erected on Church Street, Huntsville, Alabama. In 1920, twenty years after completion of the building, under the leadership of Rev. Patterson, the mortgage was burned.

Ministers serving St. John besides Dr. Councill and Rev. Patterson include: Reverends Shelton; Goodlow; Williams; Todd; Brooks; Newell; Evans; Hill; Brice; Douglas; Cook; Thompson; Oliver; Woods; Lamar; Hughes; Howard; Stone; Dennis; Foxx; Hereford, and our present pastor, Dr. Homer L. McCall. He and his wife, Mable and family have labored with us selflessly. Dr. E. L. Blankenship, Presiding Elder, South Birmingham-Huntsville District, has helped to motivate us to new heights.

We appreciate and pay tribute to these leaders and many outstanding men, women, youth and Bishops of the AME Church who have labored faithfully, served sacrificially, and who have died nobly that the legacy of Richard Allen and William Hooper Councill shall not perish from the earth.

The One Hundred Seventh Church Anniversary Litany

÷

- LEADER: From the very beginning of American Methodism there has been a great interest in the spiritual welfare of black Americans. In 1809 the Methodist Episcopal Tombigbee Mission's first report showed seventy-one white and fifteen black members, and from 1810 to 1870 we have annual reports of black representation.
- PEOPLE: "The Lord reigneth; let the earth rejoice; let the multitude of isles be glad thereof."
- LEADER: The Reverend Matthew P. Sturdevant was the first Methodist preacher ever appointed to preach in Alabama. His work commenced in January of 1808, and the first appointment to black Alabamians was made in November of 1831.
- PEOPLE: "Clouds and darkness are round about him: righteousness and judgment are the habitation of his throne. A fire goeth before him, and burneth up his enemies round about."
- LEADER: In 1838, the Reverend L. Massengale received an appointment to minister to black converts in the Madison, Courtland Valley and Bigbec Mission Districts; in 1840, five black missions existed, namely, Huntsville, Courtland Valley, Wilcox, Tombigbee, and Green; and in 1842 there were eight missions to North Alabama blacks, including Huntsville and Courtland Valley.
- PEOPLE: "His lightenings enlightened the world: the earth saw, and trembled. The hills melted like wax at the presence of the LORD, at the presence of the Lord of the whole earth."
- LEADER: The Saint John African Methodist Episcopal Church was organized in 1885 with the aid of Dr. William Hooper Councill, the founder of Alabama A. and M. University. The first church services were held in a barber shop on the corner of Miller and West Holmes Streets, and Dr. Councill was ordained an elder in the A. M. E. Church.
- PEOPLE: "The heavens declared his righteousness, and all the people see his glory. Confounded be all they that boast themselves of idols: worship him, all ye gods."
- LEADER: In 1900 the first church building was erected on Church Street adjacent to the old church, which stood until 1971. Twenty years after completion of the building, the mortgage on the first church was burned in 1920 under the leadership of Reverend Patterson.
- PEOPLE: "Zion heard, and was glad; and the daughters of Judah rejoiced because of thy judgments, O LORD."

PEOPLE: "His lightening enlightened the world; the earth trembled. The hills melted like wax at the presence of the LORD, at the presence of the Lord of the whole earth."

LEADER: The Saint John African Methodist Episcopal Church was organized in 1885 with the aid of Dr. William Hooper Councill, the founder of Alabama A & M University. The first church services were held in a barber shop on the corner of Miller and West Holmes Streets, and Dr. Councill was ordained an elder in the A. M. E. Church.

TITHING IS GOD'S ANSWER TO CHURCH FINANCE

The Principle of Tithing: Tithing is taught through the Bible.

- GOD is sovereign of the universe and is owner of all things (Genesis 1:1, Psalm 24:1, John 1:3-11
- HE has made man a steward or trustee (Ecclesiastes 5:18-19, Acts 17:28, James 1:17
- Man is therefore accountable to GOD (Philippians 2:10, Luke 16:1-2, Romans 14:10-12, Matthew 12:36

The Preaching of Tithing:

- It is the responsibility of every proclaimer of GOD'S word to preach about tithing.
 CHRIST'S disciples are ordered to preach the Word (Mark 16:15, Matthew 28:19-20)
- Tithing must be fully preached, clearly explained and the definites pointed out (II Timothy 4:2, Titus 2:15).
- A DEFINITE Person: Who does GOD hold responsible for tithing? The answer is every Christian (II Corinthians 9:6-7). Tithing is a Christian's privilege and responsibility.
- A DEFINITE Sequence of Giving. II Corinthians 8:1-15 stipulates the GOD ordered sequence of giving. There we are told that the Macedonians "First gave themselves, then their money." Giving to GOD is an act of worship (Isaiah 60:6, Matthew 2:11).
- A DEFINITE Proportion. The Bible is clear in its teachings that 10% (Genesis 23:22, Leviticus 27:32) of the Christian's income is "Holy unto GOD" (Leviticus 27:30).
- A DEFINITE Place. Majachi 3:10 states that tithes are to be brought into the storehouse.
 Also Majachi 3:10, GOD refers to this storehouse as "My house." This storehouse is your local congregation (Deuteronomy 12:10-14, Deuteronomy 26:1-4).
- 5. A DEFINITE Time. When are we to bring tithes to the storehouse? I Corinthians 16:2 tells us, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store, as GOD has prospered him."
- 6. A DEFINITE Purpose. By tithing Christians demonstrate their love for the SAVIOR (John 14:15, I John 5:3). By tithing Christians demonstrate that they are truly a spiritual being (John 6:63, I Corinthians 2:12-14). By tithing a Christian shows tangible evidence of their interest in the CHURCH and GOD'S KINGDOM Work (Matthew 12:30, Malachi 3:8). GOD wants meat in HIS storehouse (Malachi 3:10). By tithing the Christian places himself in position for receiving the personal blessings, which GOD has promised him (Malachi 3:10-12). By not tithing the Christian places himself in position for receiving judgment (Malachi 3:8-9, Haggai 1:3-9).

The Practice of Tithing:

- Unfortunately, untold numbers of professing Christians still continue to rob GOD (Malachi 3:8). Many problematic excuses are offered for this:
- Some say that "tithing is legalistic" (part of the Old Testament, therefore not applicable
 in these New Testament times).
- Some say, "I'm in so much debt, that I cannot afford to tithe." The answer is, very logically, to whom do you owe the most? (Acts 17:28, Psalm 116:12-14, James 1:17, Genesis 1:26-30).

The One Hundred Twelfth Church Anniversary Litany

In 1809 the Methodist Episcopal Tombigbee Mission's first report showedseventy-one white and fifteen black members, and from 1810 to 1870 we have annual reports of black representation.







Bishop T. Larry Kirkland was elected and consecrated the one hundred and fourteenth Bishop of the African Methodist Episcopal Church in Louisville, Kentucky in 1996. He was assigned to the Seventeenth Episcopal District encompassing the countries of Zaire, Zambia, Tanzania, Rwanda, Burundi, Malawi and Zimbabwe. During the General Conference 2000, Bishop Kirkland was assigned to serve as Ecumenical Officer. In 2001, he served as the

Bishop Theodore L. Kirkland, Sr. Presiding Prelate Ninth Episcopal District AME Church

Bishop T. Larry Kirkland was elected and consecrated the one hundred and fourteenth Bishop of the African Methodist Episcopal Church in Louisville, Kentucky in 1996. He was assigned to the Seventeenth Episcopal District encompassing the countries of Zaire, Zambia, Tanzania, Rwanda, Burundi, Malawi and Zimbabwe. During the General Conference 2000, Bishop Kirkland was assigned to serve as Ecumenical Officer. In 2001, he served as the President of the Council of Bishops and in 2002 was assigned to serve the Ninth Episcopal District

(Alabama), his birth state. This gave him the distinct pleasure of serving two offices at once. He was reassigned to the "Notable Anointed Ninth" District in 2004.

Prior to being elevated to the Episcopacy, Bishop Kirkland was the pastor of Brookins Community AME Church in Los Angeles, California. The Los Angeles Community of AME ministers dubbed him "The Down Home Preacher" as an insult to his southern roots and style of worship. Taking this insult as a challenge, the Bishop began to distinguish himself as a pastor and grew the mission church of twelve members (including his family of five), into a congregation of more than eight thousand. Rev. T. Larry Kirkland helped establish the AME presence in the large metropolis with southern-style teaching, preaching and singing and was dubbed by the community "The Down Home Preacher with the Uptown Message."

Bishop Kirkland received his early education in the Jefferson County Public Schools of Birmingham, Alabama. His preparation for ministry began under the tutelage of his father Rev. H.E. Kirkland (an AME minister), and from getting his feet wet by pastoring several small churches in the Eighth Episcopal District (Mississippi). He received a B.A. degree in Sociology from Alcorn State University where he was an All-American Football player and a Master's degree from Mississippi State University. Bishop Kirkland continued to develop his ministry through further study at the School of Theology at Claremont in Claremont, CA.

Bishop Kirkland's ministry of over 40 years has placed him in the company of presidents, politicians, government officials, and celebrities. He has been featured in Ebony and Jet and continues to be actively involved with local and state politics in the district he serves. His preaching and capacity for developing strong relationships have garnered him life long friendships and standing invitations across denominational and cultural lines. This includes and is not limited to Baptists, Catholics and Presbyterians. Bishop Kirkland is the author of several books on Church Growth and continues to be consulted by both Civic and Christian Organizations.

Bishop Kirkland is married to Mrs. Mary L. Kirkland and is the proud father of three adult children and one grandchild.

Litany The 123rd Church Anniversary

- Leader Dr. William Hooper Councill was born in Fayetteville, N.C., in 1848, and brought to Alabama by the traders in 1857, through the Richmond Slave Pen. He was a self-made man, having had only few school advantages. He attended one of the first schools opened by kind Northern friends at Stevenson, Alabama in 1865.
- People: "Give thanks to the LORD, for he is good: his love endures forever."
- Leader: By private instruction and almost incessant study, Dr. Councill gained a fair knowledge of some of the languages, higher mathematics and the sciences.
- People: "In my anguish I cried to the LORD, and he answered by setting me free."
- Leader: But he never left the profession of teaching for a day. Normal was founded by him in 1875. He occupied high positions in church and other religious, temperance and charitable organizations, and was an exceptional preacher and public speaker. Rev. Dr. Councill traveled abroad in Great Britain and on continental Europe. He was received by William E. Gladstone, His Majesty, King Leopold, and other great personages.
- People: "It is better to take refuge in the LORD than to trust in man. It is better to take refuge in the LORD than to trust in princes."
- Leader: The Saint John African Methodist Episcopal Church was organized in 1885 with the aid of Dr. William Hooper Councill, the founder of Alabama A&M University. The first church services were held in a barber shop on the corner of Miller and West Holmes Street, and Dr. Councill was ordained an elder in the A. M. E. Church.
- People: "The LORD is my strength and my song; he has become my salvation, "
- Leader: In 1900 the first church building was erected on Church Street, adjacent to the old church which stood until 1971. Twenty years after completion of the building, the mortgage on the first church was burned in 1920 under the leadership of Reverend Patterson.
- People: "Open for me the gates of righteousness; I will enter and give thanks to the LORD."
- Leader: Ministers serving Saint John A. M. E. Church besides Dr. Councill and Reverend Patterson, included Reverends Shelton, Goodlow, Williams, Todd, Brooks, Newell, Evans, Hill, Brice, Douglas, Cook, Thompson, Scott, Oliver, Woods, Lamar, White, Hughes, Howard, Stone, Dennis, Foxx, Hereford, and our present pastor Dr. Homer L. McCall.
- People: "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the LORD."





BISHOP JAMES LEVERT DAVIS



James Levert Davis, a fifth generation African Methodist Episcopal minister, is the son of the late Mother Dorothy Lynch, the late Reverend Sam Davis and Mother Alma Davis.

Bishop Davis attended both the public and private schools of Alabama. Having received the call to ministry at age 12, he attended Morris Brown College in Atlanta, Georgia where he earned the Bachelor of Science degree; Master of Divinity degree from the Turner Theological Seminary; and the Doctorate of Ministry degree from the Interdenominational Theological Center in Atlanta, Georgia.

Bishop James L. Davis has preached and taught the good news of Jesus the Christ for over 40 years. After seeking the divine guidance of He who called him to higher service in Kingdom building campaigned for twenty-two months on his mantra – "I Showed Up for Work and God Blew My Mind". On July 3, 2004, in Indianapolis, Indiana he showed up for an opportunity to serve and was elected and consecrated the 123rd Bishop in the African Methodist Episcopal Church during its 47th Quadrennial General Conference.

Bishop James L. Davis currently serves as the servant prelate of the 9th Episcopal District which encompasses the entire state of Alabama. As the spiritual shepherd for the District, in the first six weeks of assignment (July 2008) Bishop Davis visited over 250 of the 275 churches throughout Alabama. On a mission to R.E.V.I.V.E. (Rekindling Eternal Vision, Inspiring Victory Everywhere) our responsibility as the service agents in our communities to those in need, he has developed an ABC – Back to Basic Christian Education program that is being taught every second Sunday by all A.M.E. churches statewide.

During the 2009 Founder's Day Celebration the 9th Episcopal District dedicated its newly purchased and renovated District Headquarters located in the Downtown area of Birmingham, AL.

Bishop Davis is Chairman of the Board of Directors for Daniel Payne College, Birmingham, AL., Chairman of the Global Witness and Mission of the AME Church, and a member of the AME Re-Insurance Corporation, Ltd. Bishop Davis served as Chair of the Commission on the Development of the Continent of Africa.

Bishop Davis is a doer as well as a caring, insightful manager of human and material resources, which he utilizes effectively and efficiently to achieve desired outcomes. While serving his first assignment as presiding prelate in the 19th Episcopal District (Republic of South Africa) Bishop Davis' vision of furthering the legacy of self-help and self-reliance led to accomplishing the following while living on the continent for four years (2004-2008):

 SOLOMON'S BOOK STORE: Established in 2006, to meet the enormous demand for all kinds of religious supplies throughout the 19th Episcopal District.

- H. B. SENATLE AME CENTER: Solicited tenants to occupy the over 75 percent vacant four (4) story building complex situated in the business district of Johannesburg. Now operates in the financial black, with an average expense of R 10,000.00 and a monthly income up to R 24,000.
- RICHARD ROBERT WRIGHT SCHOOL OF RELIGION: Secured the entire campus
 with a brick wall and 24 hour manpower security service-maximizing elimination of crime
 on campus. Renovated a state of the art Administration Building that also serves as a
 means for generating outside income by renting office space to South Africa's
 Department of Housing.
- COUSIN-SENATLE CONVENTION RETREAT CENTER: Renovated at the sum of over 1 million rand the Convention Retreat Center is an up-to-date meeting space and guest quarters designed to provide comfortable lodgings that can sleep over 210 people; and has the capacity to serve meals to over 350 people. The building is named in honor of retired senior Bishop Philip R. Cousin, Sr. and in memory of the late Bishop Harold B. Senatle. Additionally, The Bonner Hall Building has been transformed into a modern place of worship.
- HOPE VILLAGE: By negotiating with squatters and sidewalk businesses to vacate
 the land owned by AME Church since 1911, a 5.1 million rand project, which Phase I
 (10 of 50 housing complexes) is completed and its entire infrastructure today was paid
 for in cash with money raised in the United States of America. HOPE Village will
 provide housing for low-income families in the Evator community.

Bishop Davis has pastored in Alabama and Georgia over his 40 year span of pastoral ministry. Prior to his election as a Bishop, he served as Senior Pastor of Big Bethel A. M. E. Church in Atlanta, Georgia for twelve years. As an innovator, builder, visionary and Spiritual leader, he is remembered for leading over 1200 souls to Christ and spearheading many dynamic programs and projects to better serve the people of the community. Among them are:

- The Big Bethel Village (an independent Living Facility for adults in Southwest Atlanta); a
 Youth Retreat and Recreation Center and Administrative Complex; Trinity House for
 homeless men; Big Bethel Credit Union; the Big Bethel Endowment Fund; and in
 partnership with another congregation built twelve (12) Habitat for Humanity Houses.
- . The purchase of over 20 pieces of property for the expansion of the kingdom on earth.
- The development to construct, on the more than 20 pieces of property purchased, the oldest Black Community in Atlanta into what will be known as "Auburn Renaissance."

Bishop Davis has many civic affiliations to his credit and has done much to improve the quality of life in the communities in which he has served.

Bishop Davis has traveled throughout the continental United States; and his travels outside the United States have taken him to the Dominican Republic; Hong Kong; Bermuda; Bahamas; England; Singapore; Spain; Malaysia; Germany; Brazil; Canada; West, East, and South Africa.

He is married to his partner in the ministry, the lovely Mother Arelis Beevers Davis. They are the very proud parents of Nicole Titiana (pursuing her doctorate degree) and Damarys Monique (teacher with the Atlanta Public Schools) and two grandsons-the love of his life-Patrick James and Ashton James Pass.



Litany The 124th Church Anniversary

Leader Dr. William Hooper Councill was born in Fayetteville, N.C., in 1848, and brought to Alabama by the traders in 1857, through the Richmond Slave Pen. He was a self-made man, having had only few school advantages. He attended one of the first schools opened by kind Northern friends at Stevenson, Alabama in 1865.

People: "Give thanks to the LORD, for he is good: his love endures forever."

Leader: By private instruction and almost incessant study, Dr. Councill gained a fair knowledge of some of the languages, higher mathematics and the sciences.

People: "In my anguish I cried to the LORD, and He answered by setting me free."

Leader: But he never left the profession of teaching for a day. Normal was founded by him in 1875.

He occupied high positions in church and other religious, temperance and charitable organizations, and was an exceptional preacher and public speaker. Rev. Dr. Councill traveled abroad in Great Britain and on continental Europe. He was received by William E. Gladstone, His Majesty, King Leopold, and other great personages.

People: "It is better to take refuge in the LORD than to trust in man. It is better to take refuge in the LORD than to trust in princes."

Leader: The Saint John African Methodist Episcopal Church was organized in 1885 with the aid of Dr. William Hooper Councill, the founder of Alabama A&M University. The first church services were held in a barber shop on the corner of Miller and West Holmes Streets, and Dr. Councill was ordained an elder in the A. M. E. Church.

People: "The LORD is my strength and my song; He has become my salvation."

Leader: In 1900 the first church building was erected on Church Street, adjacent to the old church which stood until 1971. Twenty years after completion of the building, the mortgage on the first church was burned in 1920 under the leadership of Reverend Patterson.

People: "Open for me the gates of righteousness; I will enter and give thanks to the LORD."

Leader: Ministers serving Saint John A. M. F., Church besides Dr. Councill and Reverend Patterson, included Reverends Shelton, Goodlow, Williams, Todd, Brooks, Newell, Evans, Hill, Brice, Douglas, Cook, Thompson, Scott, Oliver, Woods, Lamar, White, Hughes, Howard, Stone, Dennis, Foxx, Hereford, and our present pastor Dr. Homer L. McCall.





St. John African Methodist Episcopal Church History



St. John African Methodist Episcopal Church is in the South Birmingham-Huntsville-Bessemer District of the Northwest Alabama Conference of the Ninth Episcopal District of the African Methodist Episcopal Church.

The African Methodist Episcopal Church was the first major religious institution for African Americans. The church was founded by Bishop Richard Allen in 1787 in Philadelphia. The church began as a protest against racial injustice to worshipers of African descent at St. George's Methodist Church. The first organization was known as the Free African Society. In 1816, the church held its first General Conference and elected Richard Allen the first Bishop. Today the church has millions of members and twenty Episcopal Districts in North and South America, England, Africa and India.

The Ninth Episcopal District consists of the state of Alabama and the Presiding Bishop is the Right Reverend James Levert Davis. The Ninth

District was originally the Seventh Episcopal District. It was officially formed at the General Conference of the AME Church in 1868. Bishop John W. Brown was assigned as the first Bishop. Between 1868 and 1920 the district was geographically reorganized several times and at different times Alabama was attached with Florida, Georgia and South Carolina. In 1920, Alabama became the Ninth District. Currently the District has five (5) conferences.

Bishop Henry McNeil Turner organized the North Alabama Conference, beginning with Greater St. Paul A.M.E. Church in Florence, AL, in 1878. The North and West Alabama Conferences were combined and the Presiding Elder Districts realigned under the leadership of Bishop James L. Davis. St. John is in the South Birmingham-Huntsville-Bessemer District of this conference. The current Presiding Elder is Reverend Oliver Allen, Jr.


St. John Huntsville was organized by Dr. William Hooper Councill and others in 1885. The first church services were held in a barber shop on the corner of Miller and West Holmes Streets and Dr. Councill was ordained an elder in the A.M.E. Church. In addition to organizing St. John and serving as the first Pastor, Dr. Councill was the founder and one of the most distinguished presidents of Alabama A&M University. In 1900 the first church building was erected on Church Street. Ministers serving St. John besides Dr. Councill include Reverends Patterson, Shelton, Goodlow, Williams, Todd, Brooks, Newell, Evans, Hill, Brice, Douglas, Cook, Thompson, Scott, Oliver, Woods, Lamar, White, Hughes, Howard, Stone, Dennis, Foxx, Hereford, McCall, and our present pastor, Reverend Patrick Clayborn.


In 1971 the church moved into a newly erected facility at 229 Church Street. From this location at the corner of downtown Huntsville, St. John opened its doors to the community. The many civic and cultural events hosted by St. John include NAACP meetings and programs, inaugural prayer services for the President of the City Council of Huntsville, graduation for the Phoenix program, Greater Huntsville Interdenominational Ministerial Fellowship and Interdenominational Ministerial Spouses Association services, voter registration, Alabama Democratic Conference meetings, Race Unity programs, and the originating point for the NAACP Annual Martin Luther King, Jr. March.

St. John continues to have a strong affiliation with Alabama A&M University through its members, outreach to students and financial support. Transportation is available for students who desire to attend worship. Five of Presidents of the eleven Alabama A&M University have been members of St. John; the founder and first president, Dr., William H. Councill, the eighth President Dr. David B. Henson, the ninth president, Dr. John T. Gibson, Sr., and the eleventh President, Dr. Andrew Hugine, Jr.

St. John has numerous active ministries serving members and the community. The church purchased 53 acres of land in northwest Huntsville in 2008 and an expansion committee is making plans for future use of this property. Strong emphasis is placed on the WORD - through preaching, teaching and Christian living.

St. John's motto is "A People in the Word- Serving People in the World."



Part I

O Give thanks to the Lord, for He is good; his mercy endures forever!

Religion and higher-education are two narratives that are inextricably linked in the African American community. Our beloved St. John African Methodist Episcopal Church was established in 1885 with the aid of Alabama A&M University founder, Dr. William Hooper Councill. Long before W.E.B. DuBois published the Souls of Black Folks or Booker T. Washington challenged African Americans to 'caste down their buckets,' the American statesman, Fredrick Douglas lifted Dr. Councill in complement as a beacon of hope to the people in the South. 'This great orator, William Hooper Council, a slave child brought to North Alabama from North Carolina through the slave trade, began educating the Negro in the South a few years after the American Civil War.'

Councill, a self-made man, with only the bare educational necessitates, taught himself to read and write the classical languages: Latin, Greek, and Hebrew. To become an ordained elder in the AME Church, he taught himself theology which enabled him to pass the required examination. In addition, he taught himself law and passed the Alabama Bar exam on his first attempt. Out of a great calling to educate our community, Alabama A&M University was first erected in downtown Huntsville, Alabama in 1875. Compelled to build a house of worship, the first church services for St. John AME Church were held in a barbershop on the corner of Miller and West Holmes Street.

In 1900, the first church building was erected on Church Street, adjacent to the old church site, which stood until 1971. Twenty years after the completion of the building, the mortgage on the church was burned in 1920 under the leadership of Reverend Patterson.

In addition to Dr. Council and Reverend Patterson, we give thanks for the legacy of all ministers who have served St. John AME Church: Reverends: Shelton, Goodlow, Williams, Todd, Brooks, Newell, Evans, Hill, Brice, Douglas, Cook, Thompson, Scott, Oliver, Woods, Lamar, White, Hughes, Howard, Stone, Dennis, Foxx, Hereford, McCall, and our present pastor, Dr. Patrick Dewitt Clayborn.

Part II

The stone that the builder refused shall be the chief cornerstone!

129 years later, we stand at 229 Church Street. Being founded by freed slaves, there is plenty of work to do. It is therefore essential we embrace a theology of liberation to tackle the issues that confront our people today. In honoring the legacy of St. John AME Church, we shall not ignore the powerless of the black community and the role our dear St. John must play in shaping the advancement of those lives.

The affirmation of greatness in this church comes from the whole experience of being free and responsible. The freedom of those who came before us was not given lightly—it was taken by force. It is our responsibility in the 21st century to continue laying stones of hope where there is a path of despair.

This morning:

We thank God for the struggle.

We thank God for social action and change.

We thank God for the resources to feed the hungry and clothe the naked.

We thank God for the wisdom of our elders.

We thank God for the courage to rise up and take control to lead our youth.

To restore our communities and lift the bloodstained banner of hope requires that we, as a people, continue to take risks. To bring sight to the blind, we must move beyond these walls and onto the streets where young black boys — who are really men—congregate.

We must walk through prisons and offer a balm to the sin sick soul. We must travel to the group homes and affirm the dignity of women marginalized by domestic violence and to the wards where patients with HIV and AIDS live. We must pour back into our communities markets, schools, and resources that will sustain our children.

This means it is time we stand on a stone of hope, producing greatness in the midst of despair. With the legacies of Richard Allen and Dr. William Hooper Councill, we must educate, refine, and build anew that which is broken.

St. John African Methodist Episcopal Church History



St. John African Methodist Episcopal Church is in the South Birmingham-Huntsville-Bessemer District of the Northwest Alabama Conference of the Ninth Episcopal District of the African Methodist Episcopal Church.

The African Methodist Episcopal Church was the first major religious institution for African Americans. The church was founded by Bishop Richard Allen in 1787 in Philadelphia. The church began as a protest against racial injustice to worshipers of African descent at St. George's Methodist Church. The first organization was known as the Free African Society. In 1816, the church held its first General Conference and elected Richard Allen the first Bishop. Today the church has millions of members and twenty Episcopal Districts in North and South America, England, Africa and India.

The Ninth Episcopal District consists of the state of Alabama and the Presiding Bishop is the Right Reverend James Levert Davis. The Ninth

District was originally the Seventh Episcopal District. It was officially formed at the General Conference of the AME Church in 1868. Bishop John W. Brown was assigned as the first Bishop. Between 1868 and 1920 the district was geographically reorganized several times and at different times Alabama was attached with Florida, Georgia and South Carolina. In 1920, Alabama became the Ninth District. Currently the District has five (5) conferences.

Bishop Henry McNeil Turner organized the North Alabama Conference, beginning with Greater St. Paul A.M.E. Church in Florence, AL, in 1878. The North and West Alabama Conferences were combined and the Presiding Elder Districts realigned under the leadership of Bishop James L. Davis. St. John is in the South Birmingham-Huntsville-Bessemer District of this conference. The current Presiding Elder is Reverend Oliver Allen, Jr.

St. John Huntsville was organized by Dr. William Hooper Councill and others in 1885. The first church services were held in a barber shop on the corner of Miller and West Holmes Streets and Dr. Councill was ordained an elder in the A.M.E. Church. In addition to organizing St. John and serving as the first Pastor, Dr. Councill was the founder and one of the most distinguished presidents of Alabama A&M University. In 1900 the first church building was erected on Church Street. Ministers serving St. John besides Dr. Councill include Reverends Patterson, Shelton, Goodlow, Williams, Todd, Brooks, Newell, Evans, Hill, Brice, Douglas, Cook, Thompson, Scott, Oliver, Woods, Lamar, White, Hughes, Howard, Stone, Dennis, Foxx, Hereford, McCall, and our present pastor, Reverend Patrick Clayborn.

In 1971 the church moved into a newly erected facility at 229 Church Street. From this location at the corner of downtown Huntsville, St. John opened its doors to the community. The many civic and cultural events hosted by St. John include NAACP meetings and programs, inaugural prayer services for the President of the City Council of Huntsville, graduation for the Phoenix program, Greater Huntsville Interdenominational Ministerial Fellowship and Interdenominational Ministerial Spouses Association services, voter registration, Alabama Democratic Conference meetings, Race Unity programs, and the originating point for the NAACP Annual Martin Luther King, Jr. March.

St. John continues to have a strong affiliation with Alabama A&M University through its members, outreach to students and financial support. Transportation is available for students who desire to attend worship. Five of the eleven Presidents of Alabama A & M University have been members of St. John: the founder and first president, Dr. William H. Councill, the eighth President, Dr. David B. Henson, the ninth president, Dr. John T. Gibson, Sr., and the eleventh President, Dr. Andrew Hugine, Jr.

St. John has continued to follow the vision of Christ: feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, visiting those who are sick and shut in, and preaching the gospel to all. Now, the church seeks to more fully follow that vision into the 21st century







James Levert Davis, a fifth generation African Methodist Episcopal minister, is the son of the late Mother Dorothy Lynch, the late Reverend Sam Davis and Mother Alma Davis. Bishop Davis attended both the public and private schools of Alabama. Having received the call to ministry at age 12, he attended Morris Brown College in Atlanta, Georgia where he earned the Bachelor of Science degree; Master of Divinity degree from the Turner Theological Seminary and the Doctorate of Ministry degree from the Interdenominational Theological Center in Atlanta, Georgia.

Bishop James L. Davis has preached and taught the good news of Jesus the Christ for over 45 years. After seeking the divine guidance of He who called him to higher service in Kingdom building campaigned for twenty-two months on his mantra — "I Showed Up for Work and God Blew My Mind". On July 3, 2004, in Indianapolis, Indiana he showed up for an opportunity to serve and was elected and consecrated the 123rd Bishop in the African Methodist Episcopal Church during its 47th Quadrennial General Conference. He was appointed to the 19th Episcopal District


which encompasses the Republic of South Africa. While serving his first assignment Bishop Davis' vision of furthering the legacy of self-help and self-reliance led to many accomplishments while living on the continent for four years (2004-2008).

Bishop James L. Davis currently serves as the servant prelate of the 9th Episcopal District which encompasses the entire state of Alabama. As the spiritual shepherd, in 2008 and 2014, Bishop Davis visited all 275 churches throughout the state of Alabama. Under his leadership the 9th Episcopal District purchased and renovated the District Headquarters located in the Downtown area of Birmingham, AL. Twenty-five months later the District celebrated the mortgage burning, while still reporting \$1.8 million in budget assessments and giving back to the local churches over \$60,000 to assist in various areas of need.

For six years, the 9th District saw phenomenal growth in evangelism through Pentecost gathered and Pentecost scattered. He prayerfully spearheaded the coordination of a myriad of details executed by District leaders and members, resulting in unforgettable worship experiences that have drawn over 25,000 worshippers and witnesses throughout the state of Alabama, resulting in numerous accessions, conversions and recommitments.

As Chair of the Board of Directors for Daniel Payne College, Bishop Davis has presented a phenomenal vision for its property. This project will serve as one of the instrument for which the District will find another way to finance our church by erecting an income-generating facility. In August 2014 the Daniel Payne College Foundation, Inc. of the 9th Episcopal District purchased the Daniel Payne Middle School as a \$2.5 million cash-sale. Making this the largest property owned by an African American institution in the state of Alabama. The Daniel Payne Community Plaza will be the new home for the District Headquarters, and become a thriving space catering to the needs of the immediate Birmingham community and the state of Alabama.

He is married to his partner in the ministry, Arelis Beevers Davis. They are the very proud parents of Dr. Nicole Davis Pass and Damarys Monique Burnett, her husband, Christopher, three grandsons, Patrick James and Ashton James Pass and Baron Christopher Valentino Burnett and one granddaughter-Noel Olivia Burnett.

Born in Samana, Dominican Republic, to Mr. Federico Beevers and the late Mrs. Luz Francisca Beevers, Mother Davis moved to the United States and was educated in the Belmar Public School System in Belmar, New Jersey. Mother Davis earned the Bachelor of Arts degree from Morris Brown College in Atlanta, Georgia and Master of Education degree, with an emphasis in Spanish Education, from the University of Alabama in Birmingham. While fulfilling the requirements for her master's degree, Mother Davis studied at the University of Guadalajara in Mexico. Mother Davis has been the recipient of numerous awards and honors from numerous organizations including:

Who's Who Among Black Americans an the National Hispanic Society. She is a member of the Professional Association of Georgia Educators (PAGE), the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) and the prestigious sisterhood of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated.

In the Ninth Episcopal District, Mother Davis supervises missionaries which encompass the state of Alabama. Beyond her mission in Alabama, Mother Davis' travels have taken her to Hong Kong, Bermuda, Bahamas, England, Singapore, Malaysia, Germany, Brazil, Canada, and East, West and South Africa. While serving in the Nineteenth District, Mother Davis established the "Hope and Healing" Ministry which focuses on health awareness, breast cancer awareness and other women's health issues. Mother Davis developed extensive plans to effectively minister to those who are impacted by health issues that plague our community especially HIV and AIDS. Her ministry also includes giving hope and support to women and families that are directly affected by breast cancer.

Prior to becoming the Episcopal Supervisor of the Nineteenth Episcopal District, Mother Davis faithfully served the Lord at Big Bethel AME Church in Atlanta, Georgia. She faithfully fulfilled her duties as a Stewardess, member of the Scholarship Committee and the Married Couples' Ministry.

Leader: Teach us to know Your voice and give us the courage to obey it. Lord, please continue to provide this church with a light for the world.

People: God, we gather in this place to acknowledge that we did not choose You, but You chose us, and appointed us, to go and bear fruit—fruit that will last. We praise You for choosing us and calling us out of darkness into Your wonderful light.

Leader: You have searched us and You know us, yet You continue to love and use us. Wash away all our iniquity and cleanse us from our sin. As we reflect upon the work You, oh Lord, have done through us, help us never to forget the message, mission, and work to which You have called St. John AME Church because You are the vine and we are the branches—apart from You we have no work of our own.

People: As we move forward in this ministry, we recommit ourselves to the principles of Your Word—to love the Lord our God with all our heart, mind, and soul; to love our neighbor as we love ourselves; to feed the hungry and to clothe the naked; to work for justice on behalf of those whose voices are not heard.

Leader: For this is how our God is glorified, that we bear much fruit, showing ourselves to be Jesus' disciples.

People: We shall always keep a dream in our hearts, for when we have the Lord's dream, then—by all means we shall do what it takes to make the dream become true; when we have a goal, we shall make it something to strive to accomplish; when we have hope, then we shall hope for it with all our hearts.

All: Amen, Amen, and Amen again!!

St. John African Methodist Episcopal Church History

The African Methodist Episcopal Church was the first major religious institution for African Americans. The church was founded by Bishop Richard Allen in 1787 in Philadelphia. The church began as a protest against racial injustice to worshipers of African descent at St. George's Methodist Church. The first organization was known as the Free

African Society. In 1816, the church held its first General Conference electing and consecrating Richard Allen the first Bishop. Today the church has millions of members and twenty Episcopal Districts in North and South America, England, France, Africa and India. The Ninth Episcopal District consists of the state of Alabama and the Presiding Bishop is the Right Reverend James Levert Davis. The Ninth District was originally the Seventh Episcopal District. It was officially formed at the General Conference of the AME Church in 1868. Bishop John W. Brown was assigned as the first Bishop. Between 1868 and 1920 the district was geographically reorganized several times and at different times Alabama was attached with Florida, Georgia and South Carolina. In 1920, Alabama became the Ninth District. Currently the District has five (5) annual conferences.

Bishop Henry McNeil Turner organized the North Alabama Conference, beginning with Greater St. Paul A.M.E. Church in Florence, AL, in 1878. The North and West Alabama Conferences were combined and the Presiding Elder Districts realigned under the leadership of Bishop James L. Davis. St. John is in the South Birmingham-Huntsville-

Bessemer District of this conference. The current Presiding Elder is Reverend Oliver Allen, Jr. St. John Huntsville was organized by Dr. William Hooper Councill and others in 1885. The first church services were held in a barber shop on the comer of Miller and West Holmes Streets and Dr. Councill was ordained an elder in the A.M.E. Church. In addition to organizing St. John and serving as the first Pastor, Dr. Councill was the founder and one of the most distinguished presidents of Alabama A&M University. In 1900 the first church building was erected on Church Street. Ministers serving St. John besides Dr. Councill include Reverends Patterson, Shelton, Goodlow,

Williams, Todd, Brooks, Newell, Evans, Hill, Brice, Douglas, Cook, Thompson, Scott, Oliver, Woods, Lamar, White, Hughes, Howard, Stone, Dennis, Foxx, Hereford, McCall, and our present pastor, Reverend Patrick Clayborn, Ph.D.

In 1971 the church moved into a newly erected facility at 229 Church Street. From this location at the corner of downtown Huntsville, St. John opened its doors to the community. The many civic and cultural events hosted by St. John include NAACP meetings and programs, inaugural prayer services for the President of the City Council of Huntsville, graduation for the Phoenix program, Greater Huntsville Interdenominational Ministerial Fellowship and Interdenominational Ministerial Spouses Association services, voter registration, Alabama Democratic Conference meetings, Race Unity programs, and the originating point for the NAACP Annual Martin Luther King, Jr. March. St. John continues to have a strong affiliation with Alabama A&M University through its members, outreach to students and financial support. Four of the eleven Presidents of Alabama A & M University have been members of St. John: the founder and first president, Dr. William H. Councill, the eighth President, Dr. David B. Henson, the ninth president, Dr. John T. Gibson, Sr., and the eleventh President, Dr. Andrew Hugine, Jr.

Over the long history of St. John A.M.E.C there have been many strong members and leaders who have done herculean work in the church for the glory of God. St. John strives to set a Christian standard within the Huntsville/ Madison County area, the Nation and the World through its commitment to the Proclamation and study of the Word. worship, stewardship, mission and evangelism. Under the current leadership of Pastor Patrick D. Clayborn, the church continues to grow and expand its current ministries to continue serving the needs of its church and the community at large.


Mrs. Mildred Dunn Hereford

Mr. Homer McCraw



Mrs. Idell Merrill





His father, Reverend Jamar, was a member of St. John and editor of the Huntsville Mirror, one of the first African American news publications in Huntsville. As a child he was a Boy Scout and a newspaper carrier. He later served as a Scoutmaster. When asked why he did not follow in the father's footsteps in the newspaper business, he replied, "That was not my calling." He was married to the late Helen Nance Jamar, is the father of one daughter and has 2 grandchildren. He graduated from Councill High and earned a Bachelor's of Science degree in Secondary Education and Masters of Science in Secondary Education degree from Alabama A & M University. He studied further at Tennessee State University, University of South Alabama, Peabody University and University of Alabama-Huntsville. Mr. Jamar, an accomplished clarinetist and



saxophonist, conducted a musical ensemble under the leadership of Reverend McCall. He served as a member of the Steward Board under Reverend Hereford and as a member of the Male Chorus and the Sanctuary choir. He is also a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc.

Some of his fondest memories are of attending Annual Conferences in Birmingham, Alabama and his baptism. Reverend Hughes was assisted by his father during his baptism as well as by Stewardess' Betty Derrick, Amanda Derrick and Dora Ashford.

The Church School class can depend on Dr. Williams to thoughtfully provide a perspective with a historical reference that promotes conversation and food for thought. Dr. Williams retired after 36 1/2 years at University of Alabama - Huntsville serving in the History Department. Dr. Williams, who specialized in African-American history, also served as director of the Office of Multicultural Affairs, Former Chair of University Review Board, member of the Faculty Senate, Curriculum Committee Member, Intercollegiate Athletic Committee, Promotion Tenure and Reappointment Committee, Academic Advisory Team, and Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) Committee.



Dr. Williams has served as a member of the Steward Board for 5
years, Trustee Board for 34 years and as former Music Committee Chair. He continues to serve as a
member of the Sons of Allen, Lay Organization, 50+ Auxiliary and Sunday School Teacher. Two of his
favorite memories that occurred at St. John are the baptism of son, Lee William III, and when his son

Vanona worked for Computer Sciences Corporation as a Programmer/Analyst until her retirement in 2002 after 25 years of service. She has been a member of St. John for 38 years and has served in many capacities within the church. She taught the Primary class in Church School for over twenty years, first as an assistant working with Mrs. Townsend (deceased) and Mrs. Rose Thomas. 
have 9 grandchildren and 6 great grandchildren. His favorite memories of how his family was received by the St. John family when they joined. Everyone was so friendly. He also has fond



ST. JOHN AME CHURCH HISTORY



St. John Huntsville was organized by Dr. William Hooper Councill and others in 1885. The first church services were held in a barber shop on the corner of Miller and West Holmes Streets. Dr. Councill was ordained an elder in the A.M.E. Church. In addition to organizing St. John and serving as the first Pastor, Dr. Councill was the founder and one of the most distinguished presidents of Alabama Agricultural and Mechanical University. In 1990 the first church building was erected on Church Street. Ministers serving St. John besides Dr. Councill included Reverends Patterson, Shelton, Goodlow, Todd, Brooks, Newell, Evans, Hill, Brice, Douglas, Cook, Thompson, Scott, Oliver, Woods, Lamar, White, Hughes, Howard, Stone, Dennis, Fox, Hereford, McCall and Clayborn. Our current pastor is The Reverend Maurice Wright, II.

In 1971 the church moved into a newly erected facility at 229 Church Street. From this strategic location at the corner of downtown Huntsville, St. John opened its doors to the community. the many civic and cultural events hosted by St. John included NAACP meetings and programs, inaugural prayer service for the President of the City Council of Huntsville, graduation for the Phoenix Program, Greater Huntsville Interdenominational Ministerial Fellowship and Interdenominational Ministerial Spouses Association services, voter registration, Alabama Democratic Conference meetings, Race Unity Programs, and the origination point for the NAACP Annual Martin Luther King Jr. March.

St. John continues to have a strong affiliation with Alabama A&M University through its members, outreach to students and financial support. Transportation is available for students who desire to attend worship. Five of the eleven presidents of Alabama A&M University have been members of St. John; the founder and first president, Dr. William Hooper Councill, the eighth president Dr. David B. Henson, the ninth president, Dr. John T. Gibson, Sr., and the eleventh president, Dr. Andrew Hugine, Jr.

The African Methodist Episcopal Church was the first major religious institution for African Americans. The church was founded by Bishop Richard Allen in 1787 in Philadelphia. The church began as a protest against racial injustice to worshipers of African descent at St. George's Methodist Church. The first organization was known as the Free African Society. In 1816, the church held its first General Conference and elected Richard Allen the first Bishop. Today the church has millions of members and twenty Episcopal Districts in North and South America, England, and Africa.

The Ninth Episcopal District consists of the state of Alabama and the presiding bishop is The Right Reverend Harry L. Seawright. The Ninth District was originally the Seventh Episcopal District. It was officially formed at the General Conference of the AME Church in 1868. Bishop John W. Brown was assigned as the first bishop. Between 1868 and 1920 the district was geographically recognized several times and at different times Alabama was attached with Florida, Georgia and South Carolina. In 1920, Alabama became the Ninth District. Currently the district has five conferences.

Bishop Henry McNeil Turner organized the North Alabama Conference, beginning with Greater St. Paul A.M.E. Church in Florence, AL, in 1878. The North and West Alabama Conferences were combined, and the Presiding Elder Districts realigned under the leadership of Bishop James L. Davis. St. John is in the South Birmingham-Huntsville-Bessemer District of this conference. The current Presiding Elder is Reverend Bruce W. Hunter.

St. John has a strong commitment to uphold our mission of service to our members and the community. Through the leadership of Rev. Homer McCall, the church purchased 53 acers of land in northwest Huntsville. Under the leadership and guidance of Pastor Wright, we have launched our building project for a new worship edifice and plan to break ground in September of 2020.

After 137 years of service St. John continues to serve through preaching, teaching and Christian living. We believe in "Sharing the Word and Serving the People".
