# Dr. Andrew Hugine, Jr. BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

God-fearing, visionary leader, faithful husband, devoted father, amazing grandfather, and faithful servant, President Andrew Hugine, Jr. (pronounced hugh-guinea), served as the 11th President of Alabama Agricultural and Mechanical University. President Hugine was born in Green Pond, South Carolina, to Rev. Andrew and Irene Hugine. Reared by a father who was the pastor of his home church, he was introduced to Christ at an early age who has served as the center of his life. Reared by a mother who was an educator and his first and second grade teacher, he was taught early that "Education is the Key to a Successful Life."

President Hugine earned a Bachelor of Science (BS) and Master of Education (M.Ed.) in Mathematics from South Carolina State University (SCSU) and his Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) in Higher Education/Institutional Research from Michigan State University. He has presented at numerous professional meetings on strategies for increasing the number of minorities in the STEM disciplines and is the author of three mathematics textbooks.

Hugine began his career as a teacher of mathematics at Beaufort High School in Beaufort, South Carolina. Other positions held included Director of the Special Services Program, Director of University Year for Action Program, Assistant Professor of Institutional Research, Director of Institutional Self-Study, Assistant Vice President for Academic Affairs, Professor of Mathematics, and Interim Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer. These positions prepared him and ultimately led to his appointment as the 9th President of South Carolina State University, his Alma Mater, in 2003.

At SCSU, relative to capital improvements, he secured \$33 million for the completion of the science building addition and construction of a new engineering and computer science building. He also secured a \$42 million loan for the construction of a 755-bed apartment style housing complex for students, the *Andrew Hugine*, *Jr. Suites*, *A Living Learning & Community*, which is named in his honor. At the time, the loan was the largest non-student aid funding ever provided by the U.S. Department of Education to any institution.

He also established the Miller Society to recognize \$100,000 of lifetime giving and the enrollment increased by 14%. During this time, the university hosted the first debate for the 2008 presidential race. Hugine gave the greetings at the opening on national TV on NBC to a listening audience of millions. Participating in the debate was a young Senator from Illinois, Barack Obama, who would go on to become the 44th President of the United States and the first African American to hold the position.

On June 16, 2009, Dr. Andrew Hugine, Jr. was selected as the 11th president of Alabama A&M university. A glimpse of the visionary leader that was chosen was revealed in a response to an interview question. When asked how he would deal with challenges facing the university at the time, he politely answered with "as long as I have faith the size of a mustard seed you can move any mountain." His unwavering faith has afforded him 12 years of transformative leadership at AAMU.

Immediately upon his appointment as president of AAMU, Hugine addressed the University's probationary status with the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) resulting in the removal of the university from

SACSCOC's sanction. He also developed a financial plan to address the university's budgetary issues. Among the many transformative accomplishments during his tenure were the following: reorganizing the five academic schools into four colleges: Colleges of Agricultural, Life and Natural Sciences; Business and Public Affairs; Engineering, Technology and Physical Sciences; and Education, Humanities and Behavioral Sciences; securing a \$96 million-dollar financing agreement with the U.S. Department of Education, the largest in the Department's history; construction of a new 580-bed student residence hall; increasing enrollment by 25.83% since Fall 2012; adding ten (10) new academic degree programs; increasing funds from external sources by 146%; establishing the Normal Legacy Society to recognize \$100,000 of life time giving; securing an anonymous \$2.2 million dollar gift from a young alum; successfully completing the University's first ever capital campaign totaling \$27.3 million; expending over \$50 million in upgrading facilities; installation of a million dollar electronic video score board in the stadium; construction of a university event center and welcome center/food court; and strengthening the university's finances as evidenced a budget that now exceeds \$192 million dollars with end of year cash on hand more than forty times the amount in 2009.

In recognition of his many accomplishments, Hugine was named the 2019 HBCU Male President of Year by HBCU Digest. Other honors include honorary chair of the salute to education centennial celebration of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity; included in the 2012 Stellar Alumni Calendar of the South Carolina State University; Educator Award by Essence Magazine; included in the Noteworthy News section of Diverse Issues; featured in the HBCU Times; recipient of commendation for commitment to education by 100 Black Men of America; featured on the winter 2005 and 2006 covers of the Oracle, the national publication of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc.; Professor of Year for South Carolina State University; and listing in the publications, Outstanding Young Men in America, Personalities of the South and Marquis Who's Who. Another honor was the invitation to be the only Non-Chinese speaker at the 50th Celebration of the founding of Nanjing Forestry University in Nanjing, China. Also, upon his retirement, the AAMU Board of Trustees bestowed upon him the title of President Emeritus and the new residence hall was named the Andrew and Abbiegail Hugine Living Learning Complex in honor of he and his wife.

Community, civic and religious organizational affiliations include: St. John AME Church and White Hall AME Church; Life and 50 Year member of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity; Sigma Pi Phi Fraternity; Life Member NAACP; Life member of the SCSU National Alumni Association; 100 Black Men of America; Edisto Masonic Lodge (PHA); United Way of Madison County; elected member of the Orangeburg Consolidated School District Board of Trustees for 10 years; Board of Trustees for the Alabama School of Cybersecurity and Technology; Huntsville Rotary; Huntsville Madison County Chamber of Commerce; and Chair of the South Western Athletics Conference (SWAC) Council of Chancellors and Presidents. He and his wife are members of the SCSU Miller Society and the AAMU Normal Legacy Society.

Dr. Hugine and his wife Abbiegail of almost 50 years, have an adult son, Andrew Hugine, III and daughter-in-law Karen; a daughter, Akilah Hugine-Elmore and a son-in-law, Quincy Elmore; two grandsons, Amir and Kal-el; and a granddaughter, Nylah.

# Mrs. Abbiegail Hugine BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Mrs. Abbiegail Mariam Hamilton Hugine was born in Green Pond, South Carolina, the eldest of eleven children to Isiah and Viola Wright Hamilton. She retired from Orangeburg Consolidated School District Five after a very successful 37-year career in education. While employed with Orangeburg Consolidated School District Five, she was the director of The Technology Center, where she served as instructional leader and monitored and supervised all school operations. During her tenure at The Technology Center, the Center received several awards: The National Blue Ribbon Schools Award; The Red Carpet School Award for customer service; and the Palmetto Gold School Award for achievement for four consecutive years. Other positions held included assistant principal, administrative assistant, chair of the Department of Social Studies and History, and Social Studies teacher. Prior to coming to Huntsville, Alabama, she was the director of a federally funded American History grant, which was designed to improve the performance of social studies teachers.

Her professional development activities included the Orangeburg Consolidated School District Five Strategic Planning Committee; chair of the Social Studies Performance Goals; member of the SREB Making Schools Work Site Visit for Jasper County Public Schools; and consultant with Stuart Flanagan in writing test items for Social Studies Pact Test. Additionally, she was the administrative coordinator for Orangeburg Wilkinson High School Southern Association of Colleges and Schools School Improvement Peer Review Visit; freshman academy administrator; High Schools That Work District Coordinator; SACS Committee administrative chairperson; and the presenter for numerous educational workshops on the local, regional and national levels.

In recognition of her exemplary work and service, she was the recipient of a number of honors and awards, including Orangeburg School District Five Teacher of the Year; Orangeburg-Wilkinson High School Teacher of the Year; South Carolina Law Related Teacher of the Year; Soror of the Year for Beta Zeta Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc.; Mother of the Year for the Orangeburg Chapter of Jack and Jill of America; Outstanding Young Women of America; recipient of the Clara Barton Award for Service as chairperson of the Edisto Chapter of the American Red Cross; the Wil Lou Gray Outstanding Educator Award; and she was listed among Who's

Who Among Outstanding Teachers. In 2014, she was the recipient of the Alabama A&M University Black Tie Gala Advocate of the Year Award.

Presently, she is a member of White Hall AME Church in Green Pond, South Carolina, and St. John AME Church in Huntsville, Alabama. At St. John, she is a member of the Steward Board and the CPR Ministry (Caregivers, Prayer, Respite), The History Makers Committee, the Fifty Plus Auxiliary, the Lay Organization and the Missionary Society. She is a member of the Board of Advisors of the Huntsville Botanical Garden and the North Huntsville Library Capital Campaign Project. Other organizations include the Greater Huntsville Chapter of Links, Inc.; Epsilon Gamma Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. (Life Member and Golden Soror); and the Advisory Board of the Huntsville Literary Association.

At Alabama A&M University, she has initiated an effort to enhance the beautification of the campus and continue the legacy of pride. The genesis of these efforts is spearheaded through the Bulldog Pride Committee, which strives to actualize the University's motto, "Service is Sovereignty." An Endowed Normalite Pavers Scholarship has been set up to help students to complete their degree programs at AAMU. She initiated the First Lady's Scholarship Fund in 2011 to raise scholarship dollars for deserving students who need financial assistance to graduate. This scholarship is also endowed within the AAMU Foundation.

Mrs. Hugine received the Educational Specialist degree from the Citadel, and Master of Education and Bachelor of Arts degrees from South Carolina State University. The First Lady of Alabama A&M University is married to Dr. Andrew Hugine, Jr., president of Alabama A&M University, and they have two adult children: Andrew, III, (Karen) and Akilah (Quincy Elmore); grandsons, Amir and Kalel; and a granddaughter, Nylah.

# About the Clinician Dr. Roland M. Carter



Composer, arranger, conductor, pianist, scholar, researcher, teacher... the list of roles performed by UTC Holmberg Professor of American Music, Roland M. Carter, is never-ending. During his 23-year tenure at The University of Tennessee Chattanooga, Professor Carter conducted choirs, taught classes, accompanied recitals, arranged music, funded concerts, fostered inter-departmental productions, chaired the department, mentored and

recruited students, and promoted affirmative action while at all times retaining the demeanor of a true professional.

To the greater Chattanooga community he has served as an advocate for the arts through his work with Allied Arts of Greater Chattanooga, the Chattanooga Symphony and Opera Association, with a very special promotion of the great musical traditions of the African-American heritage, through his work with The Chattanooga African American Museum, (Bessie Smith Cultural Center) and the Chattanooga Choral Society for the Preservation of African American Song.

Roland Carter served as the Ruth S. Holmberg UTC Foundation Professor of Music at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga. Carter served as Head of the Cadek Department of Music and Conservatory for six years (1989-1995). Prior to returning to his hometown to accept this assignment, he served as Chair of the Department of Music at Hampton (Institute) University and director of its internationally acclaimed choirs for nearly a quarter century.

In addition to teaching performing, Carter has an outstanding record in arts advocacy and service. A life member of the National Association of Negro Musicians, Carter has served on its Board of Directors, Chair of the Committee on Choral Standards, and national President. He is a life member of the American Choral Directors Association. He has held membership in Music Educators National Conference, the Music Teachers National Association, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity. Most recently, he was inducted as a national arts advocate and honorary member of Sigma Iota Theta. Carter has served as a member and co-chair of the NEA Music Advisory Panels for Choruses.

Dr. Carter is founder and CEO of MAR-VEL, a publisher specializing in music by African American composers and traditions.



#### The 2001-2002 Conference Year Literary Report

To Bishop T. Larry Kirkland, Mother Mary Kirkland, Presiding Elder & Mrs. Dwight E. Dillard, Presiding Elder & Mrs. A. L. Hyche, Host Pastor, Reverend and Mrs. James A. Rumph, members of the 124th session of the North Alabama Annual Conference of the Ninth Episcopal District of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, Conference visitors and friends, the Pastor of St. John African Methodist Episcopal Church, Huntsville, Alabama, humbly submits the following annual report.

#### Worship and Christian Education

Sunday Worship Services are held at 8:00 a.m. and 10:50 a.m. Our membership increased by twenty-five (25) members. One (1) infant, two (2) youth and three (3) adults were baptized this year.

Go preach my gospel, saith the Lord. The ministerial staff of St. John continues to grow. Sister Meriam Garrett united with St. John this conference year as a transfer of membership from the Second Episcopal District as an Exhorter and was licensed to preach by the late Presiding Elder Blankenship. Other ministerial staff who continue to assist Pastor McCall are Reverends Kenneth Johnson, James R. Johnson, Claudewell Campbell, and Debra Woods; Brother Raymond Nomel; Reverend Lenwood Purce (of Bethel AME Church, Ensley and a student at Alabama A&M university); and Sister Judith Gardner (of St. Paul AME Church, Hamilton, Bermuda and a student at Alabama A&M University.) Other Licentiates who served during the conference year were Brothers David Perry, Micah Perry, Eric Etheridge, and Darrell Ezell.





Church School, under the direction of Pastor McCall and Superintendent Willie Sandifer, was held each Sunday morning. Church School Anniversary and Promotion Sunday were celebrated in October. A Back-to-School Night of Christian fun, food and fellowship was sponsored by the Church School on August 9. Our Church School youth represented St. John at the Sunday School Convention in June.

The pastor and the ministerial staff led Weekly Prayer and Bible Study Class on Wednesday evenings. On each Wednesday before the first Sunday, Bible Study concludes with Love Feast. Noon Prayer is held each Thursday.

#### St. John Ministries

The **50+ Auxiliary** provided fellowship and growth for seniors. The Annual Harvest Service was held in November and monthly meetings are held on the first Monday of each month. Trips were made to events and sites in the Huntsville area.

The Prison Ministry continued to operate under the leadership of Brother Powers and Brother Burnett. The Pastor and members of the Prison Ministry led several services at Limestone Correctional Facility during March, April and May of this year.

**FoodSOURCE** provided fresh and frozen meats, vegetables and fruit for about half the retail cost. Members and organizations of the church have made monthly donations to purchase FoodSOURCE units to donate to those in need. Volunteers work each month to assist with the collection of funds and the distribution of food.

St. John, **Habitat for Humanity** of Madison County, and four (4) other churches partnered to build a home for the Baker Family during a Building Blitz from August 31– September 14. This is the ninth home St. John members have participated in building.






The **Media Ministry** includes the St. John A.M.E. Newsletter (St. John A.M.E.N.) and the St. John web site on the Internet. This year the St. John A.M.E.N. continued to provide informative articles on church activities at the local, district, and connectional levels; community activities; information about outstanding contributions of our members; and potpourri articles on books, puzzles, and recipes. The newsletter staff published a cookbook, *AMEN: A Taste of St. John and Friends*, this conference year. They also published a weekly Lenten Series entitled "By His Stripes We Are Healed" during Lent.

Our Music Ministry continues to grow and expand under the leadership of our talented and gifted Director of Music and Organist, Brother Rufus Gilmore, III. The Sanctuary Choir sings the first Sunday of each month under the direction of Sister Ellen Washington and Brother Gilmore. The Gospel Choir renders music on the second Sunday of each month under the direction of Mr. Cleveland Wilson and accompanied by Mrs. Antoinette Wilson. The third Sunday music is led by the Children/Youth Choir under the direction of Sister Ellen Washington and accompanied by Mr. Kevin Long. Brother Gilmore directs and accompanies the Male Chorus as they render music on the fourth Sunday. Brother Talbert Cox serves as percussionist each Sunday. New robes were purchased for the Gospel Choir. Membership has increased in all choirs.



The **Van Ministry** provides transportation for trips taken by the organizations within the church, provides transportation to connectional meetings, and provides transportation on Sunday for students and members who desire to attend worship services.

Youth Ministry activities include Church School, Y.P.D., youth ushers and Children/Youth Choir, Vacation Bible School, as well as participation in worship services, District Conference and statewide youth meetings. Our youth represented St. John at the Ninth District YPD Meeting in February, Youth Crusade for Christ in May, and Christian Education Congress in July.





**New Life Ministries** continues to provide a spiritual growth and development course with emphasis on new members. The course is guided by Biblical principles.

The **Telecommunication Ministry** enhances our communication with members and the community by combining the technologies of the telephone and the computer. The pastor delivers prayers and announcements to the entire membership via this system. Organization representatives use this ministry to inform members of meetings and rehearsals.

The Praise Dance Ministry has grown this conference year. A Women's Praise Dance Group was added to this ministry. The Second Annual Praise Dance Workshop was preceded by a Praise Workshop that featured the Praise Dance Groups of St. John; Sister Shona Henry of Bermuda; and Mrs. Ira Cummings and daughters of St. Paul AME Church, Birmingham. Reverend C. C. Cummings, pastor of St. Paul, was the guest preacher. The Second Annual Praise Dance Workshop was held the following Saturday. The guest presenters were Sister Shona Henry and Sister Ira Cummngs.





The Women's Ministry led the planning for the Second Annual Women's Prayer Breakfast on June 29 and the Annual Women's Day Observance on July 14. This ministry plans to support the women of the church by offering mentoring for young women, leadership development opportunities for all, special workshops, focused seminars and small discussion groups devoted to learning more about the Bible and enhancing spiritual growth and development.


#### Special Services and Activities



# A tribute to the Late Presiding Elder E. L. Blankenship.....

During my sixth year as pastor at St. John (1977), the Reverend Dr. E. L. Blankenship was appointed Presiding Elder of the South Birmingham-Huntsville District. He led us with a sense of preparedness. He often reminded us, "It is better to be prepared to fight and not have to fight, than to have to fight and not be prepared." He led us with a tough love, but he never lost his touch of human kindness. He often said and he also lived his own words, "It's nice to be nice," and "You can catch more folk with honey than vinegar." He always tried to make everyone feel important, needed, and he utilized everyone's gifts in the District's work and worship. He recognized the accomplishments of all through scholarships, prizes, awards and accolades.

Elder Blankenship led us with humor. Perhaps someone on the District has found the wood that Esau Wood sawed with the wood-saw, Wood saw wood? Dr. Blankenship could talk with tough tongue twisters and talk with kings, Bishops and Presidents but he kept the common touch. He led us with a strong sense of spirituality and social consciousness. This was felt throughout the connection, country, community, as well as in our congregations. He championed the cause of the poor. He opposed racism and discrimination. "He too sang God Bless America and no coward soul was his."

Finally, Presiding Elder Blankenship led us not only with a sense of preparedness and humor, tough love with human kindness, spirituality with social consciousness; in short, he led the District by ordering his steps in God's Word and by also allowing his wife, Mrs. Mary B. Blankenship, to daily work with him. As the home goes, so goes the nation; as the home goes, so also goes the District. Dr. Blankenship was a family man. He loved his family. He loved the family of God. He was a friend.

Perhaps, one of his favorite scriptures sums up best this tribute of him: Isaiah 40:28-31: "Do you not know? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. He will not grow tired or weary, and his understanding no one can fathom. He gives strength to the weary and increases the power of the weak. Even youths grow tired and weary, and young men stumble and fall; but they who wait on the Lord; shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run and not be weary; they shall walk and not faint."

We thank God for Dr. Blankenship's courage to hold on without complaining and to walk on in the storm in spite of his illness. We thank God for allowing him to stay at his post until He called him to his heavenly reward on May 24, 2002.


Our song is a song of thanksgiving for God's goodness and mercy that have brought us through another year in which we have been blessed to offer ministries in His service to the church and the community.

Kenneth R. Parham's family members include: Lorraine Parham (wife), Wallace (son), and Walter Nikolby Jenkins (nephew).







#### INTRODUCTION

I am so excited that you've joined us for this journey in prayer! I can hardly hold my anticipation in. I believe that God is doing something wonderful in our midst. Yes, as the body of Christ, we are under a Divine mandate to pray at all times. Prayer, however, should not be viewed as an item to check off of our To Do Lists. Prayer – for us – must be the most integral part of our individual lives – the activity we hunger for – the time we are desperate to maintain – the compass for our journey – the lifeblood of our existence. As a church, prayer is our reason for being because God's house is to be a house of prayer for all peoples!

There is no one right way to pray. Prayer is a conversation with God that springs from the heart. The posture we take in prayer ought to include: honesty, humility, openness to others [forgiveness, loving others, etc.], gratitude, faith, living that is line with what is said in prayer, hope – an expectation of God's movement, and an openness to God and God's will. The only wrong way to pray is to pray with pride and self-elevation (Matthew 6:5-8; Luke 18:9-14).

Jesus gave the model prayer – the Lord's prayer (*Matthew 6:9-15*). Acknowledgement of God and show God reverence: Our Father...hallowed be Your name...Your will be done.... Confession of sins: Forgive us our debts.... Thanksgiving to God: For Yours is the kingdom.... Supplication of need: Give us this day.... Many refer to this model of prayer as the ACTS model.

Jesus is not as concerned with the form of the prayer as with the heart of the prayer. What are the desires of your heart? What is the concern in your home? What is the pain of your past that still haunts? What is the vision in your spirit? What is the longing of your soul? Where are your places of uncertainty, fear, shame, promise, joy, praise? Lay all of these before God, and that makes prayer!

As we take this journey, we will look at seven different aspects of prayer. This is not exhaustive, because learning about prayer takes a lifetime. Instead, this is suggestive of what we ought to consider as we focus on prayer. There is an entry for each week which includes a scripture, a focus, an activity, further exploration, and an entry point for journaling. This journal will be used alongside our weekly bible studies. I pray that this will not only meet our need as a church to be galvanized around prayer, but that it will also "enlarge our territory" of love, service, giving, hospitality, faith, and learning.

Fully immerse yourself in this voyage. Don't hold back. Let go and allow God to do a new thing in you! You will be surprised how God will meet you in this season.

Special thanks to our Executive Minister, Rev. Sheri Smith Clayborn for the idea and intention and Janette Smith for the design layout. They both contributed various content throughout.

**WEEK ONE** 

Partnering with God

"For just as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is also dead."

– James 2:26 –

#### Focus:

Since prayer is a dialogue with God, it is a joint effort. Most often, for the answers to our prayers to materialize, we must do some work alongside God. For example, if you are praying for God to bless you with a new job, then you may need to partner with God by filling out the job application. When we find that our prayers are slow in being answered, we may need to ask ourselves what steps we have taken to partner with God on helping the prayer come to fruition.

Activity:

Make a list of the things or people for which you are praying. Next to each prayer request, write what steps you are taking to partner with God to help the prayer be answered.


#### Note:

God is not expecting us to do God's job. God is expecting us to do our job. There are gifts and skills that God has placed within each of us. Those resources are the foundation to the answers to our prayers. When we use our gifts in the direction of our prayers, God will do the things that we are unable to accomplish. For example, after we fill out the job application (our part), God will give us favor with the hiring manager (God's part). If we don't do our part, God's part is useless. Faith without works is dead!

Journal Prompts:

When you made the list of ways in which you have partnered with God, did you find that you are actively working on your prayer? If so, describe your progress and what you're expecting/needing God to do. If not, detail the obstacles you face in partnering with God for your prayers. How will you start working with God on those prayer requests?

Being Present with God

"Stay awake and pray that you may not come into the time of trial; the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak." – Matthew 26:41

#### Focus:

Prayer is being present with God. This is how we partner with God. When we pray, we are doing more than just talking – giving our wish list to the Almighty. We are listening for God, looking for God, and being attentive to God. Prayer is noticing our limitations and God's infinite ability. Prayer is paying attention to God's movement in our lives and in the lives of others. When we search for God's purpose in a situation – even if it's hurtful – or when we look for God in another person – including one that is opposed to us, we are increasing the effectiveness of our prayers. Prayer is our being present in the moment. To do anything less is to fall asleep.

#### Activity:


Access a timer on your smartphone or other device as you prepare for prayer. Choose a place that's quiet or at least away from mainstream traffic. Sit quietly for (1) one full minute with no barriers around what you think about or see in your mind. Write down what you remember. BE honest. Now, set your stopwatch for another minute. Before you begin this time - pray and ask God in earnest, what He wants you to get out of this 7-week Prayer Journey. Start the timer. Listen. Write down what you see and hear.


#### Note:

Have you ever experienced a conversation with a person who is constantly looking past you trying to listen to other nearby conversations? You realize that the person is not fully "present" with you. That is what Jesus discovered when the disciples fell asleep during his prayer. They lacked engagement in his prayer time. Matthew's gospel says that their eyes got heavy. Luke's version says that they were in grief. Being present in prayer can be difficult, but it is not impossible. When we eliminate distractions and focus on God's goodness, the more we are able to be present.

#### Journal Prompts:

Take note of where your mind wanders when you're not focused on God. Write about them and assess why these things take 'center stage' in your mind. What happens when you turn them over to God through prayer? Does your perspective shift? If so, how?

#### WEEK THREE Perpetual Prayer

"Pray without ceasing." - 1 Thessalonians 5:17

"...Jesus told them a parable about their need to pray always and not to lose heart." - Luke 18:1

#### Focus:

Prayer is continuous. In order to start, maintain, and build any relationship, a continuing flow of communication must be established. Prayer is NOT a haphazard or random activity. Prayer is a lifestyle. Communication within a relationship is most vital, and it's more than talking with that person. It also involves listening, being present, and – when not present with him/her – *thinking* about that person. When we are commanded to pray without ceasing, we are instructed to talk with, listen to, be present with, and to think about God at all times. Without any of these forms of communication, our relationship with God is weakened greatly. Praying without ceasing – takes practice.

Activity:

Begin to 'practice' perpetual prayer, by increasing your prayer time this week. Increase the amount of time you pray each day – even if it is just two or three minutes. Then, increase the number of times you pray each day.

#### Note:

Praying perpetually seems absurd from a practical perspective. How can we pray while at work, at our children's soccer game, at the fraternity meeting, in the check-out line of the grocery store, in the middle of our conversation with our best friend, at the town hall meeting while talking with the mayor, in the car while a truck cuts us off on the highway, during an argument, when on a date, or during the child's birthday party at Chuck E. Cheese? When we do most activities – no matter how focused we are – we usually have another thought in our minds at the time. We must take every opportunity to talk to, listen to, be present with, be open to, and to think about God. By placing our thoughts toward God in our daily lives, the more prayer becomes a part of who we are. We become prayer!

**Journal Prompts:** 

Create and take note of opportunities where you have 'side bar' conversations with God this week. Where were you? What prompted the prayer? Did you sense God's presence?

Standing in the Gap

"I looked for a [person] among them who would build up the wall and stand before me in the gap on behalf of the land so I would not have to destroy it..." – Ezekiel 22:30

#### Focus:

Prayer is only complete when we lift up the needs of those around us. God commands us to love our neighbors (Mark 12:30-31). By loving them, we show love for God. An essential way to love someone is to pray for her. Please note that neighbors include more than just friends. We are also required to pray for our enemies (Luke 6:27-28). To find out how to focus your prayers for another, ask that person in what ways prayer is needed. In addition, take time to observe that person's needs yourself because you may see a need that he misses. In your prayers for that person, ask God what she/he needs and allow God's Spirit to lead your thoughts and words (Romans 8:26.)

#### Activity:


Take note of the names or faces of people who 'pop' into your mind this week. Write down their names. Ask God who needs your prayers? Write down those names. Pray for them all, and if possible - call them to 'check in.' Do this with no motive of telling them you prayed for them.

#### Note:

Praying for another person is called intercession. Interceding – or standing in the gap – for someone else is primarily based on putting that person's prayer requests before the Lord. However, there are more levels. Intercession also includes sacrifice. To pray for another requires a sacrifice of time, energy, spirit, and perhaps resources (faith without works is dead!). Standing in the gap can also involve a sacrifice of self. To intercede means to stand between the person for whom you pray and the issue that the person faces. When we intercede for someone, we are positioning ourselves to take on (for a certain amount of time) the concern affecting that person. We are bearing the burden of another (Galatians 6:2). This kind of prayer is for those called and willing to accept those sacrifices. Be sure to recognize that any progress we have made is a direct result of the prayers of another on our behalves. Someone stood in the gap for you and me!

#### Journal Prompts:

Take note of the people you thought of and prayed for. How does it feel to pray for others? What came out of your 'check-in' conversations?

WEEK FIVE Corporate Prayer Page 18

"Again, truly I tell you, if two of you agree on earth about anything you ask, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven. For where two or three are gathered in my name,

I am there among them." - Matthew 18:19-20

#### Focus:

Prayer can be extremely powerful when done with other believers. This is what we call Corporate Prayer. This form of prayer can be powerful. One of the reasons group dynamic has the potential to experience the power of God is because our effectiveness in prayer is not solely dependent on the size of the gathering. Notice, the scripture does not require a huge group... "where two or three are gathered in my name..." The size of the gathering only matters to the extent that the individuals have developed their personal prayer lives. When people with developed, personal prayer lives connect with one another in corporate prayer they are able to experience more of God. It is when we know God's name (who God is which also leads us in what we should ask for) that we can feel that God knows our name...that is Power!

#### Activity:

- 1. Commit to developing your closet (personal) prayer life. Pray (with listening) daily.
- 2. Commit and show up for corporate prayer at our meeting this week.
- 3. When you arrive, begin to center yourself. Remember the goal is not necessarily to be the leader of the prayers but to be a worthy (earnest) participant.
  - Stay present during the prayer / Exalt God in a new way / Visualize what you are praying for coming to pass (healing, loving kindness, employment, etc)

#### Note:

Remember: "The whole is greater than the sum of its parts." So when we move the focus from ourselves to the needs of the whole, we have an opportunity to petition God in a way that can yield greater power, through greater access.

#### WEEK SIX

#### Focus:

Page 20

Prayer is a spiritual weapon (2 Corinthians 10:4). The conversation we have with God is quite powerful. In that dialogue, God can let us know who our enemy is, where danger is upcoming, and how to prepare for the challenges ahead. Our talk with God also gives us a place to confess our sins, frustrations, hurts, desires, and questions. In prayer, God has a place to express His will for our lives and to express frustrations with us when we err. This conversation with God has the power to cast out demons, bring healing, open jail cells, break addictions, mend marriages, convey comfort in times of bereavement, locate resources, clarify vision, increase faith, find human help, overturn sorrow, instill forgiveness for self and others, free the mind, lift self-esteem, eradicate fear, protect from evil attacks, provide in times of lack, and supply peace in the midst of chaos.

**Activity:** Read the scriptures below and identify the kind of warfare and breakthrough that takes place with prayer (for example – healing, fight against sin, victory over an enemy, etc.)

#### Note:

Prayer that takes us through warfare into breakthrough comes boldy before God's throne focused on a particular need, desire, or outcome (Hebrews 4:16). We ask, seek, and knock for what we want (Matthew 7:7). We must call upon all the faith within us (Mark 11:22-24). We even make sacrifices to clarify our focus. One such sacrifice is fasting – abstaining from anything that distracts our attention away from God. Some issues are so great that they can only be resolved when we add fasting to our prayers (Mark 9:29). In these prayers, mountains can be moved, demons can be cast out, and sicknesses can be healed. God WILL move! We may not be able to predict God's plan, but God will do something. God will transform us – our perspective, faith, courage, hope, resolve, love, wisdom, thinking, vision, and service – and elevate us to where God wants us. Our spiritual development is a primary weapon in the war! Be aware that the victory is not just in what we can see; victory is also about what takes place within us and in the Spirit!

#### **Journal Prompts:**

What areas in your life need warfare prayer? Note how you can implement each kind of breakthrough prayer (from the activity) into your life.

### WEEK SEVEN In the Spirit

"...for we do not know how to pray...but that...Spirit intercedes...." - Romans 8:26

"Pray in the Spirit at all times in every prayer and supplication." - Ephesians 6:18

"...I will pray with the spirit, but I will pray with the mind also...." - 1 Corinthians 14:15

#### Focus:

Prayer is a dialogue with God that is established and enhanced by God. Yes, we play our part in prayer, and we can initiate the conversation. Yet, prayer is most powerful when God within us connects to God beyond us (Psalm 42). To reach the place where we pray in the Spirit, we must yield our wills to God. Even though we can pray in the way that Jesus taught (Matthew 6) and we can pray for the things/issues/people we know, we must admit that we do not have God's larger perspective. When we yield our desires to God's care and acknowledge that our insight is limited, we say ves to the Spirit interceding for us in prayer. What is released to us is fresh power that is indescribable, wisdom that is amazing, and peace that goes beyond comprehension. While this sounds great, it may not feel good in the moment. Jesus yielded His will to God's will (Luke 22:41-44). He did get strength and yet had great anguish at the same time in His prayer. All that emerged during His prayer time infused Him with the power to face the cross! When we pray, we pray with our understanding and desires about the job, about the marriage, about the family drama, about the bills, about the health concerns, about the dreams, about the relationship, about the fear, about the uncertainty, about the journey, about the regret, about the anger, about the expectation, and about the memories. In that same prayer, we must allow room for God's will. We have to yield our hope on a desired outcome, be obedient to the leading of the Spirit, and place the outcome in God's hands - trusting that God knows our needs.

#### Note:

Praying in the Spirit may not be as grand as Jesus' prayer in the Garden of Gethsemane. It may result in a gentle nudge from God to go in an unexpected or unwanted direction. It may not come as a light show. Rather, it may manifest in a small voice (1 Kings 19:12). As well, praying in the Spirit may manifest in very radical and unique ways. Speaking in tongues – praying in a heavenly prayer language – is one of those radical forms. Often, when the bible refers to praying in the Spirit, those authors are including the idea of speaking in tongues. Speaking in tongues is the result of a person yielding his/her will (and his/her tongue) to God. The Spirit has taken over the person's prayer and voice since that person was open and willing. There is no particular formula on how this kind of prayer comes about. A person must be yielded to God, desiring more of God, and actively searching out new ways to connect with God. In God's time, God blesses with a new prayer language. Read Acts 2; Acts 10; 1 Corinthians 12-14.

#### **Journal Prompts:**

Identify and list areas in your life where you are NOT open and yielded. Why are those areas closed? What will it take for you to be open? How would your prayer life change if you were?

#### We honor these World War I veterans who are relatives of St. John AME Members

Mr. Arthur L. Heyward, Sr. the uncle of Col. (Ret) James O. Heyward served in WW1. Arthur Heyward was born in Charleston, South Carolina on April 11, 1893 to Archie W. and Luready Heyward. He and his brother Julian three years his senior lost their parents thru death in 1898. They were raised by his mother's brother Isham Gary, Jr. on a farm in Sumter County, South Carolina.

Arthur was drafted and served in the US Army in WW1. He was assigned to a Quartermaster unit. His unit was sent to France. After the end of the war, he was honorably discharged and returned to Sumter County, SC. He married the late Katie Brogdon. They were the parents of three children who are all deceased. His brother Julian was so proud of his brother's military service and he kept a large picture of Arthur in uniform on the wall in his home.

In 1959, Arthur accompanied his nephew then LT. James Heyward to the Brooklyn Army Depot (Docks) on official business. It reminded him of the preparation of his trip to France during WW1. Arthur died in April 1966 and is buried in Sumter, South Carolina.



Mr. Q.T. Walker (1893-1950), paternal grandfather of Dr. Arthur L. Walker, Jr., was one of more than 350,000 African-American soldiers to serve this nation during World War I. Q.T. (referred to as "Cute" or "Mr. Cute" by the town's black population) grew up in Bridgeport, Alabama, a small town in the extreme Northeastern corner of Jackson County. He was one of 14 children born to Henry and Cora Walker.

While working as a coal miner in Eastern Kentucky, he was inducted into the United States Army and served as a private in the "Colored" 515<sup>th</sup> Engineer Services Battalion, which, by all accounts, was a labor unit.

After being discharged at the war's conclusion, Q.T returned to Bridgeport. He later married Julia Criswell and to their union was born two children: Arthur L. Walker, Sr. and Dorothy Walker Blair.

Q.T. Walker died March 5, 1950 at age 56. He was buried with full military honors in Lloyd Cemetery in Bridgeport, Alabama.

### Veterans Day Guest Speaker

#### LIEUTENANT COLONEL (RET.) ANGELO W. JOHNSON

Lieutenant Colonel (Ret.) Angelo William Johnson is a native of Huntsville. He is a 1986 graduate of Alabama Agricultural & Mechanical University with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Civil Engineering Technology. He earned his Commission through the Alabama A & M University's Army ROTC Program. He continued his studies and graduated with a Masters in Military Arts & Science from the United States Air Force, Air University, Montgomery, Alabama in 2001. LTC.(Ret.) Johnson served his country honorably for twenty-eight years in many capacities and retired in 2012.



LTC.(Ret.) Johnson, has continuously built "Teams of Teams", led, taught, coached, and mentored, over 60,000 elite warriors on 4 continents and

9 sovereign nations. Several highlights of his career were, becoming a Special Forces Officer and serving as the Director of Training and Development at the U. S. Army John F. Kennedy Special Warfare Center and School. However, he affirms that his greatest accomplishment was returning from multiple combat operations without losing a soldier.

He also served as Director, U. S. Army Special Operations Digital Training Center, and trained over 10,000 U. S. Army Special Operations Force Warriors on Digital Systems to standard with a budget of \$6.2 million annually. He transformed the U. S. Army Special Operations Force Language program to a \$20 million, 5 year Omni Bus Program and improved speaking capability. He was the military advisor to an Iraqi General commanding a 70,000 member Iraqi Security Armed Force engaged in counterinsurgency operations.

A global business leader post retirement, he became the Director of Operations for Reliant Global Solutions (RGS), and Defense/Security Consulting Associate for Booz Allen Hamilton's International Office. His primary responsibility was engaging the Kuwait Ministry of Defense (MOD), and the Ministry of Interior (MOI) at the National Security level.

His professional affiliations include membership in the American Business Council of Kuwait (2012-15); Cape Fear Regional Bureau for Community Action, Inc.; Special Forces Association Life Membership; Triple Nickel Parachute (555th) Association; and Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc.

LTC.(Ret.) Angelo W. Johnson most important of all is a son of St. John AME. His parents were Mr. &. Mrs. Ollie Elworth (Mary Alice Powers) Johnson.

Lieutenant Colonel (Ret.) Angelo William Johnson is married to Mrs. Lauroselle Ray Johnson, a 1984 graduate of Alabama A&M University. They have two adult children, Mr. Jared Austin Ray Johnson, (Florida A&M graduate) of Atlanta, GA., Miss Lindsay Olivia Johnson, (North Carolina A&T graduate) of Durham, North Carolina and a beloved pet Shih Tzu named Freedom Shakur. He and his wife reside in Fayetteville, North Carolina. He is the sibling to Mrs. Janice Johnson-Hereford, Mr. Jesse Johnson, Ms. Barbara Johnson and Mr. Ronald Johnson.
