


His character was strengthened by doting parents who provided him the best possible opportunities and odeled sound Christian Values. Those values were nurtured through his membership in St. John A.M.E.


In 2009, Brian started his own company, Chief Entertainment, at the age of 34. He took a leap of faith



Jerry Jerome Baldwin was born to
Jerry and Aurelia Harris Baldwin in
Montgomery, Alabama on January 7,
1945. He transitioned on February 23,
2017. "What mattered most... was the
dash between those dates." (Linda
Ellis) Jerry made a difference by
acquiring an excellent education,
doing valuable work, developing a
wholesome family life, and giving
worthwhile community service.

He filled the dash between the dates with an excellent education. After graduating from Alabama State Laboratory High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in electronics from Tuskegee University and a master's degree in personnel administration from Alabama A&M University. From the National Defense Industrial Association, he earned certification as a configuration and data manager. From the Institute of Configuration Management and Arizona State University's College of Engineering and Applied Sciences he earned Management II certification. Equipped with excellent technical skills and knowledge, he made profound contributions to the Marshall Space Flight Center.

After serving as a configuration management supervisor with the United Space Boosters, Incorporated, he joined the configuration Management branch of the Marshall Space Flight Shuttle Projects Office. There he held a series of challenging positions, including Configuration and Data Management Team Lead, Deputy HH Group Lead and Senior Lead Configuration and Data Management Auditor for the Product Assurance Office of the Marshall Space Flight Engineering Directorate. In each position, he exhibited superior leadership skills and provided technical directions to teams of professional engineers and specialists assigned to major programs and projects. He also assisted with the supervision and management of civil servants, monitored contracts and served as contracting officer.

Jerry's wholesome family life was equally as successful as his productive career. On August 5, 1972, he married Miss Gwendolyn Davis whom he met at Alabama A&M University. Their 44-year marriage fostered a supportive and enriching bond of love, friendship, and family life. He enjoyed spending time with their son Brian and volunteering with his band and Boy Scout activities. Together, the family worshipped at St. John African Methodist Episcopal Church where Jerry was a longtime steward.

Filling his dash with worthwhile community service, he chose activities closely aligned with his family and career. Just as he served through supporting Brian's activities, he also volunteered for science-related community service. For many years, he judged science fairs in local school competitions and served as facilitator to a NASA employee team which completed several improvement projects. 





Everett was the third of four sons born to the union of Estol and Eula Brooks in scenic Pearisburg, Virginia. He was preceded in death by his parents and two brothers.



# Obituary





# Obituary

Willie Mingo Clark, the only child born to the late John C. and Margaret M. Perdew Clark, began his life's journey, October 12, 1931 in Troy Alabama.

He was educated in the public schools of Troy, Alabama and graduated from Academy Street High School where he was involved in a number of extra-curricular activities, mainly football, track and choir.

Mr. Clark began his collegiate study at Alabama Agricultural and Mechanical College in 1950 where he sang in the College Choir and earned the B.S. Degree in Industrial Arts Education. He was drafted into the U.S. Army upon graduation and was honorably discharged two years later. After his tour of duty in the Army, Mingo continued his studies at AAMU, earning Masters Degrees in Trade and Industrial Education and Administration and Supervision. Later, he earned a Ph.D. in Education.

In 1954, he married his high school sweetheart, Lou Verlon Banks. This union produced two children: a son, Carlos who preceded him in death and a daughter, Cassandra.

Mingo accepted Christ at an early age and was very active in his church as he was gifted with a beautiful tenor voice. In 1957, he relocated to Huntsville and united with St. John A.M.E. Church where he served faithfully until his death. He served in numerous leadership roles including Trustee Board, Stewart Board, and several choirs.

Dr. Clark was an avid educator and loved working with youth. He began his 35 year teaching career in 1956 as an Adult-Education teacher in Troy, Alabama. One year later, he accepted the Industrial Arts teaching position at Councill High School in Huntsville. In 1964 he became the Diversified Occupation Coordinator at Butler High School. It was here that he teamed up with local business leaders to start the Youth Opportunity Program which became the first high-school cooperative-education program in the state. Along with Dr. Werner Von Braun, Dr. Clark began arranging for students to work at Marshall Space Flight Center (MSFC) and the Army

Missile Command. In 1972, Mingo left this teaching position at S.R. Butler High School and took an administrative position as assistant principal at J. O. Johnson High School where he served for 21 years until his retirement in 1993.

His honors and awards were numerous and include Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. "Man of the Year" and induction into the "District of Alabama Hall of Fame." He also served as Southern Regional Vice-President and Director of National Conventions. June 4, 1983 was declared "Willie Mingo Clark Day in Huntsville" by Mayor Joe Davis at a dinner given at the Carriage Inn in his honor. Recently, the North Alabama Educators Credit Union (NAECU) named the Sparkman Branch in his honor for his 30+ years of dedicated service as a board member.

Professional and civic affiliations include HEA, AEA, NEA, AVA, AAMU Alumni Association, North Alabama Educators Credit Union (NAECU) Board, Athletic Booster Club (ABC Club), Kiwanis, and Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Incorporated.

His beautiful tenor voice will surely be missed from his beloved Alpha Phi Alpha Ensemble. This group sang by special request at numerous venues and Alpha Regional and National Conventions all over the country.

He leaves to cherish his memory a loving and devoted wife, Lou Verlon Banks Clark; two daughters: Cassandra Clark (Tommy) Thompson of Huntsville, AL; and Beverly (Stanley) Hinckley of U.S. Virgin Islands; four granddaughters: Kristin Marie Thompson, Jacquelyn Nicole Thompson, Brooke Dionne Thompson of Huntsville, AL and Lori (Anthony) Gibbons of Rochester, New York; two great granddaughters: Audriana Ni'Shae and Makenzie Danielle Brown of Huntsville, AL; one cousin, James W. Curtis of Decatur, GA; three sisters-in-law: Annie (James) Stringer of Dayton, OH, Jimmie Lois Banks and Vera (Bruno) Carter of Detroit, MI; one brother-in-law, Johnny Banks of Miami, FL; one god daughter, Angela F. (Pizas) Smith of Louisville, KY; and a host of nieces, nephews, extended family and friends.





We little knew that morning that God was going to call your name. In life we loved you dearly, in death we do the same.




Hazel's civic commitment was also evident. Her civic affiliations included Eta Phi Beta Sorority, Inc. and the Miles College Alumni Association.





known then as "Greater St. John AME." This is the structure that still stands. today.



Mrs. Houston was faithful to give her time, talent and resources. She always enjoyed fellowship with her church family.









# Obituary

Ernest C. Jones was born August 6, 1933, in Huntsville, Alabama. His connection to St. John AMEC spans several generations; his grandfather was a founding member of the church. His parents, Preston and Mildred Jones, were also members of St. John and were well-known in the community as the owners of *Jones Groceries* - a local landmark. Ernest assisted his parents there for many years. Ernest was known world-wide as "Alabama Red". He departed this life on August 25, 2014, at home surrounded by Family.

Ernest was preceded in death by his parents, his sister-Nellie Maxie, his brother-Henry "Hank" Jones and his brother-David Jones and son-Gary Eugene Jones. Ernest attended William H. Council School and was the first African-American paper carrier in Huntsville.



In 1949, he moved to Ft. Wayne, Indiana where he was employed by General Electric for several years. While there, he continued his love for mechanics and learning how things work. Ernest met and married the late Lavina White, and to that union five children were born.

Ernest was a traveling man, having visited many places across the country including Chicago, parts of Tennessee and even ended up in Vancouver, Washington for a short time where he worked in the shipyard, when work was abundant as a result of World War II.

Around 1953, he felt the call to move back home to Huntsville with his children and pursue his passion to be an entrepreneur and own businesses. After returning to Huntsville, he met the love of his life - Lorene Sledge. They married on Christmas Eve of 1963. To this union two children were born. Ernest absolutely loved cars and operated an auto mechanic shop for several years. He even worked in a Nascar pit crew, and raced for a short stint against Darrell Waltrip and other Nascar drivers. Ernest also shared his passion for auto mechanics and taught his trade to many students. Some of them went on to own their own successful shops.

While the country was in unrest, battling for civil-rights, Ernest was the first Black to enlist the efforts of white men to protest the inequality. The Turkish Army soldiers who joined him sitting in protest at the counter at GC Murphy Department store were visiting Redstone Arsenal at the time. Erney says the soldiers were forced to leave Huntsville shortly after that, for getting involved in the politics of our country.

Ernest was a man of many talents and was always his own Boss. He owned and operated the highly popular Night Life Club on Holmes Ave., which was mentioned and noted in "Rocket City Rock & Soul" by Jane DeNeefe. The Night Life was located on Holmes Avenue for many years and later moved to Posey Street where it was known all over the Tennessee Valley as Erney's. It was the first club in the area to have a lighted dance floor, which he designed and built with his sons.

Ernest returned to his roots by operating the family grocery store in what was then called, The 10<sup>th</sup> Calvary Hill area. Jones Groceries was a pillar of the Northwoods Community for many years. Ernest later changed the name of the family business to Erney's Groceries.

While Erney and his wife operated the store, he embarked upon a new adventure. He launched Erney's Construction by teaching himself and becoming proficient in running all the equipment necessary to finish concrete, build foundations, swimming pools, plus bush-hogging and other skills needed to be a landscaper. The family often says it was just in his blood, since his Grandfather was a Brick Mason who made his own bricks.

Wanting to get back into business on the social scene, Erney turned over the grocery store to his brother and continued his construction work during the day. In 1977 he purchased the property for, and later opened a new night club on Pulaski Pike. Can you guess the name? Erney's! That third run of Erney's became 'the' premiere night spot in Huntsville. The club ran strong for over 11 years. In 1990, the club was renovated and reopened as a restaurant. Ironically, the longitude and latitude coordinates of that location at 1605 Pulaski Pike during the 2000 census proved to be the exact center of the population for Madison County.

Erney built many friendships through the club and restaurant. It wasn't uncommon for people to stop him or Ms. Lorene through the years to share stories and fond memories of their times at the restaurant. He remained in the true spirit of an entrepreneur to the end, still operating as a commercial landlord.




#### **OBITUARY**

Mackey accepted the Lord as her Savior at an early age, and joined the Mitchell Springs Methodist Church in Lanett, Alabama.


Mrs. Mackey was a May 24, 1948 graduate of Lanett Accredited High School, Lanett, Alabama. She had previously attended the historic

New Hope School in Chambers County, AL, one of the historic Rosenwald schools established in Alabama to educate African-American children in the segregated South, before advancing to high school. On June 17, 1950 she married the love of her life, Mr. Paul William Mackey in West Point, Georgia, and they remained life partners for 53 years until his death on August 22, 2003. As a dedicated wife, Mrs. Mackey elected to become a member of the Baptist faith in order to attend church services as a family.



Mrs. Mackey was in the process of becoming a Licensed Practical Nurse, but changed her "career" to dedicated wife and mother. After the birth of their two oldest children, Mr. and Mrs. Mackey became a part of the second great migration of African-Americans from the South, seeking better opportunities for their family. They settled in Brooklyn, New York, and Mr. Mackey worked two jobs so that she could stay at home and nurture their children.

In 1967, the Mackey family returned to the South, settling in LaFayette, Alabama, to "live off of the land". As proud homeowners they began raising their children on homegrown fruits, vegetables, eggs, and meats, growing organic foods before organic was popular. They taught their children the value of a dollar, but more importantly they taught them the value of knowing and trusting in the LORD. Later, Mrs. Mackey started working as a seamstress so that she could help her children to attend college, working at Playtex International (LaFayette, AL) until they closed, Terry Manufacturing, (Roanoke, AL) and lastly, Russell Corporation (LaFayette, AL) where she retired early in order to take care of the love of her life.



Mrs. Mackey was the epitome of a Christian woman. She did everything from the heart, living and walking in faith, not by sight. She not only regularly attended church services and bible study, but also served as a Sunday School teacher. She sang hymns at home as she cooked, as she sewed, and as a comfort to her children. Not only did Mrs. Mackey sing in the pews, but she also sang in the choir, performing solos when requested. Additionally, she sang solos as a part of a singing troupe named "The Old Ship of Zion" in LaFayette, Al. 

From her birth on December 4, 1899 to her parents, Edward and Maltie Robinson, to her homegoing on August 18, 1989, Mrs. Bertha Robinson McCall gave to all, her life was touched, a legacy of a devoted Christian. 

# Homer Littl efi eld McCall T

Sunrise: February 1, 1941 - Sunset: November 22, 2019

"Be faithful until death, and I will give you the crown of life." -Revelation 2:10



A product of Montgomery, Alabama, Homer Lattlefield McCall I was the youngest of three children born to the late Edward and Bertha Robinson McCall. He was also preceded in death by a brother, Edward Jr., and a sister. Barbara Ann McCall Thomas. He received his calling as a child and at a tender age and found himself consoling and reassuring family members of God's love. When he accepted the call to preach, he immediately sought mentorship with Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., who ordained him in the ministry and lived three doors down from his home on South Jackson Street. He delivered Dr. King's newspaper and cut his lawn to which Dr. King once noted, "Homer, you're mowing that lawn like Michelangelo carved, like Shakespeare wrote poetry, like Leonardo Da Vinci and all his works. You're doing it so well that the host of angels will have to pause and say 'there stands a great street sweeper'" and that inspired him to do even better. He excelled in academia and accelerated from the tenth grade from Alabama State University, Laboratory High School to Morehouse College. He not only graduated from Morehouse College in 1962 with a B. A. degree in English and French, but also continued his educational development via many rare

opportunities, such as matriculation at the Sorbonne, University of Paris, France, Exeter College, University of Oxford, England, and the Yale University Divinity School, New Haven, CT. Dr. McCall received the Master of Divinity (1975) and the Doctor of Ministry in (1980) degrees from Vanderbilt University, Nashville, TN.

While as an instructor of English and French at Daniel Payne College, Homer met Mable, who caught his eye and he knew she was the one to be his partner in life and in love. The two became one on November 27, 1970. They were married for 45 consecutive years until her untimely death on July 8, 2016.

Dr. McCall was the pastor of two circuit churches, St. Phillips A.M.E., Margaret, Alabama and Ward Chapel A.M.E., Warrior, Alabama. One Sunday morning on the way to St. Phillips, Mable told Homer that she "wished that the Lord and Bishop Robinson would have mercy on us." That day, at church, there were two members and two dollars in the offering. Later that day, Dr. McCall received a phone call from Bishop Hubert Robinson's secretary telling him to call the Bishop. He called Bishop Robinson and he told him that he had a dream to send Homer McCall to Huntsville and that he would like to meet with him at his office on the following Saturday for his appointment to St. John, since he would be in Florida that week. Homer responded with "Let me pray on it." Mable, known for her tell-it-like-it-is personality, told Homer, "You pray, I'm packing." Dr. McCall served as the pastor of St. John A.M.E. Church, Huntsville, for 40 years prior to returing on October 19, 2011.

While pastoring in the African Methodist Episcopal Church, he was always willing to serve and share his talents. Dr. McCall facilitated numerous workshops and served on various committees at the local, state and Connectional levels. He served the Ninth Episcopal District of the A.M.E. Church as a Delegate for each General Conference during his pastoral leadership. In 2001, he attended the World Methodist Conference in Brighton, England. He and Mrs. McCall led a workshop for the Pastor and First Lady Marriage Seminar for the 8th, 10th, and 12th Districts of the A.M.E. Church. Dr. McCall also served the Ninth District as the Dean of Ministers and Secretary of the North Alabama Conference until his retirement. In 2010, he and Mrs. McCall were awarded the Pastor and First Lady of the Year Award from the Ninth Episcopal District. Various events

and ministries were founded under Dr. McCall's leadership at St. John, such as, the AAMU Day, which continues to connect the founder of Alabama A&M University, Dr. William Hooper Councill, who also founded St. John A.M.E. Church; Feeding the Homeless Ministry/Soup Kitchen, which went from feeding 1-2 now feeds over thousands; Prison Ministry; Scholarship Committee awarding and recognizing students in the congregation, to name a few.

Dr. McCall was well respected by legions of past and current students, faculty, staff and administrators at Alabama A&M University, to which prior he taught at Sparkman High School. At AAMU he was often called upon to provide spiritual counseling and leadership at the university and in the community when the need would arise. He was often heard during his tenure offering the invocation at university and sporting events and regularly attending the football and basketball games. He served as an Assistant Professor in the Department of English and Foreign Languages and as University Chaplain. In 2010, Dr. McCall retired from Alabama A&M University after 38 years of service and received the distinct honor of Professor Emeritus in 2010 and Chaplain Emeritus in 2011. And in May, 2017 was honored with an Endowed Scholarship in his name at his beloved AAMU.

Dr. McCall was involved in religious, educational, civic, and community activities and received many honors and awards in each area. He was a Life Member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Morehouse Alumni Association and NAACP. Dr. McCall was called upon and chosen to serve in many capacities, such as Leadership Alabama Class of 2003; Leadership Huntsville/Madison County Class of 1999; AAMU Community Development Corporation; UNCF Community Wide Committee; Member of the Board of Directors, American Heart Association, Huntsville Madison County; Spiritual Director North Alabama Habitat for Humanity; Chaplain, Huntsville Chapter 100 Black Men of America; and President, Greater Huntsville Interdenominational Ministerial Fellowship (1997-1999) and member until his retirement.

Dr. McCall was a prayer warrior. He readily petitioned God in a most eloquent and earnest way, whether in a worship service, at a public event, in a hospital room or on a telephone communication. His sermons demonstrated the formal religious training as well as the life experience and belief system of one who can offer Christ and chronicle God's goodness. Under the direction and guidance of the Holy Spirit, his ministry emphasized and implemented Stewardship, Evangelism and Outreach, Church Growth and the Word of God preached to save souls and serve people. His inspiration continues to live through the hearts and minds of his sons and daughters in ministry and all lives that he has touched. He was an exemplary leader, minister and teacher. He was often heard reciting one of his favorite scriptures, Psalm 23, lining the hymn, Blessed Assurance and quoted saying, "Take one day at a time and keep the faith" and "love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul and with all your mind and love your neighbor as yourself." He would say further, "I cannot lift you up without lifting myself up, I cannot tear you down without tearing myself down, so lift up Jesus, lift up others and you will lift up yourself as well," and "the best is yet to come." He earnestly, wholeheartedly, even until his death, was heard saying, "I've always tried to treat people right." We were blessed to encounter such a man that treated people right, lived his life according God's Will, and loved all mankind. Thank God for Reverend Doctor Homer Littlefield McCall.

Dr. McCall emphasized that his first commitment was to God, followed by his undying love to his family. He leaves to cherish his loving memory three children: Homer (Shakira) McCall II, Towson, Maryland, Sonya (Darryl) McCall-Shepard, Washington, DC and Gale (Gerald, Jr.) McCall-Teague, Madison, Alabama; seven grandchildren: Madison McCall, Jacob McCall, Aria Taylor, Lauryn Shepard, Zuri Shepard, Genae Teague and Zoe Teague; two brothers-in-law: Melvin Jones, Sawyerville, Alabama and Calvin Jones, Oak Park, Illinois; one sister-in-law, Martha (Zedock) Long, Cleveland, Ohio; and a host of nieces and nephews, cousins, godchildren, and friends.







# LIFE REFLECTIONS Mable Jones Mc Call

A product of Hale County, Alabama, Mable McCall was the youngest of four children born to the late Calvin and WillieBell Jones. She was also preceded in death by a brother Calvin Morris. Mable was tenacious as a child, always trying out new things and discovering new possibilities. After graduating from Hale County Training School, Mable went to

Cleveland, Ohio to work for two years before returning home to be with her mother after her father died. While there, she contacted a friend who was attending Daniel Payne College to find out more about the school. She applied, was accepted and graduated from Daniel Payne which is where she met Homer Littlefield McCall who was teaching English and French and also pastoring two circuit churches, St. Phillips AME, Margaret and Ward Chapel AME, Warrior. While she was studying, she also had her eyes on her English teacher, Homer. They married on November 27, 1970 and were married for as Homer likes to put it 45 consecutive years.

One Sunday morning on the way to St. Phillips, Mable told Homer that she "wished that the Lord and Bishop Robinson would have mercy on us." That day, at church, there were two members and two dollars in the offering. Later that day, Homer received a phone call from Bishop Robinson's secretary telling him to call the Bishop. Homer called Bishop Robinson and he told him that he had a dream to send Homer McCall to Huntsville and that he would like to meet with him at his office on the following Saturday for his appointment to St. John, since he would be in Florida that week. Homer responded with "Let me pray on it." Mable, known for her tell-it-like-it-is personality, told Homer, "You pray, I'm packing."

Growing up Mable always liked to play school with her brothers, sister and cousins and being the youngest, she would make sure that she was the teacher and in charge. As a result, she was nicknamed "Teacher" by her uncle. This was the prelude to a career of teaching and helping to cultivate students academically as she began teaching in the Huntsville City Schools where she taught at Terry Heights and Chapman for one year, West Huntsville for two years and Lakewood for 24 years, before retiring after 28 years.

Another favorite pastime when Mable was younger was to play church with her brothers and sister. This was another confirmation of a purpose-driven life dedicated to work and ministry of helping others, not only academically but also spiritually. She was known to St. John African Methodist Episcopal Church as Lady Mable for 40 years as she co-partnered in winning souls for Christ as First Lady of St. John until her husband retired as Pastor in 2011. While as Pastor and First Lady of St. John, Homer and Mable received honors at the AME Connectional Level as the Ninth Episcopal District Family of the Year and Pastor and First Lady of the Year.

Mable's church involvement at St. John and the connectional level included the Stewardess Boards as President for several years, Women's Missionary Society, President/Coordinator of the Junior – Intermediate Usher Board, Scholarship Committee, Prison Ministry, Vacation Bible School Coordinator and Instructor, Christian Education, Feeding the Homeless Ministry, Observer/Participant AME General Conference and Bishop's Council. She presented several presentations, among them were "How to Succeed as an Effective Minister's Spouse" at the North Alabama Annual Conference. Along with Homer, Mable presented a Pastor and First Lady Marriage Seminar for the 8th, 10th, and 12th Districts of the AME Church. She was a member of the North Alabama Minister's Spouse Association and a Charter member of the Interdenominational Minister's Spouse Association, Greater Huntsville Chapter and served as President for seven years. Mable was an active member of the Huntsville Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Incorporated and a Life Member of the NAACP.



#### Life Reflections of Homer Hamilton McCraw, Sr.

God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in the times of trouble.

omer Hamilton McCraw Sr. was born on August 11, 1920 in Oakman, Alabama to the late Isaac McCraw and Bessie Foster McCraw, their second of three sons. At the age of 14, Homer moved with his father and step-mother, the late Ernestine Lyle McCraw to Huntsville, Alabama and completed his high school education at Normal Training School.

Shortly after entering college at Alabama Agriculture and Mechanical College, known today as Alabama A &M University, the U.S. Army drafted **Homer** to serve in World War II. He served 3 years in the European Theater participating in the most documented engagements to include D-Day, "Battle of the Bulge" as staff sergeant and platoon leader in 3393 Quartermaster Truck Company. The company was a component of the acclaimed predominantly-black unit, named Red Ball Express for their unique, yet effective truck convoy system responsible for transporting fuel, ammunition, food, clothes and other critical supplies supporting the US Third Army. Staff Sergeant McCraw received the Silver Star, the third-highest personal decoration for valor in combat; the Bronze Star Medal, awarded for heroic achievement and meritorious service in combat; and the Purple Heart, awarded to those wounded while serving in a combat zone. Upon his return to Huntsville **Homer** re-enrolled in Alabama A&M College and received a Bachelor of Science in agriculture education.

After graduation, Homer taught veterans in Madison County, Alabama from 1947 through 1952. Homer was a member of Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity and an active member of the Kiwanis Club. A civic-minded individual with a strong appreciation for voting and exercised his rights as well as supporting his community by providing transportation to the voting polls and frequently served as a volunteer within Madison County.

#### REFLECTIONS FROM THE LIFE OF Seward Carverless O'Neal, Jr.

MR. SEWARD CARVERLESS O'NEAL, JR. was born in McComb, Mississippi, to the late Seward and Zalda Robinson O'Neal Sr. He was the oldest of five children and was affectionately known as "Mickey." He attended the Alabama State Laboratory (Montgomery, Alabama), Immaculata and Center Street Elementary Schools (Birmingham, Alabama). His high school years were completed at the Alabama Institute for the Deaf and Blind, Talladega, Alabama. He also completed the course of study for Data Processing at the J. F. Drake State Technical College.

Upon graduation, he began utilizing the skills he learned at school in various occupational endeavors (barbering and dry cleaning). He later applied for and was hired at the U. S. Army Aviation and Missile Command in the Corporate Information Center (CIC). He was diligent in his assignments as he worked there for 25 years until his retirement on July 3, 2003.

Mickey, his sister Sandra, and brother Rouchell were the only children for several years and were very close. Luke and Kelley joined the group later. Sandra was his "little mother and protector"; Rouchell was Mickey's "partner in crime." When the children would tease Mickey about his hearing defect and speech impediment, Rouchell would join Mickey in the fight, and if all else failed, Sandra would be sure to threaten the bullies with "I'll tell my daddy." During the summers, these three could be found anywhere on the Alabama State College Campus, particularly under the classroom windows when classes were in session, keeping lots of noise and being asked to find another place to play.

Mickey never let his handicaps stop him from any of the family activities and he was never excluded. None of the family ever learned sign language because he was always understood and he understood his family. As the family made several moves within the state and had to often make new friends, the children spent much time together playing board and card games, jacks, fiddle sticks, Superman/Wonder Woman, dodge ball, hop scotch, riding bicycles and roller skating outdoors. They frequently traveled to and from Mississippi and New York to visit relatives. Mickey enjoyed winning and would laud it over his siblings whenever he could. Mickey was an integral part of a loving and caring family.

Mickey had a natural talent to draw. At an early age, he could see an object or a picture in a book and draw it stroke for stroke. His specialty was locomotives. He could draw a train engine and all of the cars down to the last nut and bolt. The detail was amazing to us. His drawings were often sent to art schools that were found in magazine advertisements. He was recognized on several occasions in written responses praising his abilities.

Mickey was very independent, courteous and appreciative for any kindness he received. He loved his family, particularly his nieces and nephews. He loved to strike out on his own and travel back to the various places that he had lived to see his friends and on to places he had not been before. He might be seen anywhere in Huntsville; the bowling alley, the hospital cafeterias, and the shopping centers and always with his family on holidays.

He joined the West Huntsville Church of Christ many years ago because of its extensive attention to deaf and hard of hearing persons. He was embraced by this congregation and seldom missed the services. During his lengthy illness, the numerous cards, calls, visits and gifts were a constant source of inspiration and caring. The congregation even sent him individual pictures for the bulletin board in his room at the NHC Healthcare Facility in Dickson, Tennessee during the last four months; these served as a constant reminder of their care and concern for him. He also received cards and visits from numerous other friends and family.

Mickey will be truly missed by his family and friends. He loved people, and people loved him. He leaves to cherish memories of him, sister, Sandra (Harold, Sr.) Dickerson; brothers, Rouchell (Geneva) O'Neal, Luke Douglas O'Neal and Kelley E. O'Neal; nieces: Jacqueline O'Neal, Madison O'Neal, Amari O'Neal and Alexandra Dickerson; nephews: Harold (Kim) Dickerson, Jr., Erik Dickerson, Rouchell (Lindsey) O'Neal Jr., and De'Angelo O'Neal; aunts: Jacqueline Walton (New York); Lula O'Neal (Mississippi); uncle, Raoul Robinson (Genoa, Italy); and many cousins and friends.




Obituary


An Expression of Love



## Lauretta Yvonne Teague



Obituary

Derwood Doyle Wilson was born on November 24, 1934 in Cuney, Texas to the late Taylor A. Wilson and Sim Wille Wilson. He was the fourth of seven children and was affectionately called "Lil Brother". He was educated in the public school system of Jacksonville, Texas and was a proud graduate of Fred Douglass High School, class of 1952. As a child, he attended the Rising Star Missionary Baptist Church and accepted the Lord as his personal Savior.

After high school, he attended Texas Southern University for two years and then he joined the United States Air Force. He served honorably for more than 20 years. During his time in the service, he served in Vietnam, Bermuda, Germany and North Africa. He served his country with distinction and was praised with dozens of honors, certificates and commendations.

In 1957, Derwood Married the love of his life, Erma Teen Washington. They were married for 34 years before her passing. Sherman David, Jr. In 1986, he and Missionary Wilson moved their membership to Emmanuel COGIC under the leadership of Elder Larry and Missionary Jean Melton.

Under the leading of the Lord, Elder Wilson founded the Ebenezer Church of God in Christ, where he served until he was lead to unite with Roosevelt Heights under the leadership of Elder John Wayne Penton. In addition to his service in the local church and the Washington State Jurisdiction, he served as one of the housing coordinators of the Progress House and volunteered in other state and federal prison ministries.


Rev. Wilson believed in the value of hard work. He had several jobs throughout his lifetime. In addition to serving in the United States Air Force, he worked for Tam Engineering for more than 25 years. After retirement from Tam, he worked for The Tacoma News Tribune. He was skilled with his hands and had a unique talent for building special projects. In the summer of 2019, he and Brother Jesse Johnson dug up a portion of the yard because he needed more driveway space. When Brother Johnson went back to look at the progress being made, to his surprise, Rev. Wilson had dug up more space than was needed. In addition to working in carpentry he was skilled in working with steel. One of the most prized possessions is a tool cabinet that he made more than 60 years ago, that he still used regularly.

In 2018, Rev. Wilson moved from Tacoma Washington to Huntsville, Alabama to live with his grandson, Maurice, due to declining health and unfortunate circumstances. He gladly united with the St. John AME Church and became affectionately known as "Grandpa". He served in the soup kitchen ministry, was active in the Fifty-Plus Axillary, and worked where- ever he was able. When asked why he did not unite with a COGIC church, he simply replied there is only one God, and St. John likes to have church. Rev. Wilson was loved and admired by the members of St. John and was faithful in his service to the church. He loved to dress up. Each week, the members would wait to see what he was going to wear to service and he always exceeded expectations.

Rev. Wilson was the kind of man who believed in doing things his way and on his terms. He loved to travel and would often talk about the many cruise expeditions he experienced. In 2019, "Grandpa" decided to trade in his CRV for a big truck, as he called it. He drove to Chicago to visit his grandchildren: Jessie and Dominique; and then to Texas to visit his sister Debra, and brother Robert. He then ended up driving to Georgia to visit his brother, Marvin also. In July, he drove to Orlando on a solo expedition to attend the General Conference. Not only did he enjoy driving, he enjoyed driving fast. In fact, just three weeks ago, he was cited for going 79 in a 45-speed zone.

Rev. Derwood Wilson was a gentle, giving man who would put the needs of others before his own. He will surely be missed.

He was proceeded in death by his parents, stepmother-Josephine Wilson, three siblings, wife-Missionary Erma Teen Wilson, and son, Jesse Wilson. He leaves to cherish his memory, son-Elder Maurice Wright, Sr., three stepchildren, eight grandchildren, five great-grandchildren, two brothers-Marvin and Robert, one sister-Debra Wilson McClelland, and a host of nephews, nieces, relatives and friends.





