



Veterans Day Observance

The origins of Veterans Day in America or, as it was then called, Armistice Day officially received its name through a Congressional resolution in 1926 (the same year that Dr. Carter G. Woodson initiated the celebration of "Negro History Week"). It became a national holiday twelve (12) years later by a similar Congressional action. Following in the tradition of memorial gestures which had occurred in England and France since the end of World War I-- "the war to end all wars" -- the annual ceremonies all took place on November 11, giving universal recognition to the celebrated ending of WW1 fighting at 11:00 a.m., November 11, 1918 (the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month).

Unfortunately, "the war to end all wars" failed to live up to its billing. In the 1940's World War II erupted, in the 1950's Americans fought in the Korean conflict, and in the 1960's America was mired in a seemingly never-ending "conflict" in Vietnam. More recently, our young men and women of the military have been placed in harm's way in geographical locations that many Americans would have difficulty finding on a world map; places like Lebanon, Grenada, Panama, Kuwait, Iraq, Somalia, Bosnia, Serbia, and, more recently, Yemen, where 17 young sailors (one-third were African-Americans) lost their lives to a terrorist attack.

Even when not serving in "hot zones," our military men and women must endure the hardships of being separated from loved ones for extended periods of time. Many serve in remote locations like Diego Garcia (a tiny speck of an island in the Indian Ocean) or hostile climates like Thule, Greenland and Saudi Arabia. In foreign lands, they must acclimate themselves to different cultures and political systems.

For the millions of Americans who have served in the armed forces, a debt of gratitude is owed. Veterans Day observance is America's way of pausing to honor the commitment and contributions of all who have served in the Army, Army-Air Corps, Air Force, Marines, or Navy. If we fail to keep this in mind, Veterans Day will become nothing more than a "white sales" day at malls around the country.

tin Luther King Birthday/Emancipation Proclamation Celebration Service, Thanksgiving Service, and Revival. The occasion was also presented as three-pronged; that is, Christ, Celebrate Christ, and Celebrate Christ in Your Life and Homes.

Reverend Paul Hillard, Jr. presided over the Monday night service. The Union Hill Cumberland Presbyterian Church Choir provided choral selections. Ushers for the evening were from First Baptist, St. John AME, St. Mark Primitive Baptist, and Blackburn Chapel Cumberland Presbyterian Churches. Reverend Stanley Terrain read the scripture (Romans 10: 1-9). Reverend Dr. Henry Bradford, Jr. offered prayer and Rev. Michael Jones gave the offertory appeal and prayer. Reverend Paul Hillard, Jr., nephew of the evangelist, introduced the Reverend Clarence Hillard.

Reverend Clarence Hillard's sermon was entitled 'The Door of Fellowship', based on text
from Galatians 3:28. He began by stating that
the center of church unity is the name of the
Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. He postulated
that if people of the church do not love the
name of Jesus, they could not really be happy
in the church. Further, God's presence in the
church is assured in that there only needs to be
two or three gathered in his name to assure
this; that is, "a quorum is established by three'.
Reverend Hillard indicated that it is important
for people to experience Jesus, which in his
view would result in crowds of people flocking
to be a part of God's church.

Reverend Hillard stated that the church should "call persons to their commitment" but expressed concern that "Satan has stacked the church with his folk" and that "Christ may not be in all of those who are leading in the church". Other obstacles to fellowship in God's church include members who are involved in baseless conflict with ministers and the tendency to stay at home in order to watch or listen to a sermon. The latter lacks the "personal touch ... when the Holy Spirit comes and we can touch each other". According to Reverend Hillard, when Christians come together to worship "there is a fellowship that surpasses all others – a fellowship of unity". He went on to suggest that there



ADVENT 2000: December 3 - 24, 2000

ADVENT begins the Christian liturgical year on the Sunday closest to November 30. which is St. Andrew's Day. The season is four Sundays in duration. The Sundays are referred to as "Sundays in Advent".

Advent also bears the admonition that we need to prepare for the sure coming of the Lord. Preparation for the coming Lord must include the following:

REPENTANCE: We must forsake our sins and seek to reform our lifestyles in accordance with God's mandate for right living.

PRAYER: We must pray for the coming of Christ into our personal lives.

PATIENCE: We must watch and wait for the Lord's coming. It may be delayed or it may be soon and sudden. However, His arrival is assured.

The liturgical color for Advent is violet. It is a color that communicates a feeling of quiet dignity, royalty, and repentance. Violet (or purple) is the traditional color of a king's robe. Such a color is most expedient to announce the coming of the King of Kings.

An alternative color for the season is blue, the color symbolizing hope. The Christ coming brings hope of a new and abundant life to all.

ADVENT RESOURCES:

Old Testament passages which allude to a Messianic (Christ) figure whose arrival and reign was yet to be established.

New Testament passages which speak of the arrival of a fulfillment to the Messianic hope in Jesus of Nazareth.

New Testament passages which suggest the return of Jesus as the reigning Christ eternal.

Printed Text: Luke 3:2b-18

Key Verse: A voice of one calling in the desert, 'Prepare the way for the Lord, make straight paths for him.' Luke 3:4

The ministry of John the Baptist is highlighted by the phrase "Preparing the Way" as he made ready for the arrival of the promised Messiah. John was given the task of creating a climate of expectation in which Jesus could teach and minister effectively. John the Baptist's message speaks loudly to Believers today. He taught that the process of preparing the way for the Messiah was to prepare one's heart through repentance. How much more is this an appropriate way to prepare for Jesus' second coming! Repentance is still required of those who wish to know Jesus as personally

as Lord and Savior.

December 10, 2000

Lesson Title: Responding to God Lesson Scripture: Luke 1:26-38 Printed Text: Luke 1:26-38

Key Verse: And Mary said, Behold the handmaid of the Lord; be it unto me according to

thy Word .-- Luke 1:38

Who was Mary? Mary was descended from David. Luke's genealogy of Christ is through His mother. In this lesson, Mary visited her kinswoman Elizabeth, the mother of John the Baptist. Luke tells the story of Jesus' birth from Mary's standpoint, describing her maidenly fears, her humble submission to the will of God. Mary sang praises to God for the favor accorded her in being the mother of the Messiah. Mary was a woman with a quiet spirit, humble, self-control, and the knowledge of the Old Testament. She would not talk to others about mysteries of her experience, but kept all things hidden in her heart.

December 17, 2000

Lesson Title: Praising God Lesson Scripture: Luke 1:39-56 Printed Text: Luke 1:39-55

Key Verse: And Mary said, "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior, for he has looked with favor on the lowliness of his servant. Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed; Luke 1:46-

Mary's song of praise, know as the "Magnificat," is the focus of this lesson. The Magnificat, a song of Hannah, the mother of Samuel, is considered the model for Mary's song. She sings praise for what God has done both in her life and for Israel. Mary's words of personal joy had celebrated God's mercy and the song tells us that God's mercy is at work in striking and baffling ways. God is the God of all humanity, of all creation, and in relation to each and every creature.

December 24, 2000

Lesson Title: Welcoming the Savior Lesson Scripture: Luke 2:1-20 Printed Text: Luke 2:4-20

Key Verse: To you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord, Luke 2:11

This lesson looks at the story of Jesus' birth and the angelic announcement concerning that event to the shepherds. The actions and reactions of the people in this story give a clear picture of the impact of God's grace on human life. As soon as the angels are off the scene, the shepherds decided to go to Bethlehem in order to see exactly what had happened regarding that which they were told. This Sunday's lesson focuses on Jesus' earthly parents and the old man Simeon. All three were faithful to God and were able to see God's promises to them come to fruition.

The scripture for this lesson tells of Jesus' parents presenting Him in the temple after the custom of the law - the dedication of the firstborn child to God. There in the temple they met Simeon. The Holy Spirit had revealed to Simeon earlier that he would not see death until he had laid eyes on the 'consolation of Israel', the Messiah. The Holy Spirit then led Simeon to the temple on the same day that Joseph and Mary brought Jesus there. There Simeon held Jesus in his arms and identified Him as the Messiah - the fulfillment of God's promise to His people. Jesus, a mere baby. was the hope of the world.

Joseph and Mary were faithful to the Lord in bringing Jesus to the temple to be dedicated. Simeon was faithful in waiting for the fulfillment of the Lord's promise that he would see the Messiah before he died. We, too, should be faithful in our walk with the Lord because God always keeps His promises.


should be a spirit in the church such that if one is not feeling well, "a small smile, pat on the shoulder, or a word of encouragement," would serve to inspire one to 'go on a little longer'. This fellowship lets people know that they are not alone. He went on to say that God promised 'never to leave us alone', referring to the familiar hymn.

He concluded by characterizing the "fellowship of unity" as capable of bringing Christians together "in the great getting up morning". This "great fellowship" was described by quoting the scripture written by John who "saw men coming from all directions". Reverend Hillard indicated that this will be a time when God will find his people and posed the question of whether those in the congregation wanted "to be in that number". The evangelist then sang a testimony of how good God has been and repeated the refrain, "I just say thank you Lord, I won't complain ... God has been good to me, more than this world could ever be ... "

After the hymn of invitation, "Just As I Am", Reverend Hillard asked that the congregation sing the spiritual "Steal Away" as they departed from the service. The benediction would be given on the last night of revival.

The program for the remainder of the week had Reverend Jerry Crutcher presiding and introducing the evangelist on Tuesday, October 24th. The Little Indian Creek P.B. Church School Lesson Overview - April 2001



The Church School Department provides the monthly lesson review for the St. John A.M.E.N. This month's lesson reviews were written by Lula Rochelle (1st), Willie Sandifer (2nd), William Bell and Brittney Bell (3rd Sunday), and Jason Brown (4th and 5th Sundays).

Sunday, April 1, 2001 Lesson Title: Empowered to Serve Lesson Scripture: Acts 6:1 – 8:3

Printed Text: Acts 6:1-8, 7:55 – 8:1a

Key Verse: The word of God continued to spread; the number of the disciples increased greatly in Jerusalem, and a great many of the priests became obedient to the faith. Acts 6:7

As the early Christians moved forward with the gospel, it was inevitable that they would run into opposition from governmental authorities, especially from the religious leaders who were angry and jealous of their wisdom and power. In the early days of the church, it was customary to make daily disbursements to the poor widows of the church who had no other means of support. Some of the believers who were Hellenists (i.e., newly converted Jews) complained because their widows were not receiving the same treatment as the widows of Hebrews from Jerusalem and Judea. You see that is how the devil works. If he cannot destroy God's plan by attacks from the outside. he will seek to overthrow believers by attacks of dissension from within. This is illustrated in this lesson.

The twelve apostles realized that with the increasing growth of the church, something had to be done about handling these matters. However, they themselves did not want to abandon the ministry of the word of God in order to handle business matters, so they recommended the church designate seven spiritual men to handle the temporal affairs of the church. Out of the seven men chosen, only two of them were well known to us---Stephen and Phillip. Stephen, who is the primary focus of this lesson, became the first martyr of the church. Opposition to Stephen's powerful ministry arose from the synagogue. These were places where Jews gathered on the Sabbath for instruction in the law. These zealous Jews proved no match for Stephen as they challenged him. Stephen was a Samaritan who had been converted to Christianity. Yet, he was considered a man "full of faith and of the

Holy Ghost" (Acts 6:5). Since these Jewish leaders could not silence Stephen, they secretly brought on false witnesses to accuse Stephen of blasphemy against Moses and God. (Acts 6:13-14). However, as Stephen stood before the Sanhedrin Council, they heard the charges, but as they looked at Stephen, they saw not the face of a demon, but the face of an angel. They saw someone fully surrendered to the Lord, determined to proclaim the truth, and more concerned with what God thinks than with what men may say.

As Christians, we are called to serve and forgive. This lesson "Empowered to Serve," reminds us that we are responsible for serving, teaching, witnessing, and sharing the "Word of God" with others. Just as Jesus commanded the disciples in (Matthew 28:19-20) i.e., "The Great Commission," it becomes our responsibility to spread the good news of Jesus Christ at home, in our local communities, as well as throughout the world.

April 8, 2001

Lesson Title: Called to Witness to All People Lesson Scripture: Acts 8:4-8, 26-35 Printed Text: Acts 8:4-8, 26-35 Key Verse: Those who had been control

Key Verse: Those who had been scattered preached the word wherever they went. Acis 8:4

This lesson focused on persecuted believers who had fied Jerusalem, preaching about Christ wherever they went. Philip encountered an Ethiopian official who wanted help in understanding a portion of Isaiah as he returned home from worshiping in Jerusalem. Phillip linked the messianic prophecy to Jesus, and the man joyously responded by asking to be baptized.

Lesson Title: Proclaiming The Risen Lord Lesson Scripture: Luke 24:1-12 Acts 9:1-31 Printed Text: Luke 24:1-10; Acts 9:19b-22, 26-

Key Verse: Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; He has risen!

Jesus Christ Is Alive! This lesson is very im-

portant because it talks about and describes when and what happened when Jesus was resurrected from the dead. Three days after Jesus was crucified on the cross for our sins, he rose from the dead. Mary Magdalene, Joanna, and Mary, the mother of James, went to the tomb where Jesus was put after His death. They went to prepare Jesus' body for burial, and found that the stone had been rolled away from the tomb. They saw no one. Then two angels appeared and said that Jesus had been raised from the dead. The women were astonished at what the angels had told them. The women left the tomb and told all these things to the eleven apostles and the other disciples.

This lesson also covers the account of Saul's conversion on the Damascus road. After several days in Damascus, Saul proclaimed Jesus as the Son of God. Barnabas helped Saul by his witnessing and boldly preaching in the name of Jesus Christ. Jesus also depends on each Christian believer to carry on his earthly mission, to love one another, help one another, witness to each other about God's great love, and to win souls for Jesus Christ our Lord and Savior. Jesus Christ Is Alive!

Sunday, April 22, 2001

Lesson Text: Gentiles Receive the Spirit Lesson Scripture: Acts 10: 1-11:18 Printed Text: Acts 10: 30-40, 43-48

Key Verse: God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. - Acts 10:34-35 (NRSV)

One of the longest surviving problems that has served to separate even believers from each other is INTOLERANCE or RACISM. In this lesson the main character is Cornelius, who has the great distinction of becoming the first Gentile to hear the Gospel. Cornelius, a centurion, sought out God in order to learn more about God and also because he needed a savior. Peter was to witness to Cornelius but was reluctant to do so because of the long-standing division between Jews and Gentiles. God worked through Peter and opened his eyes to God's desire to add Cornelius to the

kingdom. Reluctantly Peter did visit with Cornelius and assured him that God shows no partiality. Peter continued to reach out to Gentiles and baptized them in the name of the Lord.

Even today, we are separated by our legal, religious, and social barriers that keep us apart and hamper our communications. We worship on different days, at different times, we are even buried in separate cemeteries. But, be assured that there is no black heaven, no white heaven, no black God nor white God, there is only GOD. A GOD for ALL who believe in Him and keep His commandments.

Lesson Title: The Church in Antioch Lesson Scripture: Acts 11:19-30

Printed Text: same

Key Verse: While they were worshiping the Lord and fasting, the Holy Spirit said "set apart for me Barnabas and Saul for the work to which I have called them." Acts 13:2 (NRSV)

Following the stoning death of Stephen the followers of Jesus scattered to other areas. Some went to Phoenicia, Cyprus, and Antioch (of Syria). In Antioch a church formed which consisted mostly of Gentiles. This was unheard of, but served notice that God's message is for everyone and can be spread by anyone. The church in Antioch continued to grow and attracted the attention of the leaders in Jerusalem. Barnabas, known as the encourager, was sent to Antioch to help the church mature. Due to the excitement caused by the devotion and commitment of the church at Antioch, Barnabas sought out Saul to assist him in developing the church. They worked together and the church continued to grow.

When the great famine came to the land as prophesized, the church at Antioch shined even brighter. The church assisted those in other areas by sending gifts to the suffering brethren in Judea who had already suffered mightily due to their persecution for being Christians. After the church at Antioch had matured God separated Barnabas and Saul

St. John Begins Lent with Ash Wednesday Service

LENTEN SEASON covers the forty-six day period between Ash Wednesday and the eve of Easter. Traditionally on this day, ashes have been placed on the foreheads of Christians as a symbol of the beginning of the season. The ashes are used to make the sign of the cross on the forehead of the believer and are from the charred remains of the palm branches used on Palm Sunday the previous year.

Lent itself excludes the six Sundays and is, therefore, only forty days. Our worship services on Sundays are weekly commemorations of the first Easter and the proclamation that Christ is risen. The date of the beginning of Lent, Ash Wednesday, is determined by the date of Easter.

Ash Wednesday Service was held on February 28 at 6:30 p.m. in the sanctuary. The call to worship, a call and response of commitment to Christ, was led by Sister Judith Gardner. Prayer was offered by Brother Claudewell Campbell. The responsive scripture reading from Psalm 51:1-12 was led by Brother Raymond Nomel. Songs during the service were centered on repentance, suffering and commitment and included "Jesus Keep Me Near the Cross", "I am on the Battlefield for My Lord", and "Pass Me Not, O Gentle Savior."

Pastor McCall introduced the preacher for the hour. Brother David Perry brought a spirit-filled message entitled "The Dove Has Landed" with text from Genesis 8:6-12.

The ceremony of the ashes followed the invitation to discipleship and the service concluded with Love Feast.



STEWARDSHIP & **TITHING**

Excerpts from the New Member's Manual

When you tithe, you return to God one tenth of His money.

"Give, and it will be given to you; a good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you get back." Luke 6:38 (NRSV)

Tithing is a biblical term which means giving ones first fruits to God. It is the first tenth of one's income. Tithing is a voluntary and systemic way of returning to God part of what He has given us. It refers to the total gross income from any source including salary, stocks and bonds, interest income and dividends, etc.

It is also necessary that we as a people begin to realize the significance of a "self tithe." This means that you give your tithe to God first and then you tithe 10% of your income to yourself by saving 10% of your earnings. One then begins to learn how to live on less and experience a victorious life because you have been obedient to God, for you are sowing the seeds of a good steward. Basically, you are in charge of God's gifts to you.

Tithing is a spiritual approach. When we tithe, we are expressing faith in God and we are trusting God to keep His promise. Not to tithe is blatant disobedience to God's Word and is equal to robbing God and results in a curse.

Malachi 3:8-10 (NRSV) states:

"Will anyone rob God? Yet you are robbing me! But you say, "How are we robbing you? In your tithes and offering! You are cursed with a curse, for you are robbing me - the whole nation of you!"

"Bring the full tithe into the storehouse, so that there may be food in my house, and thus put me to the test, says the Lord of hosts; see if I will not open the windows of Heaven for you and pour down for you an overflowing blessing."

ADVENT begins the Christian liturgical year on the Sunday closest to November 30. The season is four Sundays in duration.

The Sundays are referred to as "Sundays in Advent". The advent message comes from the two Latin words, as venire, which means "to come to". The message is that God, in Christ, is coming into the world. It includes all time.

Advent bears the admonition that we need to prepare for the sure coming of the Lord. Preparation for the coming Lord must include the following:

> REPENTANCE: We must forsake our sins and seek to reform our lifestyles in accordance with God's mandate for right living.

PRAYER: We must pray for the coming of Christ into our personal

PATIENCE: We must watch and wait for the Lord's coming. It may be delayed or it may be soon and sudden. However, His arrival is assured.

The liturgical color for Advent is violet, it is a color that communicates a feeling of quiet dignity, royalty, and repentance. Violet (or purple) is the traditional color of a king's robe. Such a color is most expedient to announce the coming of the King of Kings.

During this season of Advent 2001, use the time for you and your family to grow closer to God. There are many Advent resource guides available at Christian bookstores to guide you through a series of studies. The lighting of the Advent wreath and reading of Biblical passages relating to peace, love, hope and joy are also encouraged during this season.



Church School Lesson Overview - December 2001

This month's lesson reviews were written by Church School Superintendent, Brother Willie J. Sandifer (2nd, 9th, 16th and 30th) and Sister Pat Grier (23rd).

December 2, 2001

Lesson Title: The Servant's Mission Lesson Scripture: Isaiah 49:1-7 Printed Text: Isaiah 49:1-6

Key Verse: And he said, it is a light thing that thou shouldest be my servant to raise up the tribes of Jacob, and to restore the preserved of Israel: I will give thee for a light to the Gentiles, that thou mayest be my salvation unto the end of the earth. Isaiah 49:6

In this lesson we examine the role of God's servant, who has been given a mission to bring hope and light to others. Isaiah, perhaps the most important Book of the Old Testament, reveals God's plan more completely for His people than any other prophet in history. Isaiah focuses on the Messiah and His love for His people despite their rebellion and disobedience. The "Servant" is not just the nation of people, but One who has been given a special assignment that will benefit every nation.

December 9, 2001

Lesson Title: The Peaceful Kingdom Lesson Scripture: Isaiah 11:1-9 Printed Text: Isaiah 11:1-9

Key Verse: The wolf also shall dwell with the lamb, and the leopard shall lie down with the kid; and the calf and the young lion and the fatling together; and a little child shall lead them. Isaiah 11:6

We are reminded that believers are now a part of the New Kingdom where righteousness, peace, and joy abound. In Isaiah 11, the prophet is given a glimpse of God's prophetic future. Though Israel had rebelled against God and did not want to obey Him, God chose not to leave them in their sins. His promise to David was sure. One of David's sons would sit on the throne and rule God's people forever. Isaiah helps us understand that God's purpose for Israel would be fulfilled

in Jesus Christ who would rule the eternal kingdom with power and authority as King and Lord.

December 16, 2001

Lesson Title: Comfort for God's People Lesson Scripture: Isaiah 40:1-11 Print: Isaiah 40:1-5, 8-11

Key Verse: The grass withereth, the flower fadeth; but the work of our God shall stand for ever. Isaiah 40:8

Isaiah gives Hezekiah a strong and prophetic word of God's future judgement on the king. Because of his lack of faith in God and Israel's sinful ways, the Babylonians would conquer Jerusalem, God's people, and their treasures and take them to their land. The judgment was also against King Hezekiah's sons and the generations to come. Isaiah prophesied that they would be eunuchs in the palace of the King of Babylon. This prophecy was fulfilled in Daniel 1-3.

December 23, 2001

Lesson Title: God's Servant Brings Hope Lesson Scripture: Luke 2: 8-20 Printed Text: Isaiah 9:2-7

Key Verse: 'For to us a child is born, to us a Son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And He will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace,' Isaiah 9:6

This Sunday's lesson is about HOPE. On this Sunday before Christmas, the lesson focuses on the hope that we all have because Jesus came into the world and gave meaning to the season of Christmas.

The lesson Scriptures are taken from the Old Testament (Isaiah 9:2-7) and the New Testament (Luke 2:8-20). The Scripture from Isaiah tells of the hope and promise of a "great light" that would come and bring the world out of its darkness of sin. Chapter 9 of Isaiah tells of the promise of a child who would reign on David's



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

During this Christmas season as we celebrate the birth of our Savior, let us keep our hearts and minds focused on Jesus, our hope for eternal salvation.

December 30, 2001 Lesson Title: Justice for the Nations Lesson Scripture: Isaiah 42:1-9 Printed Text: Isalah 42:1-9

Key Verse: Behold my servant, whom I uphold; mine elect, in whom my soul delighteth: I have put my spirit upon him; he shall bring forth judgment to the Gentiles, Isaiah 42:1

Isaiah 41 opens with the nations being challenged by God, who reminds them of His greatness, power, wisdom, and foreknowledge. This was more than a century and a half before Cyrus - God's instrument to fulfill His divine purpose and to be a blessing to His chosen people - was born. The Lord revealed to Isaiah that He was going to raise Cyrus up to be used by God to conquer the nations and to protect Israel.

Dr. Davis Featured Evangelist for Summer Revival

Senior Pastor of Big Bethel is Evangelist for Summer Revival. Rev. Dr. James L. Davis, Senior Pastor of Big Bethel AME Church, Atlanta, Georgia, was the evangelist for St. John's Summer Revival. The services were held August 5-7, 2002 at 6:30 p.m. Members of the Steward Board led devotion nightly, members of the Senior Usher Board served nightly, and St. John ministerial staff and guest ministers were on program each night.

Worship in song set the stage each night for the evangelist's sermons. The Gospel Choir was featured Monday night. They were directed by Mr. Cleveland Wilson and accompanied by planist Mrs. Antoinette Wilson and percussionist Mr. Taibert Cox. Tuesday night the Children/Youth Choir sang, directed by Mrs. Ellen Washington and accompanied by Mr. Kevin Long, pianist. On Wednesday night the Male Chorus rendered music, led by Director of Music, Mr. Rufus Gilmore III. Pastor McCall, the evangelist, and those in attendance gave accolades to outstanding musical performances by each group.

Dr. McCall presented the speaker each night with highlights of his various accomplishments rather than reading from a formal vita. He emphasized the fact that the highest endorsement is to trust one's child to the spiritual care of an individual, which is the case with Dr. Sonya McCall, who is now a member of Big Bethel and was in supportive attendance during revival. Dr. Davis has roots in Alabama (of which he spoke proudly) and has pastored several churches in the South Birmingham-Huntsville District. At Big Bethel he has

Pastor McCall's Letter

"Travelling in a Storm" - Acts 27

What do you do when you are travelling in a storm? In the twenty-seventh chapter of Acts, Paul is a prisoner in a storm aboard a ship headed for Rome. This experience of the Apostle shows us how to cope with many storms we may pass through in our own journey home. Our transitions and seasons of life are often stormy such as beginning a new school year, a new job, a new relationship, an illness, and a host of other problems and plans known and unknown. However, the example of Paul shows us the value of dependence on God as you and I travel through the storms of life.

Although Paul began the trip as a prisoner, at the end of it he was the captain. As you know from your reading of this chapter, by the grace of God moving through the faithful testimony of Paul's presence, all passengers were saved, although the ship was lost.

The plan outlined in chapter twenty-seven for travelling in life's storms is very simple whether the storms are: 1. Spiritual, such as temptation or sin; 2. Emotional or economic, such as the loss of a job, divorce, retirement, peer pressure; 3. Physical, such as illnesses, etc.

Paul's example to us as we travel in life's storm is simple:

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spearheaded an economic development program which offers opportunity to some and communicates a need to "cease and desist" to negative elements who previously inhabited the historic "Sweet Auburn" area of Atlanta. The numerous ministries of Big Bethel will be joined by an assisted living facility in January of 2003. Dr. McCall emphasized that in Dr. Davis' ministry, and literally, "God opens doors that no man can shut." He alluded to the atypical occurrence of the jetway door being opened, allowing Dr. Davis to board, after the plane had begun to prepare to leave the gate of Hartsfield International Airport in Atlanta.

"Trusting God in Tight Situations" The sermon title for Monday was "Trusting God in Tight Situations" from the text I Kings 17: 115. Dr. Davis indicated that church people talk about faith more than they use it. That is, it is untested, similar to a water resistant watch which has yet to be submerged. He said a different kind of faith is needed "when your back is up against the wall". It is then "time to trust God".

He referred to the Biblical instances where God had tired of the Israelites who had been blessed by God but "thought more of the gifts than the Giver". According to Dr. Davis, no matter what God gave (or gives) it was not (is not) His intention that it take the place of the Giver. In the text Elijah had the task of letting the people know of God's displeasure. The manifestation of this was God's causing a drought, due not only to lack of rain but the formation of dew as well. As directed, Elijah told King Ahab. The land was barren but God placed Elijah "on a welfare plan" where the raven brought food and Elijah drank from the brook. Ultimately Elijah, too, was in the throes of fully experiencing the drought. God gave specific instructions for him to go to a town and ask a widow to prepare food for him. Elijah was persistent in following God's directions despite the widow and her son being on the brink of death due to lack of food, and her insistence that she could not fulfill his request. But "God had arranged it", therefore when she relented, making two portions and giving the larger to Elijah, she and her son were blessed with an abundance of meal, and life rather than death.

Dr. Davis emphasized it is important to 1) Put God's Agenda Before Yours, 2) Understand How God Operates. That is, "He gives no regard to how reluctant we are, He just wants us to do it". He said that in a "tight situation ... enough is enough. God's grace and mercy are enough to get you through". He urged those in attendance to not worry about their 401 K's: Trust in God. "Don't worry about Wall Street scandals: Trust in God. Don't worry about war around the world: TRUST GOD!"

Dr. McCall invited people to Christian Discipleship and to altar prayer which was led by Rev. Carey Vickers.

"For His Father and Mother Knew Not That it was For the Lord". On Tuesday, Dr. Davis spoke from Judges 14: 1-4 and urged the reading of the 13th and 14th chapters in their entirety. His subject was the family is under attack and from the text specifically "For His Father and Mother Knew Not That it was For the Lord". Dr. Davis pointed out that the family is the most abused gift that God has on Earth. He went on to say "It is a place that we hurt, and hurt others more than anybody or anything else. He gave the reason as the family being the "only thing that gives 'a care'. No one else cares enough about what you do".

Dr. Davis said the family is an instrument of God that He will use to save the world: "As the family goes, so goes society". Children are a product of their families; i.e., their behavior whether respectful or disrespectful reflects the home in which they were raised. He suggested that if a parent made mistakes in rearing a child, s(he) should apologize to that child and "do a better job with the grandchild". Dr. Davis indicated "no child is born by mistake, but by purpose of God's plan". He admonished those who would condemn a person, or the child born to that person, who is not wed.

Dr. Davis referred to the 13th chapter where a child was given to a barren woman. It is here that clarification of the stewardship role is given regarding the duties of parents, because children belong to God. Dr. Davis described his practice over the past five years of requiring three counseling sessions with parents prior to baptism of children, to preclude a ceremonial commitment without follow-through in bringing up a child in the church and the word of God.

The Biblical text focused on the early years of Samson who had a good family home that prepared him for "responsible independence" so that he could leave home when he was grown. Subsequently he met a woman who peaked his interest and returned home for guidance from his father rather than from his less wise peers. Dr. Davis described in the vernacular his perception of how Samson was impacted by this woman. He advised parents to be open with children regarding their experiences and share their wisdom and guidance, not pretend that they did not face temptations or made all the right choices in their youth. He gave examples of how critical parents can be when considering their children's friends and romantic interests. He focused on the verse indicating that in their criticism, Samson's parents did not know that God was in Samson's selection.

Dr. Davis indicated that the greatest gift is that a "child will rise up and call you blessed". He had the congregation stand as he stated "The strength of family is found in unity" Further, the church family is a unique family in itself. As everyone held hands, Dr. Davis offered a prayer of unity. Dr. James R. Johnson gave the dismissal prayer after altar call.

"Dealing and Living in the Meantime" On Wednesday night Dr. Davis spoke on "Dealing and Living in the Meantime" with Psalm 30 as the text. He defined the meantime as the most difficult time in which we live. Not everyone recognizes their meantime as such, but mistake it for their "end time". Meantime situations have caused people to "blow their brains out because they could not cope".

David wrote of his serious illness and "friends" who rejoiced in his illness. Although David was "a man after God's own heart", prior to his illness, he had begun to live in "a false sense of prosperity" and "God allowed him to become ill", according to Dr. Davis. He advised against allowing material things to interfere with knowledge that "God is in charge" and expressing thankfulness to God for health and strength. Dr. Davis suggested ways to deal with the "meantime": 1) Activate Your Remembrance...of His Holiness". Remember what God has done and that "anything that God will bring you to, he will bring you through". 2) Thank God For What He Has Done. He urged automatically giving thanks for what may be viewed as a minor event (brushing teeth, hair, waking up). Effective prayer occurs when you understand what God wants to happen. That is, the more knowledge you have of God's word and will, the more effective your prayer life can be.

Dr. Davis said "there is no failure in Jesus...! can do all things" when God is in the picture. With regard to the "end point", David's words were quoted: "Weeping may endure for a night, but joy cometh in the morning." In the end time God will take away the sorrow of the world.

Closing remarks were given by the evangelist and Dr. McCall. Dr. Davis gave the benediction for this summer revival that "began" in those present,



Church School Lesson Overview - September 2002

The Church School Department provides the monthly lesson review for the St. John A.M.E.N. This month's lesson reviews written by Willie J. Sandifer (1st Sunday), Agnes Bailey (2nd Sunday), Pat Grier (3rd Sunday), Willie J. Sandifer (4th Sunday), and Vanone Walton (5th Sunday).

September 1, 2002

Lesson Title: Repentance and Renewal Background Scripture: 2 Chronicles 29, 30; 2 Kings 18-20

Lesson Scripture: 2 Chronicles 30:1-12

Key Verse: "The LORD your God is gracious and compassionate. He will not turn his face from you if you return to him." 2 Chronicles 30:9

This lesson helps us see that the majority does not accept the call to true godliness. A godly king realizes the "product" he has to offer — renewal of proper worship — is desperately needed by all the Jewish people. So, he sends his "sales force" throughout the land with the message, only to have them repeatedly rejected and scorned. He presses on with his plans, and many are spiritually blessed. King Ahaz led the country far into idol worship, but king Hezekiah turned it around. He restored the Passover feast that had been long neglected.

September 8, 2002

Lesson Title: God Restores A Sinner
Lesson Scripture; 2 Chronicles 33:1-13
Key Verse: When he prayed to him the Lord
was moved by his entreaty and listened to his
plea; so he brought him back to Jerusalem
and to his kingdom. Then Manasseh knew
that the Lord is God. 2 Chronicles 33:13.

The focus of this week's lesson is forgiveness. As we study the life of King Manasseh, we see an evil man that is forgiven by God.

Manasseh became King of Judah at the age of twelve and ruled for fifty-five years. He began as an extremely evil king and led the hearts of the people away from the Lord. Because of their sins, the people were led into captivity in Babylon. It was during captivity that Manasseh sought the Lord and God heard his prayer and forgave him. Manassah's repentance is a dramatic lesson in

God's Grace.

We should remember that there is no person so evil that God cannot save them. It is not the amount of evil in one's life, but the response to God that matters. God will save anyone who turns to Him regardless of how wicked they have been.

September 15, 2002

Lesson Title: A Sinful People

Lesson Scripture: Zephaniah 1:12; 3:1-7, 11-

Key Verse: "The Lord within her is righteous; He does no wrong. Morning by morning He dispenses His justice, and every new day He does not fall, yet the unrighteous know no shame." (Zephaniah 3:5)


This Sunday's lesson is taken from the book of Zephaniah. The prophet Zephaniah prophesied during King Josiah's reign, about the time the prophet Jeremiah's ministry began. Zephaniah proclaimed a message of impending judgment by God upon a sinful people and the fulfillment of a promise to restore Jerusalem and God's chosen people.


This Sunday's lesson can be studied and taught in three parts.

Part I – Zephaniah 1:12 - The day of the Lord, the time when God's Lordship and judgment will reign, is coming. No sinner will be able to hide. God's judgment will prevail. Zephaniah 1:12a portrays God as one searching every comer with lamps to fret out the unrighteous. Zephaniah 1:12b portrays the people as COMPLACENT – like dregs left in wine, the worthless and offensive bits of sediment that settle in wine as it ages.

Part II – Zephaniah 3:1-7 – Zephaniah speaks of the wickedness of Jerusalem and opens Chapter 3 with a cry of WOE – indicating a three-fold indictment of being oppressors, being rebellious, and being morally filthy. Zephaniah warned the people that they would feel God's wrath if they did not repent. The people heeded not Zephaniah's warning, and felt no shame for their sins.

PART III - Zephaniah 3:11-15 - Zephaniah (Continued on page 11)

reiterates to the people that God' does not forget His promises. God has promised to restore Jerusalem and His chosen people. Zephaniah closes this Book with a song of delight that those who are in Christ look forward to the return of Christ and the New Jerusalem.

In conclusion, we are to remember that there is a day when God will judge us according to the lives we have lived. We should live each day obeying God's commandments and desiring to serve Him with our whole hearts.

September 22, 2002

Lesson Title: Josiah Makes a New Beginning Background Scripture: 2 Chronicles 34, 35; 2 Kings 22, 23

Lesson Scripture: 2 Chronicles 34:1-4, 19-21, 29-33

Key Verse: "Because your heart was responsive and you humbled yourself before God when you heard what he spoke against this place and its people, and because you humbled yourself before me and tore your robes and wept in my presence, I have heard you, declares the LORD." 2 Chronicles 34:27

In the long reign of Manasseh and the short reign of Amon, places of idol worship were built all over Judah, King Josiah ordered them destroyed. This lesson is about a godly king's efforts to restore lost distinctions. In destroying idolatry and unholiness, Josiah was no "moderate" as some of his godly predecessors had been. Josiah's grandfather Manasseh, in embracing and promoting all kinds of pagan practices, was one of the worst of Judah's kings. He led his people in these evil ways until they became worse than the pagans around them. This evil king changed in his latter years. He supported the real God as vigorously as he had supported the fakes. Earnestly he tried to undo the evil he had done, but was not completely successful.



September 29, 2002

Lesson Title: Rebellion and Judgment Lesson Scripture: Jeremiah 6

Key Verse: This is what the Lord says: "Stand at the crossroads and look; ask for the

ancient paths, ask where the good way is, and walk in it, and you will find rest for your souls". Jeremiah 6:16

Chapter 6 of Jeremiah begins with a warning of hostile forces that would overrun Judah from the north. The people of Judah continuously ignored the numerous warnings about the moral pollution that gravely imperiled their society. They were told how to cure it, but they were too busy enjoying life. The sinners in Judah could not complain that they had no way of knowing what was right, since God's genuine prophets were constantly among them. But the people refused to pay attention and repent. Since the people of Judah refused to act in God's way and refused to heed his warnings. He would have all the other nations to take notice. God wanted the whole world to be witness to the fact that their rebellion against him will be punished.

God brought disaster to the people of Judah, not because he wanted to, but because the fruit of their schemes required it. The armed invaders, instruments of the Lord's vengeance, will come from "the north". This northern invader was identified as Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon. His forces would destroy Jerusalem and take most of its survivors into captivity.

We, in society today have the same choices that the people of Judah had. God lets us choose our paths, but we are warned that we must accept the consequences of our choices.



Presides at North Alabama Annual Conference

And are we yet alive, And see each other's face? Glory and praise to Jesus give For His redeeming grace.

The 124th Session of the North Alabama Annual Conference began officially on Wednesday, October 2, at 10:00 AM at Grant Chapel AME Church, Birmingham, Alabama, with the processional of Bishop Kirkland, General Officers, Presiding Elders, and Ministers of the Conference. The traditional opening hymn, "And Are We Yet Alive," was sung and the conference was off to a spirit-filled start. The Annual Sermon was preached by Reverend T. Eric Nathan, pastor of Greater St. Paul AME Church, Florence, Alabama, and a son of the pulpit of St. John. Pastor McCall's Letter

Enemy of the Truth

"Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" (John 9:2)

It has been noted that Jesus performed more miracles of the type mentioned in John 9:1-12 (giving sight to the blind) than of any other and it is also known that the rabbis had developed the principle that "there is no death without sin, and there is no sin without iniquity." They also held that "terrible punishments come on people because of the sin of their parents," and that "a child could sin in the womb," or that its soul "might have sinned in a preexistent state." Hence we are confronted with the above question by Jesus' disciples, "Who sinned...?"

Rather than be distracted by the ploys of the satanic accuser, "Who sinned?" "Who is sinning?" "Who will sin?" Let us stand steadfast with our master, Jesus, who said: "You shall know the truth and the truth shall set you free." (John 8:32) Jesus is the truth. The man born blind was cured by Jesus whereas the Pharisees remained spiritually blind.

Rather than casting the blame (the Accuser) in any situation, why not have a progressively closer walk with God through community involvement and by having a deeper relationship with a Man called Jesus (9:11). Why not share the blame of claiming the truth of Jesus' words as did the man born blind? See what happens

The sermon was anchored in I Thessalonians 1:1-10. The title was "The Kind of Church God Wants." Bishop Kirkland expounded on the description Paul gave of the church at Thessalonica and highlighted three models of the church:

Be sure you have an *elect church.* Are you saved?

The church must be exemplary.They were examples of what they taught.

3. God wants an enthusiastic church.

Bishop Kirkland stated he is fired up about many things but what he is fired up most about is that on Friday, Jesus died and on the first day, Sunday, He got up – and that he is saved by what Jesus did. The stirring, Spirit-filled sermon moved many throughout the sanctuary.

The service and conference concluded with the commissioning service and the reading of Pastoral appointments by Bishop Kirkland.

We welcome Rev. Dr. Homer L. McCall as the pastor of St. John AME Church, Huntsville and Presiding Elder Dillard as Presiding Elder of the South Birmingham— Huntsville District.

Church School Lesson Overview - November 2002

The Church School Department provides the monthly lesson review for the St. John A.M.E.N. This month's lesson reviews written by Willie J. Sandifer (1st, 2nd and 4th Sundays) and Rosetta Williams (3rd Sunday).

November 3, 2002

Lesson Title: The Fall of Jerusalem

Background Scripture: 2 Chronicles 36:9-21; 2 Kings 24:8-25:26

Print: 2 Chronicles 36:11-21

Key Verse: "The Lord, the God of their fathers, sent word to them through his messengers again and again, because he had pity on his people and on his dwelling place. But they mocked God's messengers, despised his words and scoffed at his prophets" 2 Chronicles 36:15, 16

This lesson describes the result of the sins of the people. It was not just the king who had a problem; the people and leading priests were also unfaithful and desecrated the temple. They have walked in their own way, disregarding the direction of the Lord; now they face people who care not for the Lord and know not of His compassion. They have refused to hear the cry of the poor; now they cry and no one shows them compassion. The Babylonian army came three times, eventually leveling Jerusalem and the temple. They took most of the survivors to captivity in Babylon. The fall of Jerusalem teaches us not to take for granted the warnings of the Lord.

November 10, 2002 Lesson Title: Grief and Hope

Background Scripture: Lamentations Print: Lamentations 1:12-16; 3:22-26, 31-33,

Key Verse: "Because of the Lord's great love we are not consumed, for his compassions never fail. They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness.* Lamentations 3:22, 23.

This lesson describes Jerusalem's plight and attributes it to God's judgement. The rebellious people of Judah were in captivity. Their grief and hope found expression in the book of Lamentations. Judah had ignored the word of God and no comfort was available. Jeremiah declares God's steadfast, neverending love; and sees God as a source of hope. Although God's Judgement is painful,

God continues to act out of compassion. As you study this lesson, remember that God is waiting to show mercy to you,

November 17, 2002

Lesson Title: Who Is To Blame

Lesson Scripture: Ezekiel 18

Key Verse: Know that all lives are mine; the life of the parent as well as the life of the child is mine: it is only the person who sins that shall die. Ezekiel 18:4 (NRSV)

In today's lesson, we find that emphasis is placed on individual responsibility. Ezekiel, a prophet of God, did not believe the old proverb that says children would inherit the sins of their father. He held on to the hope of forgiveness and new life-when each person repents of his own sins and turns from his evil ways. Today, as in the Biblical times, many people blame everything and everyone else for their actions except ourselves. This is very sad because we are giving our control and power over to some-

The people to whom Ezekiel spoke had been very rebellious and refused to obey God. They were exiles in Babylon. Ezekiel stressed that they have the opportunity to repent. He taught that salvation would bring new life to them. God had disciplined the exiles; however, Ezekiel taught them that they still had an opportunity to change and find the life that God desired for them regardless of their sins.

In summary, Ezekiel presents God's truth to people who are addicted to their own sinful ways. They want to continue thinking that they are innocent victims of their fathers' sins. Many will continue to say that it is not fair to punish them for sins that they did not commit. Ezekiel challenges us to acknowledge God's fairness in dealing with our sins on a personal basis. God holds us all accountable only for our own sins and not for the sins of others. God's judgment will be fair, just, and right, whether the people choose to see it that way or not. Judging each one according to his ways means that no one will be held guilty or innocent because someone else has done wrong or right. We have all sinned; however, our God is a forgiving God.

God's Emancipation Proclamation

Pastor Homer L. McCall

The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because He has anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor, He has sent me to heal the broken hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed; to proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord. - Luke 4:18-19

The Anointing

The anointing is the difference. As we celebrate the birth of Christ, we are reminded of the Holy Spirit we receive at our rebirth by grace through faith in Christ. What a wonderful celebration at Christmas – God's Emancipation Proclamation! For it is not merely a weekly, monthly, or annual (Black History Month) remembrance. Although it is on the inside, it's value is not reflected by any outside appearance. The anointing of the Holy Spirit through our union with Christ is the difference. At Christmas we can spiritually visualize Jesus identifying with us as the Holy Spirit descended upon Him at His baptism (3:21-22). We can also remember that He was filled and led by the Holy Spirit in the wilderness (4:1-13). He delivered, in the power of the Spirit, God's Emancipation Proclamation of our salvation (4:14-21). As children of God, let us daily claim the power of the anointing of the Holy Spirit – the greatest gift of Christmas. We can claim His power through constant, fervent, unselfish prayer and through daily reliance on the WORD of God. The Anointing of God is the difference not only at Christmas but for eternity.

The Preaching of the Gospel

Jesus, the Anointed One – Prophet, Priest and King – preached good news to all especially those with an attitude receptive to the gospel. It is an attitude which only the Holy Spirit can provide, cultivate and nourish. What a wonderful gift we can share anytime, anywhere, anyway and with anyone – the proclamation that Jesus is LORD. He still delivers the captive. He still breaks yokes, bondages and enslavement to drug addiction, violence, destructive thought patterns, pride, arrogance or sexual promiscuity! He still can empower anyone to live, move and have their being in Him through a life of abstinence that honors the CREATOR rather than serve the creature.

Through claiming the power of God's anointing let us share the good news that "the weapons of our warfare are not carnal but mighty through God to the pulling down of strongholds..." (2 Corinthians 10:4-5)

For the salvation of souls, let us claim and share the victory Christ already has won. Let us pray that others be convinced, convicted, and converted by the Holy Spirit to repent, rely on Christ's WORD and be released from the penalty of eternal death by His grace through faith in the living Christ. His anointing is the difference for anyone, anytime, anywhere.

The Healing

God's Emancipation Proclamation (Luke 4:18-19) also reminds us not only in December or February but also in any month or day of the year that "Jesus was sent to heal the brokenhearted." Although the emphasis here is our spiritual healing, Christ is the Physician whose ministry proves that He was sent to heal us bodily and spiritually. Hearts and homes need healing at Christmas. Congregations and communities need healing at Christmas. Students, schools, teachers, parents need healing at Christmas. The elderly, the young need healing at Christmas.

January 5, 2003

Lesson Title: Setting Right Priorities

Printed Text: Mark 10:17-27

Key Verse: Jesus, looking at him, loved him and said, "You lack one thing: go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." Mark 10:21 (NRSV)

When a young man came to Jesus with the question "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus gave him the answer he obviously wanted to hear. He cited the commandments to the young man. The young man boasted that he had kept all of the commandments from his youth. Jesus then asked him to sell everything, give it to the poor, and follow Him. Even though he had inquired about how to obtain eternal life, his riches hindered him from following through. The problem was that he thought that he could earn eternal life.

Matthew 6:24 reminds us that "We cannot serve God and money." The disciples were surprised when Jesus told them that "It is hard for a rich man to enter the kingdom of heaven" Matthew 19:23. Anything that is in our lives that hinders our relationship with God must be given up. If we were to do as Matthew 6:33 advises, "Seek first the kingdom of heaven, and all these things will be given you as well," all will be well with us.

January 12, 2003

Lesson Title: Purposeful Friendships

Printed Text: Luke 10:38-42; John 11:20-27, 30-32

30-32

Key Verses: The Lord answered her, "Martha, Martha, you are worried and distracted by many things; there is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part, which will not be taken away from her." Luke 10:41-42 (NRSV)

This lesson deals with purposeful friendships, which indicates that we do not get to choose our friends. Jesus was on His way to the Feast of Dedication at Jerusalem, when He stopped by Martha, Mary, and Lazarus' home. Martha was working to make the "perfect"

meal for Jesus. She wanted to see that the house and everything was in order. In contrast, Mary was more interested in listening to Jesus. Martha expressed frustration and asked Jesus to tell Mary to help her. Jesus stated, in Luke 10:42, "there is need of only one thing, Mary has chosen the better part, which will not be taken away from her." The "better part" was being open to the words that Jesus spoke. Mary's spirit was in tune with Jesus' spirit.

January 19, 2003

Lesson Title: Truth and Character Printed Text: John 18:31-38; 19:12-16a

Key Verses: Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice." Pilate asked him, "What is truth?" John 18:37-38 (NRSV)

When Pilate questioned Jesus about being a king, Jesus did not deny it. Jesus said His kingdom was not of this earth. Pilate again tried to turn Jesus over to the Chief Priests ad Pharisees, telling them, "Here is your King." They refused to accept Jesus as their king and demanded that He be crucified. Although Pilate knew that Jesus was innocent of any crime punishable by death, he gave in to the pressure and allowed them to take Jesus to be crucified.

As Christians, we must trust at all times. If the position of favor or money or praise is to belong to us, we do not need to lie, cheat or steal for it. As the popular contemporary gospel song goes, "What God has for me is for me".

January 26, 2003

Lesson Title: Failure and Restoration Printed Text: Luke 22:31-34, 54-62; John

21:17

Key Verse: Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "feed my lambs." John 21:15 (NRSV)

This lesson teaches us the danger of taking on temptation in our own strength. Among the twelve apostles, Peter is the one who rises to the forefront often in the final days of Jesus' ministry on earth. God can use flawed people in His service despite their shortcomings. God uses imperfect people and He is in the restoration business for those who disappoint him but choose to return to Him.

Christmas Morning Worship Tradition Continues at St. John

The tradition of an early morning Christmas Service at St. John continued on December 25, 2002 with a 6:30 a.m. service.

Pastor McCall presided. Director of Music, Rufus Gilmore, was the organist. Prayer was offered by Steward Clifton Pearson. Reverend Claudewell Campbell read the scripture. Congregational songs were "Angels We Have Heard on High" and "Joy to the World". The Christ candle in the Advent wreath was lit by Gale McCall and the Christmas Morning Advent Litany was led by Ms. Barbara Johnson, coordinator for the Advent readings.

Sister Meriam Garrett delivered the Christmas Morning message. Her sermon was entitled "Christmas Presents" with text Luke 1:27-35. She spoke of the Christmas presents that we cannot buy; thankfulness, faithfulness and hopefulness.

Sister Garrett reminded us that we should be thankful for the changes in children's behavior over the past few weeks as they anticipate Christmas presents. We should be thankful for whatever we receive because some have no presents. The second present she described was faithfulness. She described Mary's faithfulness to God as she was able to sing "my soul does magnify the Lord." The third present was hopefulness. We can be hopeful because of a child born over 2000 years ago – a gift to the world. She closed by reminding us that Christ is the greatest gift – the best Christmas present.

The Invitation to Christian Discipleship was extended by Pastor McCall. The Christmas service concluded with the congregation joining hands in a circle and prayer led by Pastor McCall.

Pastor McCall's Message

"But grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ." 2 Peter 3:18

We could offer a contemporary educational parallel/paraphrase to the spirituality of 2 Peter 3:18 by noting the purpose of the hottest topic in education today, the "No Child Left Behind" law. The goal, as you know, of this law is to have 100 percent of students reaching proficiency in reading and math by the 2013-2014 school year and schools will be accountable for raising student achievement. The purpose of my message this month is not to analyze the pros and cons of this important landmark law.

However, to reach this maximum student achievement and productivity, we do need adequate and sustained parental involvement in the learning process as well as enhanced teacher quality and effectiveness by 2005-2006. We could not legislate morality ("Love your neighbor as yourself") into the Supreme Court Decision of 1954 and the Civil Rights and Voting Right Acts of the 60's and America's public schools remain basically as segregated today as they were then. Regretfully and painfully, an ACT of GOD often motivates us to grow in grace and in the knowledge of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior.

Rather than make a resolution today, why not allow the Holy Spirit in you as a believer to help someone at home, church, school, or community to increase (through prayer and Bible study) "in wisdom and stature and in favor with God and men." (Luke 2:52) If your per-

February 2, 2003

Lesson Title: Encouraging Others

Lesson Scripture: Acts 4:32-37; 9:26-27;

11:19-30; 15:36-40

Print: Acts 4:36-37; 9:26-27; 11:22-26; 15:36-

Key Verse: When he (Barnabas) came and saw the grace of God, he rejoiced....for he was a good man, full of the Holy Spirit and of faith. Acts 11:23-24 (NRSV)

To encourage- is to help, give support to; be favorable to; foster.

In our lesson today we see how Barnabas lived up to his name as an encourager to the Church, Saul of Tarsus, and to John Mark. Barnabas was a Levite. His actual name was Joseph, or Joses, but the apostles called him Barnabas, which meant "son of encouragement," or "son of consolation." Barnabas was among the earliest converts to Christianity. He was a man of great generosity. The first recorded deed of Barnabas was that he sold a piece of property that he owned and donated the money to the church (Acts 4:36-37).

After the conversion of Saul on the road to Damascus, it was Barnabas who brought him to the Apostles in Jerusalem (Acts 9:26-27). They and the church feared Saul for his reputation of persecuting the church. Barnabas described how Saul met Jesus on the Damascus Road and how he later spoke boldly in the name of Jesus. Barnabas gives us a wonderful example of how to help new Christians.



When the church at Jerusalem sent Barnabas to Antioch, he encouraged the Antioch church by exhortation, mentoring, and teamwork. Once again, we see Barnabas being a mentor and encourager. On their second missionary journey, Paul and Barnabas disagreed sharply over John Mark's failure concerning the first missionary journey. The disagreement caused the two

to separate. Paul may have had good reasons to disagree, however Barnabas spoke up for John Mark as he once did for Paul.

In closing, there is always someone who needs encouragement. Remember just as Barnabas was an encourager so should every Christian be an encourager.

February 9, 2003

Lesson Title: Paul: Obedient Messenger Background Scripture: Acts 25:23 - 26:32 Print: Acts 26:12-23, 27-29

Key Verse: So then, King Agrippa, I was not disobedient to the vision from heaven. Acts 26:19

Paul, who had been a great persecutor of Christ and Christians and now was an equally enthusiastic spokesperson for Christ, plead his case before King Agrippa. Paul told Agrippa that all he had done was to be obedient to God's call. He had preached the good news of the Messiah to the Jews and to the Gentiles. Paul's eloquence was so great that King Agrippa was almost persuaded to become a Christian.

Paul was born in Tarsus; his father was a Roman Citizen. He was a Pharisee by birth. He was well educated, having received training by the great philosopher, Gamaliel. Paul also claimed that his knowledge came "Through a revelation of Jesus Christ." (Galatians 1:12)

February 16, 2003

Lesson Title: Playing a Supportive Role Lesson Scripture: Acts 16: 1-5, Philippians 2:19-24, 1 Timothy 1: 1-3; 2 Timothy 1: 1-5 Key Verse: Timothy's worth you know, how

like a son with a father he has served with me in the work of the gospel. Philippians 2:22

"... and the best supporting actor award goes to Timothy, Paul's true son in the faith".

In this lesson we learn of Paul's second mission, for it was the 1st time that Paul left the east and witnessed in the cities of Greece in the western world and where he met a young man by the name of Timothy on his second preaching journey in the city of Lystra. In this lesson we also address what it truly means to

be supportive, to be of assistance, to be an encourager, and to be a true shoulder to lean on.

Timothy was truly a committed Christian, who supported the ministry of Paul as well as the message of Jesus Christ, i.e., Christianity. He was willing to take in instruction and sincerely perform his tasks. Paul was so impressed with Timothy because of his strong Christian character and the invaluable assistance that he provided to him that he commissioned Timothy to start new churches. Paul, like any good mentor, provided the necessary guidance that Timothy needed with running the church. Paul instructed Timothy in his letters as described in 1st and 2nd Timothy to help people stick to the truth because there is danger in false doctrine and those who teach it, teach people to do the right things in life, respect authority and leadership, take care of your family, and be careful about worldly things.

February 23, 2003

Lesson Title: Partnering in Ministry

Lesson Scripture: Acts 18:1-4, 24-26; Romans 16:3-4; 1 Corinthians 16:19; 2 Timothy 4: 19

Key Verse: Greet Pris'ca and Aquila, who work with me in Christ Jesus, and who risked their necks for my life, to whom not only I give thanks, but also all the churches of the Gentiles. Romans 16:3-4

This lesson is about teaching and helping others in the faith, and focuses on Priscilla and Aquila. In Paul's day, Corinth was an influential city, powerful politically and economically. It is there that Paul began his next mission and met some fellow tentmakers and Christians, Priscilla and Aquila, They had recently come from Rome because Claudius had expelled Jews from the city. Paul began his Corinthian witness in the synagogue, as usual, but due to Jewish opposition he eventually had to abandon the synagogue and concentrate on the Gentiles. Priscilla and Aquila offered assistance and opened their home to Paul, preachers, teachers, and other Christians in the ministry of the gospel without fear of retribution. They encouraged others to



accept Christ as their Savior. Priscilla and Aquila, were a Christian couple that used everything they had including their home to assist in the ministry. Their gift was to start new churches and provide instruction, when needed, to foster the ministry and they were willing to risk their lives for the gospel.

Paul remained in Corinth approximately 18 months because God had assured him that his work there would be blessed. accompanied by Priscilla and Aquila, left Corinth and journeyed to Ephesus where they remained to establish the witness there. While in Ephesus, Priscilla and Aquila encountered Apollos. Luke describes Apollos as a Jew who knew of Jesus and taught accurately about him but was deficient in this Christian knowledge, knowing only of John's baptism. scriptures state that "Priscilla and Aquila soon instructed him accurately" meaning that they explained to him more correctly the way of God. Apollos ventured to Achaia, equipped with new knowledge and was a great help to those who, through God's grace, had become believers. He was able to defeat Jews in public debates with his strong arguments by providing from the Scriptures that Jesus is the Messiah.

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MARTIN LUTHER KING DAY

Dr. King Advocated Achieving Peace Through Love

As the world remembers the life of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and our military forces are positioning for multiple wars, we should remember Dr. King's cries for peace. Dr. King was an advocate for love and non-violence. His pleadings for peace are found throughout his speeches and sermons.

His acceptance speech for the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964 was anchored in a cry for peace to be achieved through love and nonviolence. In this famous speech he said:

I refuse to accept the idea that man is mere flotsom and jetsom in the river of life unable to influence the unfolding events which surround him. I refuse to accept the view that mankind is so tragically bound to the starless midnight of racism and war that the bright daybreak of peace and brotherhood can never become a reality.

I refuse to accept the cynical notion that nation after nation must spiral down a militaristic stairway into the hell of thermonuclear destruction. I believe that unarmed truth and unconditional love will have the final word in reality. This is why right temporarily defeated is stronger than evil triumphant.

In his sermon entitled "Loving Your Enemies", he noted that he frequently preached on this subject with text from the fifth chapter of St. Matthew, "Ye have heard that it has been said, 'Thou shall love thy neighbor, and hate thine enemy.' But I say unto you, Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them that despitefully use you; that ye may be the children of your Father which is in heaven." He concluded this sermon with a fervent prayer that is fitting for us today as we also pray for peace.

Oh God, help us in our lives and in all of our attitudes, to work out this controlling force of love, this controlling power that can solve every problem that we confront in all areas. Oh, we talk about politics; we talk about the problems facing our atomic civilization. Grant that all men will come together and discover that as we solve the crisis and solve these problems—the international problems, the problems of atomic energy, the problems of nuclear energy, and yes, even the race problem—let us join together in a great fellowship of love and bow down at the feet of Jesus. Give us this strong determination. In the name and spirit of this Christ, we pray. Amen.

(Delivered at Dexter Avenue Baptist Church, Montgomery, Alabama, on 17 November 1957.)

As we observe Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day in 2003, let us thank God for Dr. King and his outstanding contributions to society and pray for peace on earth.

Once upon a time, someone said: Experience is a tough teacher; it gives you the test first and the lesson later. Before Christ began His ministry, before He went to Calvary for our redemption, He had already overpowered and conquered Satan in the wilderness of Sinai where Moses and Elijah also fasted forty days. In your own hour of temptation and testing, why not claim the victorious lessons from the wilderness that Christ offers freely to all. 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Praise Dancers Instructed in the Ministry of Dance During Workshop

Ms. Cynthia Handy-Quintela and Ms. Monique Ryan were the guest presenters for the adult workshop during this year's Praise Dance Workshop.

Ms. Quintela first explained liturgical dance. Liturgical dance reinforces the words of a song or scripture. It helps us to reclaim the sacredness of our bodies and promotes all aspects of the use of the arts in Christianity. Liturgical dance was defined as Holy Spiritguided dance, rather than dance steps put to music.

Ms. Ryan presented a video entitled "The Moving Word: Ministry of Dance." The video presentation focused on four aspects of dance ministry: dance theology, dance trials, dance testimony, and dance triumph. Dance theology involves the study of our spiritual belief system through movement. The scriptural reference used was II Samuel 6:14, "and David danced before the Lord with all his might; and David was girded with linen ephod.* Praise dancers are encouraged to lead with their lifestyles and to let God manifest his work through the ministry of dance. This entails asking God to reveal one's gift and purpose. Once God had revealed the purpose of the gift, one must prepare. Praise or liturgical dancers must bathe everything in

Dance trials are challenges. The question of "to dance or not to dance" must be answered first. This must be discussed with the pastor to determine the attitude toward dance and what elements will fit into that church. The dance ministry must be congregationally friendly. Most people's reference point for dance is from a social standpoint which presents the greatest challenge. To meet this challenge, dancers should establish a code of dress. In addition, dancers should receive some training and skills in dance and interpretation through dance. Praise dancing should honor the body and the spirit.

Pastor Speaks to Team Redstone

"The Souls of Black Folks (100th Anniversary)" was the theme of the Black History Month Celebration held at Redstone Arsenal on Thursday, 20 February 2003 at 9:00 a.m. in the Command's Sparkman Center Bob Jones Auditorium. Pastor McCall presented the keynote address.

To build on the theme, Rev. Dr. McCall selected as his subject - "Who Will Stand in the Gap?" He challenged an audience of over 400 persons to build on the efforts of many Black leaders, past and present, who have stood in the gap for a better world. "The problem of the 21st century remains who will stand in the gap constantly interceding before GOD on behalf of the land", said Pastor McCall.

He continued by stating, "We won't leave here like we came when we stay in the gap and be true to our GOD and true to our native land. When you stand in the gap with hands and heart attuned to GOD, you won't leave here like you came". And indeed the audience did not leave the auditorium like they came after this thought-provoking address.

Ms. Arturine Shackleford, Defense Intelligence Agency, Missile & Space Intelligence Center and Ms. Benetta Halbert, Acquisition Center, US Army Aviation & Missile Command provided beautiful solos for the occasion. Mr. Horace Wilson of the South Central Personnel Operations Center presented an original poem.

Included in the audience of over 400 were a representative number of members from St. John and the Huntsville community.

ana State University. He retired from Regions Bank in December of 2000. He was elected Executive Director of the Department of Employee Security in July of 2000. He was pastor of Brown Chapel AME in Selma, Alabama for seven years. He formerly served as Presiding Elder in Alabama as well.

Dr. Harris joined Pastor McCall for the installation of the Trustees, Class Leaders, and Church Officers for the 2002-2003 Conference Year. These members were asked to come to the altar. Pastor McCall and Dr. Harris offered prayer as well as charged these

individuals to serve and to be examples to those who observe them in the service of the Lord and their church.

Dr. Harris spoke on the topic of "Focus on Faith". The text was Matthew 15: 21-28, with an emphasis on verses 26-28. He indicated that life is a mysterious

journey. He described this journey as everunfolding as well as containing trials and tribulations. Sometimes these trials and tribulations are sufficient to compromise courage and confidence, regardless of one's level of religiosity. He cited national and international tragedies such as the space shuttle and September 11th incidents as tests of faith. Often it takes this level of catastrophe to move people to seek the Lord. According to Dr. Harris, faith tells us "the Lord will make a way, somehow".

Referring to the text, Dr. Harris pointed out that the woman in the story sought Jesus' help for her daughter's illness of demonic possession. The illness tormented the woman and according to Dr. Harris, it may have been a mental illness or epilepsy, for which doctors had no answer. Her final act was to approach Jesus with her daughter's problem. There are too many times when instead of being the first choice, Jesus is the last resort.

Initially, Jesus did not respond to the woman's request for help. When he did respond he said, "It is not right to take the children's bread and toss it to the dogs." According to Dr. Harris, the woman was not offended. Rather, she was on a mission to seek help for her child, so she was not deterred by the rebuff. In fact, she acknowledged that she was not worthy of being in Jesus' presence. Dr. Harris indicated that the woman had faith, in that, she knew that "just a crumb of God's grace would be sufficient to answer her prayer."

The result was that Jesus made the daughter "whole". Dr. Harris distinguished between healing and being made whole. He stated that only Jesus can do the latter. He pointed out

that the woman's faith was the catalyst or change agent. He emphasized that when you focus on faith, all things are possible. Dr. Harris recounted the story of Richard Allen. It was when he was removed from the prayer rail that he was inspired to leave the worship setting that sorely restricted his religious freedom.

This event served as the catalyst for the founding of the AME Church.

Dr. Harris went on to give a litany of African American historic figures who achieved greatness because they focused on faith. He indicated that tribulations became testimonies. Faith is the difference between victory and defeat. One must focus on faith to lead slaves to freedom via the underground railroad, and to lead a civil rights movement where loss of life is a major risk.

Dr. Harris gave the ultimate example of trial and tribulation as he cited the cross on Calvary and Jesus giving a prayer on Friday which was answered on Sunday.

Dr. Harris' message was most appropriate for celebrating the founding of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. He gave a fitting tribute and reminder that out of trials and tribulations great things (such as the AME Church) can emerge. The trials and tribulations suffered by Christ gave us the ultimate answer to prayer. Jesus' resurrection after dying for the sins of others. The key is to focus on the faith.

HIV/AIDS Ministry Sponsors Series of Services By Charlele Brooks

ST. JOHN RECEIVES "BALM IN GILEAD" TRAINING FOR HIV/AIDS MINISTRY

Human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) is the virus that causes acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS). St. John sponsored a program to provide information about this serious syndrome that disproportionately impacts the African American community. On Saturday, February 22, 2003, the Missionary Society, the Christian Education Director, YPD Department and Class Leaders united for HIV/ AIDS training conducted by Ms. LaTeisha Akin, Certified HIV/AIDS trainer, AIDS Action Coalition (AAC), Huntsville. After prayer by Pastor McCall, who emphasized that AIDS is now considered the world plague, he invoked the Holy Spirit to lead our membership to accept the charge in helping victims by receiving and implementing the training that we received this morning.

Mrs. Akin's expressive flip chart presentation and hand-outs stated that AIDS was identified

in 1981. Some persons infected with HIV/AIDS may not have symptoms to show for a period of as much as 15 years. There are typically no visual symptoms in the infected person. She gave clarity regarding how HIV is spread. She stated

that only a doctor can diagnose AIDS. Discussion and questions followed the HIV infection timeline hand-out. Specific identifiers were given showing how HIV is spread. Mrs. Akin stated that as Believers we stress AB-STINENCE; however, all should know how to care for themselves and loved ones, for this disease has become an epidemic in our society and is currently killing so many of our black brothers and sisters. In her closing she stated that the "Balm in Gilead" outreach is seeking churches that are unafraid to discuss this volatile disease and will accept the call to add HIV/AIDS training and assistance to the church's ministries.

COMMUNITY FAITH GATHERING Held on Monday, February 24, at 6:00 p.m.

St. John was one of several churches hosting Community Services stressing Prayer and

Healing of AIDS. Reverend McCall opened the services with a warm welcome to the guest speaker, the gospel choir, staff from the AAC office, the ushers, and all present. A pungent opening prayer was offered by Sister Lillie Rivers which was followed by the responsive reading from the "Balm in Gilead Call to Commitment" led by Community Faith Gathering (CFG) Member, Mrs. Akin. Mrs. Erica Harbin gave an exceptional welcome that included some horrifying statistics. By the end of 2001 there were over 12 million young people aged 15-24 living with HIV/AIDS, world wide. Also in 2001, among African Americans who make up 12% of the U.S. population, 54% were newly infected with HIV. Since 1982, 563 people in Madison County have been reported as living with HIV/AIDS, Mrs. Harbin stressed that our role is to learn as much as we can about the disease and to help where we can.

The speaker of the hour, Elder Kenneth Anderson, a certified professional counselor was introduced by Ms. Wendi Williams, CFG mem-

ber. Elder Anderson, a prolific speaker, used the text from Matthew 25:34-46. "What Type Christian Are You?" Only in the Anderson creative style could a truly picturesque description regarding how the devil chose the HIV/AIDS virus

to reveal how some "so-called" Christians would react to the crisis of AIDS sufferers. He illustrated that this disease was a true brain storm of Satan, and many of us have not taken the banner to help. Some believe that AIDS sufferers are being punished for their lifestyles because many victims are homosexuals and drug users. Many religious groups refuse to take action because of the magnitude of Africans who are affected by the disease.

Elder Anderson then asked where would Jesus be if he were here? He said Jesus would form CARE teams. He would be walking through the community, helping. "Jesus, the bright and Morning Star," he said, "would stop by the Downtown Rescue Mission, and stop by 6th Avenue." He would wrap His arms around all the so-called untouchables. Jesus would stop by the Boys and Girls Clubs and give them

ANSWER! God is to be depended upon, not distrusted.

Once upon a time, children were taught that if you play with fire you will get burned. Another lesson from the wilderness we can claim by God's grace is this: "Stop it before it starts!" God is to be praised and served not Satan. Let's keep our hearts open for the indwelling presence of Christ. Let's claim the power of HIS Anointing and simply say Yes, to JESUS and Get behind me, Satan! Let's worship and serve God with our bodies, minds, and souls! Let's praise the Lord with Christian precepts and Spirit-filled examples that affirm: Abstinence is best for those who live in Christ and postponement until marriage is best for those who are given another chance. God alone is worthy to be praised. Let's present our bodies as a living sacrifice to Him today. (Romans 12:1)

Finally, once upon a time, children were taught character begins in Christ not Hip-Hop, Rap, R&B, or any other artists past, present, or future. God is to be trusted not tested. Even though Israel attempted to test God at MERIBAH (Exodus 17:1-7) Jesus would not repeat the same faithless mistake the Israelites made. We don't have to make the same error either. We have the answer before the test is given. Jesus is the answer. God is to be trusted not tested.

The temptations of Jesus in the wilderness recorded in Luke 4:1-13 and Matthew 4:1-11 ended and the devil departed from Him until an opportune time. Let's apply by God's grace through faith in Christ the Scripture-Answer lessons from the wilderness: Memorize before you evangelize. It is written, "Man does not live by bread alone, but by every WORD of God." Stop it before it starts. "Get behind me, Satan. It is written, 'You shall worship the Lord your God and Him only shall you serve." and Character begins in Christ. "It is written, 'You shall not tempt the Lord your God."

Once upon a time, Christ was tempted and given the worst test of all, CALVARY. He passed through death to the resurrection perfectly. And He is coming again soon with His reward. Aren't you glad?

Lenten Observances Yield a Closer Walk with God

LENTEN SEASON covers the forty-six day period between Ash Wednesday and the eve of Easter. Lent itself excludes the six Sundays and is, therefore, only forty days. Our worship services on Sundays are weekly commemorations of the first Easter and the proclamation that Christ is risen. The date of the beginning of Lent, Ash Wednesday, is determined by the date of Easter.

Palm Sunday, which begins the Holy Week preceding Easter, celebrates Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem. Thursday of Holy Week is known as Maundy Thursday. It is the anniversary of the last supper Jesus ate with His disciples on the evening before the crucifixion. The name comes from the Latin term, mandatum meaning "Command." The command as originally given, was for the followers to continue to remember by washing feet as a sign of humility. However, the contemporary interpretation is that the meal itself is commemorated as an act of remembrance.

Friday in Holy Week is the anniversary of the crucifixion. The term, "GOOD FRIDAY," comes from "God's Friday," just as good-bye comes from "God be with ye."

In times past, observances associated with the Lenten season were preparation (preparing converts for baptism on Easter), penitence (mourning, solemnity, and sadness over sins), fasting (discipline), and special prayer (development of their spiritual lives).

The contemporary church observes the Lenten season with penitence (self-denial), teaching (growth in knowledge of the faith), outreach (special witness to the redemptive message, prayer (special personal and public prayer), and preparation for the victory of Easter. Through these spiritual exercises, a person is afforded a closer walk with God.

The liturgical color during Lent and Holy Week is violet or purple indicating the penitential spirit. Black is used on Good Friday. Lenten resources are the four Gospels and other Biblical passages depicting the meaning of "Bearing the Cross Redemptively."

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AME Women in Ministry Were Trailblazers

Our Women's History Month feature focuses on the lives of spirit-filled AME Women in Ministry.

"And it shall come to pass ... that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh; and your sons, and your daughters shall prophecy." Joel ii. 28.

Women in Ministry bring a difference, which is unique, it's not superior or better, the difference allows them to reach the same goals and objectives concerning ministry unto the Lord. The role of women was limited by many societies to childbearing and keeping the house. They were viewed as the property of men along with the house, the land, and the animals. Throughout history women have been described as the weaker and not important sex, but they have always made a great contribution within their homes, their communities, and in their countries. Women have throughout the ages exercised leadership and pastoral skills from the pew and sometimes the pulpit. They served without denominational support or an office of ordination. They have started churches, led Bible studies, evangelized and headed organizations which were for women only. The road has not been easy or the burden light for pioneering women who faced criticism, rejection, isolation, excommunication, and even threatened with bodily harm. In the following, we lift up a few trailblazers.

Jarena Lee

Jarena Lee was born February 11, 1783 in Cape May, New Jersey. In 1811, she married Reverend Joseph Lee, an AME preacher. Six years later, Joseph died and Lee was left with two children and a commitment to preach in the place of her husband.

Lee is reported to be the first woman to request to preach in an AME church. This request was denied in 1809. In 1817 or 1818, Lee voiced her renewed intentions to preach. The Bishop Richard Allen of Philadelphia was convinced this time and even praised her gift for preaching.

In 1836, the publication of Jarena Lee's Life and Religious Experience of Jarena Lee is said to have started the rich autobiographical tradition for African-American women.

Amanda Berry Smith

Amanda Berry Smith was born into slavery in Maryland on January 23, 1837. By 1840, her father, Samuel, and mother, Miriam, had purchased their family's freedom. The family had moved to York, Pa. by 1850. Smith learned to read and write at home since she was unable to attend school. As the oldest daughter, Smith was expected to help her family financially. At the age of thirteen, she went to work as a domestic. Three years later, she married Calvin Devine. They resided in Columbia. Their unhappy marriage ended with Calvin's death early in the Civil War. Smith then married James Henry Smith, an AME Church deacon in Philadelphia. Smith worked in the mission field for forty-five years. She spent time on four continents and with many different groups of people. She was called "the singing pilgrim" and "God's image carved in ebony" by the newspapers of her time. She was an active member of the AME church even though she spent much of her time in North America preaching to white congregations. Though she was sometimes criticized for her work among whites, she was highly regarded as a leader of the AME church.

Harriet Baker

Harriet Baker was born in Havre de Grace, Maryland in 1829. She was born into a long line of strong and rebellious women. Her grandmother on the paternal side supposedly once killed two men with an axe after they severely whipped her. They whipped her so badly that strips of skin and flesh were brought away from her body, blood flowed, and by the time they were done, her

"very entrails had protruded." After being taken to jail, she was granted her freedom due to the severity of the crime against her. Though born free, Baker (her maiden name was Cole) did not have an easy life. Her father died when she was eleven. As was the custom then, a nearby slaveholder would come to claim the children from the widow if it was proven she could not provide. Luckily, the house was stocked with provisions so the children remained with their mother. In 1845, when she was only seventeen, Baker married William Baker, who was enslaved by Edward Gallop, Gallop "allowed" this marriage because he believed Baker to be a hard worker and that she would work for free around the house. After two years though, Baker found out that Gallop was planning to sell William to Georgia. So, two nights before he was to leave, Harriet and William set off for Pennsylvania with their seven-week old child in their arms. They then settled in Columbia. For many years, Baker believed she was called to preach. However, her pastor and her friends dissuaded her. It was not until a great time of need, after her home had burnt and her two teenage daughters had died within weeks of each other, that she heard the call, "Go now or you shall die." She would no longer be deterred. She began her ministry in Brownstown, Pa. After eighteen years of "arduous labors," it is estimated that she lead five thousand persons to "realize salvation, and countless thousands of believers have been strengthened, and encouraged, and blessed."

Bishop Vashti Murphy McKenzie

Rev. Vashti Murphy McKenzie walked through a door that was once closed to women. At the AME's quadrennial convention in July 2000 she was elected and consecrated the 117th bishop of the AME Church. She was assigned to the 18th Episcopal District, which comprises some 10,000 members and 200 churches in Lesotho, Botswana, Swaziland, and Mozambique. This, too, was a first for a woman. Bishop McKenzie became the first woman in the 214-year history of the African Methodist Episcopal Church (AME) to walk through this door.

Credit Due

Phoebe our sister , . . has been a helper of many and of myself also.

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Women have often gone unrecognized for their achievements and contributions. And sadly, it's also true in the church. But in Romans 16, we have an example of the importance of honoring women who serve faithfully. Paul praised Phoebe as "a helper of many and of myself also" (vv. 1-2). He commended Priscilla and her husband Aquila, who risked their lives for Paul's sake (vv. 3-4). Tryphena, Tryphosa, and Persis "labored in the Lord" (v. 12). Paul mentioned at least eight women for whom he had great appreciation.

Women of faith deserve honor for their service to God and others. Think of the women who are serving faithfully in your church. Why not give one of them a word of thanks and praise today?

In 1990 Rev. McKenzie was appointed to Baltimore's Payne Memorial African Methodist Church, the first time in her denomination that a woman had been assigned to a congregation of that size. Payne Memorial was located in the city's urban core, with all the attendant problems of drugs, crime, and violence, but also in a neighborhood of other large and active religious institutions. The soon to be Bishop McKenzie assessed the needs of the church and its community, focusing efforts on spiritual growth, educational and economic development, and community revitalization. Payne Memorial, under her leadership, was able to institute 25 new ministries and increase its congregation from 300 to more than 1,700.



March for Jesus and Searcy Homes Block Party

On June 7, 2003, Pentecost weekend, millions of Christians in more than 2000 cities around the world will march to show their love for Jesus. The 2003 March for Jesus will once again be a part of Jesus Day- "A day on earth as it is in heaven...no one goes hungry, no child is fatherless, no one suffers alone, and the streets are filled with singing."

Huntsville has supported the March for 10 years and has promoted Community Evangelistic Block Parties in neighborhoods throughout the city as a demonstration of the love of God. Lesson Title: Entering Jerusalem and

Cleansing the Temple

Lesson Scripture : Mark 11:1 - 12:12

Print: Mark 11:1-9, 15-18

Key Verse: When they arrived in Jerusalem, Jesus went to the temple and began to drive out all those who were buying and selling. He overturned the tables of the money-changers and the stools of those who sold pigeons. Mark 11:15

In this lesson we examine Mark's account of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem and His cleansing of the temple prior to His Crucifixion. Jesus rode into Jerusalem on a donkey amid cheering crowds (Zechariah 9:9). He then engaged the religious establishment by disrupting the commercial traffic on the temple grounds. These were not random events. Jesus was nearing the end of His ministry. He was presenting Himself to Israel as the Messiah.

Do we enter the house of worship in the spirit of praise and prayer as God intends? Or have we turned God's house into a place to display our religiosity; a place to make business connections, a place to socialize? May this lesson serve as a reminder that we should treat God's House with respect and enter it in a true spirit of worship of the one in whose name the building is dedicated.

When worship degenerates to involve only what we can get rather than what we can give, we make the church a den of thieves. This lesson is a reminder that worship is a serious matter and everyone is encouraged to examine his or her attitude toward worship.

Passover Lamb

April 13, 2003

Lesson Title: A New Meaning for Passover

Lesson Scripture: Mark 14:1-25 Print: Mark 15:21-24, 34-37; 16:1-8

Key Verse: This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many. Mark 14:24

As the Jewish Passover approached, Jesus' disciples asked how they should prepare for this observance. He instructed the two disciples to follow a man carrying a jar of water and to make preparations for the Passover in a home where Jesus had arranged for using a large room upstairs (vv. 13-16). During the Passover meal, Jesus announced that one of the twelve would later betray Him (vv. 17-18). As each distressed disciple openly questioned Him, Jesus described and pronounced judgment on the one who would betray Him (vv. 19-21). Jesus blessed and broke a loaf of bread, giving it to the disciples as a symbol of His body (v. 22). Jesus gave thanks for the cup, passing it to all of the disciples and describing it as a covenant in His blood (vv. 23-

The meeting at the upper room was about the preparation for death of the Lord, but it also served as re-interpretive context. The Lord gave new meaning for old traditions. In terms of the celebration of life and death, Jesus raised for us the issue of having good plans, anticipating future needs, and addressing them successfully.

Lesson Title: The Cross and the Empty Tomb Lesson Scripture: Mark 15:21-16:8

Print: Mark 15:21-24, 34-37; 16:1-8

Key Verse: Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look there is the place they laid him. Mark 16:6

The verses, in this lesson, tell of the crucifixion of Jesus and of some of the things that He had to endure on His way to the cross. The biblical text emphasis includes passages which tell us the following: 1) Simon of Cyrene was ordered to carry Jesus' cross to the place of the cruci-

(v. 34)" 5) Those standing around thought Jesus was calling for Elijah and waited to see if Elijah would come (vv. 35-37). 6) On the first day of the week, the three Marys found Jesus' tomb empty; and an angel told them that Jesus had been raised and to tell the disciples to meet Him in Galilee (vv. 35-37).

in the Garden of Gethsemane and the crucifixion; which in turn can be followed by hopeful outcomes such as the resurrection.
Bishop Kirkland indicated that historically, this
was the only time Jesus allowed a public
demonstration on his behalf. The point being,
Jesus "had no ego problems". Bishop
Kirkland indicated that there were two reasons
for this: 1) To answer and fulfill the prophecy
in Zechariah ("Behold your king is coming for
you ... humble and on a donkey"; 2) To force
Jewish religious leaders to act immediately,
rather than wait until after Passover as they
had planned. Again the prophecy was that
God's son would be killed during Passover.

Another unusual event was Jesus weeping (noted only twice in the scriptures). The first time was at the tomb of Lazarus and the second was when Jesus looked into Jerusalem and "sobbed loudly" as he lamented their lost opportunity in not realizing that they had the Son of God in their midst. Bishop Kirkland elaborated that there was a lost opportunity for peace that Jesus was offering. He distinguished between material goods and the peace that is not disturbed by the negativity of others. This is an opportunity that he urged Huntsville area residents to take because it is still available because of the resurrection. According to Bishop Kirkland, the second issue that caused Jesus to weep was seeing religious activity accomplishing nothing (of a religious nature). This caused Jesus to drive out those who were commercializing the temple, because this angered Him. Bishop Kirkland quoted the scriptures, 'My house shall become a house of prayer" (not preaching, teaching, offering). He expounded on the power of prayer in terms of changing things and people as well as easing a troubled mind.

Bishop Kirkland ended by admonishing those present to not make Jesus cry. That is, come into church sincerely, "make Him rejoice over what you are doing for Him. Make sure your activity means something to Christ". Bishop Kirkland cited current political, economic, and wartime issues that make this a trying time. Despite this potential time for weeping, he reminded listeners, through song, to not complain because in reviewing the good and bad

events from the first organizational meeting until the present time. Reverend Jackson mentioned the hard work involved when you start a church with no money, no members, and no place to meet. He thanked everyone who assisted them with financial gifts and other items for the church that helped them get to where they are currently. Reverend Jackson said it takes a lot of prayers and patience to start a church.

The Word of God was preached by Reverend Vicki Sanders, pastor of Matthew Chapel A M E Church in Fackler, Alabama. Reverend Sanders took her text from Matthew 26: 36-46 and spoke from the subject "In the Need of Prayer". Reverend Sander's sermon was spirit filled, informative, inspirational, uplifting and biblical based.

We were blessed during the morning session with the presence of Presiding Elder Albert L. H. Hyche and the Revs. Bobby Cox, Richard Davis, Levi Billups, Sheryl Shipman, and Ron Sterling from the Birmingham-Florence District.

Here are ten principles to help you grow in grace toward yourself.

- 1. Hate your sin, but never hate yourself.

- 10. Never stop learning; but don't allow your education to become a point of pride. God doesn't use you because of what's in your head, he uses you because of what's in your heart.
- Realize that your talents are a gift, not something you have manufactured yourself, so never look down on people who can't do what you can.
- Don't despise your weaknesses they keep you dependent on God.

Reviewing these principles regularly will help you grow in grace toward yourself.

As the Twig is Bent, the Tree is Inclined

It is the sacred duty of a father to instruct and train his children.

It is the sacred duty of a father to instruct and train his children. Ephesians 6:4 instructs us; "Fathers, do not provoke your children to anger, but bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord." Slightly translated, it is up to us as fathers not to irritate and provoke our children, but rear them tenderly, and in my estimation, firmly in the training, discipline, counsel and admonition of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. It is a noble and worthy goal to build in our children the strongest sense of character and lay the foundations for a useful and wholesome life. This is our responsibility as parents and as fathers.

Every father instructs his children, mostly by example. Every father instructs his children, mostly by example. In the case of his daughters, in the way a man should treat the females in his life – the example of self love and reverence to his wife, the respect and love that can only exist between a son and a mother, the honoring of a grandmother and, of course, the special love and relationship that a father has for his daughter. Ultimately, one should ask "Am I, as a father, living the kind of life I would want the man who may one day marry my daughter to live?" Raising boys is extremely special and challenging for fathers. Fathers and sons share a bond that has the highest example – John 3:16 is perhaps the most well know Bible passage, telling us how important God's son is to the world. Am I teaching my son in the way the Lord would have me to teach him? Am I the type of father I would want my son to grow up to become?

Our children, the future servant-leaders of our world, will be shaped through a process of cultivation – a comparison might be to flowers or music. The wild rose is beautiful, but not as pretty as the cultivated one. Amateurs can make stirring music, but not in the same class with master musicians, whose ability and genius has been enhanced by dedication and practice. The child should receive intellectual, physical, religious and social rearing – as did Jesus. Read Luke 2:41-52 when you get a chance. Being about "My Fathers business" does not, and did not, happen by accident.

I believe that the responsibility of training and nurturing our children has world-shaping consequences. Just imagine if your child is to become the next Michael Jordan or Venus Williams? Sports heroes are wonderful and, in most cases, beneficial contributors to society. But imagine if your offspring's destiny is a little more important than being a sports hero? What if your daughter or your son has the potential to be a future President of our country, or Bishop of our church, or Beethoven, or Langston Hughes, or the first human to walk on Mars, or finder of the cure for cancer. What if the potential is something seemingly unconnected to importance or greatness, as just another loving human being - who just happens to positively influence someone else to achieve greatness? Just like the ripples that form when a rock is thrown in the water, we have no idea the forces of change for good (or bad) we set in motion as we grow (or neglect our responsibilities to grow) our children.

As I father, I very rarely wake up and plan the "lesson" for the day for Emerson and Evan – up to this point, they have learned a great deal from the keen observation that exists on the part of our children. For those opportunities where lessons and planned counsel are appropriate, the following 10 points may be useful to other fathers and par-




Pastor McCall Gives Sermon for Pentecost Service

The Pentecost Service for 2003 was held on Sunday, June 8th at the 8 a.m. worship service. Pastor Homer L. McCall served as worship leader and offered the sermon. Stewards Nedra McDaniel and Clifton Pearson were program coordinators. Inspirational music was provided by the gospel choir, directed by Cleveland Wilson, accompanied by Antoinette Wilson on piano and percussionist. Talbert Cox.







The Gospel Choir rendered two selections and led the congregational hymns.

This year's service began with an instrumental performance by James E. Jamar, saxophonist. Clifton Pearson led the congregation in the Pentecost Season call to worship. Reverend Claudewell Campbell gave the morning prayer. The hymns and musical selections focused on the coming of the Holy Spirit. This was also true of the scripture readings, which were done by the McIntosh family. The New Testament (Acts 2:1-21), Epistle (1Corinthians 12:4-13), and Gospel (John 20: 19-23) were read by Ronald, Patricia, and Patrice McIntosh, respectively. Phyllis Conner led the congregation in "A Special Decalogue". Glenn Pippen, Sr. led the Pentecost responsive reading and announcements were read by Jeannette Jones. The St. John Adult Praise Dancers transitioned the services to the emphasis on the Holy Spirit after Brother Raymond Nomel gave thanks for the offering.



Reverend McCall spoke on "Growing a Vital Church" with the text taken from Acts 2:1-4. He emphasized the point that a saved people have a sanctified mind and should be growing in grace. He stated further that on Pentecost Sunday one should analyze one's spiritual vital signs. He noted that Pentecost is the 50th day after the resurrection of Christ. He encouraged celebrating the power of God's Son, who came to "save us from sin in redemption".

Dr. McCall described the service as "a party" and the Holy Spirit as "an unseen guest" at the party. He stated that the Holy Spirit helps to focus the mind on pleasing God, that is, "a sanctified mind". He emphasized that a vital church does not grow without the Holy Spirit. He reminded worshipers that the coming of the Holy Spirit was the birthday of the Church. Dr. McCall indicated that Christ is the gift of salvation. He asked the congregation what they were bringing to the party. He went on to say that sanctification is a gift that cannot be earned and there is no need to develop a list of deeds or accomplishments for God to consider in determining entitlement to this sanctification. "God freely gave His son to save the corrupt mind", according to Dr. McCall. He suggested a gift that should be brought to the "party" is "the desire to build and grow a vital church".







Jump Start Jump Start

July 6, 2003

Lesson Title: Nehemiah Begins Work Background Scripture: Nehemiah 1,2 Print: Nehemiah 1:1-4; 2:4-5, 13, 16-18

Key Verse: They replied, "Let us start rebuilding." So they began this good work. Nehemiah 2:18

The returned exiles had been in Jerusalem for more than ninety years, the temple had been completed, but the city's walls remained in ruins. Nehemiah was serving in the palace of the king of Persia when the distressing news came: Jerusalem needed walls! The condition of the walls left the city, the temple, and the people vulnerable to attack and gave their enemies cause to ridicule.

Nehemiah was successful because he had God's blessing and a key to that blessing was his faithful exercise of prayer in his planning. Upon hearing Nehemiah's report, the people were ready to build and committed themselves to the task.

Lesson Title: The Wall Completed Background Scripture: Nehemiah 6 Print: Nehemiah 6:1-9, 15-16

Key Verse: When all our enemies heard about this, all the surrounding nations were afraid and lost their self-confidence, because they realized that this work had been done with the help of our God. Nehemiah 6:26

Most projects have those who oppose it. But Nehemiah prayed, resisted the enemies, and succeeded.

In spite of external and internal problems, the Israelites soon completed the rebuilding of the wall. When word of their accomplishment reached Israel's enemies, they knew they would have to devise a more devious method of attack. Rather than concentrating on intimidating the populace, they would try to destroy the people's leader.

When the enemies of God's people heard of it, all the nations around them were afraid and fell in their own esteem, for they sensed that the word had been done with God's help.

After the returned exiles were settled, the people met in the square before the Water gate in Jerusalem and asked Ezra to present the Law of Moses. From early morning to midday, Ezra read the Law; the people listened attentively.

He went on to suggest how this can be done. First, one should have a praying house, go to church, and attend Bible Study. That is, "choose you this day whom you will serve". He pointed out that the body is a temple of the Holy Spirit and that one's associates influence beliefs and behaviors. As such, one should choose those who believe and their behaviors demonstrate this. Secondly, "choose to take up the cross...because He saved me...and we should be glad to serve Him unto death". The third suggestion was to choose to think in your heart that Jesus is Lord and to thank God for the gifts of God which began with the saving of three thousand (3000) souls on the day of Pentecost. Reverend McCall urged those present to "get out of the comfort zone and get in the 'salvation zone". While earthly friends may forsake, the "Holy Spirit will wrap you and bring you through...the stormy banks of Jordan. In closing, Reverend McCall urged those present to "bring a saved heart, sanctified mind, desire to live a vital life in Jesus". Pastor McCall offered the invitation to discipleship.

The recessional song was "Where the Spirit of the Lord Is."

Once again the Pentecost Service focused on the spirit of worship, the spirit of the living God, the Holy Spirit. The service allowed those present to focus or refocus on the significance of the Holy Spirit and the true meaning of this gift from God.

Mrs. Eloise Sterrs was a graduate of Alabama A&M University during the tenure of Dr. William Hooper Councill. She was an elderly lady respected throughout the community and country.

She owned and operated a boarding home on South Jackson Street in Montgomery where blacks traveling across the country could find room and board in a segregated society. It was next door to the Dexter Avenue Church parsonage where Dr. and Mrs. Martin Luther King, Jr. lived. My family and I lived just a few doors up at 285 South Jackson Street.

As a child growing up in Montgomery, it was always inspirational to chat with Mrs. Sterrs. She was always elated over the very special care and treatment she received as the oldest alumna upon returning for the Founder's Day activities at Alabama A&M.

If I knew then that I would spend most of my adult life as an employee of A&M, I would have asked Mrs. Sterrs more questions concerning the founder, who also, in 1885, organized St. John African Methodist Episcopal Church in Huntsville.

If I could have an imaginary conversation with Mrs. Sterrs, perhaps some of my priority questions would be her knowledge of Dr. Councill's involvement in organizing St. John A.M.E. Church and his work as an ordained elder in the A.M.E. Church. For certainly, Dr. Councill's social consciousness was influenced by such renowned Episcopal leaders in Alabama as Bishop Henry McNeil Turner.

Why did Dr. Councill turn to the A.M.E.

Church, the first black freedom movement in America?

In his 1903 edition of "The Souls of Black Folk," Dr. W.E.B. DuBois noted that the A.M.E. Church, founded by Richard Allen in 1787, was the most powerful organization for blacks in America. My constant thirst and hunger for more detailed knowledge about the founder and organizer of two institutions that I have served for most of my life could be satisfied by an interview with Mrs. Sterrs, the elderly matriarch of South Jackson Street.

As she would sweep her walkway and speak proudly of her alma mater and "life on the Hill," I would also ask her about Dr. Councill's family life – his wife, children, and whether there are any living relatives of one of the most unsung heroes of America – educator, ordained clergyman, social activist, politician, attorney, orator, etc.

While our loved ones, family, friends, and significant persons are here with us, let's delete the "if" and seize the moment. Let us put in more time listening to our elderly. Let's listen beyond the ordinary, polite and expected with aggressive questions that would startle our own imagination.

Youth Reflect on Ninth District **Christian Education Congress**

The Ninth Episcopal District Christian Education Congress took place June 30 - July 3, 2003 at the Adam's Mark Hotel in Mobile, Alabama. The workshops were informative and the services were uplifting. This year a great effort was made to maintain the youth's attention. The facilitators of the workshops were able to relate to us on our level. They let us know that it does not matter what has gone on in our past, as long as we make a change and follow the Lord. God can use anyone.

The Consecration Service was held at Bethel AME Church, Rev. Dr. Leslie Raphael White provided the sermon which was entitled "Jesus Believes in You." He talked about having a maturity of faith in your life. Dr. White also stated that you should not back into growth with God, but should take forward steps to God.

On Tuesday, the workshops began. The first youth workshop was "Learning to Pray Scripture." The presenter was Reverend Carla Stallworth. The points of her discussion were 1) Why does God want us to pray? 2) How can we pray effectively? 3) The effectiveness of prayer. This was a very helpful workshop. The second workshop was "Sharing Your Falth." The presenter was Reverend Chekibe Holman. His message included references from hip-hop culture. He stated "even thugs can change and be used by God." Rev. Dr. Leslie R. White also delivered the sermon at the Keynote Service. His title was "Keep Up the Good Work." The scripture text was Hebrews 12:1-3. Important points in his message were: 1) It is by being open to God that we can be what God wants of us. 2) In order to be closer to God, we can look to those who have made it in their lives, look at ourselves and lay aside any weights and sins. 3) We must do what we can to please God right now.

Reverend Bobby B. Cox, Jr gave the Youth Night sermon. The message was entitled "It's a Process." Scripture text was Philippians 3:12-14. He emphasized that becoming what God wants for us is a process. Everything that we go through is connected to something that will take us to another level with Christ. Three things that can prevent us from tapping into God's purpose for us are: 1) remaining in a comfort zone, 2) failure to relinquish control to God, and 3) failure to remember the Lord. At the conclusion of the service, there was a social hour for the youth, where a Gospel Rap group performed.

The Christian Education Congress was enjoyable, and it was a blessing that one hundred and fifty youth gave their lives to Christ during one of the workshops.

Church School Lesson Overview - August 2003

The Church School Department provides the monthly lesson review for the St. John A.M.E.N. This month's lesson reviews were written by Willie J. Sandifer.

August 3, 2003

Lesson Title: Edom's Condemnation Background Scripture: Obadiah Print: Obadiah 1-4, 10-11, 15, 21

Key Verse: As you have done, it will be done to you; your deeds will return upon your head. Obadiah 1: 5

Obadiah, serving as a prophet from Judah received a message from the Lord regarding the judgement to come upon Edom. The Edomites were descendants of Esau who was Jacob's twin brother, blood relatives of the Israelites. Jacob stole Esau's birthright when he gave Esau food. Obadiah gave God's message to the Edomites. He told them that they believed that Edom was invincible because of its location; it was high up in the mountain region. Obadiah told them that they were arrogant toward God and that they were guilty of persecution of God's children - the Israelites. God's judgment would fall on them for this. Edom had stood by and gloated when Jerusalem was completely destroyed by the Babylonians. They could have come to the aid of their northern brothers, but instead they helped the enemy and were glad to see Israel in trouble.

August 10, 2003

Lesson Title: Call for Repentance Background Scripture: Joel 1,2 Print: Joel 2:1, 2, 12-14, 28, 29

Key Verse: "Return to me with all your heart, with fasting, and weeping and mourning." Rend your heart and not your garments. Return to the Lord your God, for he is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and abounding in love, and he relents from sending calamity. Joel 2:12, 13

The book of Joel begins by describing a terrible plague of locusts that covers all the land, and devours the crops. Joel is describing a terrible, devastating event, but it will be nothing compared with the coming of the "Day of the Lord."

Joel called on the elders of the land, the leaders, to "Pass this information to your children and your children's children. This is what will happen if you don't repent and turn to God."

Many people fail to acknowledge God's hand in their prosperity. They begin to believe that they did it on their own. The people of Judah were beginning to act the same as the Edomites in the previous lesson. Joel told Judah that when "The Day of the Lord" comes, it will be judgement. It will be too late to repent. Now was the day of repentance. Now was the time to put God back into their lives.

August 17, 2003

Lesson Title: Promise to the Faithful Background Scripture: Malachi 3, 4 Print: Malachi 3:1-4, 16-18; 4:1-6

Key Verse: "You will see the distinction between the righteous and the wicked, between those who serve God and those who do not." Malachi 3:18

Malachi is predicting the coming of a "forerunner" of Christ - John the Baptist. Malachi is also predicting the coming of Christ, God says, " I will send my messenger who will prepare the way for me." Malachi then speaks of the messenger of the covenant, who is Jesus Christ, the Messiah.

Judah is still "messing up." They have brought blemished animals for sacrifice on the altar. God was not pleased. God promised to "curse their blessings." The priests were to be intermediaries between God and the people, but they were the ones accepting imperfect animals for sacrifice. They were leading the people to believe that God was accepting those sacrifices. God was displeased with the actions of the priests.

God deserves the best that we have. God refused the offerings of Cain because of their imperfections. God was pleased with Abel's offerings because Abel brought his "first and best".

Print: Daniel 2:26, 36-45

Key Verse: "In the time of those kings, the God of heaven will set up a kingdom that will never be destroyed, nor will it be left to another people. It will crush all those kingdoms and bring them to an end, but it will itself endure forever." Daniel 2:44

In this lesson we get a glimpse of Daniel's prophetic powers. Having a close relationship with God made Daniel the courtier, statesman, man of business and prophet that he was.

Nebuchadnezzar had troubling dreams; he couldn't sleep; he was very disturbed. He called for his magicians, enchanters, sorcerers, and astrologers. Nebuchadnezzar refused to tell them his dream, but insisted that they tell him what he had dreamed and then interpret its meaning. The astrologers could not tell him what his dream had been. The king became highly agitated and threatened to have them all executed. In fact, he ordered that all the wise men in Babylon be executed.

Daniel went to the king and asked for time to interpret the king's dream. The king granted the request. Immediately Daniel went to his friends and asked that they pray with him for a revelation of the king's dream. God granted their request. That night the dream was revealed to Daniel.

Daniel gave praise to God for allowing him to interpret the king's dream. It is true the prayers of the righteous avail much.

August 31, 2003

Lesson Title: Prediction of the End Background Scripture: Daniel 12

Print: Daniel 12-1-9

Key Verse: Multitudes who sleep in the dust of the earth will awake: some to everlasting life, others to shame and everlasting contempt. Daniel 12:2

Daniel's vision revealed that at the resurrection both the saved and the lost will rise, but the fate of the lost will be drastically different from those who belong to God. Before this time there had been no teaching about the resurrection of the saved and the unsaved. It was the belief that only the saved would be in the resurrection.

Is Gay Ok?

read announcements and recognized visitors, who included the Honorable Loretta Spencer, mayor of the city. Mrs. Katherine Campbell gave the prayer of thanksgiving after the presentation of the tithes and offerings.

Remarks were made prior to the sermon in order to allow the spirit of the message to continue to impact the congregation as they dispersed. Dr. Jeannette Jones, co-chair of the Women's Day Committee, commented on the program and the willing participants. Ms. Karen Stanley spoke on the Tax Reform Referendum of September 9th. She expressed appreciation for the opportunity to speak to this congregation during this special worship service. She focused on the religious principles that support the Governor's tax plan. Pamphlets were available in the vestibule for members and guests to read about these principles in depth. Following this, Ms. Tami McGhee made a presentation to Reverend McElroy, asking all sorors of Delta Sigma Theta to stand at that time.

After an introduction by Mrs. Vickki Cox, Reverend McElroy provided an inspirational and challenging message, entitled "Finally". She based her sermon on Ephesians 6:10. She began by mentioning a "dream" of a "true church" which embodied people and behavior that would make God proud. That is, one which ministers to the community, does not allow evil to thrive/survive, places no restrictions on membership, but does restrict gossip. Essentially she dreamed of a church that is built on the foundation of God and leans on Jesus, according to Reverend McElroy. Other characteristics of a "true church" that were cited by Reverend McElroy included honoring the leadership or pastor of the church, building lives that make a difference and grateful lives that spread the good news and connects families.

Reverend McElroy then transitioned to a key word in the scripture as well as the title of the sermon; that is, finally. She highlighted well-known terms and phrases in popular culture such as, the "final answer, final exam, final four". She indicated that "finally" brings forth change and gives peace and "finally" comes with consequences. She suggested that there were four (4) steps to getting to "finally".

According to Reverend McElroy the first step is to finally accept your situation. Instead of seeking perfection, which is the typical in today's world (beauty parlor, barbershop, fitness center), people should take an inventory of who they truly are. They should accept their faults and failures, realizing that Jesus can only work with the real you, according to Reverend McElroy.

Secondly, Reverend McElroy suggested that a person must acknowledge his/her past, realizing that there are consequences for one's actions. She urged that one should "tell the truth and let it go." For example, admit marrying or becoming sexually active too soon, or that parents were right. Also important is accepting responsibility for mistakes, to not hold on to anger which is likely to contribute to depression and illness. She urged letting go of "baggage".

Related to this is the third step, which is to "let it go". Reverend McElroy urged those listening to "stop waiting to exhale", rather, "let Jesus be Jesus". She suggested instead, wait for Jesus to fight the battles, "finally", trust and obey Him.

The fourth step is to "Finally, let God be God in our lives". Reverend McElroy cited biblical examples of how one should trust and obey God. She warned to never look back, as did Lott's wife. She reminded of God's keeping promises as He did with Sarah. She concluded that it is necessary to "realize that God is finally in control."

Reverend McElroy asked all females, and others who wished to make a pledge to "finally" take steps toward the "true church."

Reverend McCall extended the invitation to Christian discipleship. The congregation responded enthusiastically to the speaker and the message for this special day.

The Debate over the Alabama Tax Reform Plan

From everyone who has been given much, much will be demanded; and from the one who has - Luke 12:48 been entrusted with much, much more will be asked.

Over the past several months, citizens all across the state of Alabama have been debating about Governor Bob Riley's proposed Tax Reform Plan, which will be voted on this September 9, 2003. This referendum will affect all Alabama residents, from children to senior citizens, from Medicaid recipients to state troopers, from school systems to prison systems.

As with any vote, it is our responsibility to educate ourselves on the pros and cons of the proposed plan. The key questions for members of the Christian community are "What is my role as a Christian in this debate?" and "What action should I take as a Christian?"

The following items are some basic issues plaguing the state of Alabama and how the Riley Administration's Tax Reform Plan proposes to address them:

- Underfunded educational system. The plan proposes funds set aside for primary, secondary, and post-secondary public schools and institutions, which would improve schools, encourage more college attendance, and positively impact the state socially as well as economically.
- The level of taxation. The plan seeks to reduce taxes and to ensure fair taxation. The Campaign for Alabama, notes on its website that 67% of Alabamians will pay the same or lower taxes if the plan is accepted. They also note that property taxes will rise slightly for most property owners, but the benefit here is the improved educational system for the state (http://www. campaignforalabama.com).
- Accountability of legislators handling funds. Through the plan, any movement of funds without the knowledge of the citizens of the state would be illegal and punishable by law.

Caroline Novak, chairman of the Alabama Partnership for Progress, a "grassroots" association made up of various business, education, religious and civic groups as well as individuals, states that the Riley Administration's plan "allows us to achieve excellence in education, government accountability and tax fairness all at once." (A Better Alabama website, sponsored by the Alabama Partnership for Progress http://www.abetteralabama.org)

Susan Pace Hamill, professor of law at the University of Alabama School of Law, in an editorial titled The Least of These: Tax Reform and the Commands of Faith based on her article "An Argument for Tax Reform Based on Judeo-Christian Ethics', seems to agree strongly with Caroline Novak. She discusses several reasons why we as Christians need to participate actively in the referendum vote on September 9th. According to Hamill, there are several Biblical scriptures, specifically in Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, and Deuteronomy, which clearly state the expectations of God when it comes to the treatment of the poor and powerless. She then goes on to identify the ways in which Alabama is not living up to these expectations.

Hamill clearly states that the role of Christians across Alabama is to assist in the improvement of the system the best way we can. She closes the editorial by challenging Alabamians to "rise up and insist on a fair and just tax structure for all of us, but especially for the poorest Alabamians and their children, who lack the power, knowledge and resources to effectively speak up for themselves". On September 9th, this is the charge that Christians should be keeping in mind!

September 7, 2003

Lesson Title: Endurance in God's Strength

Background Scripture: James 1:1-18

Print: James 1:1-8, 12-18

Key Verse: My brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of any kind, consider it nothing but joy, because you know that the testing of your faith produces endurance. James 1:2, 3

The focus of this lesson is on faithfulness that is necessary for joyous living, which only comes from God. James, the writer, was probably the brother of Jesus and wrote as a "servant" of God and the Christ.

James did not indicate that Christianity would be easy. It was not easy for him. Being the brother of Jesus, James was probably a special person. And yet, he desired no special recognition or privilege, because being a "Servant" of God would give him all he needed for endurance through life.

The heavier the burdens placed upon us, the more intensified our training in faith becomes, the more we become encouraged because we have the assurance that victory lies ahead. These burdens are only stepping-stones to the upward way.

September 14, 2003 Lesson Title: Faith and Action

Background Scripture: James 1:19 - 2:26; 5:7-

Print: James 1:22-27; 2:8-9, 14-17; 5:13-16

Key Verse: Be doers of the word, and not merely hearers who deceive themselves

James 1:22



The lesson in these passages seems to be attacks upon the teachings of Paul and his followers by James. Paul's teachings were based on the fact that salvation comes by faith alone, while James stressed that faith must be accompanied with work. Faith without work is not good. And work without faith is useless. James indicates that if we possess one with the other, we deceive ourselves.

James was intensely practical. He challenged readers to be doers of God's word and not hearers only. Being doers of the word means to live after the pattern of Jesus Christ. This pattern is deeply rooted in God's love and should bear good fruit among those who He touches each day. The "doer" is one who looks carefully at the liberating law of Christ to fulfill God's requirements and his own needs and opportuni-

James describes two kinds of religions, and control of one's tongue was the first test of real religion. If one cannot control his tongue, then his religion was considered "vain". The religious person takes great care to make sure everything concerning worship is in proper order.

James teaches that fulfilling the law means loving our neighbor, and showing partiality is sinful. Wise living is to love God supremely, and to love our neighbor as ourselves.

September 21, 2003 Lesson Title: A New Beginning

Background Scripture: James 3 Print: James 3

Key Verse: Who is wise and understanding among you? Show by your good life that your works are done with gentleness born of wisdom, James 3:13

This lesson challenges us to cultivate the minds of laymen and apostles and to help them in developing an adequate sense of their responsibilities to the ministry of teaching.

Those who teach have greater accountability than those who do not. The office of teacher in the early church was held in high esteem, yet some who held the office then were not qualified. For James, a very important qualification was one's ability to control the tongue. Naturally, this applies to us today. The tongue is considered the worldliest of all parts of the body, and therefore can defile the whole body. A responsible teacher who can control his/her speech can control the whole body, because the tongue wields enormous influence on the direction and character of his life.

We sometimes say things we wish we could

take back, but God's people are called to use good speech. True wisdom leads to a godly life and the believer is to avoid envy and selfish ambition.

September 28, 2003 Lesson Title: Faith and Attitudes

Background Scripture: James 4:1 - 5:6 Print: James 4:1-10, 13-17

Key Verse: Humble yourselves before the Lord, and he will exalt you. James 4:10

James goes deep into the underlying causes of "war and fighting" in this lesson and quickly directs attention from peace to the hostility that developed among his readers. The war like the one in the Middle East is not the kind of war James addresses in this lesson. It is the kind of war that often springs forth among congregations in our churches.

This lesson teaches us that the conflict in church, family, and the work place is inappropriate for true Christians. But God extends His grace to those who come to Him in true humility.

James focuses on the conditions that would exist, if all men sought divine wisdom with situations such as those we are experiencing today, when men and nations give way to evil, lust and greed, and also to wars that develop within us as individuals.

Revival Services are Inspirational

Reverend Dr. James L. Davis, Sr. Pastor of Big Bethel A. M. E. Church returned as the evangelist for St. John's revival. The twonight revival was held August 11th and 12th and was preceded by a pre-revival worship service on Sunday, August 10th.

The pre-revival service featured sermonettes on The Beatitudes from the St. John ministerial staff. Licentiates preached on one verse, while each of the ordained ministers provided sermonettes on two verses. Songs, scripture, and prayer accentuated the program. The sermonettes were as follows: Matthew 5: 3, Sister Ellen Washington; Matthew 5: 4, Brother Raymond Nomel; Matthew 5: 5, Sister Meriam Garrett; Matthew 5: 6-7, Reverend Johnathan Richardson; Matthew 5: 8-9, Reverend Claudewell Campbell, and Matthew 5: 10-11, Reverend Kenneth Johnson.

Monday night revival featured the Male Chorus, directed by Mr. Rufus Gilmore III, Director of Music, and the Tuesday night service featured the Gospel Choir, directed by Mr. Cleveland Wilson and accompanied by Mrs. Antoinette Wilson, pianist. Nightly devotion was led by members of the ministerial staff (Sisters Meriam Garrett and Ellen Washington and Reverend Johnathan Richardson) and Mrs. Lillie Rivers.

Dr. Davis began with a sermon entitled "Trees and Bushes" taken from Judges 9: 6-15. He highlighted the negative impact of inadequacy and inferiority and the associated efforts to camouflage these feelings via beauty treatments and cosmetic enhancements. While it is normal to have doubts at times, it is important to not let them stand in the way of successful experiences due to unwillingness to step out on faith. He indicated that a little doubt is good because no one can do everything; however, it is important to re-

Pastor McCall's Letter

- Reflections on 911 -

"I have seen something else under the sun: The race is not to the swift or the battle to the strong, nor does food come to the wise or wealth to the brilliant or favor to the learned, but time and chance happen to them all." (Ecclesiastes 9:11)

A year ago, September 5, 2002, was a clear sunny day much like the climate on September 11, 2001. I was driving to Montgomery safely. swiftly and securely for the celebration of the opening worship service of the Alabama Annual Conference. Suddenly, within a moment, there was a traffic jam in north Birmingham. I turned on the radio and discovered that it was due to a major accident in the downtown area. I exited at Fultondale without knowing the miles of pileup would be clearing up before I made my way around it. Inwardly, I began claiming even in the delay, there must be a message from the Lord right now. I found a spiritual meaning in the road sign on Hwy 31, that said: SPEED ZONE AHEAD. Immediately three types of zones emerged in my mind:

> Speed Zone Comfort Zone Safety Zone

There must be a text that should fit those ideas. And I asked the Lord for it. As soon as I sat for worship at St. Paul A.M.E. Church, Montgomery.

Alabama the thoughts of studying the scriptural 9:11s throughout the Bible came across my mind. The one I focused on immediately was Ecclesiastes 9:11. member that there is no failure in God. He emphasized leaning on the Lord and remembering that "with God we can do everything". Dr. Davis encouraged using God's gift that He has given everyone, whether it is the talent of cooking, cleaning, or singing, and to use God's gift "with an attitude". He emphasized that "God never leaves us without a gift". One must have that faith. He pointed out that "if you think so little of yourself, you think too much of somebody else". He went further to say it is important to see God above them.

Returning to the text, Dr. Davis described this period as a time when there was no prophetic voice, unlike the times of Moses and Samuel. Therefore, every man did as he thought best. Dr. Davis compared it to the television evangelists of present day. In biblical times, the king had died and Abimelech was made king over the people. Jotham spoke out because this was not a God-fearing person. Dr. Davis indicated that it is essential that someone stand up for what is right in the name of the Lord. The method used by Jotham was to "tell them off in a holy way"; that is, he told them the story in the text about the trees choosing inappropriate plants to "reign over them". His goal was to help them see that the leader selected had inappropriately accepted the position of leading/guiding the people. In Jotham's story, neither the olive nor the fig tree accepted the role of ruling over the trees. While they were not as lofty, they each highlighted their respective gifts (fatness and sweetness, respectively) and the important roles that they would not relinquish in order to rule over the trees. However, the bramble bush which was "good for nothing", was most willing to take on this inappropriate role. Dr. Davis emphasized that the bush grew low to the ground and could not compare to a tree.

In day-to-day living, he drew comparisons to individuals who are not embracing lofty goals, but wish to "reign over your house". He cautioned that "when you hang with a bush you become a bush", and further, to "stay away from the bushes". In the text, the bush required bowing down to its low shadow. Dr. Davis spoke of persons in the workplace who are promoted over individuals who have superior skills/abilities, but there may be a reason those in authority wish an unqualified person to hold such a role (e.g., one can look good by comparison and thusly not feel threatened). He cautioned that the bush can disease the tree and emphasized positive self worth, remembering the gifts/talents given by God.

His points were enthusiastically received by the congregation. He chose to lead the congregation in singing "Have Thine Own Way, Lord", as a hymn of invitation. Dismissal occurred with benediction reserved for the final night of revival.

On Tuesday night, Dr. Davis' sermon was entitled "The Man from Gadara" and was taken from Luke 8: 26-37. This familiar text about a man possessed by demons, inspired a unique emphasis on saving the young African American males in the context of the plight of urban/inner city dwellers and the special interests of suburban dwellers.

"The Man from Gadara"

He began by noting the statistically troubling plight of the African American male with large numbers in prison, labeled as underachievers and non-supporters of their families. He hypothesized that this is likely attributable to insufficient attention given to "our boys", and consequently calls for more nurturance from the community. Dr. Davis cited the importance of a father serving as a model of "how to be a black male"; that is, serving as an authority figure while honoring "his queen", the boy's mother. Additionally, other males in his life/community can serve as models, ranging from uncles to someone else's father. Dr. Davis urged women to "pray him up". The key point being, "Men are a part of God's plan".

In the text, Jesus had been on a preaching exhibition and had disembarked from a ship on the coast of Gadara. Dr. Davis pointed out how Jesus was typically drawn to where problems existed; that is, "Jesus would leave the beaten path to get to the one person who needed Him". In this story, Jesus approached a man who was most unusual in that he was unclothed and resided in the

Church School Lesson Overview - October 2003

The Church School Department provides the monthly lesson review for the St. John A.M.E.N. This month's lesson reviews were written by Willie J. Sandifer (1st, 2nd and 4th Sundays) and Claudinette Purifoy (3rd Sunday).

October 5, 2003

St. John A.M.E.N.

Lesson Title: Called to be God's People Background Scripture: 1 Peter 1:1 - 2:10 Print: 1 Peter 1:3-5, 13-21; 2:4-5, 9-10

Key Verse: As he who called you is holy, be holy yourselves in all your conduct, for it is written, "you shall be holy, for I am holy." 1 Peter 1:15

The focus of this lesson is on the positive effects of loving with a purpose in life and hope for the future. Peter writes to connect the resurrection of Christ with that hope and meaning in the midst of sufferings.

After addressing praises to God and His son, Peter encourages his readers to understand that a Christian's hope is deeply rooted in divine blessings. Peter states that it is most beneficial to remember that: When trials and tribulations distress us, Jesus offers new life - and this new life is imperishable. The Spirit sets Christians apart from all others, by the word and by the grace of God.

Christian hope is based on the resurrection of Christ that makes our hope "living." We are protected by God's power and not through power of our own. Whatever happens in our lifetime, we can live with the assurance that trials are only for a season. They are only opportunities to deepen our faith commitment to Jesus Christ.

October 12, 2003

Lesson Title: Be a Good Example Background Scripture: 1 Peter 2:11 - 5:15 Print: 1 Peter 2:11-12: 3:13-17; 4:7-11; 5:8-10 Key Verse: Conduct yourselves honorably ... so that, though they malign you as evil doers, they may see your honorable deeds and glorify God. 1 Peter 2:12

Instead of exhorting us to be brave and endure trails in this lesson. Peter focuses on us to keep on living in the distinctive Christian ways. Peter entreats us to be so upright that when we are maligned by unbelievers, our

good deeds will certainly bring praise to God.

Peter admonishes believers to abstain from desires of the flesh and to conduct themselves properly, even if one is accused of doing wrong. Peter presents areas of life in which the spirit of humble service should be executed. These areas include obligation to the community, employment, and family.

Peter advises that sometimes our own nextdoor neighbors can be our worst enemies. This is caused by being misinformed or from plain misunderstanding, false rumors, and malicious gossip attacks, often even about our worshiping procedures.

We can put silence to the ignorance of people when we show, through example, that we will not let our law-abiding obligations violate our Christian conscience or consent to things that are morally wrong and contrary to the laws of God.

October 19, 2003

Lesson Title: Grow in Faith Background Scripture: 2 Peter 1 Print: 2 Peter 1:3-15

Key Verse: His divine power has given us everything needed for life and godliness, through the knowledge of him who called us by his own glory and goodness. 2 Peter 1:3

Peter wrote his second epistle to counter the influence of heresy (false teachings) within the church. He appealed for spiritual growth as an antidote to defeat heresy and he urges us to live holy lives in anticipation of Jesus' return.

Peter felt strongly that his death was near and he wanted to leave a spiritual testament that would provide helpful instruction after his departure. He provided warning against the character and false teachings of heretics who would infiltrate the church. Peter urged a development of proper Christian virtues (faith, goodness, knowledge, self-control, perseverance, godliness, kindness and love) and a constant growth in God's grace. An abundance of these virtues indicates a spiritual health and without these virtues we are spiritually lost. Accepting Jesus as our Lord and Savior is the beginning of our growth. As our faith matures and we do

the will of the Father, the testament is revealed that God will do for us what we cannot do for ourselves. God will and does provide everything we need.

October 26, 2003

Lesson Title: Trust God's Promise

Background Scripture: 2 Peter 3 Print: 2 Peter 3:3-5, 7-15a, 17-18

Key Verse: Beloved, while you are waiting for these things, strive to be found by him at peace, without spot or blemish; and regard the patience of our Lord as salvation. 2 Peter 3:14-15

This lesson focuses on two main points of Peter's teachings: the fact of a "Day of Judgment," and how believers should live today in light of this fact.

Among things that were already known and remembered by early Christians, was that prophets and apostles had taught about a falling
away from the true faith. There were many people, even within church congregations, who actually ridiculed the teachings of the Lord's return. They seemingly did not believe that this
day would come, since year after year had already passed, and nothing had yet happened.
Everything had gone along as usual without
any divine intervention. Therefore, people lived
as they pleased, with all disregards for morality.
Scoffers simply made their own declarations
that "the end has not occurred before, so
where is the promise of the Lord's coming?"

Peter introduced the fact that many people simply refused to believe in the coming judgment, because they did not want to admit their lustful lives, and certainly they did not want to be exposed by the "Righteous Judge."

cemetery. He was chained perhaps to prevent his hurting himself. Jesus asked him his name. Dr. Davis pointed out that this man may have 'acted crazy because he was called that', highlighting that people often behave or respond in order to fit the name or label they have been given. So if people had called him crazy, it is possible he had begun to act "crazy". As the man responded that his name was Legion (reflecting the numerous demons by which he had been possessed). Dr. Davis pointed out that Jesus was "in dialogue with the devil". Dr. Davis further commented that the devils asked permission to enter the swine and once done. the swine could not live with that much hell in them" and ultimately "committed hog suicide".

Dr. Davis went on to speak of the aftermath, including freedom for this young man who was purged of the demons. He characterized the cities in that day in terms of the inner city that is often neglected (e.g., crime goes unchecked), and the more "suburban" areas where they adhered to the religious practices of that day, which he described as behavior of the upper echelon.

Dr. Davis compared Legion to the black male who embraced the "hip-hop or street culture", but changed by going to school and realizing that "he is somebody". This type of transformation will frighten people. Dr. Davis stated "there is still hope for black men". He urged those present to "find a boy tomorrow" and impart the knowledge that he is "God's child" and is "going to be somebody's husband one day... prepare him to be a man". According to Dr. Davis, "our communities won't be better until we make them better". He encouraged raising boys and girls to be Christian and holy. He asked those present to reflect on their potential role in the life of a boy, who may be getting a negative message from significant people in his life, and may be essentially doomed without outside in-

During the hymn of invitation, Shayla Gibson came forward to indicate that she wished to be a part of Dr. Davis' congregation in Atlanta when she matriculates at Spelman College in the fall. The benediction was given and another inspiring revival.





Delegate Reports on North Alabama Annual Conference

THE 125th SESSION NORTH ALABAMA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

September 30-October 4, 2003





The Ninth Episcopal District of the A.M.E. Church began pre-conference services with the issuance of the Holy Spirit during the convening of the awesome Women's Missionary Society. The morning speaker was Mrs. Phyllis F. Wynn, President, Birmingham Board of Education. Her topic was "Education and How Missionaries Can Be Involved." Mrs. Wynn's speech challenged each missionary to volunteer for education. We should not ask "How much does it pay?" She stated "God says He paid the price."

The evening Missionary sermon was powerfully delivered by Reverend Sheryl Shipman, Hopewell AME, Florence, AL. The sermon was entitled "This Little Light of Mine" and the text was Matthew 5:14-16. Pastor McCall's Letter

Sealed and Filled with the Holy Spirit

And do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, by whom you were sealed for the day of the redemption. – Ephesians 4:30

But be filled with the Spirit. - Ephesians 5:18 (NKJV)

As we begin a new conference year in the WORD and in prayer, I invite you to reflect on one of the major themes of Ephesians written to the believers in Ephesus by Paul while he was a prisoner in Rome. His message that God is at work in the world through His church is just as relevant today as it was then, around A.D. 60. Rather than focus on Paul's explanations of redemption (chapter 1) resurrection (2:1-10) and reconciliation (2:11-3:21) or to even attempt to examine all of chapters 4-6 where Paul states our response as believers in light of God's purpose, let us center on our sealing by and filling with the Holy Spirit. Our challenge today is to be both sealed by and filled with the Holy Spirit.

"Filling" is a step beyond the sealing of the Holy Spirit. For we do not obey God so that He gives us His grace, we obey Him in response to grace already given. Sealing is an action God took at the point of our new birth, regeneration. The tense of the Greek word translated filled indicates that filling is a moment-by-moment, repeatable action. It is something Paul commands the believers in Ephesus to do. In other words, not all Christians are Spirit-filled, but all have



Opening Worship Service

The 125th Session of the North Alabama Conference opened at 10 AM on Wednesday, October 1. The Opening Worship Sermon was delivered by our Pastor, Rev. McCall. Empowered from above, surrounded by Mrs. McCall, daughters Gale and Sonya, the dynamic Male Chorus of St. John led by Director of Music, Mr. Rufus Gilmore, many officers and members of St. John, and other prayer warriors, God sent a message through Rev. McCall. The sermon topic was "There is Something About the Name Jesus: Looking Back but Pressing Forward'. The sermon text was Hebrews 13:10-16. A few main points included: (A) Many don't realize The New Covenant and think of going back to an eye for an eye. Jesus mediated the New Covenant. By studying the Ephesians better we note the balances in the Christian life between doctrine (chapters 1-3) and duty (chapters 4-6) i.e., divine sovereignty and human responsibility. Likewise, by looking to what precedes and to what follows (4.30) and (5:18), we may see what grieves the Holy Spirit of God and what is to be filled with the Spirit.

What are some of the sins Paul lists that invite Satan into your life and hurt you, harm the church and grieve the Spirit of God. He names such things as lying, losing your temper, stealing, corrupt speech, bitterness and an unforgiving spirit. Likewise, those who are full of drink are not likely to be filled with the Spirit. Throughout the conference year, may God empower us to move together day by day with:

A forgiving spirit in prayer A thankful heart in service A mind growing in grace daily with godly wisdom

preach at 12, Terrance Gray has been preparing most of his life to work in the Lord's vineyard and
to bring the Good News to God's people everywhere.

After his opening prayer, Reverend Gray used the scripture from Luke 22, which contains several critical events in the last days of Jesus' physical presence here on earth. In Luke 22, you find the Betrayal of Jesus, the Last Supper, Jesus praying on the Mount of Olives, Jesus' arrest, Peter disowning Jesus, the mocking of Jesus by the guards, and Jesus standing before Pilate and Herod. From Luke 22, he focused on verses 31 and 32, in which Jesus tells Peter, by addressing him as Simon, that when Satan asked Jesus to tempt him, he prayed for Simon and prayed that Simon's faith would not fail.

"Simon, Simon, Satan has asked to sift you as wheat. But I have prayed for you, Simon, that your faith may not fail. And when you have turned back, strengthen your brothers." Luke 22: 31-32

Key to this scripture and key to Reverend Gray's message was the request that Jesus had of Simon — "And when you have turned back, strengthen your brothers." As the soul-stirring preaching started, references to Christian Men and Women going through trials and tribulations after choosing to follow the Anointed One were sprinkled with references to faith, hope and love. Revered Gray told the church that our choice to follow Christ, making us literally a part of Jesus, does not promise us a "flowery bed of ease". We will experience heartaches and tribulations and even though we are saved, these trials will come. He instructed us to not let the Devil's work or presence, even in the church, stop us from praising the Lord. He reminded us that, like in the last supper, the Devil is always around us, always present and always at work.

Why did God test Peter? The Devil wanted to tempt Simon, who, as Peter would literally be the head or the "rock" upon which Jesus would build his Church [Matthew 16:18]. Before Jesus left this earth to be with his Heavenly Father, He needed to be sure that Peter's faith was strong. Peter was to be the head of the church after Jesus' Resurrection; therefore Satan wanted to "cut off" the head before the body of the church formed. Reverend Gray compared the tempting and testing of Peter to us as Christian Men. If Satan succeeds in breaking our faith, he effectively cuts off the head of the family and future generations of the church. He reiterated that our trials, which will surely come as Satan tempted Job, are meant not to tear us down, but to build us up! Before we can sit as a judge, we must be tried and tested.

As Reverend Gray continued, his Anointed message and his spiritual connection with The Almighty was evident. His sermon's main point was that as Christians, we have a Divine Intercessor – Jesus Christ. We will be tested, and strengthened, that we will celebrate the strength of our faith in Christ Jesus, that we should "turn back and strengthen our brothers" after our trials and tell them about the goodness of the Lord. He left many impressions on our hearts and minds, with one in particular – we don't praise because everything is good, we praise because God is good!

The service, all those who attended, all who participated, every song, every prayer and every remark was a feast for the soul and contributed to what proved to be a blessed worship experience. The foundation-shaking Word as delivered by Reverend Terence Gray and entitled "Tried to Stand" was truly a fitting close to the Men's Day Celebration and the theme of "Christian Men Standing on the Promises of God."

Pastor McCall Preaches Annual Conference Opening Sermon

In the tradition of African Methodism and the profound structure established by the founders of this great institution, the Annual Conference begins with worship service. A pastor from within the conference is selected by the Bishop to deliver the Annual Sermon at this opening worship. It is a great honor to be selected for the sermon. Pastor Homer L. McCall was so honored by Bishop Kirkland. Dr. McCall preached the Annual Sermon at the opening worship service of the 125th session of the North Alabama Annual Conference on Wednesday, October 1, 2003, at 10 A. M. The conference was hosted by St. John A.M.E., Birmingham. The Male Chorus provided inspirational music for the service.

The Presiding Bishop, Rt. Reverend T. L. Kirkland introduced Dr. McCall. He highlighted Dr. McCall's education, but emphasized God's role in Dr. McCall's development. He noted that Dr. McCall has led St. John for thirty-two (32) years, increasing the membership from the seventy-five members found on his first Sunday at St. John.

Dr. McCall preached on the topic "There is Something About the Name Jesus: Looking Back but Pressing Forward". The text was taken from Hebrews 13: 10-16. This book in the Bible tells about the divine mediation, divine sacrifice, and the new covenant. It tells of a choice to "press on". Dr. McCall cautioned against going back to the old law (eye for an eye, tooth for a tooth). He questioned how one makes the right choice over one's carnal nature to seek revenge or exact punishment. The Old Testament did not provide "something to hold on to" when the Roman persecution of Christians occurred, according to Dr. McCall. However, the life and sacrifice of Jesus gave them something to sustain them.

The old law provided for animal sacrifices and there was a long history of upholding the Mosaic Law. But the new law brought about by Jesus and the ultimate sacrifice, allowed for atonement. Dr. McCall indicated that the theme of the book of Hebrews is faith and emphasis is placed on believing in Jesus and the ultimate sacrifice. He pointed out that the carnal mind is still present, which may think that a sinner should sleep in the hard bed made by his misdeeds. Dr. McCall cautioned that this type of belief-system must be relinquished, and instead the focus must be on the "power of the anointing".

While the author of the book of Hebrews is not known, Dr. McCall noted that what is known is the Author of one's faith who mediates; that is, "stands between the wrath of Satan". He pointed out the Importance of the name of Jesus and His saving grace. Dr. McCall gave several examples in the Bible that demonstrated the power of Jesus (translation of Enoch, deliverance from a fiery furnace or a lion's den). He gave present day examples of healing from life-threatening illness and treacherous highway conditions that can literally cause one to spin out of control. The primary emphasis was on accepting Jesus and the anointing associated with His life and sacrifice.

Dr. McCall's message was well received. The hymn of invitation was "Just as I am". The opening service set an appropriate tone for the Annual Conference, where there is a recognition on the past, but the primary focus should be on the future, with particular emphasis on Jesus and His anointing.

Church School Lesson Overview - November 2003

The Church School Department provides the monthly lesson review for the St. John A.M.E.N. This month's lesson reviews were written by Willie J. Sandifer.

November 2, 2003

Lesson Title: Enjoy Fellowship With God Background Scripture: 1 John 1:1 - 3:10 Print: 1 John 1:5 - 2:6, 15 - 17, 29 - 3:1

Key Verse: If we walk in the light as he himself is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin. 1 John 1:7

This lesson is complementary to the last lesson where the major focus was on our need to grow in a life of holiness, in preparation for the return of Christ. In this lesson we are given the incentive that comes from our personal relationship to God.

John said, "God is light." Not a speck of darkness is in Him, and, "if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another." Spiritual people love the light, because darkness suggests hidden evils and light represents goodness, truth, and beauty.

John uses the idea of light in a moral and ethical sense. To live in the light is to live "according to the truth." God is light, because His activities in the world always express His basic nature of holiness. Because He is the light and the only true light, He is also the judge of all the activities of men.

John writes the instructions that those who are members of the body of Christ cannot deny sin in their lives. If persons say they have no sin, they deny the truth and discredit God. But if they confess their sins, God through Christ, will forgive them.

November 9, 2003

Lesson Title: Love One Another
Background Scripture: 1 John 3:11 - 4:21
Print: 1 John 3:11, 14-16; 4:7-16
Key Verse: Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. 1
John 4:11

In this lesson we focus on the necessity of LOVE. Love is the Christian experience that stands out among all other Christian qualities. The first test of assurance was that a Christian keeps God's Commandments. The next test of assurance is based on the first. Love is God's greatest commandment. Many times we feel that we can love or not, depending upon our own feelings. If few live under the lordship of Christ, we cannot determine our love by feelings of a moment. We love, because God commanded us to love.

Hatred of a brother or sister denies life, but Christ's sacrificial death sets the example of love. As separation of the body from the soul brings physical death, so separation of the soul from God brings spiritual death. When one is alienated from God, he lives in a state of death.

God's love became incarnate in a living person - His own Son became flesh. Here we can understand what God's love is all about. It is personal, unmerited, sacrificial, active and inclusive of all people.

Love for God and for others can never be separated. He who loves God must love his brother. When believers love one another, God's love is perfected in them, and they are assured of God's abiding presence.

November 16, 2003

Lesson Title: Live with Confidence Background Scripture: 1 John 5 Print: 1 John 5:1-15

Key Verse: This is the testimony: God gave us eternal life and this life is in his Son. 1 John 5:11

One's relationship with Christ changes one's life more than anything else can. This lesson shows that faith in Jesus Christ alters our way of living and gives us eternal life. It teaches the importance of loving God in learning to love other people.

John makes sure that his readers have their priorities clearly arranged by reminding them the loving God is the first step in the new life. Being born of God through our faith is the changing force. Everything else springs out from that.

Although it is very difficult to decide which is first priority in providing love to God and love to people - they are strongly interrelated. John suggests we cannot omit either one. Believers love God; they keep His commandments that are rooted in victorious life that conquers the world... the belief that Jesus is the Son of God.

The Spirit affirms to believers that Jesus Christ has come, believers by water (baptism) and blood (crucifixion). John is attempting to make sure that his point is made concerning the reality of the Christ.

November 23, 2003 Lesson Title: Remain Loyal

Background Scripture: 2 and 3 John Print: 2 John 4-9; 3 John 3-11

Key Verse: Beloved, do not imitate what is evil but imitate what is good. Whoever does good is from God; whoever does evil has not seen God. 3 John 11

This lesson contains some of the same themes and communicates the same message, as have previous lessons. Love, commandments, and truth are still paired with warning against those who deceive us with false teaching.

Those who have faithfully followed the truth are commended and told that love is not a new commandment, but one that we are taught from the beginning of time - to love one another and to walk according to the commandment of love. The commandment "as you have heard from the beginning to follow love," is the secret to promoting loyalty among members of the church. John says that if we know the truth about love and loyalty, and do not practice it we are hypocrites.

Those who abide in the true teaching of Christ have both the Father and Son; those who depart from the teaching do not have God; their rejection of the teachings separates them from Him.

November 30, 2003 Lesson Title: Maintain Steadfast Faith Background Scripture: Jude Print: Jude 3-4, 8, 10, 12-13, 16-23

Key Verse: Keep yourselves in the love of God, look forward to the mercy of our Lord Jesus Christ that leads to eternal life. And have mercy on some who are wavering. Jude 21-22

This lesson, the book of Jude, confronts Christians who justify their shortcomings, rather than repent of them; and warns us that our faith must be practiced in order to be preserved. Strange doctrine still seems to exait immorality, instead of trying to rise above it.

We will distinguish between loving the sinner and hating the sin; and between being judgmental of people with weaknesses that they are trying to rise above, and being so tolerant of immorality that we seem to approve of lifestyles more geared toward the world than lifestyles centered on Christ.

Jude warns believers against intruders who deny Jesus Christ as Lord and Master, and who pervert the message of faith. He felt a need for this warning, because people's faith had been threatened by unfaithful activities.

Many intruders that Jude spoke about distorted spiritual truths that they did not understand, and acted with animal passions, even joining in love feasts, as if they were true believers.

Believers are encouraged to build up their faith, keep themselves in the love of God, and live in hope of the eternal, while showing compassion and support to those who are inclined to stray away. Jude encourages us to discriminate between those who desire to do evil, and those who do evil by mistake. Only Jesus is available to keep all of us from falling and makes us stand without blemish in the presence of His glory.

For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.

- 3. Are visitors treated with tender loving care and a follow-up greeting after the service?
- 4. Do you seat people safely and reverently?
- 5. Do you receive offerings with reverence and cheerfulness?

Bishop Kirkland Offers Encouragement As GHIMF Guest Evangelist

The annual GHIMF City-Wide Fall Revival was held at 7 p.m., October 27-30, 2003 at the First Missionary Baptist Church on Blue Springs Road in Huntsville, where Reverend Dr. Julius Scruggs is the pastor. Reverend John Clay is president of the GHIMF. Reverend Dr. T. Larry Kirkland, Presiding Bishop of the Ninth Episcopal District of the A.M.E. Church, served as the guest evangelist. This was the third occasion that Bishop Kirkland has been invited to speak for a GHIMF-sponsored activity. This was not only a significant achievement but rather a testament to the dynamic sermons of Dr. Kirkland that strike an interdenominational chord in those who have the opportunity to hear him. This instance was no different in terms of the rousing response to his spiritual messages combined with a "down-home" delivery.

Various members of the Greater Huntsville Interdenominational Ministerial Fellowship (GHiMF) presided each night and participated in the order of worship. Various choirs from some of the churches pastored by members of the GHIMF served during the week. They set the mood with spiritually rousing worship in song. Representatives of ushers from the various churches served each night as well. On Monday night, Dr. Kirkland was introduced by Rev. Dr. Homer L. McCall. Dr. Kirkland maintained a stance of preferring an informal introduction, rather than listing the many accomplishments on his vita.





Dr. Kirkland spoke on the topic "An Encouraging Word to a Discouraged Servant", with text from the 18th chapter of Acts. In the text, Paul had seen the membership of the church he built to greater than eight thousand, dwindle by some 1500 under Paul's successor. Dr. Kirkland indicated that one of the strongest weapons in the devil's arsenal is that of discouragement, and that mankind is prone to discouragement. He indicated that God allows members of the clergy to become discouraged so as to "build empathy for their flock". He noted that "great people" have experienced discouragement, the likes of Moses, Joshua, Elijah, Job, and Jeremiah. Returning to Paul, Dr. Kirkland indicated that while in Corinth God spoke to Paul in a vision, assuring him that God would be by his side.

According to Dr. Kirkland, God encouraged Paul in three ways: 1. Through the companionship of friends ("When you are down and out, God will bring you friends, sometimes from folks you don't even know); 2. Giving you the blessing of converts, in that God will show you the fruit of your labor (God blessed Paul with some converts); and 3. Make sure you have fellowship with God (God spoke to Paul in the night, reassuring him).

On Tuesday night, Dr. Kirkland's sermon was entitled "A Church to be Proud Of" from the biblical text of 2 Thessalonians 1: 4. Again, Paul is featured as he is depressed but learns that one of his churches "was on fire". This was a time when Christians were persecuted and under siege. Membership in the church was a major commitment and at times risky due Roman persecution. In modern times there are the "megachurches" (memberships of greater than five thousand) with



a multitude of assets but limited association with spiritual growth. According to Dr. Kirkland, there are some ministers who preach "comfortable" sermons so as not to offend and risk decreasing the membership of these high profile, multimedia worship centers. He indicated that if everyone is agreeing with a pastor of a church, it is likely that the pastor is "not doing much". He compared this to biblical writings indicating that Paul was literally "run out" of town because he disturbed people with the truth. The evangelist expounded on what kind of church would make God proud.

He described features of the church of the Thessalonians which was characterized by 1. Everyone in the church being genuinely saved (In today's church there is not "true change" in enough people.); 2. Their faith was increasing ("It will require big-time faith to survive the times in which we live"); and 3. They had love for one another. Dr. Kirkland stated that the "church is not worth anything if your church does not have love. He cautioned that "classism" within the church is "destructive and divisive" and may ultimately lead to God's response of "class dismissed when we get to heaven."

On Wednesday, Dr. Kirkland preached on the topic "Get Over It! It's Time to Move On" from the text of I Samuel 16:1. God wanted Samuel to move on because 1. He was neglecting his spiritual assignment, 2. Persistent grieving and mourning were transforming Samuel's personality; and 3. He was hindering God's Program. Revival culminated on Thursday night with text from Matthew 6:25, with the title "Quit Worrying and Start Trusting". Bishop Kirkland highlighted three points: 1. Worry is unnecessary because of your Father; 2. Worry is uncharacteristic because of your faith (worry undermines scripture); and 3. Worry is unwise because of your future.

St. John members as well as ministers and presiding elders from the Ninth Episcopal District were present to offer support and be inspired by Bishop Kirkland. Additionally, Bishop Lawrence L. Reddick of the 7th Episcopal District of the Christian Methodist Episcopal (CME) Church was present.

The Debate over the Alabama Tax Reform Plan: The Results are In

By now, we all know that the September 9th vote on Governor Riley's Tax Reform Plan ended with a loud, resounding "NO"! In the weeks after the vote, there were hundreds of news reports and articles across the state of Alabama with headlines such as "Some say plan never had a chance" and "Tough times ahead".

These reports highlighted only some of the sentiments held by the citizens of Alabama. When discussing the plan with people, it is easy to find both supporters and opposers of it. Whatever side any of us were on, the results of the vote took effect quickly, even as early as twenty-four hours later. On September 10th several state agency employees found themselves receiving pink slips. There were also many state supported programs that had their funding snatched.

Governor Bob Riley, as he opened a special budget writing session of the Alabama Legislature on September 15th, spoke about restoring the faith of the citizens in their state government. This lack of trust is the reason for the outcome of the vote, according to the Governor.

In order to get the state out of its deficit, something the plan was designed to do, Riley proposes "across-the-board" budget cuts for many state agencies (Chandler, Birmingham News, 09/16/03). Some believe that current and future budget cuts are inevitable, but others disagree. Senator Jeff Enfinger (D-Huntsville) noted that Alabamians "didn't vote against all revenue measures. They voted against his [Riley]" (Chandler, Birmingham News, 09/16/03).

The biggest issue that voters were concerned with was the increase in property tax. Historically, the citizens of Alabama prefer their significantly lower property taxes (Hollis, Huntsville Times, 09/10/03). If the Riley plan had not focused as much attention on raising these taxes, many analysts believe that the reform may have passed.

Even so, there was another major concern of many voters about the plan. There was a lack of earmarking on the taxes that were intended to be collected to support schools. This was another point that allowed voters to bring up questions about the trustworthiness of the Riley administration. If taxes are going to be levied, citizens want to know exactly where they are going. The plan did not specify where education funds would go and who would be administering and monitoring the funds. This raised a lot of red flags for voters.

Many citizens suggested that Governor Riley rewrite the plan, taking into account many of the questions raised, such as other forms of taxation and being more specific about what schools will receive which funds.

During the September 9th vote two major issues were to be addressed by the new tax plan. These issues were 1) Alabama's under-funded educational system and 2) level taxation across all classes. Due to the outcome of the vote, the Alabama education and tax systems will remain the same. What does this mean for the future of the state? Will the education system worsen? Will the poor continue to be overtaxed? Will the rich continue to be under-taxed? Whatever happens, we will all just have to continue to pray that the state of Alabama finds a way to improve the quality of life for those who need it and to ensure that the youth of the state receive the quality education that they deserve.

Thinking on Thanking

It would be absurd to declare that "thanks" is an outdated concept. However, I am inclined to think deeply about gratitude and its implications within the realm of our present day society. In the document to follow I will bring to light some crucial questions regarding thankfulness. Then I will attempt to engage my own questions with a view toward resolving the issues such questions raise. These questions are not evidence of any doubt that thankfulness is a necessary part of the Christian life. Rather these questions are evidence of my resolve to reflect deeply and seriously about giving thanks in a way that will be helpful and challenging.


The first question that I want to pose is, "Does giving thanks begin and end with the individual?" Is the event of gratitude self-centered? To this question one may respond with a resounding no! They may affirm that giving thanks is not self-centered but God-centered. Such persons would agree with the statement. "I thank God for what God has done for me, to me, through me and with me." While this is definitely true, I would venture to ask should not the "me" be a "we" or an "us"? Is the "me" ever replaced with an "us"? I would argue, rarely if ever. Such a simple feel good answer to such a serious question is insufficient. One reason that this answer is wanting is because it disregards our innate need to feel safe. And this need for security and comfort, whether it is for ourselves or loved ones, plays a large part in the reason why we give thanks to God. The backdrop for giving thanks is most often from the standpoint of "it could have been me", as if those that "it" did happen to have no reason to be grateful. Such a frame of reference relegates gratitude to the dungeons of the "I" without the "thou", the "me" without the "you" and the "self" without the "other". Now I am not implying that we should stop thanking God for our individual blessings whatever they may be. However, there is incompleteness when this type of gratitude is the only one rendered. Giving thanks does have an individual component that is necessary for affirming and validating a healthy self-interest but giving thanks also has a social component - an edict of the communal. Our thanks giving should never come at the expense of others. Giving thanks is not self-centered but resides where God and our relationship with others and ourselves meet. Concerning this dynamic the words of Psalm 100 and Psalm 34:3 are clarifying:

"Make a joyful noise unto the Lord, all ye lands. Serve the Lord with gladness: come before his presence with singing. Know ye that the Lord he is God: it is he that hath made us, and not we ourselves; we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture. Enter into his gates with thanksgiving, and into his courts with praise; be thankful unto him, and bless his name. For the Lord is good; his mercy is everlasting; and his truth endureth to all generations." (Psalm 100)

"O magnify the Lord with me, and let us exalt his name together." (Psalm 34:3)

Is being grateful bounded? Do we have to be grateful every moment of the day and in every situation? These sorts of questions regarding the nature of being thankful I feel are helpful to understanding what it means to be ungrateful. Because only by fully understanding giving thanks can we guard against being otherwise. Again we have the individual that will answer the question saying that we should be thankful at all times and in all places. Gratitude is not bounded. If this is true, how then can we validate this claim in trying situations that visit human life? Surely we are not going to say to an individual who has been the victim of abuse or who has lost a loved one to death or incarceration, be thankful. What is at the heart of whether being grateful is bounded is the question of whether an individual, community or nation can be angry with God. Does being thankful trump every other human emotion? Well, in every life, social as well as single, being thankful is bounded but this boundary is porous, it is not consistent. In times of suffering, pain, and want we should be able to say with H. G. Spafford, "It is well with my soul". And make no mistake, this is hard to do. "Thanks" always has power but its meaning may be compromised by

CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP & TITHING

(Excerpts from the New Life Ministries New Members Manual)

When you tithe, you return to God one tenth of His money.

"Give, and it will be given to you; a good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you get back."

Luke 6:38 (NRSV)

Tithing is a biblical term which means giving ones first fruits to God. It is the first tenth of one's income. Tithing is a voluntary and systemic way of returning to God part of what He has given us. It refers to the total gross income from any source including salary, stocks and bonds, interest income and dividends. For example, if you gross \$100.00 weekly, you would be expected to give \$10.00 of your earnings each week to the church as your tithe.

It is also necessary that we as a people begin to realize the significance of a "self tithe." This means that you give your tithe to God first and then you tithe 10% of your income to yourself and save your earnings. One then begins to learn how to live on less and experience a victorious life because you have been obedient to God, for you are sowing the seeds of a good steward. Basically, you are in charge of Gods gifts to you.

Tithing is a spiritual approach. Whenever we tithe, we are expressing faith in God and we are trusting God to keep His promise. Not to tithe is blatant disobedience to God's Word and is equal to robbing God and results in a curse. Malachi 3:8-10 (NRSV) states:

"Will arryone rob God? Yet you are robbing me! But you say. "How are we robbing you? In your tithes and offering! You are cursed with a curse, for you are robbing me - the whole nation of you!"

"Bring the full tithe into the storehouse, so that there may be food in my house, and thus put me to the test, says the Lord of Hosts; see if I will not open the windows of Heaven for you and pour down for you an overflowing blessing."

We recognize that there is a financial sacrifice involved, but we believe that God, in all His goodness, will not allow our obedience to Him to destroy or harm our family in any way. God says in His word, put Him to the test, to prove Him, but you will never know the fullness of God and what He can do for you until you put Him to the test and TITHE.

We believe that if you take care of God's church, God will take care of you. It may not be that you will get more money, although some have, but to know the rewards of Gods spiritual blessings of His love, grace and the peace that only He can give, is worth more than the sacrifice of giving. Whether our blessings are material or spiritual or both: "Every generous act of giving, with every perfect gift, is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change."

James 1: 17 (NRSV)

November is Stewardship Emphasis Month in the African Methodist Episcopal Church. As we begin this conference year, pray that you will grow in stewardship. If you are already a tither, continue to tithe in time, talents and treasure. If you have not made the commitment to tithe, prayerfully consider making this decision during this conference year. Church School Lesson Overview - December 2003

December 7, 2003

Lesson Title: Samuel: A Child Dedicated to God

Background Scripture: I Samuel 1:1 - 2:10 and Luke 1:46-55

Print: I Samuel 20, 26-28; 2:1-8 Devotional Songs: "# 242, #251, & #243

Key Verse: I prayed for this child, and the Lord has granted me what I asked of him. So now I give him to the Lord. For his whole life he will be given to the Lord. I Samuel 1:27-28

How many times have you prayed to the Lord to provide a particular blessing to you? Once you received the blessing did you share it with others? Did you thank the Lord for it? Did you return the blessing to him? The lesson gives the biblical account of the sacrifice and courage of Hannah and the birth of Samuel.

Hannah was a wife of Elkanah who was often tormented and ridiculed by Peninnah; the other wife of Elkanah, because she was without child. Deeply humiliated, Hannah turned to the Lord, prayed for Him to bless her with a son and promised to dedicate the child to Him. Hannah prayed so fervently that Eli, a priest that was witnessing her in the tabernacle, thought that she was drunk. She convinced him that she was not drunk by telling him of her anguish. Eli dismissed her and bestowed a blessing.

Hannah and Elkanah were blessed with the birth of Samuel. Hannah could have very easily said, "Thank you Lord for blessing me with a son but I can't keep my vow to you. Samuel is my miracle baby and his daddy and I need him with us. You know Lord - I'm not getting any younger" but she did not. She remembered her solemn promise and after Samuel was weaned, at the age of 3, Hannah presented him to Eli at the tabernacle in Shiloh. She wanted him to know that the Lord had answered her prayers and that she was there to fulfill her promise to the Lord. It would be under Eli's tutelage that Samuel would serve the Lord and become a great prophet.

Hannah prayed to the Lord after keeping her promise. Her prayer was a song celebrating the righteousness and sovereignty of Lord. Her prayer told of how the Lord defeats the proud and exalts the humble, how He protects and provides for those who are faithful to Him and He will strengthen His anointed king.

Hannah's account reminds us that there is no sorrow that He cannot heal.

December 14, 2003

Lesson Title: John: Forerunner of Jesus

Background Scripture: Luke 1:5-80 Print: Luke 1:67-90

Devotional Songs: #221, #272, & #243

Key Verse: And thou, child, shalt be called the prophet of the Highest: for thou shalt go before the face of the Lord to prepare His ways. Luke 1:76

While Zacharias was performing his priestly duties in the Lord's temple, an angel of the Lord, Gabriel, appeared before him, Gabriel told Zacharias that his wife would give birth to a son, and that he would be filled with the Holy Spirit from birth and be great in the sight of God. Zacharias was fearful and did not believe the angel's words, and because of his unbelief, Gabriel silenced his tongue so he could not speak until the prophecy was fulfilled.

Zacharias and Elisabeth became the parents of John the Baptist and after John's birth, Zacharias spoke, prophesying and praising God for His mercy and goodness. Zacharias thanked God that He was raising up the promised Savior who would come to save people from their sins. John's role was to prepare the way for the Messiah. John grew strong and lived in the desert.

Mary and Joseph were engaged to be married when Mary became pregnant by the Holy Spirit. Joseph, who was a descendant of King David, was about to divorce her until an angel appeared to him in a dream.

The angel told Joseph not to break the engagement, but to name the child Jesus because he would save people from their sins. The name "Jesus" is a Greek form of the Hebrew name Jeshoshua, which means, "the Lord saves." The sinless and divine nature of Jesus made Him the only man capable of shedding blood on the cross that is sufficient to atone for man's sin.

Key Verse: And Jesus increased in wisdom and stature, and in favour with God and man. Luke 2:52

Jesus accompanied His parents on their yearly visit to Jerusalem to celebrate the Passover. Jesus was talking with the teachers in the temple when Mary and Joseph started home. When they realized He was not with the crowd, they returned to Jerusalem to find Him. Jesus returned to Nazareth with Mary and Joseph and was obedient to them.

Jesus grew in wisdom, which came from God, and the grace of God was upon Him because He stayed connected to His Father in heaven. Jesus knew who He was and understood His purpose. anger and despair. This is why in times of pain, loss or extreme sadness, thankfulness is the last thing on our mind. But gratitude at its best occurs at that moment when we really don't have a reason to be thankful. Giving thanks is purest when pain and suffering is deepest – not necessarily after. It is at this point that I leave you with the words of Job, "Though he slay me/ us, yet will I/we trust Him".

I have considered briefly the idea of gratitude/ giving thanks. I have more queries on the topic but am hopeful that this snap shot of where I am has been inviting. I pray it has been received in love and benefits consciousness.

ADVENT

ADVENT begins the Christian liturgical year on the Sunday closest to November 30, which is St. Andrew's Day.

The season is four Sundays in duration. The Sundays are referred to as "Sundays in Advent". This year, advent begins on Sunday, November 30.

The advent message comes from the two Latin words, as venire, which means "to come to". The message is that God, in Christ, is coming into the world. It includes all time.

In times past, God did come in the Christ-like child in whose honor we celebrate Christmas. Thus, God supplies the fulfillment of the Old Testament prophets. In times present, the individual may experience God coming into their lives for the first time, "new birth," or in the renewal and growth into deeper dimensions of reality. In times to come, we are promised the return of the Christ in His full glory and power as judge of all the world.

Advent also bears the admonition that we need to prepare for the sure coming of the Lord. Preparation for the coming Lord must include repentance, prayer, and patience.

The liturgical color for Advent is violet. It is a color that communicates a feeling of quiet dignity, royalty, and repentance. Such a color is most expedient to announce the coming of the King of Kings.
