#### Legacies of Nonviolence and Forgiveness: Martin Luther King, Jr. and Nelson Mandela

On January 20, 2014, there will be a holiday/celebration marking the birth of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. which occurred on January 15, 1929. This is the only national holiday to honor an African American. Dr. King, an iconic civil rights activist and minister began his activism in the 1950's in Montgomery, Alabama. The catalyst for the Montgomery Bus Boycott was Ms. Rosa Parks' refusal to relinquish her seat on the bus. The ensuing boycott and civil rights movement were characterized by nonviolent protests which often resulted in arrests and beatings. Great efforts were made to train those who would participate in the protests to withstand verbal and physical aggression and respond in a nonviolent manner, even under extreme conditions. The efforts of Dr. King and the vast numbers of those who would march for racial and economic justice, contributed to legislation for desegregation and voting rights for minorities. Dr. King, before his death in April of 1968, began to move toward economic and employment equality as well as advocating for peace/nonsupport of the Vietnam War. Many persons besides Dr. King lost their lives in an effort to bring attention to the injustice and atrocities that were inflicted upon African Americans (and protestors regardless of race) and to effect the changes that are viewed as part of the "Dream" about which Dr. King spoke.

Interestingly, on another confinent, in the country of South Africa, there was another iconic leader/activist, Nelson Mandela, who was born July 18, 1918. He fought apartheid, a legalized system of oppression, inequality for the black majority by the white minority. Although trained in the
area of law, Nelson Mandela, responded to mass killing of blacks by embracing the idea of violence to change the injustice of the ruling National Party of South Africa. His struggle began after
1948 and he was tried for treason but acquitted in 1961. He was tried for attempts to violently
overthrow the government and sentenced to life imprisonment in 1964. He underwent a transformation while imprisoned and continued his effort to change the policies, law, government, and
was released in 1990. He ultimately became the first Black President of South Africa as apartheid was ended.

Mr. Mandela was an example of how one could be transformed and he was held in high esteem in his country and internationally as a symbol of forgiveness. Rather than embrace bitterness and seek revenge against those who imprisoned him, he united his country and the people. During his illness and particularly after his death in December of 2013, news coverage communicated the multicultural and multiracial unity of South Africans as they mourned/celebrated the life of Nelson Mandela; and the international leaders and citizenry at large, communicated respect for the leader and particularly his transformation/example of forgiveness. He was often quoted as noting the importance of forgiveness and the liberating power associated with forgiveness.

Both King and Mandela received the Nobel Peace Prize for their work effecting change for racial equality, ending discrimination, and working for unity. The latter, received the award in combina-

tion with Willem de Klerk, President of South Africa, who worked with Mr. Mandela to gain his freedom and have fair elections which would result in "President" Nelson Mandela.

A few quotes from Mr. Mandela speak not only to his legacy but highlight the work of Dr. King as well. Two icons, who sacrificed their lives in different ways, but changed the lives of many for the better; and set in motion events that would be noted globally. While they never met, their struggles had similarities and differences.

"I learned that courage was not the absence of fear, but the trium ph over it. The brave man is not he who does not feel afraid, but he who can conquer that fear". — Nelson Mandela

"For to be free is not merely to cast off one's chains, but to live in a way that respects and enhances the freedom of others". — Nelson Mandela

"Resentment is like drinking poison and then hoping it will kill your enemies". - Nels on Mandela

"As I walked out the door toward the gate that would lead to my freedom, I knew if I didn't leave my bitterness and hatred behind, I'd still be in prison" - Nelson Mandela

"No one is born hating another person because of the color of his skin, or his background, or his religion. People must learn to hate and if they can learn to hate, they can be taught to love, for love comes more naturally to the human heart than its opposite". Nelson Mandela - Long Walk to Ereedom.

"... And when this happens, and when we let freedom ring, when we let it ring from every village and every hamlet, from every state and every city we will be able to speed up that day when all of God's children, black men and white men, Jews and Gentiles, Protestants and Catholics, will be able to join hands and sing in the words of the old Negro Spiritual: Free at last! Free at last! Thank God Almighty, we are free at last!" - Martin Luther King Jr.


appeared when the shepherds did not know what to do. In concluding, Pastor Clayborn stated that sometimes all one has to do to "Move Past Fear" is to give God praise.

#### Condensed New Members Class



# Healthcare Coverage is Mandatory

The Patient Care and Affordable Care Act's first deadline for coverage led to over 1 million people / families signing up to healthcare coverage by Dec 23, 2013. There is still time to ENROLL prior to March 31, 2014 deadline for 2014. Healthcare coverage is mandatory and persons without coverage will be fined.

These are the enrollment deadlines through March 2014.

- January 15th, for coverage to begin on February 1st
- February 15th, for coverage to begin on March 1st
- March 31st for coverage to begin on May 1st (this gap is due to how insurance plans implement coverage)

Jazz was perplexed, she could not figure out why God wanted to help her now. Her only response was, "Lord, I don't pray."





## The Eyes Have It



Glaucoma is irreversible damage to delicate nerve fibers and the optic nerve that sends information to the brain. Because there can be significant damage to the eye before the problem is discovered, glaucoma has long been called "the silent thief of sight." More than three million adult Americans have glaucoma. It generally appears in middle age and seems to have a genetic component. One in five people with glaucoma has a close relative with the disease.

The inside of the eye continuously produces and drains away a fluid called aqueous humor. As fresh aqueous is produced by cells inside the eye, an equal amount must exit through a drainage passage way (trabecular meshwork). If not enough drains away, pressure will increase inside the eye. The effects of intermittent or persistent high pressure on delicate retinal nerve fibers and the optic nerve results in permanent vision loss.

The most common type of glaucoma is called chronic open angle glaucoma (COAG) accounting for 75-90% of cases, of which both eyes may be affected at the same time, but one eye is often worse than the other. Eye sight begins to fade in the outer areas (peripheral) of the visual field. If untreated, tunnel vision and then blindness follow.

Narrow or closed-angle glaucoma (CAG) is less common and occurs suddenly with blurred vision, a great deal of pain in the eye and head, and redness, usually in one eye first In CAG the flow of aqueous fluid is blocked from entering the drainage system causing a sudden and severe rise in pressure inside the eye. Acute CAG is a medical emergency and needs immediate medical care to restore normal aqueous outflow, reduce pressure and prevent damage to the eye and blindness.

It is not possible to prevent chronic open angle-glaucoma, but early detection and effective treatment will prevent significant damage to the eyes and preserve your sight. All adults need an eye exam that includes tests for glaucoma every three to five years. These tests are usually done by an eye doctor, either an optometrist or an ophthalmologist. More frequent exams may be suggested if there is a family history of glaucoma

or if there are other risk factors for glaucoma.

Risk factors may include:

- Being of African, Hispanic, Inuit, Irish, Asian, Russian, or Scandinavian descent.
- Having a family history of glaucoma
- Being nears ighted
- Having poor vision from a different eye problem
- Having had serious eye trauma
- Taking any form of steroid medication (pills, inhalers, eye drops) for disease such as asthma and rheumatoid arthritis.

Tests for glaucoma are brief and painless. The mere presence of higher than normal eye pressure does not mean that you have glaucoma. Elevated pressure in the eye without evidence of damage to the optic nerve is called ocular hypertension. People with this condition must be test ed at regular intervals.

If glaucoma is suspected, eye doctors will carefully inspect the appearance of the optic nerve for signs of damage. One will also have a visual field test that measures the sharpness of their peripheral vision (side vision) by using spots of light of different sizes and intensities. Prescription eye drops are the first choice of treatment used to reduce pressure. Laser treatments and surgery are used if eye drops do not control glaucoma.

Glaucoma is a life-long condition that needs continual follow-up with your eye doctor. Early detection of glaucoma is the key to preventing damage to the eyes and blindness.

is one's daily walk with Christ in vain? Upon reflecting on this lesson, one's thoughts wonder as to whether they can serve God with an angry spirit. Apostle James wanted to convey that Christians should take note of their daily actions (looking in the mirror) in showing Christian love. He pointed out that in order to wak in the God spirit, one must strive to follow the perfect law — the law of liberty and perseverance, being doers and not only hearers of the word. Apostle James also indicated that while reflecting on Christian characteristics, if one determines that they cannot curtail the tongue then maybe the deeds that are done for others, in the spirit of Christ, will not be blessed and what was done for others will have been a wasted effort.

Apostle James also reminded readers of their obligation of being good Christians. In following the perfect law, they are reminded that they have an obligation to care for the orphans and the widows in distress and to always walk in a manner that is not characteristic of the world.

February 9, 2014

Lesson Title: Playing Favorites Lesson Scripture: James 2:1-13

Application: To recognize the sin of prejudicial treatment and repent of it.

In reflecting on this lesson, one central question came to mind, "How do we treat the less fortunate amongst us?" In placing the lesson in modern day times, this reviewer recently came across an article or an internet hoax that brings verses 1-8 to home. The article, released in September, indicated a newly appointed minister, upon arriving at his new church assignment, decided to arrive dressed as a homeless person. While waiting for the service to begin, he interacted with the congregation - speaking to some, asking others for money and/or food and even attempted to take a seat on a pew up front. The article indicated that only a few spoke back, many ignored him. He was not given food or monies and when he sat up front, ushers politely requested that he sit in the back. The article went on to indicate that during the service, one of the stewards announced the arrival of the new minister. It was reported that the congregation cheered and clapped hands until the homeless man stood in the back of the church and proceeded to walk towards the altar, then there was total silence.

Apostle James reminds readers in verses 9-13 that if they were the ones who looked down on this homeless man then they too had sinned. Apostle James indicates that believers should strive to follow the royal law —"love your neighbor as yourself." And he notes that if one cannot keep this law, one should not profess to be almighty in other areas of their Christian walk. Apostle James reminded readers that for as long as they fail to keep one law, they will be judged as not keeping any of the laws. He also reminds readers that God's judgment will be without mercy to any who showed no mercy to his/her neighbor and to remember that mercy may allow one to escape judgment.

February 16, 2014

Lesson Title: Live What You Believe Lesson Scripture: James 2:14-26

Apostle James continues teaching Christians on the concepts of faith and works. He cited

several examples where it took more than a good heart and lip service to demonstrate one's Each example, where faith was described took an action on the part of the person to solidify their profession of faith. Apostle James provided examples of both sides. demonstrating where faith is not completed and where it is completed. He notes where only fulfilling part of a neighbor's needs while wishing them well does not demonstrate true faith. He noted where Abraham demonstrated his faithfulness by offering Isaac as a sacrifice. He also noted that the prostitute Rahab welcomed and protected the spies sent by Moses and then rerouted them to safety by giving them directions to return by a different route. Both of these later actions are noted as works.

Apostle James indicated that each of these examples indicated that works were the results of faith placed into action and therefore without works demonstrated faith alone would be meaningless.

February 23, 2014

Lesson Title: Unfork Your Tongue Lesson Scripture: James 3:1-12

Application: To have believers see that one should not only think before speaking but pray about is as well.

In this lesson Apostle James spoke on a truth that will never change. He cited several examples demonstrating how the smallest part of an object determines the path the object undergoes. ## Pastor's Message

## Visions of History, Heritage, and Hope

Hebrews 11-12

As we celebrate Black History Month, I cannot help but think of my mother, who is a retired history teacher. Whenever a topic of history enters the conversation, her eyes light up, and she begins to wax eloquently on the great royalty of Europe or the wisdom found in the ancient Far East. However, when the topic of African and African American history is broached, she turns red with passion and gives a history lesson for all times. My mother will talk about the ancient pharaohs, the slave castles of western Africa, the stories of the Zulus, the Middle Passage, the Underground Railroad, Jim Crow segregation, the fight for Civil Rights, the fight for Women's Rights, the fight for economic equality, the fight for peace over war, how former slaves built schools, how the African American community started banks and insurance companies, and how there is still great potential in Black people! She will describe the heritage and hope of African Americans through a history lesson.

The writer of Hebrews gives the reader a history lesson as well. This writer details the exploits of the great patriarchs (and some matriarchs) of Israel. The writer helps the audience to see from whence they have come.

Most paramount is the theme the writer gives this history: FAITH. The heroes and heroines of Israel were able to succeed by faith. Great works were accomplished by faith. Sacrifices were made by faith, Faith is the heritage of the Israelites. This is a strand of their history that gives credence to their spiritual authority. Faith is part of their spiritual DNA.

Interestingly, the intended audience of Hebrews is in a place of suffering and persecution. Many are walking away from church and joining cults. They cannot see how their spiritual origins do them any good in their present circumstances.

Therefore, the writer of Hebrews encourages them to embrace their history — the godly models placed before them — and to hold on to their heritage — the faith of their forebears. Though their ancestors could not access the promise in their lifetimes, the writer claims that their ancestors are surrounding them as a great cloud of witnesses. This great cloud witnesses to the goodness of one who came after them: JESUS! The writer of Hebrews dares the audience run the Christian race by looking to Jesus, who has endured more than they could imagine. Unlike their ancestors, they will be able to receive the promise in their lifetimes — a kingdom that cannot be moved. Hence, the writer demands that they lift up their hanging hands and feeble knees — with HOPE! They are to anticipate God's deliverance through the ministry of Jesus Christ.

We, too, must embrace our history and hold on to our legacy as a people and as a church. We must do this in order to have hope for the situations we face daily. In a world of chaos, confusion, joy, triumph, uncertainty, and specificity, we have to honor the faith of our foremothers and forefathers who looked to Jesus for their help and power. When they called His name, they accessed a hope that the world could not destroy. Why should we deny ourselves this heritage? Let us as well look unto our ancestors for our history. Let us look to their faith as our heritage. Let us look unto Jesus for our hope!

#### HENRY Box Brown (c.1816 - after 1889)

#### "A Slave Signed, Sealed, and Delivered"

enry Box Brown was born a slave on a plantation called Hermitage in 1816 (precise date of his birth is unknown) in Louisa County, Virginia. He is best known throughout history as arranging to have himself shipped in a wooden box from Virginia to Philadelphia, to escape slavery and enter a world of freedom.

Unlike many slaves, Brown spent his childhood years with his parents and seven siblings who were all slaves. They were enslaved to John Barrett, a former mayor of Richmond and master and owner of the Hermitage. Although the entire family were slaves, life

was relatively good for them. They were never deprived of food or clothing; neither did they suffer any inflictions of pain.

Their slave owner (John Barrett) eventually fell ill and died on June 9, 1830. The family was then separated among four plantations, and Brown was sent to Richmond to work in the tobacco factory of Barrett's son William Barrett, whose property he became.

While living and working in Richmond, he attended First African Baptist Church, where he served as an active member. He met a young lady there by the name of Nancy, who was also a slave belonging to a local bank teller named Hancock Lee. They attended church service regularly and always kept the faith knowing they would someday be free from slavery.

In 1836, Brown married Nancy, and to their union were born four children. Brown became a skilled tobacco worker and earned enough money to set up his family in a rented house. In August 1848, Nancy Brown's master sold her and the children to another master in North Carolina named Joseph H. Colquitt He was known as an exceedingly cruel man and known to have abused Nancy - not because she did not do her duty, but because her

manner was too refined for a slave. Brown did his best to keep Nancy near him. Colquitt eventually sold Nancy to another slave owner named Samuel Cottrell. Brown regularly paid Cottrell whatever small wages he made from the tobacco factory. In return, Cottrell promised to keep Nancy and their children on his plantation. However, when Cottrell demanded more money than Brown had, he decided to sell them. After Brown had witnessed the auction of his family being sold for \$1,050 to a slave trader, Brown knew immediately he needed to do something.

Over several months he grieved the tremendous loss of his family and for a time stopped attending church. Having lost what little joy his life offered, he finally began to plan an escape. Henry Brown had a "heavenly vision" to mail himself to a place where there were no slaves but simply could not do it alone:

With the assistance of James Caesar Anthony Smith, a free black and fellow member of his church, he contacted a sympathetic white storek eeper by the name of Samuel Smith. Smith negotiated a price with Brown to assist him with escaping. Brown devised his plan to have himself shipped to a free state by Adams Express Company. Brown paid \$86 (out of his savings of \$166) to Smith, who contacted Philadelphia minister James Miller McKim. McKim advised them to mail the box to the office of Quaker merchant Passmore Williamson. In an effort to get out of work for the day, Brown burned his hand to the bone with sulfuric acid, He thought it was worth the risk.

The trip in the box began on March 23, 1849. The 27 hour journey of the box traveled thru wagon, railroad, steamboat, wagon again, railroad, ferry, railroad, and finally delivery wagon. Brown was sitting in a wooden box three feet long, two and one half feet deep, and two feet wide, and the package was listed as Dry Goods" from Richmond to Philadelphia. Brown was turned head down in the box for several hours and nearly died. During transfer points the box was handled roughly while delivery workers sat on the box to rest. The parcel finally arrived on March 24th, 1849. McKim took delivery at the office of the Pennsylvania Anti-Slavery Society, where the box was opened. While getting the box opened Brown emerged from the box alive and finally free from slavery.



While being removed from the box, he sang:

I waited patiently for the Lord And he, in kindness to me, heard my calling And he hath put a new song into my mouth Even thanksgiving -even thanksgiving Unto our God Blessed - blessed is the man That has set his hope, his hope unto the Lord O Lord! My God! Great is the wondrous work Which thou has done! if I should declare them and speak of them They would be more than I am able to express I have not kept back thy love, and kindness, and truth From the great congregation Withdrawnot thou thym ercies from me Let thy love, and kindness, and thy truth always preserve me Let all those that seek thee be joyful and glad And let such as love thy salvation Says always – say always The Lord be praised!

Program for her leadership skills and her essay on drugs, tobacco and alcohol. She attended, with three (3) other Extension Staff, the

National Drug Facts Week Symposium and Health Rocks Training January 30-February 2 in Washington, D.C. The keynote speaker for the conference was Mr. David Mineta-Deputy Director of Demand Reduction, White House Office of National Drug Policy. Deputy Mineta gave startling facts and statistics on substance abuse in the US and how important it is to educate people, especially our youth, on the dangerous consequences that come along with drug usage. He also praised the youth and adults on their involvement in getting the word out about substance, alcohol and tobacco usage. Deputy Mineta shared this statement with us, "On behalf of President Obama and my department...We Thank You for being a direct part of The President's National Drug Reform Policy through the mission of education and getting the word out to others about illegal drugs.

Attendees also participated in a Q & A Session with scientists from National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA). 

#### Church School Lesson Overview - March 2014



Lesson Title: An Eternal Kingdom Lesson Scripture: Il Samuel 7:1-17

Print: Il Samuel 7:4-16

Devotional Songs: #412[], #272 [], and #243 [] Key Verse: "Thine house and thy kingdom shall be established forever before thee; thy throne shall be established forever" (II Samuel 7:16).

Application: To show that as God prepared for the coming of Christ by means of His covenant with David, we can be assured that He is in control of history and that all that He has promised will come to pass.

This lesson looks at the original promises God made. One can learn that there are good ideas and then there are God's eternal purposes and plans for His covenant people.

David was secure in his kingdom. He had successfully transported the tabernacle and the Ank of the Covenant to Jerusalem. He was living in his royal residence. Jerusalem could now officially be recognized as the capital of Israel.

David expressed his desire to replace the tabernacle with a permanent temple, as he enjoyed this time of peace. This occasion was used by God to set up one more step in His plans to send the Messiah. God established that the lineage of David would be the lineage from which the Messiah would come and upon whose throne He would sit by making His covenant with him.

March 9, 2014

Lesson Title: Son of David

Application: To show that the Son of God, our Saviour, came into the world as promised.

This lesson examines how God confirmed His promises made in the Davidic covenant and revealed more fully through Isaiah how the Messiah would be God incarnate. How the prophecies of the coming Messiah and King were fulfilled by the birth of Christ are also examined.

Sixteen times Jesus is called "Son of David" in the New Testament. Jesus was in the family lineage of David through Joseph and Mary as a man and was eventual heir to the throne of David. Jesus was the Son of God, hence, King of Kings and Lord of Lords. God raised Jesus from the dead to be King of the Jews and to have lordship over everyone. Jesus' servants are those who have faith in Him alone.

March 16, 2014

Lesson Title: An Everlasting King

The lesson shows evidence of the certainty of God's determination to prove to His people of His oath to raise up Jesus from the dead. It also shows evidence of the eternal power and authority of God to rule the kingdom of heaven and earth.

#### Black History in Medicine

James Derham (1757-1802) was the first Black person to receive a certificate to practice medicine in the US. He won his freedom and set up his own practice in New Orleans.

Rebecca Lee Crumpler (1831-1895) became the first Black woman doctor in the US. She graduated from, what is now, Boston University School of Medicine in 1864.

Mary Biza Mahoney (1845-1926) was the first African American to study and work as a professionally trained nurse in the US, graduating in 1879. In 1908, she co-founded the National Association of Colored Graduate Nurses with Adah B. Thoms.

Daniel Hale Williams (1856-1931) founded the first black-owned hospital, Provident Hospital and Training School Association in 1891 on the South side of Chicago, serving the community as a whole. He was credited with the first successful open heart surgery in 1893.

Charles Richard Drew (1904-1950) developed a way to preserve blood, creating the first American Red Cross blood bank. He developed a method to efficiently store blood plasma; preserving blood plasma for transfusion. He was a surgeon, medical scientist and educator.

Henrietta Lacks (1920-1951) was a poor black tobacco farmer from Southern Virginia. At 30 years old she was diagnosed with cervical cancer. Six months before her death cells were taken (without her knowledge) from her womb and became one of the most important tools in medicine; vital for developing the polio vaccine, cloning, gene mapping, and in vitro fertilization. Henrietta's cells were the first immortal human cells grown in culture. Her cells even went up in the first space missions (to the moon) to see what would happen to cells in zero gravity. The HeLa cells have been bought and sold by millions, yet the she remains virtually unknown, and her family can't afford health insurance.

In her new book, The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks, journalist Rebecca Skloot tracks down the story of the source of the amazing HeLa cells, Henrietta Lacks, while documenting the cell line's impact on both modern medicine and the Lacks family.

ment prior to where the judgments of the tribulation start. Until Christ, the Lamb, comes forward, the seven sealed scroll that contains the judgments cannot be opened. Heaven bursts out in worship at His appearance.

The context of this lesson is Jesus' revelation to the Apostle John. In the first three chapters John sees Jesus in His present relationship to the church. John was transported to heaven in chapter 4 where he saw the throne of God surrounded by the elders and the four living creatures worshiping Him. When John saw the scroll that could not be opened, he was overcome with grief because no one was found worthy to open the scroll.

March 30, 2014

Lesson Title: The Entrance of the King Lesson Scripture: Zechariah 9:9-10; Matthew 21:1-11

Print: Zechariah 9:9; Matthew 21:1-11

Tentative Devotional Songs: #221 []; Alleluia; and #243 []

Key Verses: "The multitudes that went before, and that followed, cried, saying Hosanna to the son of David: Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord; Hosanna is the highest" (Matthew 21:9).

Application: To show that Jesus fulfilled the prophecies about the Messiah, proving He is the Messiah.

The lesson examines the fulfillment of the prophecy from the book of Zechariah of Jesus' triumphal entry. Zechariah provided some of those details and Jesus definitely fulfilled them.

The prophecies in chapters 9 through 11 of Zechariah focus mainly on the first coming of braefs Messiah, while the next three chapters portend the Second Coming, Zechariah presented the Messiah entering Jerusalem as a humble King. He encouraged Jerusalem to look forward with joy to the arrival of its true King.

Zechariah wrote that it was Israel's King who was coming. At the time of his writing, Israel had no king, When Jesus appeared on the scene, Israel's kings were of the Herodian dynasty, a line of leaders selected or permitted by Rome. Herod the Great was from Edom and was seen by the Jews as not being eligible to be king.

In this novel, the lives of these three characters intertwine like vines. It is interesting to see how what has been done in the dark comes to light






The Journey of Faith
1 Corinthians 4:1-2

Let [one] so account of us, as of the ministers of Christ, and stewards of the mysteries of God. Moreover it is required in stewards, that [he/she] be found faithful.

The word steward in the above passage is oil conomos. Here are some definitions: "oil conomos. In Greek this word means 's teward.' It may then denote the head of a particular branch of a great house, e.g., the chief cook. As a loanword it can denote a city official (cf. Romans 16:23), It may also be used for an estate manager or accountant as well as a housekeeper. In the rabbis Moses is God's steward. In parables the loanword usually has the sense of treasurer." A steward is "a house-distributor (i.e. manager), or overseer, i.e. an employee in that capacity; by extens, a fiscal agent (treasurer); fig. a preacher (of the Gospel)."

representative! Stewards are caretakers of the mysteries of God --- the secrets of God! We are called to take
care of the mysteries ---- what are they? God's mysteries include — but are not limited to — God's grace,
God's mercy, God's faithfulness, God's blessings,
God's miracles, God's healing, God's protection, God's
provision, God's direction, God's forgiveness, God's
restoration, God's favor, and God's peace. God's mysteries are the evidences of God's love toward us

## Bishop Guidry Leads St. John in Celebrating Founder's Day



St. John celebrated Founder's Day on Sunday, February 9, 2014, at a combined 10 a.m. worship service. The theme was: Writing the Vision: History, Heritage, and Hope. Right Reverend Carolyn Tyler-Guidry was the preacher for this time-honored celebration of the founding of the African Methodist Episcopal Church by Richard Allen. The Steward Board coordinated the program and Stewards were featured in the order of worship. Mrs. Pamela Whitehead served as program chair.

The Gospel Choir set the tone with inspirational selections, and Dr. Jennifer Patterson gave an emotionally gripping liturgical dance to "O Fix Me." Visitors were welcomed, and as with each Sunday in February (African American History Month), the drama ministry represented /introduced themselves as African American historical figures who were 'visiting' St. John. Dr. Patrick Clayborn, pas-

tor, introduced Bishop Guidry, noting the history of early AME bishops, their impact on women's rights in the pulpit, and the "ups and downs" that occurred until "faith-filled women were allowed in the pulpit." And on this day, congregants were privileged to hear from a retired female bishop. of the AME Church, which in itself was historical.

Bishop Guidry preached on the topic "The Church Will Survive" with the biblical text Matthew 16:12-20. She emphasized verse 18 with emphasis on building the church on the firm foundation which would be impervious to the efforts of the devil or any such attack. Setting the historical stage, Bishop Guidry noted that the AME Church and the United States Constitution were simultaneously in development. She emphasized the dichotomy of that time in establishing independence/freedom from Great Britain while embracing slavery for blacks. Bishop Guidry drew the time line from the founder John Wesley (Methodist Church) to Richard Allen, the end of slavery and the role of education for the newly freed slaves. Great strides were made with meager resources contrasted with the resources of today, which Bishop Guidry suggested are squandered in some instances.



Likewise, the church was established by Richard Allen and others in a humble setting (blacksmith shop). Bishop Guidry indicated that the torch should be passed and that "the Church will survive." She suggested that re-evaluation might be appropriate in an effort to "recapture the fervor of Allen" and others. She emphasized reaching out to "those in need of Jesus" without prejudgments about attire, vices, or the types of songs that they embrace; for the purpose is to "bring them to the altar/Jesus and HIS LOVE."

Bishop Guidry reiterated, "The Church will survive because Jesus commanded it to," regardless of naysayers. She highlighted the "responsibility" of outreach to "let those who need it know of Jesus." That is, "They are somebody's sons and daughters," and as

### CELEBRATING WOMEN: WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH

omen's History Month honors and celebrates the struggles and achievements of American women throughout history. American women have struggled to gain rights not simply for themselves but for many other underrepresented and disenfranchised groups in America.

Women's History Month had its origins in 1981 when Congress passed Public Law 97-28 which authorized and requested the President to proclaim the week beginning March 7, 1982 as "Women's History Week". As requested by Congress, President Reagan issued Presidential Proclamation 4903 proclaiming the week beginning on March 7, 1982 as the first "Women's History Week" and recognizing the vital role of women in American history. The beginning of the Proclamation states:

"Am erican women of every race, creed and ethnic background helped found and build our Nation in countless recorded and unrecorded ways ... As leaders in public affairs, American women not only worked to secure their own rights of suffrage and equal opportunity but also were principal advocates in the abolitionist, temperance, mental health reform, industrial labor and social reform movements, as well as the modern civil rights movement."

Congress continued to pass joint resolutions designating a week in March as "Women's History Week" and authorizing the President to issue a proclamation to inform the country of this recognition and urge the people to study the contributions of women to U.S. history. Since 1995, Presidents Clinton, Bush and Obama have issued a series of annual proclamations designating the month of March as "Women's History Month," These proclamations celebrate the contributions women have made to the United States and recognize the specific achievements women have made over the course of American history in a variety of fields.

As we continue to celebrate women, the Newsletter Ministry decided to pay homage to ten (10) remark able and notable women (see page 4) who changed history. Although their works have gone unnoticed, their contributions have paved the way despite the persecution, segregation, and racism each of these women faced. Without any of their contributions, women would not have the determination, courage, drive, nor the freedom to explore possibilities. These women have made a difference and fought a good fight in their quest for equal political, economic and social opportunities in the United States, just to make sure women have equal opportunities.

### PORTRAITS OF WOMEN IN HISTORY

Nancy Green November 17, 1834- September 23, 1923	A storyteller, cook, activist, and one of the first African-American models hired to promote a corporate trademark known for "Aunt Jennimo" Pancake Mix.
Mary McLeod Bethune July 10, 1875- May 18, 1955	An American educator and civil rights leader best known for starting a school for African-American students in Claytona Beach, Florida, that eventually became Bethune-Cookman University and for being an advisor to President Franklin D. Florida with the Struggle" because of her commitment to bettering African Americans.
Bessie Coleman  January 26, 1892 –  April 30, 1926	Served as the first African American plot and the first person of African-American descent to hold an international pilot license.
Hattie McDaniel June 10, 1895 – October 26, 1952	The first African American to win an Oscar. She won the award for Best Supporting Actress for her role of Mammy in Gone with the IMno (1939).
Barbara Jordan February 21, 1936 - January 17, 1996	She was an American politician and leader of the Civil Fights movement. She was the first African American elected to the Texas Senate after Reconstruction, the first southern black female elected to the United States House of Representatives, and the first African-American woman to deliver the keynote address at a Democratic National Convention.
Lorraine Hansberry May 19, 1930 – January 12, 1985	She was the first black woman to write a play performed on Broadway, Her best known work, the play A Paizin in the Sim.
Mary Church Terrell September 23, 1883 – July 24, 1954	She was one of the first African-American women to earn a college degree in 1884 graduating from Oberlin College.
Charlotte Ray  January 13, 1850 –  January 4, 1911	The first African American female lawyer in the United States. Ray graduated from Howard University School of Law in 1872 and became the first female admitted to the District of Columbia Bar.



Charity Adams Earley December 5, 1918 – January 13, 2002 The first African American woman to be an officer in the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps (later WACS) and was the commanding officer of the first battalion of African American women to serve overseas during World War II.



Maggie Walker July 15, 1867 – December 15, 1934

The first female bank president of any race to charter a bank in the United States.

# Ash Wednesday Began 2014 Lenten Journey Journey of Faith: 7 Steps of Stewardship

The LENTEN SEASON covers the forty-six day period between Ash Wednesday and the eve of Easter. Lent itself excludes the six Sundays and is, therefore, only forty days. The date of the beginning of Lent, Ash Wednesday, is determined by the date of Easter.

This year St. John will take a "Journey of Faith: 7 Steps of Stewardship" during the Lenten Season. Members received a preview of the journey in the previous Sunday's message "Journey of Faith: The Best Offering." The congregation will explore seven ways in which to respond faithfully to the love of God: relationships, time, health and wellness, talent, finances, community out reach, and the environment.

Worshippers gathered in the sanctuary on Wednesday, March 5, for the annual Ash Wednesday Service and in anticipation of the information that would be provided about the Lenten journey. The Reverend Meriam Garrett led the worship service. Prayer was offered by the Reverend Charles Glover. Dance and musical solo set the spiritual tone for the meditation. Dr. Jennifer Patterson, coordinator of the St. John Dance Ministry, ministered in dance to the song "Lead Me to the Cross" and a stirring solo, "God Is Here," was sung by Dr. Janette Kotey, Minister of Music at First Missionary Baptist Church.







Following a passionate singing of "Jesus, You're the Center of My Joy," Pastor Clayborn gave the meditation that was centered on Luke 15:11-13. The message was entitled "Journey of Faith: The Right Relationship." The message was focused on the first step of faith in stewardship. To have "the right relationship" one must admit brokenness, make an intent to do God's will, and take the step of faith. As the prodigal son took the first step of faith and returned to his father, believer's relationship with God is right as soon as they take the step of faith. In concluding, he stated that "Because of His grace and mercy, we have the right relationship."

Congregants gathered at the altar for prayer, followed by the imposition of ashes.














# Soup Kitchen Corner

When God began a series of plagues and finally death to Egypt's first born sons, it was through God's grace that He spared His own people. Exodus 6:28 – 11:7



The program has reduced waste and provided funds to area schools. The caps are recycled into new plastic paint containers. Residents can drop off plastic caps at City of Huntsville schools and local Huntsville fire stations to support the initiative.

# March is National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month



Among cancers that effect both men and women, colorectal cancer (cancer of the colon or rectum) is the second leading cause of cancer deaths in the United States. Every year, about 140,000 Americans are diagnosed with colorectal cancer, and more than 58,000 people die from the cancer.

The risk of getting colorectal cancer increases with age. More than 90% of cases occur in people who are 50 years old or older. Colorectal cancer screening saves lives, but many people are not being screened according to national guidelines. If you are older than 50 years old, getting a screening test for colorectal cancer could save your life. Early screening can....

- ⇒ Find precancerous polyps so they can be removed before they turn into cancer. In this way, colorectal cancer is prevented.
- ⇒ Find colorectal cancer early; treatment often leads to a cure.

You should begin screening for colorectal cancer soon after turning 50, and then keep getting screened regularly until the age of 75. Ask your doctor if you should be screened if you are older than 75. The best time to get screened is before you have any symptoms!

Precancerous polyps and colorectal cancer do not always cause symptoms, especially at first. You could have polyps or colorectal cancer and not know. That is why having a screening test is so important. Symptoms for colorectal cancer may include:

- ⇒ Blood in or on the stool (bowel movement);
- ⇒ Stomach pain, aches or cramps that do not go away;
- ⇒ Losing weight and you do notk now why.

These symptoms may be caused by something other than cancer. If you are having any of these symptoms, the only way to know what is causing them is to see your doctor.

Localized bowel cancer is usually diagnosed through a sigmoidoscopy, which is the minimally invasive medical examination of the large intestine from the rectum through the large part of the colon. There are two types of sigmoidoscopies: a flexible (flex) sigmoidoscopy, which uses a flexible endoscope, or a rigid sigmoidoscopy, which uses a rigid device. A flexible sigmoidoscopy is generally the preferred procedure. A sigmoidoscopy is similar to, but not the same as, a colonoscopy. A sigmoidoscopy only examines up to the sigmoid, the most distal part of the colon, while the colonoscopy examines the whole large bowel. This procedure should be performed every 5 years.

A colonoscopy is the endoscopic examination of the large bowel and the distal part of the small bowel with a CCD camera or a fiber optic camera on a flexible tube passed through the anus. During a colonoscopy, polyps as small as one millimeter or less can be removed and studied (with the aid of a microscope) to determine if they are precancerous or not. This procedure (screening) should be performed every 10 years. It takes 15 years or fewer for a polyp to turn cancerous.

Prevention of colorectal cancer is the key, and includes the following:

- ⇒ Be physically active for at least 30 minutes, at least 5 days a week.
- ⇒ Do not smoke. If you do smoke, quit.
- ⇒ Eatfruits, vegetables and whole grains to help you get and stay healthy.
- ⇒ Eat less red meat and cut out processed meat



Remember if detected early, colorectal cancer can be easily and successfully treated!!

### Church School Lesson Overview - April 2014



April 6, 2014 Lesson Title: Jesus Cleanses the Temple

Lesson Scripture: Isaiah 56:6-8; Jeremiah 7:8-15: Mark 11:15-19

Print: Isaiah 56:6-7; Jeremiah 7:9-11; Mark 11:15-19

Devotional Songs: #345[], #272 [], and #243 []

Key Verse: "Has this house, which is called by my name, become a den of robbers in your sight?" (Jeremiah 7:11).

Application: Like the temple at Jerusalem, our churches and other places of worship should be dedicated for worshipping God. They should be sanctuaries wherein worshippers can expect to find shelter from the storms of life.

This lesson took place during the final week of Jesus' earthly life following His triumphant entry into Jerusalem and a roundabout trip to Bethany. Jesus came across and cursed a fig tree that showed various signs of fruitfulness, yet had no figs. Jesus' reaction to both the fig tree and the money changers in the temple provide strong warnings concerning the dangers of hypocrisy and deceptiveness.

Students are challenged to personally evaluate their reasons for going to church and their behavior while they are there. Physical presence in the building / facility is not equivalent to being engaged in worship.

April 13, 2014

Lesson Title: A Messianic Priest and King Lesson Scripture: Jeremiah 23:5-6; Zechariah 6:9-15; John 19:1-5; Hebrews 7:13

Print: Jeremiah 23:5-6; Zechariah 6:9-15; John 19:1-5

Devotional Songs: #92 []; #251[]; and #243 []

Key Verse: "They kept coming up to him, saying, 'Hail, King of the Jews!' and striking him on the face" (John 19:3).

Application: Believers must aspire to righteousness like that of the Branch that God raised from David's remnants.

This lesson gives a chance for students to discern seeds of eternal hope that are available to all, especially those who are oppressed and exploited because they identify with the suffering Savior. The title of this lesson refers to Jesus, the Messiah in whom God has combined the roles of priest and king to reign forever. The invitation to join Him as inhabitants of His kingdom is still open. There are deeper insights into the nature of the Priest King and His role in God's plans for salvation.

April 20, 2014

Lesson Title: The Third Day

Lesson Scripture: Hosea 6:1-3; Luk e 24;1-12

Tentative Devotional Songs: #156[]; #258 [];

Key Verse: "Remember how he told you...that the Son of man must be handed over to sinners and be crucified, and on the third day rise again" (Luke 24:6-7).

Application: Jesus' resurrection from the dead is the cornerstone of Christian faith. On it, the Church is built.

This lesson is about a subject that has different meanings for different people — deliverance — dependent upon personal experiences and histories. Without regard to personal meanings, a dominant theme among delivered people is the essential need to maintain hope and confidence that deliverance will come.

Hosea reminded Israel of God's power and his faithfulness. God loved them unconditionally, and his deliverance was readily available to them. All they had to do was confess their sins, repent and turn back to God, knowing that as in the past, God would forgive them. Sadly, they would not acknowledge the weight of their sins. They did not repent or return to God either; they remained unfaithful, interested only in any benefits they might derive from their relationship with God. The Israelites were soon taken into exile as a consequence.

We see love as we go to the empty tomb with the women in this lesson. Jesus was hastily placed in the tomb on Friday evening before the start of the Sabbath. The women had gone home to observe the Sabbath. Early on the first day of the week, the women came with spices and perfumes to anoint Jesus' body for proper burial. On their way to the tomb, the women wondered who would roll the heavy stone from

the entrance so they could enter. They were surprised to find the stone already rolled away and Jesus' body was not there. God sent messengers, who explained that Jesus had risen from the dead.

Lesson Title: From Suffering to Glory Lesson Scripture: Isaiah 52:13-53; 12; Luke 2425-27, 44-50 Print kajah 53:5-8: Luke 2425-27, 44, 47

Print: Isaiah 53:5-8; Luke 24:25-27, 44, 47 Tentative Devotional Songs: #21 []; 282; and #2:43 []

Key Verses: "Worthy is the Lamb that was slain to receive power, and riches, and wisdom, and strength, and honour, and glory, and blessing" (Revelation 5:12).

Application: Because we are imperfect and living in an imperfect world, suffering is bound to happen. Just as the disciples were disappointed when the suffering servant did not match their expectations for a victorious king, we are often disappointed when God does not reveal His plans or answer our prayers the way we expect.

We gain new and deeper understandings in this lesson as we learn how Jesus and the Scriptures fulfilled the disciple's needs:

The disciples had followed Jesus for three years and listened to Him teach, but they did not understand because they had envisioned Jesus' role and purpose from human perspectives of royalty and political power. The disciples had seen Jesus suffer, mistreated, and killed like a criminal. The disciples needed major shifts in their way of thinking in order to move forward and to understand Jesus' message, purpose, and ministry from heavenly perspectives.

This lesson proves a framework for overcoming adversity and finding hope in what may appear to be hopeless circumstances by creating and developing deeper understandings about Jesus; by seeking to know and understand relevant prophecies from Genesis to Revelation; by maintaining an ongoing relationship with Jesus; and by seeking to strengthen spiritual understandings through personal study and with the aid of godly teachers.



### Journey of Faith to Resurrection


Luke 24:12



Yet, there is one journey that brings our journey of faith to light Peter's run to the tomb. What makes Peter's run so powerful is that his run is juxtaposed to static posture of the other apostles. When the other apostles heard the story of the women (of how they saw that Jesus was no longer in the tomb), the "words seemed to them an idle tale, and they did not believe them" (Luke 24:11). Peter, on the other hand, gets up and runs to the tomb. He looks in the tomb and finds the linen clothes without the body of Jesus. He went home and was amazed by what happened (Luke 24:12). All those who did not believe — all those with no faith — stayed. Peter gets up and runs.

Faith will cause us to move when others are still. Faith will take us to places where we have lost hope in order to reclaim it. Faith grows not in what we see but in what we cannot see. Peter could not see the body of Jesus! His faith grew from what he could not see and from what he could not find. He was AMAZED!

Resurrection is an amazing moment. Amazement is born in impossibility. The miracles of God and the wonders of God's power are so far above our comprehension that their manifestation shakes our core. The resurrection of Jesus shook Peter to his core, and he was amazed. All that he thought he would never reach was within grasp. All that he thought had died now lived. All that he felt had slipped away was coming back. This is why he was amazed. What was impossible now became possible—resurrection!

Faith ultimately leads us to resurrection. Just as it led Peter to an empty tomb, faith will lead us to places and people that are empty of the disappointment, hopelessness, confusion, chaos, gossip, envy, pride, shame, regret, pain, drama, oppression, abuse, weakness, and sorrow. As the tomb is empty, Peter's heart is filled — with amazement.

My hope is that your journey of faith has brought you to empty tombs in your life — empty of bondage, waste, generational curses, selfishness, greed, low self-esteem, and addictions. While those tombs are emptied, I pray that your hearts are filled with liberty, purpose, dreams, blessings, generosity, love, companionship, self-worth, and joy. The purpose of our Holy Week Revival — with our guest preacher the Reverend Bankole Akinbinu — is to point to the empty tomb that our hearts may be filled with the presence of God, Certainly, you will read more about the revival in next month's issue. However, I have to say that we were AMAZED at the preaching of the Reverend Akinbinu. We were also blessed by the ministries of the Voices of Triumph, the Alabama A&M Gospel Choir, and Jamel Strong. We were also honored by the presence of Pastor Carlton Byrd (Oakwood SDA) and Pastor Gregory Bentley (Fellowship Presbyterian Church). Worship was rich, and people were blessed. The journey of faith will lead us home. In amazement, Peter went home. Faith leads us to places of nurture, cultivation, contemplation, empowerment, restoration, celebration, trust, warmth, sensitivity, and peace. As we celebrate the resurrection of the Savior, be sure to let your faith lead you home — to the presence of God.

### Pastor Clayborn Preaches at Mid-Winter Meeting









The Ninth Episcopal District of the AME Church, where Bishop James Levert Davis is the presiding prelate, held its Mid-winter Meeting at the Fairfield Convention Center in Fairfield, Alabama, March 20-22, 2014. The conference was a combination of Founder's Day and Mid-year convocation.

The first day of the conference consisted of break-out sessions and reports for the ministers and various components of the Ninth District. South Birmingham Huntsville Bessemer Presiding Elder, the Reverend Oliver O. Allen, Jr., delivered a powerful message on Thursday evening that was referenced throughout the remainder of the conference. There were other outstanding presentations and sermons during the conference.

The highlight for St. John was the Friday mid-day message, delivered by Pastor Patrick Clayborn. Over twenty members of St. John were present to offer support and prayers along with countless other members in Huntsville who were praying for their pastor.

Pastor Clayborn began with a soul-stirring solo, "Great is Thy Faithfulness," that set the tone for the message. The sermon was entitled "The Right Relationship," with texts from Genesis 4:3-7 and Luke 15:15-17a. He began by posing the question "What was wrong with Cain's relationship that caused his offering to be rejected?" He further stated that even if God accepts the offering, there is room for improvement.


He explained how the parable of the prodigal son helps one to see the line of demarcation. Although decisions are rejected, God is not rejecting the person, but their choices.

Pastor Clayborn continued with more parallels of the prodigal son and one's right relationship with God. Persons must come to that "moment" when they come to themselves, as the prodigal son did, and admit the relationship is broken. They must accept justice in order to receive forgiveness and mercy. They must take the step of faith as the prodigal son did when he got up and went to his father. The father saw him from afar and ran to meet him. Likewise, when persons take the step of faith, God will catch them with grace, peace, and hope.

The preacher concluded the message with the response that persons whose relationships have been made right, even though it was not deserved, should give. The parable of the lepers who were healed when Jesus told them to go show themselves to the priest and the one who returned to say "thank you" shows how to respond. The sermon was followed by much praise and apparently an indicator that those who heard the preached word had a right relationship with God and they gave Him thanks.

Other sermons and meditations during the Mid-Winter meeting include the Friday evening message by Bishop Samuel Green, of the 13<sup>th</sup> Episcopal District, and the closing meditation on Saturday by the Reverend Elijah Shofar, pastor of St. Paul, Troy.

Other business conducted included an update from the Daniel Payne Legacy Village Board of Trustees and an appeal for donations. The Pentecost Committee presented a video on the upcoming 2014 Pentecost Explosion.

Early on Saturday morning, March 15, 2014, Aunt Ada "flew away" to be with the Lord. St. John praises God for the wonderful 98 years that God allowed Mrs. Ada Harris Houston C'Aunt Ada") to live and serve in the Huntsville community, and faithfully serve at St. John for over 70 years. In her latter years, Mrs. Houston had no living biological relatives; however, she claimed the entire membership of St John as her family. The congregation

# What are the Responsibilities of Trustees?

Duties of Trustees (AME Discipline 2012, pg. 65)

- The Trustees shall manage all the temporal concerns of the church not otherwise provided for and shall have a treasurer elected by the Board.
- They shall guard for the Connection all real estate, churches, parsonages, schools and any other property obtained by the local church.
- They shall make improvements upon the property or real estate when authorized to do so by majority of the legal members of the church.
- They shall secure, by purchase or hire, a house for the pastor's family and also comfortably furnish it. In lieu of this arrangement, the pastor may be given a housing allowance.
- They shall pay the moving expense of the pastor and family from their previous assignment.

# First Church Visits on Fifth Sunday

On Sunday, March 30th, St. John was blessed with a guest choir at the 10 a.m. (combined) worship service. The Inspirational Choir of First Seventh-Day Adventist Church (First Church), directed by Mr. Cleveland Wilson, lived up to its name with melodious and moving selections throughout the service. They set the tone as congregants entered the church to the beautiful sounds of songs which facilitated contemplation and meditation. The quality as well as the selections chosen provided the quintessential experience in musical worship.

When combined with Pastor Clayborn's sermon entitled, "The Battle for Healing". from his "Journey of Faith" series, it was a most outstanding worship experience.

The scriptural reading was Matthew 15: 21-28 and Luke 18: 35-43 with emphasis on verse 22. from Matthew and verse 37 from Luke for the sermon, Pastor Clayborn emphasized "being a good steward over our health". Noting that one's body is the temple of the Holy Spirit, the emphasis was on physical, emotional, and spiritual health. Some ways of doing this were highlighted, including having reciprocal relationships (not all giving or receiving) which should be natural or a good fit, rather than forced. Maintaining a healthy spirit involves focusing on choices made inside and outside of the church setting (there should be consistency in behavior/choices). Serving others can be rewarding and even if tiring at times, Pastor Clayborn noted the difference between "good tired" and "bad tired". He indicated that "God gave us health...it is our duty to take care of it", understanding that one cannot avoid illness totally.

Dr. Clayborn referred to the reactions of the persons healed in the scriptural references and encouraged those listening to emulate them. In both instances the man and woman began shouting in response to healing. So, the first step is to "Break the Silence". He indicated the man and wom an were aware that healing was available and did not suffer in silence. Giving praise and thanks once the healing occurs, leads to the second suggestion, "Keep breaking the silence. That is, "keep believing, serving, going to therapy, getting treated, praying, praising". The third suggestion was "Get Closer to Jesus". In the text, the woman knelt before/worshipped Jesus. Pastor Clayborn emphasized that the relationship with Jesus is more important than whether or not healing occurs or prayers are answered ("yes"). That is, "when you don't get what you ask for, you get what you need ... the will of God in your life". It may not come in the way or the time that one asked or expected.

The worship in song, liturgical dance, and sermon were spiritually intermingled in a way that

could only inspire and offer hope for a relationship | with God, as well as connecting with those on earth in a way that will promote spiritual health as well as physical and emotional health for God's

temple.

It is hoped that "First Church" will visit St. John again. St. John is appreciative of having the directing talents of Mr. Wilson with St. John's Gospel Choir. The congregation responded to the visiting choir with such enthusiasm and appreciation as the name "Inspirational Choir" truly fit.

# Managing Your Blood Pressure



About 65 million American adults (nearly 1 in 3) have high blood pressure. Many people have high blood pressure, also called hypertension, for years without knowing. Most of the time, there are no symptoms, but when high blood pressure goes untreated, it damages arteries and vital organs throughout the body. Having no symptoms, high blood pressure is often called the "silentkiller."

High blood pressure develops over many years, and it eventually affects nearly everyone. Fortunately, high blood pressure can be easily detected. And once you know you have high blood pressure, you can work with your doctor to keep it under control.

There are two types of hypertension:

Primary (essential) hypertension. For most adults, there is no identifiable cause of high blood pressure. This type of hypertension tends to develop gradually over many years.

Secondary hypertension. Some people have high blood pressure caused by an underlying condition. This type of hypertension tends to appear suddenly and cause higher blood pressure than does primary hypertension.

Blood pressure is determined by the amount of blood your heart pumps and the amount of resistance to blood flow in your arteries. The more blood your heart pumps and the narrower your arteries, the higher your blood pressure.

The higher the pressure and the longer it goes uncontrolled, the greater the damage. Uncontrolled hypertension can lead to:

- Atherosclerosis or hardening and thickening of the arteries which can lead to heart attack or stroke
- Aneurysm, which is a weakening and bulging of blood vessels. If an aneurysm ruptures, it can be life threatening.
- Heart failure. In order to pump blood against the higher pressure in your vessels, your heart muscle thickens. Eventually the thickened muscle may have a hard time pumping enough blood to meet your body's need, which can lead to heart failure.
- Weakened and narrow blood vessels in your kidneys. This can prevent these organs from functioning normally.
- Thickened, narrowed or torn blood vessels in the eyes. This can result in vision loss.
- Metabolic syndrome. This syndrome is a cluster of disorders of your body's metabolism—including increased waist circumference, high triglycerides, low high-density lipoprotein (HDL), or "good," cholesterol, and high insulin levels. If you have hypertension, you're more likely to have other components of metabolic syndrome. The more components you have, the greater your risk of developing diabetes, heart disease or stroke.
- Trouble with memory or understanding. Uncontrolled hypertension may also affect
  your ability to think, remember and learn. Trouble with memory or understanding
  concepts is more common in people who have hypertension.



Blood pressure is typically recorded as two numbers, the top number (systolic) which is also the higher of the two numbers, measures the pressure in the arteries when the heart beats (when the heart muscle contracts). The bottom number (diastolic), which is also the lower of the two numbers, measure the pressure in the arteries between heart beats (when the heart muscle is resting between beats and refilling with blood).

The American Heart Association's recommendation for normal blood pressure is systolic less than 120 and diastolic less than 80.

May 4, 2014

Lesson Title: Victory over Temptation Lesson Scripture: Deuteronomy 6:13-16; 8:3;

Ps alm 91:11-12; Matthew 4:4-11 Print: Deuteronomy 6:13-16; Matthew 4:4

Key Verse: "It is written, Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God" (Matthew 4:4).

Application: To show that when we are tempted and tested, we need to follow Jesus' example and rely on God and the Bible.

In this text, Satan's envious spirit attacked all things made perfect by God. Several biblical examples to note that support this statement In Genesis, after creating man and God's declaration that all is "very good," Satan set up and successfully tempted Adam and Eve into sinning. Next, we encounter in the book of 2 Samuel, after God has described David as a man after God's own heart, again right away Satan goes after David by exposing David as a mere man with desires of the flesh. Satan's attack also came in the Book of Job where Job was described as a perfect and righteous man, Satan set out, through Job's wife, to tempt Job by indicating to Job that he should curse God and die during his period of tribulation. And finally, in this lesson, after God's declaration from heaven that Jesus is His "beloved" son and that He is most pleased, Satan set out to bring Jesus down to his level.

The reviewer's take away from this lesson is that Satan understands the power of Jesus (even in Jesus' weakened condition) and Satan wanted to see if he could do battle with Jesus (by tempting Jesus with nourishment, scripture, show of power and riches) to see if he (Satan) could get Jesus to pledge loyalty to Satan thereby breaking the redemptive bond between God and Son (mankind). The lesson indicates that Jesus was victorious and Satan departed.

May 11, 2014

Lesson Title: Jesus' Mission on Earth Lesson Scripture: Leviticus 25:8-55; Isaiah 61:1-2; Luke 4:14-21 Print Luke 4:14-21

Devotional Songs: #412(); #251(); and #243() Key Verse: "He began to say unto them, This day is this scripture fulfilled in your ears" (Luke 4:21).

Application: To show that since Jesus clearly identified His mission as Israel's Messiah, we are responsible for the way we respond to Him.

Upon reflecting on this lesson, one sees that Jesus went straight to the point of His mission on earth. Jesus knew and understood His role to spread the Good News, to proclaim freedom to the captives, to restore sight to the blind, to restore hearing to the death, to heal the sick to be a servant to mankind.

The reviewer is reminded of the scripture where Moses encountered God at the burning bush and Moses asked God who should he say sent him to the people of Israel. God responded that He should tell the people of Israel that "I am that I am" had sent Moses. The reviewer also reflects upon the name and is reminded that "I am that I am" interprets the name as meaning completeness. In mathematical logic (the law of equality), I am equals I am. Using math logic, this name would indicate that God is anything and everything that a person would need both spiritually and physically. Therefore, Jesus identifying His mission on earth only makes manifest of God's words by putting then into action through a human form, Jesus, indicating that the scriptures have been fulfilled.

The question of observing the Law or doing God's work has always been a controversial topic between the Jews versus Jews and/or Jews versus Gentiles during the New Testament biblical era. Today's lesson sites an example where Jesus was being examined by Jewish's clergy over the washing of hands before eating. Jesus turned the table and asked the Jewish clergy why they were allowed to break the commandments in order to keep tradition.

Jesus furthered the discussion by indicating that Jewish scripture also implies that observing tradition makes one a hypocrite meaning that the ones following tradition are only giving lip service to the Lord. He continued teaching to the crowd and His disciples that the mere act of not washing before eating does not defile the body. It is more what is fermenting in the heart and comes out with the tongue that defiles. He gave noteworthy human traits of murder, adultery, fornication, theft, and false witnessing as some typical examples.



If your blood pressure is higher than normal, your doctor may take several readings over time and/or have you monitor your blood pressure at home before beginning a treatment program, such as lifestyle changes and prescription medication. Lifestyle changes may include:

- Eating healthy foods
- Decreasing the salt intake in your diet
- Maintaining a healthy weight
- Increasing physical activity
- Limiting alcohol
- Quit smoking
- Managing stress

High blood pressure is not a problem that you can treat and then ignore. It is a condition you need to manage for the rest of your life.

Even if your blood pressure is normal, you should consider making lifestyle modifications to "prevent" the development of high blood pressure and improve your health!



## Pastor's Message

#### The Mothering Spirit

John 19:25-27

I realize that very few people will have an issue with this previous statement. On Mother's Day, we see the evidence. Churches are filled to capacity with families honoring their mothers. Restaurants are packed with people taking their mothers out to eat. Parks, malls, movie theatres, and other public venues are filled with numerous persons celebrating the mothers in their lives.

Yet, this day is traumatic for so many. A number of women want to be biological mothers, but they face great difficulties. Some have tried and have had no success. They have either lacked a husband with whom they could build a family, endured miscarriages, experienced failed attempts with medical help, or had no results after all of their efforts. Other women have been told by doctors that — either from their birth or after certain life circumstances — they are unable to do so. There are some women who have at least one child, with a desire for one more; but, they, too, have one or more of the above difficulties. Some mothers have deceased children; and some have children who are suffering from illness, poor decisions, or life. There are those whose mothers are sick and close to death. Other persons miss their deceased mothers to such an extreme that Mother's Day becomes a day of depression and loneliness. There are certain persons who never knew their mothers. They were given up for adoption; they were abandoned; or their mothers died while they were very young. Still, there are others who had negative relationships with their mothers, and they are permanently separated from their mothers — either by death or by the choice to never be in relationship.

At the cross of Jesus, a similar trauma takes place. Mary is losing her son Jesus. In Mary's mind, Jesus was supposed to bury her instead of His death unfolding before her. Jesus sees Mary and sets up a surrogate mother-son relationship between her and John. Jesus shows us that mother-hood is not ultimately dependent upon biology. Motherhood is defined by a mothering spirit! Jesus was saying that His death could not stop Mary from being a mother. His death could not kill the mothering spirit within her. This means that no life circumstance can stop the call of God on our lives. Motherhood is a calling, and if God has placed that calling on our lives, then no power on earth can stop that calling from reaching its fulfillment in us.

The mothering spirit is not bound by biology, money, status, background, connections, or the values and decisions of others. The mothering spirit is based in God's will. Jesus said his mother

was one who does the will of God (Matthew 12:50). Therefore, a woman does not have to physically give birth to a child to be a mother! Attending to the mothering spirit within will help many of us to come out of hurtful places.

#### Woman behold your child...

For those who have never had children, the mothering spirit will lead some of them to adopt a child or children. The mothering spirit will guide others to take care (or assist in care) of someone else's child. Still, a number of them will find the mothering spirit birthing another life form into their lives for care and nurture: a pet, a plant, a business, a friendship, a dream, or a ministry.

#### Woman behold your child...

For those mothers who have lost children or cannot have more children, the mothering spirit will call them into nurturing relationships with other people. For those mothers with suffering children, the mothering spirit will give them the endurance to continue standing with those children.

#### Child behold your mother....

For those persons who never knew their mothers, the mothering spirit will draw them to one with a heart to care for them. For those persons who desperately miss their deceased mothers, the mothering spirit will help them find ways to honor their mothers' memories and will bring persons in their lives to provide healing for their souls.

#### Child behold your mother....

For those persons with adverse relationships with their mothers, the mothering spirit will lead them back to their mothers if the relationship can be mended. In cases where the relationship is irreparable, the mothering spirit will show those persons how to grieve, let go of the pain, and move forward in their lives. The mothering spirit will establish within them that what they experienced was not true motherhood and that real motherhood is grounded in the love of God. The mothering spirit will cause them to be open in time to one with a heart to give them motherly support and adoration.

If any of you are going through a stressful Mother's Day, I pray that the mothering spirit will cover you in whatever area you need. I pray for healing of your heart, deliverance of your spirit, peace in your mind, joy in your path, love in your relationships, and wisdom in your decisions. I pray that your grief be short-lived and that you rebound in a divine way. I pray that your life be filled and guided by the presence of the mothering spirit.

How can this kind of prayer be effective? What is this mothering spirit?

The mothering spirit is the voice of God that calls, leads, and binds mother to child.

#### Woman, behold your child. Child, behold your mother. Have a blessed Mother's Day!



### St. John A.M.E. Church 129th Anniversary Reflection

Editor's Note: This article is a reprint of the anniversary reflection that was written by Darrell Ezell, Ph.D. for the 129th church anniversary celebration on Sunday, April 13, 2014.

O'Give thanks to the Lord, for He is good; his mercy endures forever!

Religion and higher-education are two narratives that are inextricably linked in the African American community. Our beloved St. John African Methodist Episcopal Church was established in 1885 with the aid of Alabama A&M University founder, Dr. William Hooper Councill. Long before W.E.B. DuBois published the Souls of Black Foks? or Booker T. Washington challenged African Americans to "cast down their buckets," the American statesman, Fredrick Douglas lifted Dr. Councill in complement as "a beacon of hope to the people in the South." "This great orator, William Hooper Council, a slave child brought to North Alabama from North Carolina through the slave trade, began educating the Negro in the South a few years after the American Civil War."

Councill, a self-made man, with only the bare educational necessitates, taught himself to read and write the classical languages: Latin, Greek, and Hebrew. To become an ordained elder in the AME Church, he taught himself theology which enabled him to pass the required examination. In addition, he taught himself law and passed the Alabama Bar exam on his first attempt." Out of a great calling to educate our community, Alabama A&M University was first erected in downtown Huntsville, Alabama in 1875. Compelled to build a house of worship, the first church services for St. John AME Church were held in a barbershop on the corner of Miller and West Holmes Street.

In 1900, the first church building was erected on Church Street, adjacent to the old church site, which stood until 1971. Twenty years after the completion of the building, the mortgage on the church was burned in 1920 under the leadership of Reverend Patterson. In addition to Dr. Council and Reverend Patterson, we give thanks for the legacy of all ministers who have served St. John AME Church: Reverends: Shelton, Goodlow, Williams, Todd, Brooks, Newell, Evans, Hill, Brice, Douglas, Cook, Thompson, Scott, Oliver, Woods, Lamar, White, Hughes, Howard, Stone, Dennis, Fox, Hereford, McCall, and our present pastor, Dr. Patrick Dewitt Clayborn.

The stone that the builder refused; shall be the chief comerstone!

One hundred twenty-nine (129) years later, we stand at 229 Church Street Being founded by freed slaves, there is plenty of work to do. It is therefore essential that we embrace a theology of liberation to tack le the issues that confront our people today. In honoring the legacy of St. John AME Church, we shall not ignore the powerless of the black community and the role our dear St. John must play in shaping the advancement of those lives.

The affirmation of greatness in this church comes from the whole experience of being free and (Continual or page 12)

### Maundy Thursday and Good Friday Observed

### Maundy Thursday Service at St. John



The spirit of Holy Week Revival continued on Maundy Thursday as worshippers gathered at the church to commemorate the last supper Jesus ate with His disciples on the evening before the crucifixion. The name comes from the Latin term, mandaturn meaning "Command." The command, as originally given, was for the followers to continue to remember by washing feet as a sign of humility. The meal and/or the washing of feet are used as an act of remembrance. Maundy Thursday is observed during Holy Week on the Thursday before Easter. It is usually a solemn occasion, marked by the shadow of Jesus' betrayal.

The St. John Maundy Thursday service continued the revival theme of Praise, Prayer and Worship. The Invocation was offered by the Reverend Meriam Garrett and scripture was read by the Reverend Sheri Smith Clayborn from Luke 22:14-20 and John 13:1-17, 31-35. Praise and Worship was led by an ensemble consisting of Reginald Pearson, Janette Smith, Shay York, and Christina Sanders. They ministered in songs of worship that included "You've Been So Faithful," "I've Been Changed," and "Don't Give Up on God."

Worshippers gathered in groups of two to offer prayers for the concerns of one another. This prayer time was followed by communion. During the Passover meal, Luke 22:19-20 records that Jesus took bread and wine, blessed it, broke the bread in pieces, gave it to His disciples. Afterwards He shared the cup of wine. Likewise, the Maundy Thursday service included a special communion service. Each person was served individually by the pastor. As each individual came to the altar, they were given a piece of home-baked unleavened bread which they dipped in the chalice and then ate. This was indeed a sacred moment of worship and remembrance.

The Benediction was offered and members left to continue in Holy Week worship of Good Friday and Resurrection Sunday.

### Good Friday Services at Saint Philip

Good Friday, the Friday before Resurrection Sunday, is the commemoration of the Lord's suffering and death on Calvary's cross. Many Christians observe this day with a special worship service that include seven (7) sermons on the seven (7) last sayings of Jesus Christ on the cross. Traditionally, the service is held from noon until three o'clock in the afternoon, the time of Jesus' crucifixion.



This year a group of St. John members journeyed to Saint Philip AME Church in Atlanta, Georgia to worship with them in their "Seven Last Words" service and to support Pastor Clayborn as he preached during this service for the third consecutive year. Many who were not able to be present physically, watched the live streaming of the service. Dr. William D. Watley is the pastor of Saint Philip.

Pastor Clayborn preached the first word, "Father forgive them; for they know not what they do." The text was Luke 23:32-37, 44-45. His message was entitled "Facing the Darkness." He noted that Jesus was able to face the darkness with a simple profound statement "Father forgive them." Pastor Clayborn used Jesus' example of facing darkness to provide points on how believers can face darkness with the same grace that Jesus did. Pray, like the prayer Jesus prayed in the garden. Be radical as Jesus' prayer for forgiveness "calls for justice with compassion." Be persistent. Jesus spoke in the imperfect tense meaning He kept saying "Father forgive them." Pastor Clayborn brought this message with all the fervor and passion that he does each Sunday morning. What a way to start a series of sermons!

### Reverend Akinbinu Returns to Inspire St. John for Holy Week Revival

The Reverend Bankole Akinbinu, pastor of Baptist Grove Church in Raleigh, North Carolina, returned this year as the evangelist for Holy Week Revival. The dates were Monday, April 14" through Wednesday, April 16th. The Reverend Sheri Smith Clayborn led the order of worship. Guests provided music that augmented the blessing of messages by the Reverend Akinbinu. Monday featured the Voices of Triumph of Oakwood University, Tuesday featured Alabama A & M University Gospel Choir, and on Wednesday Jamel Strong and Message gave musical selections, The revival scripture read each night was Habakkuk 2:1-4. On Monday and Wednesday nights the St. John Dance Ministry spiritually enhanced the service. Pastor Clayborn introduced the evangelist each night

Reverend Ak inbinu rose to the occasion of interpreting scripture and reviving those privileged to be present each night. On Monday night Reverend Akinbinu preached on the topic "Prayed Up or Stressed Out' from the text Philippians 4:6-7. He began by asking attendees to assess their stress levels upon entering the sanctuary that evening and noted that stress causes more stress and is a "silent killer" that can lead to medical conditions and listed various sources of stress. In quoting Paul ("Do not worry about anything"), he indicated this could cause Paul to be labeled "naïve." The key to not worrying according to Reverend Akinbinu is to realize that the problems are real but one's God is real. Worry suggests that all options have been exhausted, but with a "real God" and the use of prayer "in the middle of worry" there is hope. It is important to know to whom one is praying and to always remember to 'pray about it." Secondly, supplication comes from the recognition that there is a lack or need and one should pray to God so that that void may be filled. The next important issue is to request, that is, "come to God and say 'please'...throw yourself on the altar and say 'please." He highlighted the manner in which one prays is key; that is "supplication and thanksgiving." He cautioned against letting "your need cause you to forget the many blessings God has already given" and gave a litary of reasons to be thankful which elicited praise and worship amongst those listening that night. Reverend Akinbinu stated that in the midst of difficulty/stress, it is important to note that, "God set up an army around my heart and mind to do battle around me" and to remember that "God gives us peace and has peace that blocks attacks waged against you", even if one is at one's lowest ebb and must "cry out" to God.

On Tuesday, Reverend Akinbinu preached on the topic "Remember the Stones" from Joshua 4: 1-9; 19-24. This significant scripture on the importance of remembering milestones/history was addressed in an outstanding way. He reflected on Moses "wistfully" looking upon the promise but not allowed to step foot in Canaan. Yet, Moses dutifully mentored Joshua as God directed, noting that as long as they remained faithful God would continue to bless them. The challenge was to not have "amnesia" and to "remember God when you come into better days/the Promised Land." The Reverend Akinbinu noted the "first command was that the priests were to carry the Ark of the Covenant... the presence of God going before them would allow them to cross over to dry land." Joshua also "had twelve stones carried from the midst of the dry ground of the Jordan River through the power of God." The second command was to carry the twelve stones in order to have a "perpetual connection to their faith:" They were encouraged to "never forget" this mile-

stone, "you are what you are by the Grace of God." He noted that believers have their own stones given to them by God and shared historic deliverance such as slavery ending, the civil rights movement, and many others. This dynamic preacher emphasized the significance of remembering knowing that "if the Lord has done it before...my God will make a way somehow!!!" He indicated the stones "provide a generational bridge between the young and the old." In the text, the stones were to be a point of connection "when your children ask..." Modern examples given by Reverend Akinbinu included "educate your children about what it means to be Black" and dispelled a litary of stereotypes and cited African American historical icons upon which to model for a wide range of professions /vocations. He emphatically added, "BUT BE SURE TO

TELL THEMWHAT IT MEANS TO BE A CHRISTIAN."

The final night's focus was "Prayer Push Ups" from the text Colossians 4: 12. The Reverend Akinbinu began by citing the example of "pushing the limits of endurance" and the benefit of a health and fitness regimen. He noted in the text that this man had assistance/"spotters" standing by to lift the weight off if he could not." The preacher added that "Christian growth/development also does not come without strain. There are no shortcuts to serving the Lord." One must carry a cross even if it seems too heavy to bear... "spiritual strain... the weight of trials and temptation." He indicated "there will be times in your life when you feel like giving up, the weight seems too heavy. God gives other believers to assist, "spot for us," and in turn believers are to reciprocate and "spot for others." He indicated "you cannot grow in faith if you isolate... you need other people to be what God wants you to be."

It was noted that in the text, despite being in prison, Paul was using his time struggling for the Colossians via prayer, and that intercessory prayer is the way that believers "push and are pushed up." The Reverend Akinbinu indicated "we should not be selfish in bringing just your own concerns to Him in prayer." He indicated that it is "not natural to pray for others when you are in the midst of your own issues" and referred to the example in the text of praying for others while behind prison walls. He described how Jesus prayed for others before himself and noted that one day "we will be like Jesus." According to the Reverend Akinbinu, "God wants you to pray targeted/specific prayers with your strategic knowledge." He indicated that "one day all tears shall be wiped from our eyes" and he used the metaphor of a building under construction which initially "doesn't look like the picture," but that means "God isn't through with the person yet. We must be patient with each other." He encouraged perseverance in terms of "keep pushing when it seems like your prayers are not being answered...seem like they are rejected. He stated that "PRAYER STILL WORKS."

The Benediction for the revival was given on Wednesday night. The Reverend Akinbinu gave an outstanding revival and it was well received when Pastor Clayborn announced the evangelist for revival next year: the Reverend Akinbinu. St. John was blessed with, as Pastor Clayborn indicated the first night, a much needed revival.



### New Alabama Voter ID Law to be Enforced

The new requirement for voters in Alabama is to have a photo ID in order to vote. Acceptable forms of photo identification are Alabama Driver License; US Passport; employment ID card issued by city, county, state or US government; student or employment ID issued by a college in Alabama; tribal ID with photo; Alabama photo voter card; US military ID; or ID card issued by a branch, department, agency or entity of the State of Alabama, another state or the United States.

This new law will be enforced beginning with the June primary elections. This will affect people who DO NOT have an accepted form of photo identification. Free acceptable photo identification cards may be obtained from the Alabama Department of Senior Services, at the County Board of Registrar's Office, or any Department of Public Safety location. To receive the card, you must present a correct Voter Registration card and proof of date of birth.

We thank God for the courage to rise up and

We must wak through prisons and offer a balm to the sin sick soul. We must pour back into our communities markets, schools, and resources that will sustain our children.

This means it is time we stand on a stone of hope, producing greatness in the midst of despair. With the legacies of Richard Allen and Dr. William Hooper Councill, we must educate, refine, and build anew that which is broken.


### Remembering Mr. Russell

## Nip Seasonal Allergies in the Bud

Spring means flower buds and blooming trees—and if you're one of the millions of people who have seasonal allergies, it also means sneezing, congestion, runny nose, itchy eyes and other bothersome symptoms are in overdrive and are apt to stay that way for months. Seasonal allergies, also called hay fever and allergic rhinitis, can make you miserable. But before you settle for plastic flowers and artificial turf, try these simple strategies to keep seasonal allergies under control.

Reduce your exposure to allergy triggers

- Stay indoors on dry windy days---the best time to go outside is after a good rain, which helps clear the pollen from the air.
- Delegate lawn mowing, weed pulling and other gardening chores that stir up allergens.
- Remove clothes you've worn outside; you may also want to shower to rinse pollen from your skin and hair.
- . Don't hang clothes outside; pollen can stick to sheets and towels.
- We ar a dust mask if you do outside chores.

Take extra steps when the pollen counts are high

- Check your local TV or radio station, your local newspaper, or the internet for pollen forecasts and current pollen levels.
- If high pollen counts are forecasted, start taking allergy medication before your symptoms start.
- Close doors and windows at night or any other time when pollen counts are high.
- Avoid outdoor activity in the early morning when pollen counts are highest.

#### Keep indoor air dean

- Use the air conditioning in your car.
- If you have forced air heating or air conditioning in your house, use high-efficiency filters and follow regular maintenance schedules.
- Keep indoor air dry with a dehumidifier.
- Use a portable high-efficiency particulate air (HEPA) filter in your bedroom.
- Clean floors often with a vacuum cleaner that has a HEPA filter.

For many people, avoiding allergens and taking over-the-counter medications, such as an antihistamine to help relieve sneezing, itching and a runny nose; or a decongestant to reduce stuffiness by shrinking swollen membranes in the nose, is all that is needed to ease symptoms.

If your seasonal allergies are bad enough, your doctor may recommend that you have skin or blood tests to find out exactly what allergens trigger your symptoms. Testing can help determine steps you need to take to avoid your specific triggers and identify which treatments are likely to work for you.

For some people, allergy shots (allergen immunotherapy) can be a good option. Also known as desensitization, this treatment involves regular injections containing tiny amounts of the substances that cause your allergies. Over time, these injections reduce the immune system reaction that causes symptoms.

### Church School Lesson Overview - June 2014

This month's reviews were written by Willie J. Sandifer.

June 1, 2014

Lesson Title: Obey the Lord

Lesson Scripture: Luke 19:41-48, Haggai

1:1-11

Print: Haggai 1:1-11

Devotional Songs: #377[], #272 [], and #243 Key Verse: "Then the word of the Lord came through the prophet Haggai; 'Is it a time for you yourselves to be living in your paneled houses, while this house remains a ruin?" (Haggai 1:3, 4).

Application: To so order our lives and establish our habits of thought that we would not

even consider disobeying the Lord.

In this lesson we note the link between obedience to God and material prosperity that was a vital part of the covenant relationship that existed between God and Old Testament Israel. The prophets Haggai and Zechariah appeared on the scene in the midst of the people's complacency (Ezra 5:1). These men were raised up by the Lord to shake the people out of their lethargy, to stir them to act in order to finish rebuilding the temple. Haggai played a major role in conveying God's message to a people who had become indifferent to his work.

Haggai confronts the people by drawing attention to their actions. They seem to have plenty of time to build their paneled houses. They have invested much time and expense to make sure their homes look their best. It is clear that the people's houses are finished while the Lord's house, the temple, is not.

June 8, 2014

Lesson Title: Trust God's Promises Lesson Scripture: Haggai 1:12; 2:1-9

Print: Haggai 1:12-2:9

Devotional Songs: #424[]; #251[]; and #243[] Key Verse: "The glory of this latter house shall be greater than of the former, saith the Lord of hosts: and in this place will I give peace, saith the Lord of hosts" (Haggai 2:9).

Application: To set our hearts on living by

this principle daily.

In this lesson we see the results of the obedience of the people to God's clear directives.

This lesson features Haggai continuing his encouragement to the people, but with a different focus—a focus to think in terms of an ex-

treme makeover. It begins where last week's ended, at Haggai 1:12, and the year is still 520 BC. The book of Haggai is set in the period of Persian dominance, which began with the rise of Cyrus in 539 BC. Persian expansion to the west was eventually halted by defeats at the battles of Marathon (490 BC) and Salamis (479 BC). These battles occurred within the time gap between the last verse of Ezra 6 and the first verse of Ezra 7.

An important lesson can be learned from the message that Haggai had for his people: One should live in the present by looking to the future, not to the past. Haggai the prophet now foretold what God would don in the future to encourage His people to live in the present.

June 15, 2014

Lesson Title: Live Pure Lives Lesson Scripture: 1 Peter 1:13-29

Print Haggai 2:10-19

Tentative Devotional Songs: #358[]; #258 [];

and #243 []

Key Verse: "Is there yet any seed left in the barn? Until now, the vine and the fig tree, the pomegranate and the olive tree have not borne fruit" (Haggai 2:19).

Application: To walk daily with the mind-set of delighting in thank ful obedience to God.

In this lesson we continue our study of Haggar's challenge to God's people to complete the rebuilding of the temple. Following a plan is essential in rebuilding a temple (or any structure for that matter). But God's people also needed to embrace his plan for rebuilding their lives and shaping them according to his master design. Leaving captivity in Babylon to return to the Promised Land was an important step; leaving spiritual captivity to return to God was another.

The laws concerning the transmission of purity and impurity, which are part of Hagga's message, were for the benefit of God's people. These laws were meant to emphasize that impurity or defilement is much easier to transmit than purity or holiness. The principle is that one maintains purity by separation; defilement results from exposure to that which is defiled.

Impurity seems to flourish in so many areas of life today. One of the great ironies of modern society is that people can become so passion-

ate about keeping water, air, and food free from contamination, yet exhibit an alarming apathy regarding moral and spiritual purity. God has always been concerned that his people—whether in Old or New Testament times—live pure lives.

June 22, 2014

Lesson Title: Hope for a New Day

Lesson Scripture: Nehemiah 7:1-7; Haggai

2:20-23; Zechariah 4

Print: Haggai 2:23; Zechariah 4:1-3, 6-14 Tentative Devotional Songs: #484 ∏; 77; and

#243 []

Key Verses: So he said to me, "This is the word of the Loro to Zerubbabel: 'Not by might nor by power, but by my Spirit,' says the Loro Almighty" (Zechariah 4:6).

Application: To make it our practice to respond quickly and willingly to the Lord and the

words that He sends us.

This lesson is the last in this unit of studies that focuses on the rebuilding of the temple in the post-exilic period of Old Testament history. Most of the lesson text comes from the book of Zechariah, who was a contemporary of Haggai. Like Haggai, Zechariah encouraged God's people to faithfulness in completing the rebuilding of the temple project that had been on hold for some 16 years. The day of victory and achievement would come only by means of a day-by-day devotion to carrying out God's plan.

It is clear that this second temple will not possess the grandeur of Solomon's renowned temple. But those engaged in the important task of rebuilding do possess the most important "building material" of all: the power of the Spirit of God. This will more than compensate for whatever material resources or manpower thepeople seem to lack as they rebuild.

Once the obstacles represented by the mountain are leveled, Zerubbabel is then pictured as bringing out the capstone. This is the topmost stone, the last stone to be set in place. When this is done, the building is finished! This step will be accompanied by a shout of triumph: God bless it! God bless it!

Application: To see ourselves as one with all people who own Christ as Saviour and Lord


Paul's second missionary journey began as a trip to visit the congregations he had planted on his first journey. After doing so, the restless Paul desired to move on to new territory with the message of the gospel. God influenced Paul's itinerary through a vision that directed him to cross the Aegean Sea to the region known as Macedonia. He eventually arrived in Corinth in about AD 52, where he remained for some 18 months. Corinth was a busy and wealthy center of trade in Paul's day, a cosmopolitan city with residents from many regions. It was a place of lax morals and influential pagan religions.

Paul desires unity in the Corinthian church in what the people say and do. Unity in the church is desirable both for the peace of the congregation and the effectiveness of its message to unbelievers. This is God's ideal.

While the exact causes of the divisions among the Corinthians are unknown to us, our lesson gives us the names of four individuals who were used as rallying cries: Paul, Apollos, Cephas, and Christ Using a little imagination, let's consider what these factions within the Corinthian church might have looked like and see if they match with any groups in our own experience.

Those who claimed to follow Paul might have been the original converts of the apostle, the charter members. Perhaps they wanted a church frozen in time, unchanged from the day Paul left. Because of their tenure, this group had great influence, so their resistance to change dominated.

Those said to follow Apollos perhaps were converts who came into the church after Paul left and Apollos arrived. The background of Apollos was Alexandria, so he did things differently from Paul, who was from Tarsus. Apollos had a different preaching style.



This month, we salute dads everywhere. For dads — and "other-dads" who step in — giving love, prayer, wisdom, guidance, correction, focus, opportunity, support, care, protection, provision, time, attention, and affection to their children — St. John praises God for all that you do! Dads, granddads, great-granddads, play dads, uncles, brothers, male cousins, male caretakers, mister from across the street who was kind and protective, and that male presence who came in just when we needed him most — take a bow! We honor yours acrifices and labor of love for your kids. All of your children — in addition to your spouses (for those married fathers), family, and friends say "THANK YOU FOR BEING DEDICATED DADS!"





### St. John Observes Memorial Day at Church and in the Community

On May 25, the Sunday before Memorial Day 2014, a special Memorial Day commemorative presentation was made during each of the morning services. Wallace Parham portrayed Crispus Attucks, an African American who was the first casualty of the Boston Massacre, in Boston, Massachusetts, and is widely considered to be the first American casualty in the American Revolutionary War. Ms. Marjorie Reed, a veteran, presented information on the history and importance of observing Memorial Day. The information presented was adopted from a presentation made by Col. (Ret.) James O. Heyward and is printed below.

Originally called Flag Day, MEMORIAL DAY is a time of remembrance of those who have died in our Nation's Service. It started in the south, which is a claim that has been challenged by many who insist that the observance was initiated in their respective communities. Since 1866 communities all over the country have celebrated this day. But it was President Lyndon Johnson, who in 1966 officially declared Waterloo, NY as the birthplace of Memorial Day.

Regardless of where it started, the fact is, the nation tapped into the human need to honor the war dead. There are many ways Memorial Day has been observed in the past and some continue today. Many closed businesses, had parades and/or public programs, which most do not do anymore.

The traditional observance of MEMORIAL DAY has diminished over the years. However, there are many towns, cities, and individuals that have not forgotten the meaning and reason for Memorial Day. ... JUST THINK OF THE SACRIFICES MANY OF OUR MEN AND WOMEN HAVE MADE TO KEEP OUR NATION FREE AND FOR US TO ENJOY THE FREEDOMS WE HAVE. Many PAID the ultimates acrifice: They wrote a check to this Nation with the amount left blank. Many filled that blank with their lives. When one thinks of the upheaval around the world or the nations with unstable governments, we can appreciate this great nation of ours. It began in 1770 in Boston, MA with Crispus Attucks, who is said to HAVE BEEN the first person to lose his life at the hands of British Soldiers in the American Revolutionary War. Incidentally, he was a man of color and has joined our worship service today "in spirit" through the characterization portrayed by Wallace Parham.

A few years ago, at Huntsville's Glenwood Cemetery, a marker was placed at the grave site for PVT John Reed Porter, who served in the First Alabama Cavalry during the Civil

PENTECOST EXPLOSION, 2014

Excitement rang throughout the Ninth, months in advance until its culmination as plans from the Episcopal Office to every church began in preparation of the jubilant Pentecost Explosion 2014. Focus prayers and fasting were infused into every leader and member of the District. Servant Bishop and Mother Arelis of the AMEC; Bishop Dennis V Proctor, Presiding Prelate of Alabama/ Florida District of the AMEZC and Bishop Teresa E. Snorton, Presiding Prelate of the 5th Episcopal District of the CMEC, joined to form a team to bring a new thing to their congregants and this celebration.

What is Pentecost? According to the book of Acts, the church came into being on the day of Pentecost. As 120 worshippers, including the Disciples, were fasting and praying in an upper room in Jerusalem, the Holy Spirit descended on them in a violent rushing wind that was heard throughout the city. Small flames like fires rested upon their heads and they began to speak in other languages. As crowds came to investigate the commotion, the Apostle Peter spoke to them about Jesus and exhorted them to repent. From the crowd of Jews and converts, 3,000 realized the truth of his words and become followers of Jesus.

The dynamic Pentecost Explosion was held with these three collaborating sister dominations on the beautiful campus of Alabama State University-Hornet Stadium, Montgomery, Alabama, June 8, 2014. This year's theme was "Over Flow — Catch the Fire." The mix of red (AMEs and CMEs wore read) and gold (AMEZs wore gold) made a beautiful representation of the fire. As thousands of attendees began to enter to worship, the choir, orchestra and band along with 200 praise dancers rendered Pre-Praise Worship. Video recorded greetings filled the stadium as the growing crowd turned their attention to the huge screen to receive welcomes from the Montgomery mayor and bishops of the three denominations. The stage was completely set to then receive the Holy Ghost filled guest preacher, Bishop Paul S. Morton, His chosen text was Philippians 3:1 and the sermon topic was "Power of The Resurrection." Bishop Morton stated that Paul wanted to know clearly what this Power of the Resurrected Christ was. Honoring God Honors Us: If we keep God's commandments and honor the Lord's holy places, then we do honor to ourselves as well.

Cleanliness is Next to Godliness: Be certain to keep the church clean as a way to honor God. After church classes or church meals, make certain that all chairs and tables are where they should be and throw away all paper in trash bins. Clean up after yourself in the bathroom and cooperate with any other rules of the church sanitation staff.

No Food, Beverages or Chewing Gum in the Sanctuary. This is another way of respecting the sanctity of God's house. Use of these items is too casual in church and runs the risk of ruining church property and wasting tithes made to God on repairs that would not otherwise be necessary. While the chewing gum rule is sometimes broken, its use should be kept to a minimum, and it should always be disposed of property (not under pews, in Bibles or on other church property). Pleases do not allow children to chew gum in the sanctuary.

Treatment of Church Bibles and Hymnals: Bibles and Hymnals that are placed in pews are to be treated with care and respect. They should not be written on or used to dispose of gum. They are the property of the church and should not be taken home. Let the church leadership know if Bibles and Hymnals are in need of repair.

Keep the Outside of the Church Building Neat and Clean: The outside of the church reflects the inside of the church. Help make certain that trash is picked up and that nothing unsightly mars the look of God's house.

Suggestions and concerns are welcomed. Make your recommendations to the Trustee Board for any physical church furnishings or equipment items that need repair, are not working or has out lived its designed purpose. Report these directly to any member of the Trustee Board or you can acquire a "Property Maintenance Notification" form from the church office.

## Sickle Cell Anemia By Rosemary Wells



World Sickle Cell Day is celebrated on June 19"; it is recognized globally and was created by the United Nations by resolution. This day is set aside to raise awareness of the disease in the world. In the United States, Sickle Cell Disease Awareness Month is in September; it is not recognized in every state or globally. It is created by State representatives voting to recognize it in their individual state. World Sickle Cell Day and Sickle Cell Disease Awareness Month are NOT the same.

Normally, a person inherits two genes that tell the body to produce normal hemoglobin A. One gene comes from each parent. Children with sickle cell disease have two defective hemoglobin S genes, one from each parent. People who inherit one defective hemoglobin S gene and one normal hemoglobin A gene have sickle cell trait. These people don't have symptoms of sickle cell disease, and their bodies don't make sickled blood cells. But they have a 1-out-of-2 (50%) chance of passing the defective hemoglobin S gene to each of their children.

If both parents have sick le cell trait, each of their children will have a 1-out-of-4 (25%) chance of having sick le cell disease. If one parent has sick le cell disease (has two genes for making hemoglobin S) and the other has sick le cell trait (has one hemoglobin S gene and one normal hemoglobin A gene), each of their children will have a 1-out-of-2 (50%) chance of having sick le cell disease and a 1-out-of-2 (50%) chance of having sick le cell trait. If one parent has sick le cell disease (two hemoglobin S genes) and the other has two hemoglobin A genes, each of their children will have sick le cell disease.

AN ESTIMATED 100,000 PEOPLE LIVE WITH SICKLE CELL DISEASE IN THE U.S. AND MILLIONS AFFECTED GLOBALLY.



People whose ancestors were from Africa, India, the Middle East, the Mediterranean (Turkey, Italy, Greece), and some Latin American countries are more likely to inherit the gene that can cause sickle cell disease. In the United States, about 2,000 children are born each year with sickle cell disease.

Normal red blood cells have a 120-day life span. But people born with sickle cell disease have sickle-shaped blood cells that usually live no more than 20 days. These sickle cells

can get stuck in blood vessels, blocking vessels, and blocking blood flow. Painful events (sickle cell crisis) in the hands or feet, stomach, back or chest are the most common symptoms of sickle cell disease. This pain can last from hours to days, and can occur rarely to often.

People with sickle cell disease often have anemia, caused by a shortage of red blood cells. Anemia makes one feel weak and tired. People with sickle cell anemia may look pale or washed out. Their skin and the whites of their eyes may have a yellowish look (jaundice).

A simple blood test can show whether a person has sickle cell disease. Sickle cell disease is diagnosed when initial tests show abnormal hemoglobin, with more testing if needed. A sickle cell test looks for sickle cell trait and sickle cell disease. Doctors can diagnose sickle cell disease before a child is born (prenatally). Most states in the United States screen all newborns for sickle cell disease along with other common disorders before they go home from the hospital. Couples who are at risk for passing on this disease to their children may want to talk with a genetic counselor about prenatal testing.



Sick le cell disease is an inherited blood disorder that is not preventable. Having sick le cell disease means a lifelong battle against the health problems it can cause. Treatment involves getting routine tests to monitor health, managing pain events (crisis), and treating related health problems as they arise. Many people are able to have a very good quality of life by learning to manage the disease.

### Church School Lesson Overview - July 2014

July 6, 2014

Lesson Title: Glorify God with your Body Lesson Scripture: 1 Corinthians 6:12-7:9

Print: 1 Corinthians 6:12-20

Devotional Songs: #21 [], #272 [], and #243 [] Key Verse: "Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, which you have from God, and that you are not your own?" (1 Corinthians 6:19).

Paul tries to resolve conflict when persons with different morals and values think they are free to do as they please. These folks thought they were free to establish rules that were outside of the boundaries set by Jesus. They overlooked the fact that Christian disciples were called to one faith, one baptism, and one God who sets the game plan for the actions of all believers without exceptions.

In this lesson, the emphasis is still on the temple, but the human temple, the body of the believer. Paul urged the Corinthians to have reverence toward their bodies, like the regard they had for the physical temple. In the temple, only certain prescribed rituals and ceremonies were permitted. The believer is to restrict what he/she permits for his/her body.

July 13, 2014

Lesson Title: Love Builds Up Lesson Scripture: 1 Corinthians 8

Print: Same

Devotional Songs: #461[]: #251[]: and #243[] Key Verse: "But take care that this liberty of yours does not somehow become a stumbling block to the weak" (1 Corinthians 8:9).

The lesson centers on the principles of love and knowledge. Having dealt with their questions about marriage and singleness, Paul now addresses (in 1 Corinthians chapters 8-10) the next of their questions regarding eating meat that had been sacrificed to idols. The meat offered on pagan altars was usually divided into three portions. One portion was burnt in honor of the god, one portion was given to the worshipper to take home and eat, and the third portion was given to the priest. If the priest chose not to eat his portion, he sold it at the temple meat mark et.

The issue raised many questions for the Corinthian Christians such as, can we eat meat purchased at the temple meat market, or can Christians eat meat that was offered to idols? Instead of addressing the issue of food, Paul first talked about the principles of knowledge and love. Christian behavior is founded on love, not knowledge, and the goal of the Christian life is not knowledge, but love. Paul cautioned that if persons think they know it all, they really do not know anything. Therefore, people should never be boastful and make others feel less than.

The Corinthian Christians who felt free to eat at the pagan temple or eat food sacrificed to idols may have based their freedom on correct knowledge (knowing that idols are nothing) and that there is only one God. Paul asked the Corinthian Christians who knew there was nothing to an idol to remember that not everyone shared this knowledge. And if someone believed there was something to an idol, and they ate meat that had been sacrificed to an idol, their conscience, being weak, would be corrupted.

You are not more spiritual if you know idols are nothing and feel a personal freedom to eat food sacrificed to idols (neither if we eat are we the better). No one is less spiritual for abstaining from food sacrificed to idols. This is the very point where most stumble in issues relevant to Christian liberty (such as movies, drinking, music, or television). They assume that one stance or another is evidence of greater or lesser spirituality.

Paul reminds us that love is the key to Christian behavior. Therefore, it would be better not to eat food, even if your consciousness allows, than to lead a fellow Christian to sin.

vide the way out so that you may be able to endure it' (1 Corinthians 10:13).

Paul encourages and reassures the Corinthian church so it will remain on task and be faithful to the spiritual legacy Jesus left for us. This is particularly important today when electronic media is bombarding us with images and messages designed to cultivate our loyalty to false gods.

To really take hold of what Paul was saying to the Corinthians, we must grow in understanding of two things: 1. The church was new and most of the people in the church came from a background of either Judaism or paganism. So, it is easy to understand why converts to Christianity were still struggling with some of their former practices. 2. The idea of the people becoming one with God to whom they sacrificed was not a new concept introduced by the Apostle Paul. In Judaism when a worshipper offered a sacrifice, some of the offering was a symbol of reuniting with the God to whom the sacrifice was offered.

Paul was urging the believers to see themselves as united with Christ by way of the communion. And since the Jews held to the maxim of one God one Lord, the believers could not be one with Jesus and one with the pagan gods at the same time. Rituals relating to their former pagan religions had to go.

Key Verses: "When you come together, each one has a hymn, a lesson, a revelation, a tongue, or an interpretation. Let all things be done for building up" (1 Corinthians 1426).

The Apostle put speaking in tongues in a proper perspective for the church at Corinth. He did not condemn it, but pointed out the negative results from improper use. Speaking in tongues is clearly recognized as one of the spiritual gifts. It must not be abused and must not be used in a glib or used in an ostentatious way.

Pauls point is that in a corporate worship setting, what is permitted should be done for the building up of all persons present. Prophecy, which is the gift of encouragement, is far more appropriate in corporate worship services. All gifts have their purpose and place, and Paul gave a lesson in the relative use of those two gifts.

Twenty-eight-year-old protagonist Tommy Lee Tyson steps off the Greyhound bus in his hometown of Swamp Creek, Arkansas--a place he left when he was eighteen, vowing never to return. Yet fate and a Ph.D. in black studies force him back to his rural origins as he seeks to understand himself and the black community that produced him. A cold, nonchalant father and an emotionally indifferent mother make his return, after a ten-year hiatus, practically unbearable, and the discovery of his baby sister's death and her burial in the backyard almost consumes him. His mother watches his agony when he discovers his sister's tombstone, but neither she nor other family members is willing to disclose the secret of her death. Only after being produced incessantly does his older brother, Willie James, relent and provide Tommy Lee with enough knowledge to figure out exactly what happened and why.

Meanwhile, Tommy's seventy-year-old teacherlying on her deathbed-asks him to remain in 
Swamp Creek and assume her position as the 
headmaster of the one-room schoolhouse. He 
refuses vehemently and she dies having bequeathed him her five thousand-book collection 
in the hopes that he will change his mind. Over 
the course of a one-week visit, riddled with tension, heartache, and revelation, Tommy Lee 
Tyson discovers truths about his family, his 
community, and his undentable connection to 
rural Southern black fok and their ways.



The Reverend Lover preached on the topic "Open Your





Ministries, Atlanta, Georgia, by not only sharing highlights of her vitae, but also sharing a brief anecdotal story.

The Reverend Carolyn Knight greeted the congregation with the usual Methodist protocol and then offered the scripture, Daniel 3:1-18. While viewed as a very familiar scripture, (the story of the three Hebrew boys, Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego), Dr. Knight explained that the understanding begins to deepen as one hears these familiar Bible stories over and over again. The Reverend Knight lifted this subject from the scripture, "If Not Now, When?" Four points were derived from the sermon.

First, when critical, life-altering decisions arrive, it is important to ask, "If not now, when?" The three Hebrew boys were at a critical, life-altering state. They had heard the command, however, they refused to bow down and worship the golden image King Nebuchadnezzar had erected. When called before the King to explain their actions, Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego took a stand and declared that their God would deliver them and even if He did not, they would still worship Him. The King sent the three to the fiery chamber, but when he looked in he saw four instead of three. When the boys were allowed to wak out, they were not singed, and did not smell of smoke. The king wanted to know, why?

The second point, while a person may be pushed or pulled into a problem situation, similar to the Hebrew boys, God is still there with them and he will see them through. The Reverend Knight stated, "Whatever you're going through, it is better to go through it with God, than to go through it without God."

Thirdly, Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, had come to a critical bend in their lives where they had to "put some flesh on their faith." They had to really believe that God would deliver them. The preacher then explained how believers should handle critical situations in their lives. "It is our time now, to stand up straight and not bow down, because God is bigger than our circumstances. We should not limit God. When trouble comes into our lives, don't try to compare your outcomes, but trust God, even when you don't know God's plan. Trusting God, calls for following the process. Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, followed the God process. Even when they did not know that God would deliver them, they were still going to worship Him. Even if God does not deliver you, He will sustain you. He will give you peace in the midst of your situation. Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, told the king, we would rather burn than bow down. God delivered them because He is able!"

Finally, God did deliver Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, And just as He was able to deliver them, He can still do it for persons who trust Him. "Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego exercised proactive Faith. They got out in front of the situation. 'And even if you don't deliver us,' they said, 'we will still praise you." They called to memory those other times when God had delivered them and began praising Him. And they knew, if He did it then, He would do it again. "I don't know what you see, but I see them pressing the rewind button to see when God had come through for them before." The Reverend Knight then related one last image to culminate her sermon. Being an avid golfer, she related a story about Tiger Woods. "When asked how he, in 2000, used a six iron to hit a ball out of the sand, across the water, had it to land in the green, six inches from the hole, to tap it in for birdie, in the dark, Tiger replied, "I've done it before." "How do I know God's going to bless you; keep you; make a way for you; ensure you meet your destiny----HES DONE IT BEFORE!"

The Reverend Knight ended her powerful and spirit-filled sermon by saying, "Whatever you see in your future, you need to 1) be prepared to take a stand, 2) know that it is better to go through it with God, than to go through it without God, 3) believe that God will deliver you, but even if He does not, continue to praise Him, and 4) If He did it once....GOD WILL DO IT AGAIN!" At which time the congregation erupted in praise, thanks giving and singing, "He's Able!"

While the spirit was still high, all the women of the church were invited to the altar for a special prayer for women given by the Reverend Doctor Patrick Clayborn.

### The Story of Meriam Yehya Ibrahim Ishag

Meriam Yehya Ibrahim Ishag is a young Sudanese Christian woman who was recently sentenced to be executed for refusing to renounce her faith. The Sudanese court considers her to be a Muslim. Meriam was born to a Sudanese Muslim father and an Ethiopian Orthodox mother. Her father left when she was 6 years old, and Ibrahim was raised by her mother as a Christian. The court also convicted her of adultery and sentenced her to 100 lashes because her marriage to a Christian man is considered void under Sharia law. At the time of her sentence hearing Meriam was 8 months pregnant and had a 20 month old son who remained with her during her imprisonment.

"I am a Christian and I will remain a Christian."
That is what Meriam told the court. That is a very powerful statement. Just think, not only is her life at stake but so is her unborn child's life. What a way to prove your faith in God. She knows that her God will set her free, one way or the other. Like Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, she did not bow down. She knows that giants do fall down, and she just keeps praying and praising her Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ

The point in this story is this: God is sovereign ruler of the world, at all times and all places. For us Christians, that means God wants total loyalty to Him. No matter how powerful the opposing forces may be, we must stay faithful and true, for He will defeat them all in His own time.

If you stay strong in your faith you will receive praise and honor. 1 Peter 1:7

Post Note: Meriam Ibrahim Ishag was recently released from prison. She tried to leave Sudan for the United States with her American husband and their two children but they were detained at an airport in Khartoum. They were accused of traveling with falsified documents. This is just a very short synopsis of Ms. Ibrahim Ishag's story. 

Classes were available for all ages. The classes and their teachers were as follows; Preschool, MS. The first night's lesson, "C reated with a Purpose" (Genesis 1:26-27, 2:19), focused on learning to be trustworthy and learning that believers were created in God's image and are made for greatness. August 3, 2014

Lesson Title: Consolation Granted Through

Lesson Scripture: 2 Corinthians 1:3-11

Print: Same

Devotional Songs: #387, #272, and #243 Key Verse: "Our hope for you is unshaken; for we know that as you share in our sufferings, so also you share in our consolation" (2 Corinthians 1:7).

The reviewer interprets Paul's letter to the Christians of Corinth as an attempt to provide encouragement. In Paul's writing, he revealed that all Christians were under personal attack. He relayed that if not for affliction, the Christians could not be consoled and seek salvation. Paul indicated that the group that he was with was undergoing some personal trials by non-believers. He indicated that their trials were so difficult to bear that they had even welcomed death. But he indicated that at that moment of despair is when believers must rely on God's power to see them through trials and tribulations.

Those who study the bible know that during the darkest of times is when God does His finest work (provides comfort when life looks the most difficult to continue). There are countless examples of God's divine power being showered on mankind, providing comfort and healing to the masses.

August 10, 2014

Lesson Title: A Community Forgives
Lesson Scripture: 2 Corinthians 1:23 – 2:17
Print: 2 Corinthians 1:23 – 2:11
Devotional Songs: #403; #251; and #243
Key Verse: "Anyone whom you forgive, I also forgive. What I have forgiven, if I have forgiven anything, has been for your sake in the presence of Christ" (2 Corinthians 2:10).

It appears that Paul's trials noted in the first letter somehow effected the close relationship that was established with the people of Corinth. The strain was such that it caused Paul much distress and even tears. He indicated in his letter that it was probably best that he not see them in his condition noting that if he caused further pain, who then would bring happiness? Therefore, he decided to write a

follow-up letter to convey what he had in his heart.

Paul spoke on forgiveness. He indicated that an unknown person had not caused Paul pain, but the people of Corinth, and that this collective punishment by the people of Corinth against this man would be too much for him to bear. Paul reminded the Corinthians of the Christian wak of forgiveness, if they could forgive one another, God would forgive each of them, which is true for today's Christians.

August 17, 2014

Lesson Title: Treasure in Clay Jars Lesson Scripture: 2 Corinthians 42 –15

Print Same

Devotional Songs: #460; #258; and #243 Key Verse: "We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed" (2 Corinthians 4:8-9).

Paul reaffirmed the essence of Christianity. He indicated that Christianity is an open faith. It is a faith centered on Jesus and one bathed in light. He indicated that the world has attempted to crush the Christian spirit by personal attacks of physical harm, false accusations, and even death. Through it all, the Christian spirit has been victorious.

Paul reminded the Christians that they symbolically carry the essence of salvation (the crucifixion of Christ and His resurrection) in their hearts (clay jar). And since they carry Christ in their hearts, they can withstand all that Satan devises for them — affliction, despair, persecution and even death. He reminded the people of Corinth that by remembering Christ's suffering and His conquering death, they were constantly aware of the same "light" spirit that resides in each Christian today. And in this regard, Christians must not remain silent. By speaking out or sharing Christianity with others, Christians are increasingly providing thanks giving (by others) unto the glory of God.

August 24, 2014

Lesson Title: An Appeal for Reconciliation Lesson Scripture: 2 Corinthians 6:1-7:4 Print 2 Corinthians 6:1-13; 7:2-4 Devotional Songs: #525: #77; and #243

Key Verses: "Make room in your hearts for us; we have wronged no one, we have corrupted no one, and we have taken advantage of no one" (2 Corinthians 7:2).

For some reason the new Christians of Corinth began to waiver in their belief and to pull away from the relationship that Paul had earlier established with them. Paul wrote the Corinthians in order to request that they search their hearts and minds like children experiencing un conditional love.

Paul indicated that the Christian faith was not forced on anyone who was seeking the truth. He indicated that the concept of Christianity had been severely tested. The Christians had undergone affliction, hardships, calamities, beatings, imprisonment, riots, forced labor, sleepless nights, and even hunger in profession of their love for Jesus. He also indicated that the true Christian ha met the test by showing purity in spirit, knowledge, kindness, holiness of spirit, love, and truthful speech to both the sinner and the saint

Paul closed the letter by indicating that he understood why they waivered in their beliefs. They were only human. Paul asked that the Corinthians stand steadfast and not give up. He indicated that the Church of Corinth was his greatest pride and joy. He openly boasted about his relationship with the Corinthians and their accelerated growth in accepting Christianity. He indicated that though the relationship may have been strained, it was at that moment that they could share in the affliction amongst each other and then be consoled together.

August 31, 2014

Lesson Title: A Community Shares It's Resources

Lesson Scripture: 2 Corinthians 8 - 9

Print: 2 Corinthians 8:1-14

Devotional Songs: #424; 77; and #243

Key Verses: "As you excel in everything - in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in utmost eagerness, and in our love for you - so we want you to excel also in this generous undertaking" (2 Corinthians 8:7).

The reviewer came to the conclusion that this lesson is a carryover from the August 24, 2014 lesson. It is human nature that once enthusiasm wanes for a given cause, so does financial support of that cause. Paul attempted to appeal to the Church of Corinth by making a parallel with the up and coming churches of Macedonia. He noted that the people of Macedonia were so worked up in accepting the faith that they first submitted themselves unto God, committed to service towards mankind, and gave all that they had financially. He asked that the people of Corinth once again look inward, to catch the zeal that they once shared in accepting and spreading the gospel (Christianity) and then to financially support the cause.

Paul closed the letter by indicating that one must give with eagerness. He indicated that there is a delicate balance between identifying a need and satisfying the need and that this balance can only be achieved with a pure heart.



### Pastor's Message

## A Heart of Gratitude and Joy

We have come to the end of our annual conference year, and I am so glad for all of the wonderful blessings God has given us at this time. The psalmist declared, "I will praise you, O LORD, with all my heart; I will tell of all your wonders" (Psalm 9:1). Let us praise God with all of our hearts. Let our hearts be filled with gratitude for all of the love that God has poured on St. John.

I must tell of God's wonders! Over sixty persons have joined our congregation, and several of them were saved in the process. We began a tutorial program in which we adopted Davis Hills Middle School and sent tutors there regularly. We also donated school supplies to teachers and uniforms to students. Through St. John's iThrive ministry of Friday Nite Live (both in November 2013 and August 2014), a number of youth from our church and community were turned away from suicidal thoughts. Some members found healing through the Selah Memorial service, which honored church and family members who passed away. A number of people were enlightened and empowered as we hosted a community forum on relations between police and the African American community. Others found joy in our Thankful People service just before Thanksgiving, where our sole focus was giving God thanks! Between Thanksgiving and Christmas, we donated over 100 food baskets to persons in need, the Soup Kitchen served over 1,400 meals. Our Watchnight service included a heart-warming video reflection of our ministry efforts over the 2013 calendar year. We celebrated the birth of our daughter Joya, and we praised God for bringing my father through surgery to remove colon cancer. During Lent, we took the Journey of Faith as we studied seven aspects of stewardship. Testimonies poured in from those who began to tithe, others who began better health practices, some who reprioritized their time to honor God, still others. who began offering their talents to the Lord, and a few who began to give back to their communities. The 50+ Auxiliary brought the radio show 2<sup>rd</sup> Chance (hosted by Kenny Anderson) to our church for a live taping. We then journeyed to Montgomery, AL, for the 9th District Pentecost Explosion, where over 12,000 persons gathered at Alabama State University Stadium to celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit. Upon our return, our Vacation Bible School lifted the idea of getting connected to God and had great participation. At Troy State University, the 9th District held its Christian Education Congress. There, one of our members was recognized as Layperson of the Year for the 9th District — Sis. Nedra McDaniell (We will hold our own celebration for her at our church pionic later this month.) We also had our first ever iThrive Sunday (celebrating youth and young adults). As well, we had a number of guest preachers: Dr. Keith D. D. Lawrence (Harvest Sunday), Bishop Carolyn Tyler Guidry (Founder's Day), the Reverend Bank ole Akinbinu (Holy Week Revival), the Reverend Carolyn Ann Knight (Women's Day), Rev. Bobby Cox, Jr. (Men's Day), Pastor Willie Diggs (iThrive Sunday), and Pastor Adrian Davis (Friday Nite Live).

For this wonderful journey, we thank God! It is because of God's grace that we were able to accomplish all the above and more! We thank God for my wife and our executive minister — the Reverend Sheri Smith Clayborn, Without her, none of these ministry efforts would have been achieved with the kind of excellence that they exuded. We thank God for our staff ministers who are always ready to serve. We praise God for the office staff, financial officers and volunteers,

#### Men's Day Service Was Spirit-Filled

The Reverend Bobby B. Cox, Jr., pastor of Bethel A.M. E. Church, Mobile was the preacher for Men's Day on Sunday, July 13th. The theme was "Daring to Walk on Water". The Holy Spirit was truly present from the moment of the Doxology and the opening hymn of praise, "Holy, Holy, Holy" and the special Call to Worship led by Mr. Bill Williams. The Reverend Charles Glover offered prayer which was followed by a spirit filled prayer response of "Pass Me Not", Mr. Karl Gullatte read the scripture taken from Matthew 14: 23-33 and Mr. Kenneth Parham led the litany. Visitors were welcomed by Mr. Aaron Dudley and Mr. Justin York invited the men of St. John to become active members of the Sons of Allen, noting the activities of the organization and the just-completed Men's Retreat which occurred as part of the Men's Dayweek end.

The Male Chorus and musicians, directed by Mr. Reginald Pearson, set the tone and led the congregation in an abundance of praise in music and song. A liturgical dance continued to inspire praise and worship, as Brothers Jason Gilmore, Wallace Parham, Xavier Rembert, and Carl Lewis performed to "I am" by Kirk Franklin. Pastor Clayborn introduced the preacher of the day.

The Reverend Cox preached on the topic "Greater is Coming" based on the text Philippians 3: 12-14. He began by defining and explaining "process theology" as established by Alfred North. The premise being that God and His relationship to believers/the world is a dynamic one, never static, and always in the process of "becoming". There is an emphasis on connectedness, according to the Reverend Cox, "We don't live in isolation... every experience is related and gives us greater understanding of God's purpose for us." He explained that "The Christian journey is a process... you can't handle all that God wills for your life at one time", therefore there is a process/greater is coming. Referring to the text, he indicated that when in a problem situation or having a sense that one has not become all that they could/should be, it is important to remember that this problem is part of the process and greater is coming (it will change).

The Reverend Cox cautioned to avoid staying in a "comfort zone", in that even if things are great they can become greater. He also noted the mind is extremely powerful and plays a significant role in going/pushing forward. He indicated that it is important to relinquish the past; that is do not focus on past mistakes, again highlighting that Paul moved forward rather than focusing on

the past. Finally, the Reverend Cox noted it is important to, "Remember the Lord, there is no one like Him...He stands at the apex of creation...He promised never to leave you alone" (in the process of becoming).

After the inspiring message and the invitation to discipleship, Pastor Clayborn offered a prayer for the men as they were invited to the altar. All congregants, not just the males present, were blessed by a wonderful service of worship and praise. The Men's Day Committee did a wonderful job.

Exciting, powerful, power packed, full of spirit, and much needed are some of the words and phrases used to describe iTHRIVE Sunday, July 27, 2014. This ministry geared toward the older youth, young adults, and the young at heart had its first Sunday morning worship experience. Sister Donna Gullatte, mother of two of our youth, posted on social media regarding the iTHRIVE worship service, "The iTHRIVE service on yesterday gave new life to parents and I surely hope the youth 'Got It' too."



The theme for this service was Power Lip... Get Connected. The goal was not to have so many bells and whistles that worship could not be recognized by all attendees. As part of the St. John AMEC movement to reclaim our youth and young adults, iTHRIVE ministry welcomed North Alabama attendees back to experience its annual Word and worship event that was held August 1, 2014. The theme of "Power UP: Get Connected" continued with a focus on challenging attendees to evaluate the ways and mediums they use to connect with others daily and make their connection, or relationship, with God their primary focus. The FNL team staged a power outage to emphasize the importance of being 'plugged in' to the Source of all things (GOD). Pastor Patrick Clayborn helped give context for the theme and used a powerful spoken word piece on video pointing out the flaws in 'religion', which was created by man, versus 'relationship' which was God's first intention for creating man and woman. My Financial Needs: 1) Where am I today? 2) Where would I like to be? 3) Can I get there?
4) How do I get there? (Financial advisors should be able to help you here) 5) How can I stay on track?

Dr. Jesse Wilson from Oakwood University spoke to the men on the topic of "Three Things A. Christian Should Know." The text was from Luke 15 (parable of the lost sheep). Dr. Wilson's main point was that lost people do matter to God. Every Christian should know that lost people matter to God. Every Christian should know that you can be in the house and still be lost. Every Christian should know that if you get lost, God will find you.

Dr. Lee Williams spoke to the men about evangelism. Evangelism is the spreading of the Christian gospel by public teaching or personal witness. Dr. Williams' session was filled with plenty of scripture references that reminded everyone that they have marching orders to evangelize. Christian men must stand and witness to those things shown to them. They cannot be selfish with God's word. They must share their faith in order to win souls. They must evangelize because being Christ-like means they have compassion and God has commanded them to do so.

Presiding Elder Allen charged the men with an important task: evangelism. This charge was not taken lightly as Dr. Williams spoke before Presiding Elder. ## Back to School: A Few Suggestions

It is that time of year. The joy (and pain) of returning to school is here. There is back-to-school shopping, earlier bedtimes and wake-up calls, and the traffic. There is the expectation of seeing friends, starting/continuing extracurricular activities and of course, learning and studying, which will lead to the goal of graduating and progressing to the point of being gainfully employed (full—fledged adulthood).

This involves change/transition, which can be difficult even if one wants the change. There are those who eagerly anticipate the next grade, new teacher (s), new phase (middle school, high school, college). Even when difficult, change is good. (It is necessary to venture forth from first grade.)

The key to a smooth transition is planning and structure. Changing the sleep routine is important. It is not good to suddenly change from staying up most of the night and sleeping until noon, to returning to the "school night" routine of 8 or 9 p.m. bedtime the night before school begins. The amount and quality of sleep is crucial to good school functioning. A problem in this area can result in poor attention, learning problems, as well as mood issues and irritability. Likewise, a healthy meal to start the day is important.

Study habits are crucial. There are different study styles. Briefly, active learning, or building on daily lectures or lessons is the best way to learn. This prevents the need for "cramming" before tests, as only a review of the daily learning/homework is needed. It is important to note the type of test that will be given because studying for recall versus recognition can make the difference between and "A" and "C" or lower. Studying for recall means that one can generate or explain the information for the test (fill in the blank, short answer, essay), while recognition means that the person can choose the correct answer (correctly spelled word, multiple choice, matching). If the type of test is not known, it is best to study for recall, so that one can generate the answer and easily pick the correct answer from the options.

Parents should communicate with teachers regarding assignments, finding out how the child is progressing (prompt them to give the positives / progress, not look for negatives). Be sure to have the PIN to access the online information if the school system has computer based instruction. Check the computer periodically because if games or other non-educational downloads have occurred, the student might lose their computer and the capacity to effectively do the school/homework.

Having a study routine is important. Parents should let their children know the expectation is that homework will be done before video / computer games, television, going outside to play. Having a break is good as long as it does not take twenty minutes to convince the person/oneself to return from a five or ten minute break). There should be a cap on video game time (for some it has been found best to have video game time "saved up" for the weekend, especially if there is a lot of homework or studying that extends to the normal bedtime. There should not be exciting television or video game activity during the hour before bedtime, especially if a young person has difficulty winding down at the end of the day. Lower the lights, have quiet activities, engage in a bed-time routine that slows/calms down the activity with bedtime being a natural segue.

## Technology Tip

Buying a Laptop

Now that the school year has begun for many of the local schools and will soon be starting for universities, many students will be purchasing laptops. This article will review some of the main specifications to consider when purchasing a laptop. First, determine how the laptop will be used.

Netbooks are designed to contain enough power to get basic and quick essentials done. They are very light in size and many models can be purchased at a low cost. The lightness makes it easy to carry when visiting the coffee shop or traveling. Minimum netbook requirements are an Intel Atom CPU (N2BO or N450) that is better for multitasking. The netbook should also contain an HDMI port so that the netbook can be used as a media player at home. The netbook should also contain at least 6-7 hours of continuous battery life.

If the netbook is not powerful enough and the user is a gamer, a 15-18" desktop replacement notebook with a high resolution, a good processor, at least a 512 MB video card and at minimum a 500 GB hard drive should be purchased. If a lot of downloading and storing of games will be taking place, purchase a lot of disk space or an external hard drive.

If the laptop will be used for school to do homework, research papers or light educational activities, a 13-15" notebook computer should be suitable. The notebook should contain at least 4GB of RAM to run Microsoft applications and doing a lot of research using a web browser. Most notebooks can be purchased with a 250 GB hard drive but for storing many Microsoft documents a 500 GB hard drive may be best. The 64-bit operating system is more suitable for the notebooks that are built.

As many of these features are similar, purchasing a laptop with the correct configurations is very important. The listing of the specifications for a laptop could go on forever, but the specs that have been mentioned are some of the most important.

## Seven New Food Rules for Health and Longevity

Americans are turning to real healthy foods, not just to lose weight but to reverse diseases, maintain health, and live longer. Physicians, chefs, farmers and foodies give new ideas that will change the way people eat. This is not a diet, but a movement, a revolution, and everyone should jump on board.

#### Rule Number 1 - Cook "Real" Food

The most radical thing to do in order to improve their health is to cook "real" food at home. Cooking is healthier than not cooking. Studies show that home-cooked meals contain fewer calories than meals eaten outside of the home. Nearly everything cooked at home is superior in quality and nutrition. It is cheaper, especially for four or more. Cooking gives control and knowledge of what is in the dish. Letting restaurants prepare food gives them control. Choose the healthier food.

#### Rule Number 2 – Eat Bacteria

Andrew Weil, MD, alternative medicine expert, recommends adding sauerkraut and yogurt to the diet.

#### Rule Number 3 - Reduce Meats

Eliminating a day of meat can cut saturated (bad) fats by 15%. It also saves on fossil fuels.

#### Rule Number 4 - Ditch Dieting for Good

The popular Mediterranean diet is not a diet, but a way of eating for life. According to recent studies, eating vegetables, nuts, olive oil, and fish lowers the risk of heart disease and increases the chances of living a healthy life past seventy. People need to revisit their relationship with food and dieting. They should cultivate good habits that become automatic. Having good home food habits means one can socialize and eat freely without counting calories and feeling guilty.

#### Rule Number 5 - Eat to Heal the Body

Can delicious dishes cure bodies of sickness and disease? The answer: "yes". There are many health benefits of eating certain foods. Eat foods high in fiber such as chickpeas or beans to reduce blood sugar spikes and inflammation. Extra virgin olive oil has antioxidants which reduce inflammation. Red peppers and cauliflower are good for the immune system because they are high in Vitamin C, a potent antioxidant that mops up free radicals and helps regenerate other antioxidants, like Vitamin E. Black grapes have compounds that inhibit activity of an enzyme that causes depressive symptoms as well as increase the feel good hormones, serotonin and dopamine. Dark chocolate can enhance mood. Eating salmon, tuna, and cod fish give a balance of Omega 3 and 6. Celery contains apigenin, a strong inflammation-fighting phytonutrient.

#### Rule Number 6 - Get Back to the Basics

Cook real food and serve as close to its original form so that it looks like something grown in nature that brings one to the original source, creator God. Use natural ingredients and everything will taste better. Eat whole foods and plant-based foods. Avoid processed and refined foods to reverse heart disease and Type-2 Diabetes as well as help to decrease body weight.

#### Rule Number 7 - Buy the Best Food in the Store

As fruits and vegetables have been bred to be bigger and sweeter, key nutrients have been stripped away. Science-backed tactics help to navigate the produce aisle. Go for tiny tomatoes which have more lycopene than larger ones. Buy equal amounts of fruits and vegetables, unless restricted by health reasons. Fruits have more antioxidants. Large, whole carrots have more nutrients than baby ones. Cook bold onions and eat sweet raw onion. Pungent onions are healthier. Choose bunch spinach over bagged and prewashed greens. Processing makes them less flavorful and nutritious. This is true for kale, collards, mustards, turnips and cabbage. Buy fresh herbs and spices which are most potent. Lastly, if it is black, blue, red or purple, just buy it.

Everyone needs to get out the grocery list, go shopping, pick up a pan or pot, and get in the kitchen to put these new food rules into practice so that they will live longer and healthier.

## Church School Lesson Overview - September 2014

September 7, 2014

Lesson Title: A Vision of the Future Lesson Scripture: Jeremiah 30 Print: Jeremiah 30:1-3, 18-22

Devotional Songs: #450, #272, and #243

Key Verse: "The days are coming," declares the Loro, "when I will bring my people Israel and Judah back from captivity and restore them to the land I gave their ancestors to possess," says the Loro." (Jeremiah 30:3)

Jeremiah's forty year career as a prophet witnessed both sides of that disaster as God
used him to warn Judah and its kings of pending divine judgment. God's patience with His
people had ended. He spoke (through the
prophet) of the problem as a wound that would
not heal (Jeremiah 30:12). Even though Judah
had had a brief period of religious revival under King Josiah, it did not persist after that
man's death (2 Kings 22-25). Jeremiah's message moved from a call for national repentance, to a warning of national disaster by the
hand of the Lord, to promise of restoration.
The latter is the subject of this lesson.

King Solomon built a temple in Jerus alem as a permanent "temple of the Lord" to replace the portable tabernacle that had been in use for several hundred years. As a result, the temple became the new home for the Ark of the Covenant. The capital city thus became the temple city. The magnificent temple was dedicated around 960 BC, it stood until it was destroyed by the Babylonian army of King Nebuchadnezzar in 586 BC.

Another powerful factor for reestablishing a city was religion. Places deemed to be holy needed to be rebuilt simply because they were deemed to be holy. This lesson looks at a city that met this criterion as well as the others above: the city of Jerusalem—perhaps the most famous city in the history of the world with regard to religion. Jerusalem was destroyed in 588 BC, and the text will help to understand why there was such a strong impetus to rebuild the city.

September 14, 2014 Lesson Title: Hope for the Future Lesson Scripture: Jeremiah 31 Print: Jeremiah 31:31-37 Devotional Songs: #464; #251; and #243 Key Verse: "The days are coming," declares the Loro, "when I will make a new covenant with the people of Israel and with the people of Judah." (Jeremiah 31:31)

This lesson addresses God's covenant with Old Testament Israel and looks at His promise through Jeremiah of a new covenant—a better one.

Covenants in the Bible feature agreements that express or imply obligations and benefits between parties. The Old Testament sometimes speaks of covenants made between two people, such as the one between Laban and Jacob. The most important covenants in the Bible, though, are those between God and people. They are both like and unlike human-to-human covenants in various ways.

The first mention of covenant in the Bible is in reference to promises the Lord made to Noah. This is followed by other God-to-human covenants: with Abram and his descendants Isaac and Jacob, with the people of Israel (after their departure from Egypt), and with King David. The covenants after Noah reflect the progress of the people of God from a family group headed by Abraham to a developed nation with a king, land, capital city, and temple.

We should note God's covenants to be onesided affairs in a couple of ways. First, God establishes the terms of His covenants; there are no give and take negotiations in this regard. Second, God always keeps His side of His covenants. Humans may fail, but God's promises are always true. The weakness of the covenant to Old Testament Israel was never on the part of God, but on the part of the covenant people. The relentless cycle of sin, sorrow, supplication, and salvation proved that people needed a new covenant.

Jeremiah 31 speaks of a time of restoration that was not to come until after 538 BC, the year the exile ended. The prophet pictured this restoration as a great parade of the "remnant of Israel" returning from all directions. This throng is not a victorious army, but includes pregnant women, the blind, and the lame, all weeping with joy. This sets the tone for Jeremiah's broader vision of a new covenant.

September 21, 2014

Lesson Title: Anticipation of the Future

Lesson Scripture: Jeremiah 32 Print: Jeremiah 32:1-9, 14, 15

Tentative Devotional Songs: #424; #258; and

#243

Key Verse: "For this is what the LORD Almighty, the God of Israel, says: Houses, fields and vineyards will again be bought in this land." (Jeremiah 32:15)

This lesson involves "redemption" of a parcel of land; some information on that concept is in order. The "right of redemption" within the Law of Moses was a provision designed to keep family properties intact. The land of Canaan, the Promised Land, had been given to the Israelites by the Lord. Since possession of plots of land was to be seen as a sacred trust, the law made provision for redeeming property that had been sold outside the family. This was something like the modern "right of first refusal."

Is raelite families retained ultimate rights over land they had sold. If economic hardship necessitated selling a parcel of land, such land was first to be offered to other family members. There was even a sense that a relative who had the means to buy this property from the distressed family member was obligated to do so to keep the land in the family. The seller retained the right of repurchase if his finances improved, but at current market value. All unredeemed land was to revert to the original family owners every 50 years, when a year of jubilee was observed.

The intended effect was to tie people to the land so that an ongoing possibility of economic prosperity could be retained for every family in srael. From a modern perspective, it placed severe limits on land speculation practices as a means to accumulate wealth.

September 28, 2014

Lesson Title: Future Peace and Joy

Lesson Scripture: Jeremiah 33

Print: Jeremiah 33:1-11

Tentative Devotional Songs: #525;#77; and 243 Key Verses: "I will restore the fortunes of the land as they were before," says the Loro" (Jeremiah 33:11)

In last week's lesson Jeremiah was detained at a courtyard prison connected with King Zedekiah's palace as the Babylonians besieged Jerusalem. The prophet's situation and the reason for it still hold. Jeremiah's imprisonment seemed to have been as much about taking him out of the public square as about any treasonable offense. The besieged city was on edge, and the king did not want that prophet exacerbating the morale problems.

Jeremiah had been serving as a prophetic voice in Jerusalem for some 40 years at the time of this lesson (587 BC), so he was a well-known figure in the city. Although he was never popular because of his dire warnings and harsh condemnations, his longevity attests to some degree of acceptance by the people. He was not easily silenced.





Pastor Clayborn preached on the topic of "Lost and Found" from the text Luke 15: 8-10. He began by posing the question of whether the congregants had ever been lost and noted one could be confused, and even "unsure of whose you are." He indicated that it can be hard to admit be-

Further, he suggested that, as in the text, one must shed a glimmer of light (the woman lit a lamp) in order to break from the darkness in one's life. He encouraged to "never, never, never give up" in the words of Winston Church-He indicated a "found" person will rejoice.


As the invitation to discipleship was offered, so was an open invitation to worship at St. John at any time.

In the text, Elisha, man of God, could hear the enemies plan. As a result they tried to slay him. This was not a good plan. Some people come after the anointed, thinking that God is not watching. Woe to the man who tries to destroy God's chosen! Elisha's servant was fearful. Dr. Clayborn continued by stating that people hurt when they are fearful and they can be assured that when God is with them, His eyes are always open. He directed the Reverend DeLoach to keep his eyes open so that he can see beyond confusion, beyond nature; see beyond what is in front of him. As Moses told his people, "Stand still and see what God will do."

Pastor Clayborn then focused on the second text from Mark. To the Reverend DeLoach and church he said, "We also need our ears open". Sometimes the opening process is not pretty. This scripture's healing is not pretty. He (Jesus) stuck his fingers in the man's ears, spit and touched the man's tongue. He continued, "The devil is always trying to talk to you with stuff that will keep you down, negatives." Believers need a heart with faith that comes from hearing. We were reminded that Matthew told the people not to bring gossip, or tell who or what. When we are closed to negatives we can start to hear God's plans for us.

In conclusion, he charged the Reverend DeLoach to open his mouth, ears and eyes, to preach in season and out of season, for God will pour out a blessing he cannot contain. He should also open himself to praise, for God has done too much for him to close up.


After the Invitation to Christian Discipleship and other special presentations, remarks and the Benediction, everyone joined in fellowship before returning home amid lifted clouds.



of St. John. He departed this life on Properly backing up data on a laptop or desktop August 25, 2014, at home surrounded is something that is often forgotten. There are some ways to safely back up data. It is recommended that a main folder be used to store files that will need to be backed up. This helps in the case that a quick backup to an external storage device has to be done, and provides a central ized location for personal data. There are also other mechanisms that can be used to backup or store data, such as the cloud, external hard drives, CDs/DVDs .or flash drives.

> There are several back-up solution providers that offer cloud services. The cloud service allows uploading files/data to the solution provider's servers and the data can be accessed from anywhere. The issue with storing data in the cloud is that the person does not know the physical location of the data. The next mechanism is to store or backup data to the external hard drive. Most external hard drives can be purchased in small portable sizes. External hard drives are some of the most widely used sources of backup and data storage. The external hard drives can be easily recognized regardless of the operating system that may be installed on the computer. Unlike using the cloud mechanism, the external hard drive must be carried around and can be easily lost if not secured properly.

The opposite in size of the external hard drive is the flash drive, sometimes referred to as a jump drive. These are smaller in storage and can sometimes be purchased with built in encryption which provides a safety net if the drive is misplaced. CDs/DVDs are the most cost effective mechanism for backing up data. The issue is that if there is a lot of data to be backed up, i can take an extremely long time to copy data to the discs.

As mentioned, these are some of the most commonly used mechanisms of backing up data. Each one may have an advantage over the other, but the most important mechanism is being knowledgeable of the location of the data and how it is being used.

## September is National Prostate Cancer Awareness Month

One in six men in the United States will be diagnosed with prostate cancer in their lifetime. It is the second most common cancer in the United States, and each year about 30,000 men die from this cancer.

Prostate cancer occurs in the small, walnut-sized gland called the prostate that sits just below a man's bladder. Like other cancer, prostate cancer begins when cells in the prostate begin growing and dividing more rapidly than normal cells. When other cells complete their life span, they die off. Cancer cells continue living and reproducing. As these abnormal cells accumulate, they can develop into a tumor. This tumor can eventually spread (metastasize) to nearby tissue, organs, and eventually bones.

Prostate-specific antigen (PSA) screenings detect the amount of PSA in the blood. PSA is a protein produced by the prostate gland, and when the gland is affected by cancer, infection, inflammation, or enlargement, it releases higher than normal levels of the substance.

As part of a regular physical, doctors may begin performing a digital rectal exam (DRE) on men around the age of 50 or in those with risk factors for the cancer. If the doctor detects any changes or abnormalities, s/he may suggest an ultrasound to check for the presence of a tumor. The results of a PSA and a DRE are reported as a Gleason score. The higher the Gleason score the more likely it is that the prostate cancer has spread past the prostate into nearby tissue, organs, or bones.

The most common symptoms of prostate cancer include trouble urinating, decreased force when urinating, blood in the urine and semen, swelling in the legs, discomfort in the pelvis and hips, and pain with ejaculation. For some men, prostate cancer can develop for months or years before it begins causing symptoms.

The following factors increase a man's risk of developing prostate cancer:

- Age most common in men over 65, but the likelihood of developing prostate cancer begins increasing at age 50.
- Race African American men have a higher risk, while Asian men have the lowest.
- Family history men with family history of prostate cancer have an increased risk of developing prostate cancer. The closer the relation, the higher the chance.
- Obesity overweight and obese men are more likely to have prostate cancer than men of a healthier weight.

Men with prostate cancer have several treatment options. These options include:

- Removal of the prostate gland (radical prostatectomy).
- Radiation therapy, high energy radiation that can shrink and kill cancer cells.
- Chemotherapy, drug treatment that uses chemicals to kill cancer cells.
- Hormone therapy, stops the body from producing the hormone testosterone, which prostate tumors use to grow.
- Brachytherapy, radioactive seeds are planted in or near the tumor to shrink and kill it
- Cryosurgery, freezing tissue to kill cancer cells
- Ultrasound therapy, heating the prostate to kill cancer cells.

Early-stage prostate cancer can often be treated and cured, but advanced-stage prostate cancer becomes harder to treat. Plus, the treatments that are usually most effective for advanced prostate cancer tend to have the most negative side effects. These include urinary incontinence and erectile dysfunction (ED). Based on the individual risk for the disease, the lifestyle, and age, persons can work with their doctor to decide how often they should be screened and when these screenings should start. The earlier prostate cancer is found, the better!

#### October 5, 2014

#### Lesson Title: The Rewards of Patience Lesson Scripture: Job 1; Psalm 56; Habakkuk

Print: Habakkuk 2:1-5; 3:17-19

Devotional Songs: #327[], #272 [], and #243 [] Key Verse: "Yet, I will rejoice in the Lord; I will exult in the God of my salvation" (Habakkuk 3:18)

Habakkuk likely ministered in the final decade of the seventh century BC, although some date his prophetic ministry to as early as 630 BC. The closing decades of the seventh century BC saw Israel under stress. The northern kingdom of Israel had been destroyed by the Assyrians in 722 BC as God's judgment on His people's idolatry, social injustice, and unholy political alliances came to fruition. The people of the southern kingdom of Judah did not learn from what happened to the northern kingdom and the same sinful patterns became their

The prophet Habakkuk cried out about the violence, injustice, and wide-scale abandonment of God's laws that resulted in the trampling of Israelites by the wicked. The prophet pleaded as one who had been crying out to God for a long time without receiving an answer. God answered. Not only was He aware of the sins of His people, He planned to use the Babylonians to level the southern kingdom of Judah just as the Assyrians had done to the northern kingdom of Israel.

Habakkuk was not comforted by that answer. He complained that the Babylonians were far more treacherous than the Israelites, and that they were known for trampling the righteous.

#### October 12, 2014 Lesson Title: Confident of Redemption

and that at the last he will stand upon the earth" (Job 19:25).

Though Job lived a righteous life—righteous enough to receive a divine endorsement in that

regard —Job experienced terrible adversity. God, unbeknown to Job, was in the process of disproving Satan's contention that Job lived an upright life only because God had blessed and prospered him. God then granted Satan permission to test Job.

The majority of the book of Job features conversations among Job and the friends who came to console him. Their dialogue was different from the one between God and Satan. Job and his friends shared the simplistic view that bad things happen only (or mainly) to bad people. According to that view, if one wants to know whether people are righteous or not, all one has to do is look at how well that person is faring. If one were thriving, then one must be doing right. If one were suffering, then one must be doing wrong.

Since the friends saw that Job was suffering terribly, they assumed he was guilty of some grave offense. Perhaps Job would have agreed under normal circumstances. But Job was the one suffering, and he could recall no wicked action or set of habits that warranted the magnitude of his downfall. Job had no defense other than his own claim of innocence.

#### **Lesson Title: Defiant Faithfulness** Lesson Scripture: Job 5; 24 Psalm 55:12-23

Print: Job 24:1, 9-12, 19-25


Key Verse: "I call upon God, and the Lord will save me" (Psalm 55:16).

The background of this lesson is the same as the previous lesson, so that information will not be repeated here. In the interim between the last lesson and this lesson, Job has undergone two more rounds of counseling-one by Zophar and one by Eliphaz.

The friends' counsel did not comfort Job. They said he was guilty of wrongdoing that deserved to be punished. They accused him of pride in being unwilling to confess his guilt. They called him to heed time-tested wisdom, to repent of evil, and get right with God so that God could prosper him again.

Zophar seemed to have taken the response from Job as a personal insult. In turn, Job

viewed Zophar's reply as mockery and falsehood. When it was Eliphaz's turn, he accused Job of great wickedness, the cure being repentance.

In reaction, Job expressed his wish to gain access to God's presence so Job could plead his case and be acquitted. Job then confessed that it was impossible to do so and that he was powerless to do anything about God's plans for him.

October 26, 2014

Lesson Title: Who's in Control?

Lesson Scripture: Job 42; Psalm 86 Print: Job 42:1-10

Tentative Devotional Songs: #394 []; 77; and #243 []

**Key Verses:** "I know that you can do all things, and that no purpose of yours can be thwarted" (Job 42:2).

We are close to the end of the book of Job, and a lot has happened since the previous lesson. Bildad was the last of Job's three friends to speak and he spoke briefly, only six verses. He added nothing new to the friends' case against Job, so Job continued to assert his innocence while waxing eloquent on the nature of God.

Job was then followed by a man named Elihu. He is not mentioned until this point in the book and is not mentioned again after he finishes speaking. Neither Job nor God responded to Elihu's thoughts. The man just mysteriously showed up, offered his thoughts, and disappeared.

Then God finally spoke. Posing a series of rhetorical questions, God accused Job of lacking knowledge. The gist of God's line of questioning was that He, and not Job, was the one who established and sustained creation. God then invited Job to respond. Job declined to answer, merely citing his own unworthiness to do so.

God was not satisfied with Job's reaction. Job was not going to get off the hot seat that easily! God demanded a real answer, rejected Job's accusations, and reminded Job that he could not justify or save himself, for no human could stand up even to creatures God had made—creatures such as Behemoth and Leviathan. Job was required to answer for what he had said.



## Pastor's Message

Gratitude & Laughter

In every thing give #ranks: for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you.

1 Thess alonians 5:18

To every thing there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven... a time to laugh.... ~ Ecclesiastes 3:1, 4

As we approach Thanksgiving, many of us are making preparations. I am sure that in the midst of all busy holiday preparation, we — the people of faith — are also counting our blessings. As a matter of fact, many of us are NOT waiting until Thanksgiving to tell God how grateful we are for all of the blessings God has provided. On Facebook, thirty days of gratitude is trending well. Some are taking the thirty days leading up to Thanksgiving and posting each day on their Facebook pages reasons for being grateful to God. People of faith are preparing for Thanksgiving by BEING thankfull.

The bible is clear: we are to give God thanks in all things (1 Thess. 5:18). We may not be thankful FOR everything, but we must show God gratitude in every aspect of our lives. We are to praise God at all times (Psalm 34:1). This can be difficult when we consider how many treacherous moments we have to endure. Some of us quietly believe that these verses are impossible to perform (just as some of us quietly think that praying without ceasing is impossible too). I say that it is impossible if we believe thanksgiving only to be a happy activity. As humans we will not be happy all of the time. Therefore, if our praise and gratitude are founded on our happiness, then they will be inconsistent.

Yet, I contend that there is a way we can be thankful in everything. We can show God gratitude by being honest about our feelings as we give God thanks. When a person expresses displeasure with a loved one, that person is no less thankful for that loved one's place in his or her life. That person is honest about his or her feelings with that loved one and is STILL thankful for that loved one's presence and care. The same dynamic applies to our relationship with God. When the scripture says to give God thanks in every situation, it did NOT say that we had to be dishonest. We can express hurt to God for the passing away of a loved one and still be grateful that God allowed that person to be in our lives. The expressions of anger, confusion, disappointment, fear, uncertainty, and grief do not negate our ability to give God thanks. Thanksgiving is a choice! It is a choice we make that should be primarily founded on the character and gracious activity of God. Our feelings about our circumstances may impact what our praise looks like, but it should not sway us to stop giving God praise.

I realize that this is easier said than done, especially during the holiday season. Yes, giving God thanks when remembering that loved one you lost can be challenging. Counting your blessings is tough when you just lost your job. Blessing God at all times is hard-hitting when a spouse walks away. Giving God glory is rough when the doctor tells you there is nothing that can be done about your illness. When loss or tragedy either happens or is easily remembered during the holidays, giving God praise at that time seems to become an impossible task. AND, the steps I listed above appear to be useless.

St. John has endured much loss this year. Some members have gone home to be with the Lord. A few members have lost loved ones. Sickness has hit some of our families. Financial crisis, family stress, unemployment, taking care of aging relatives and challenges on the job have gripped a

If you have food in the refrigerator, BETHANKFUL there are many dying of starvation.


If you have family to spend time with on Thanksgiving, BETHANKFUL there are many who will be alone.

## Do You Know Why Veterans Day is Celebrated?

The 11" hour of the 11" day of the 11" month is when the armistice ending World War I began in 1918 and that is the origin of Veterans Day, Veterans Day honors all American veterans, living and dead, and has a special emphasis on thanking living veterans for their service to our country.

In November 1919, one year after the armistice ending World War I went in to effect, President Woodrow Wilson declared Nov 11<sup>11</sup> as the first commemoration of Armistice Day with the following words:

"To us in America, the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations..."

In 1938, congress made November 11" an annual, federal holiday known as "Armistice Day" to honor the cause of world peace, but it was primarily used to honor World War I veterans. After World War II, in 1954, the law was changed, and "Armistice" was changed to "Veterans." November 11" became a day to honor veterans of all wars.

At 11 a.m. on November 11" at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, a color guard with members of every military branch renders honors to America's war dead. The United States president places a wreath at the tomb and the bugler sounds "taps." So although Veterans D ay was observed on the 11th of this month, acknowledge throughout the month the men and women who served in the United States Armed Forces by saying "thank you." They sacrificed everything to make this world a safer place for all.

## St. John Celebrates Breast Cancer Awareness Month

On October 18, 2014, members of St. John participated in a Breast Cancer Awareness Workshop held in the S.S. Hereford Fellowship Hall at St. John. Sister Rosemary Wells, St. John Health Ministry co-chair, hosted the event and spoke on the importance of Breast Cancer prevention/detection and gave guidelines for breast self-examinations. Workshop attendees learned that breast cancer is the most common cancer that women may face in their lifetime. It can occur at any age, but is more likely after age 40; however, the risk goes up as you get older. Some signs include a lump or mass, swelling of the breast, skin irritation or dimpling, pain in the breast or discharge from the nipple. Sister Wells included videos with facts on breast cancer in her presentation.

Sister Angelia Daniels, a member of St. John's Health Ministry and a nurse at Huntsville Hospital, was the guest presenter. She shared her personal breast cancer journey and spoke on how cancer is not a death sentence. She stated, "The best defense against cancer is early detection," Discovering cancer early before it spreads gives one the best chance to do something about it, and may save their life. She also expressed that African American women have lower incidence of breast cancer overall, but unlike any other race, are most likely to die from breast cancer. Many factors, from socioeconomic to heredity, are blamed for the treatment and outcomes for African American women. Lack of insurance, lower income and poor health are just a few examples. It is crucial that women faithfully perform monthly breast self-examinations, have a health care provider perform a clinical exam yearly and schedule regular mammograms.

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## Making the Transition to Medicare

If you are approaching age 65, this article can help you understand what you need to know to prepare for the transition to Medicare. The transition to Medicare can be scary, but it does not have to be. You just have to prepare for it in advance.

Medicare is a health insurance program run by the government to help people over age 65 and people with disabilities. Original Medicare includes all the services provided by the government—usually hospital and medical services—but there are also additional plans available through private health insurance companies.

Many people choose to purchase Medicare plan add-ons to meet all of their health care needs. Because of this, Medicare has been divided into four sections:

- Medicare Part A covers hospital services such as inpatient, hospice, skilled nursing facility and home health care.
- Medicare Part B covers medical services such as visits to your doctor, other outpatient treatment and medical supplies.
- Medicare Part C is the Medicare Advantage plan that allows you to get Medicare Parts A and B (and sometimes Part D) through a Medicare-approved private health insurance company.
- Medicare Part D covers prescription drugs.

#### What to do before your 65th birthday

- Pick an insurance company. Choose a company you trust to give you the coverage you need to add on to your Original Medicare.
- Decide which type of plan you want. Weigh the pros and cons of each plan to make sure you get the best coverage for you.
- Apply for Medicare at least three months in advance. The government charges a penalty to
  everyone who doesn't apply for coverage during their first eligibility period.

#### What types of plans are available?

- Medicare Advantage plans are the all-in-one option. Private companies contract with Medicare to provide all the Original Medicare benefits and sometimes additional health care services on top of that. When you need care, you only need to bring your plan ID card.
- Medigap Plans, or Medicare supplemental plans, fill in the gaps in your Original Medicare
  coverage. Medigap plans pay for deductibles, copayments and other benefits that Original
  Medicare doesn't cover. You'll need both your Medicare card and your Medigap ID card to
  receive care.
- 3. Prescription drug plans are an important addition to your Medicare plan. Most Medicare Advantage plans include prescription drug coverage, but some may not. If you choose a Medigap plan, you'll need to buy a separate prescription drug plan. You'll need to bring the ID card for that plan when you pick up your prescriptions.

#### How do Lenroll?

If you already receive Social Security, then you'll be automatically enrolled in Medicare Parts A and B. If you will not be automatically enrolled, you can apply at www.medicare.gov, visiting a local Social Security office or calling the Social Security Administration at 1-800-772-1213.

#### Beneficiaries Eligible for TRICARE and Medicare

If you are entitled to premium-free Medicare Part A, you must have Medicare Part B to keep TRI-CARE. Once you have both Part A and Part B, you automatically receive TRICARE benefits under TRICARE for Life. Keeping information in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS) up to date is key in ensuring effective, timely delivery of your TRICARE benefits.

You become eligible for Medicare Part A at age 65 if you or your spouse paid into Social Security for at least 40 quarters (at least ten years of work). Failure to file for Medicare benefits results in loss of TRICARE coverage.

If you already receive benefits from Social Security, the Railroad Retirement Board (RRB), or Office of Personnel Management, you are automatically entitled to Medicare Part A and are enrolled

St. John is on a prayer journey that includes a powerful sermon series on prayer as well as weekby bible study sessions that prepare the congregation to become a "people of prayer who pray without ceasing."

#### Sermon Series

"Prayer Positions" with text from Acts 9 -10 began the series. This sermon emphasized the spiritual positions of prayer, humility, honesty, and being open to others.

"Prayer Positions, Part 2 (Closet Work)" was based on scriptures from chapters 5 and 6 of Matthew and Romans 8. The key points focused on controlling the mind by being focused, having purpose, and yielding to God.

"Prayer Intentions" was centered on Matthew 6:5, 9 and Romans 15:17, 26. Prayer intentions noted were request, gratitude and empowerment.

"Prayer Intentions, Part 2" was from the text of Romans 8:15-17, 26 and highlighted the points of knowing who one is, repairing what is broken and releasing oneself to hope.

"When You Begin to Pray" was focused on John 16:20. With prayer, comes pain, but the pain of prayer has purpose. There will be transition (with pain), but expect power from God to make it through.

"Prayer that Restores Faith" was from Luke 18. The message was to "always pray and never give up or lose heart"

"Fighting for Your Heart" was also based on Luke 18. Worshippers were told to fight with the determination of the widow who would not give up until she received her blessing.

These are just snippets from a great sermon series. If you missed one of the messages or just want to hear them again, you may purchase a CD or DVD from the media ministry.

## Advent Begins the Christian Liturgical Year



ADVENT begins the Christian liturgical year on the Sunday closest to November 30. The season is four Sundays in duration. The Sundays are referred to as "Sundays in Advent".

The advent message comes from the two Latin words, <u>as venire</u>, which means "to come to". The message is that God, in Christ, is coming into the world. It includes all time.

In times past, God did come in the Christ-child in whose honor Christmas is celebrated. Thus, God supplies the fulfillment of the Old Testament prophets. In times present, the individual may experience God coming into their lives for the first time, "new birth," or in the renewal and growth into deeper dimensions of reality. In times to come, the return of the Christ in His full glory and power as judge of all the world, both the living and the dead, is promised.

The Advent wreath is a Christian tradition that symbolizes the four weeks of Advent It is usually an evergreen wreath with four candles and a fifth, white candle in the center. Beginning with the First Sunday of Advent, the lighting of a candle is accompanied by a Bible reading, a prayer and a song. The fifth candle, the Christian candle, is lit on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day. The observance is in family set-

tings and at public church services.

The liturgical color for Advent is purple. It is a color that communicates a feeling of quiet dignity, royalty, and repentance. Purple is the traditional color of a king's robe. Such a color is most expedient to announce the coming of the King of Kings.

The Christ coming brings hope of a new and abundant life to all.

in Medicare Part B starting the first day of the month you turn 65. (If your birthday is on the first of the month, Part A and Part B are effective on the first day of the previous month.)

If you aren't receiving Social Security benefits, RRB benefits, or a federal annuity from the Office of Personnel Management, you must sign-up for Part A and Part B. To avoid the Medicare surcharge for late enrollment, you must sign-up for Part B during your Medicare Initial Enrollment Period (seven-month period that begins three months before you turn 85, or four months before you turn 85 if your birthday is on the first of the month). To avoid a break in TRICARE coverage be sure to enroll no later than two months before you turn 85. If you enroll any later, your Part B effective date will be delayed and you will have a break in TRI-CARE coverage.

However, without Medicare Part B, you will not have TRICARE coverage. So, if you delay your Part B enrollment, you won't be covered by TRICARE for Life and TRICARE won't act as a second payer to your employer sponsored group health plan coverage. To have TRICARE coverage when your employer sponsored group health plan coverage ends, you should sign up for Part B before your group health plan coverage or employment ends, whichever occurs first, to avoid a break in coverage.

## Technology Tip

Who's using your Wi-Fi?

Have you ever been curious of who is using your WiFf? There are several reasons why you should know this. There can be issues when the connection is slow; caused by too many devices being connected or hackers that could be making their way to invade your network. There could also be legal issues involved if someone is using your WiFi for illegal activities. Whatever the case may be, it is always best to know who is using your WiFi. Let us take a look at a way to know who is using your WiFi.

You will first need to know the default address of your router. You can find this by using Google to search for your particular router specifications. There is a different way to do this if you are familiar with using a command prompt to run the ipconfig command on computers that use the Microsoft Windows operating system. If you are using a MAC, you can find the default address by navigating to the system preferences under your network settings. It will be listed next to router. You will need the address to enter in your browser. Once you have entered the address in your browser, you will be prompted to enter the credentials to login to your router. If you have not changed the default settings of your router, it should be a combination of "admin" and "password" or blank fields.

Once you have logged into your router's console, there will be a section for connected devices, wireless status or attached devices. This will allow you to see all the devices that are connected to your WiFi. If your WiFi is not password protected, you may see unknown devices that have been connecting to your WiFi. The best way to prevent this is to always create a password for your WiFi.

When creating the password, you will have the option of selecting WPA or WEP. You will want to use the WPA option due to the vulnerabilities of using WEP. Taking this simple step can prevent your Wi-Fi from being used by unauthorized devices.

Lesson Title: Worship Christ's Majesty

Lesson Scripture: Hebrews 1

Print: Hebrews 1:1-9

Devotional Songs: #111[], #108 [], and #113 [] Key Verse: "The Son is the radiance of God's glory and the exact representation of his being, sustaining all things by his powerful word." (Hebrews 1:3)

The fact that Christ is the radiance of God's glory connects Jesus with God in a unique way. God's glorious nature is made known through Christ as the exact representation of God's invisible being. When Jesus walked the earth, He was a physical representation of the invisible God; thus Jesus pointed the way to God. We can know about the unseen God by knowing Christ.

Christ was not only active in creating the universe He continues to be active in sustaining it All things have been created through Christ, and all things are now held together by His powerful word. Jesus is therefore not simply another great religious teacher or prophet. Those prophets spoke for God; Christ was God speaking. Such a special person is clearly able to do special things, two of which are noted in His ability to create and sustain the universe and His power to purge sin.

It is important to stress that His authority is not simply a result of His good works—He did not earn a high place with God by dying on a cross. That honor was already Christ's by His very nature, as the author of Hebrews proceeds to stress. Christ's authority is a function of His eternal birthright—He is greater than the angels not only because He did a greater work than they could do but also because He has inherited a superior name from His Father.

Lesson Title: Make a Joyful Noise
Lesson Scripture: Psalm 95
Print: Psalm 95:1-7a
Devotional Songs: #115[]; #106[]; and #122[]
Key Verse: "Come, let us sing for joy to the
Lord; let us shout aloud to the Rock of our salvation" (Psalm 95:1).

The Book of Psalms is devoted to the theme of

worship and praise. Psalm 95 provides an invitation to worship, a reason to worship and instruction on worship. There is a command to come to the Lord and to give Him praise. Praise is integral to worship. Praise should tell a song of joy, give testimony to the goodness, and encourage others to know Him.

The basic reason for praising God is that He is "a great King above all gods" as noted in verse 3 and He is worthy. He is the Creator, He sustains us, has dominion over all and is in control.

Whenever one comes into God's presence, it must be with thanksgiving and preparation to surrender all. God knows our hearts and will protect us just as a shepherd tends and protects his flock from dangers seen and unseen. Praise should be more than words, but an expression of faith and it should be lived out in faithfulness and trust.

The lesson text is part of a much larger story of Jesus' conception and birth in the first chapter of Luke as well as this second chapter. Luke we aves this story in with his account of John the Baptist's conception and birth. Both births were announced by an angel, accomplished by God's miraculous power, and accompanied by wonders that God performed. Both children were announced to be God's future instruments. But as Jesus was born against the backdrop of Roman imperial power, there was another who claimed glory. Caesar ruled much of the world and had ordered it to pay him taxes. 

This less on tells of an event that occurred after Jesus miraculously fed five thousand from a few loaves of bread and fishes which was reminiscent of manna in the wilderness in the days of Moses and the great exodus. In this lesson, Jesus had dismissed the crowd and commanded the disciples to get in a boat and proceed on a journey to Gennesaret without him. Jesus wanted to be alone in prayer.



# Pastor's Message

When There is No Room in the Inn: I Can't Breathe. Luke 2:7

Usually during the season of Advent, churches are focused on the Nativity, miraculous births, courageous wives/fiancées, wavering husbands/fiancées, praising shepherds, gift bearing wise men, jealous kings, God being with us, and the name of Jesus. We will decorate our sanctuaries in wonderful holiday ornamentation. We will put together programs where children recite speeches and scriptures focused on Christ's birth and where adults will present the same in dramatic form. Our worship services will be filled with music, dance, and sermons grounded in the blessedness of the Word being made flesh. This is what USUALLY happens at Advent.

However, this year a host of churches banded together on the third Sunday of Advent (December 14, 2014) to celebrate National Black Solidarity Sunday: Black Lives Matter. Calls to worship, prayers, affirmations, litanies, and sermons were created in these churches to lift up this theme. Parishioners were encouraged to wear all black or paraphernalia with the phrase—"Black Lives Matter."

This celebration comes as the result of the recent rash of police brutality against African American men and women. Two events that sparked the rise of attention and protests were two grand jury verdicts. Michael Brown — unarmed — was shot and killed by a police officer in Ferguson, MO, while his hands were upraised and he was saying, "D on't shoot!" Eric Garner was put in an illegal chokehold by a police officer in Staten Island, NY. As a result, he died repeating the phrase — "I can't breathe." In both cases, the grand juries determined that there was not enough evidence against these officers to take them to trial for wrongdoing.

Over the past few weeks, numerous cases — similar to these two incidents — have been uncovered which show an alarming regularity of police brutality against African American adults and children. Protesters have been marching through the streets of cities large and small. Some have been peaceful, and others have been more aggressive. Yet, they all recite the maintra — "Black Lives Matter."

Yes, St. John has participated as well. A call to worship and an affirmation of Black Life was created by Rev. Sheri Smith Clayborn and Sis. Ashley Humphrey. We dressed in Black and took pictures with our hands raised. We also encouraged economic empowerment by promoting those in our church who own their own business. We registered people to vote. We urged parents to take advantage of our free tutorial program for their children. For we know that we will need more than a march to address these atrocities. True transformation of our society will require a comprehensive plan that replaces the American prison industrial complex with institutions that actually reform criminals; reorders the justice system so that African Americans are not the sole target of police; and restructures our economic system so that all are able to live with dignity.

Even though this has been our focus during Advent, I find that these events parallel the gospel story. According to Matthew's account, the government went on a killing spree of children to wipe out little Jesus. According to Luke's version, there was no room for Jesus and his family in the inn because so many people were in town for the census. In both stories, the government had a system that (directly or indirectly) oppressed those on the margins. When we hear the chants of "hands up — don't shoot," we cannot help but think of the children that Herod's laugh-

tered in Matthew 2. When we hear chants of "I can't breathe," we are brought to the vivid image of Jesus having no place to be born.

We mourn the losses of those persons who have been killed or abused in this recent string of events. We even mourn those whose names that are not in the headlines. We pray strength for those families and communities, and we pray for our nation. We pray that God would transform us into a society of loving neighbors. We pray that God would help us to see the meaning of Advent!

The power of Advent is found in this idea: nothing can stop the will of God! It was God's will for Jesus to be born and to have life. No search and destroy mission and no overcrowding could stop the birth of Christ. Likewise, no rogue cop, no unjust legal system, no unfair economic practice, and no form of racial discrimination can stop God's plans related to God's African American daughters and sons. Whether it happens in our lifetime or in our children's lifetime — we will be the head and not the tail — above and not beneath — lenders and not borrowers!

When there is no room in the inn, God will provide a manger. Though the government sanctions a killing spree, God will make a way to get to Egypt. Yes, some things and some people may die, but the heart of who we are and our connection to God can never be destroyed. Jesus will be born — not just two thousand years ago — but right here and now! God's promises will be born. God's power will be born. God's word will be born. Racial harmony will be born. Justice for all will be born. Freedom for all will be born. Access to education for all will be born. Economic empowerment for all will be born. They will be born in AFRICAN AMERICANS! They will be born in us!! For God will be with us! If God be for us, who can be against us?

#### Christmas 2014: A Time for Personal Reflection

Introduction: As this 2014 Christmas season draws near, many will see this period as a time for being with friends and family, shopping, feasting on great food, and last but not least, aiding the needy and less fortunate. Many celebrations will begin such as "Hanukkah" and "Kwanzaa" leading up to New Year's Day 2015.

In contrast, researchers tell us that for many, Christmas is the most stressful time of the year. More people suffer depression, worry about finances and grieve over the disappointments in their lives during Christmas time than during any other season. If we would take the time to conduct a personal reflection back on the events that have occurred in 2014 within our own personal life, we must be thankful to God for His unchanging grace, His unexplainable goodness, and His enduring mercy. We have seen and experienced the distinction between "Kairos" and "chronos", Greek concepts for God's time, and man's time, respectively. Unfortunately, Christmas in our present day society is viewed as a time for receiving versus giving, often forgetting that a "true gift" cannot be earned or deserved. A "true gift" is given on the merits of the one "giving" the gift and not the one receiving.

Christmas should be a time of spiritual assessment and a reflection on the "birth of Jesus" and what that means to us individually, on a personal basis. As born again believers, we should have the same focus and message the angels had for the shepherds in Bethlehem over two thousand years ago. We should reflect on Luke 2; 10-11; "fear not, for behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born in the city of D avid a Savior, which is Christ the Lord." Isaiah's prophecy was fulfilled (Isaiah 9:6); "For unto us a Child is born, unto us a Son is given, and the government shall be upon his shoulder, and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, the Mighty God, the Everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace".

For some, this message is too simple to solve the complex problems we face today. Challenges such as the recent injustices seen in Ferguson, Missouri and New York City, as well as the countless other economic, political, and social inequalities encountered by the least, the lost, and the disenfranchised people of color within the United States of America. Many have resolved that the world is too dark or that times have become too hard. To the despondent, we offer these encouraging words from Jesus in John 10:10; "The thief comes to steal, kill, and to destroy, I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly". The abundant and blessed life that God has promised to believers is predicated upon having a committed and dedicated relationship with Him.

From a personal perspective, the birth of Jesus personified three words:

Sacrifice: John 3:16 states; "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life". Greatness depends upon a sacrifice. We know very little about personal sacrifice today. A true sacrifice is when you give up something you love or cherish. Christ was born to die as a sacrifice that we may live. God sent forth Christ as a substitute for our sins (Romans 3). We, too, must be a sacrifice if we are going to do a work for the Lord (Romans 12: 1-3). To sincerely and totally follow Christ, we must surrender ourselves to Him and this comes with a cost. The level of surrender and sacrifice determines the depth of the walk with God.

Love: In Deuteronomy 6: 5, God commands us to "love the Lord thy God, with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. Leviticus 19:18 admonishes us to "love thy neighbor as thyself, for I am the Lord". In John 15: 12-13, Jesus again commands us to, "love one another as I have loved you; greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends. Ye are my friends, IF ye do whats oever I command you." When we possess Godly love, we can believe we have whatsoever we say (Mark 11:23). All things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to H is purpose (Romans 8:28). Now is the time you can express love by giving a smile or a hug, send someone you do not normally reach out to a card, or make a call. Give and it shall be given unto you. Whatever we sow, that

The Reverend Smith Clayborn shared information on grief with the worshippers. She stated that the definition of grief is a strong, sometimes overwhelming, feeling of loss. A musical selection by the church ensemble preceded the meditation from Pastor Patrick Clayborn. The scripture back ground for the message was Psalm 120. He noted that in this short passage, there was past tense, or a statement on having been delivered at the beginning, and a few verses later a plea for needing more deliverance. #### 2015: New Year, New You!

How to Mean It When You Say It and Deliver on It This Year.

I have a personal quote, "Malking change is never as difficult as accepting change." It only takes a few days into January to realize you have either already BROKEN your New Year's resolution or you are not as committed to it as you THOUGHT you were. We are all a bit resistant to change because it can be hard and often - scary.

As we prepare to boldly bound into 2015 clutching our New Year's Resolutions in hand, I thought I would offer tools to help set you up to win in the area of personal development this coming year. After all, would not it be nice to mean it when you say it, and deliver on all your goals this year?

Just maybe, though, the problem is not laziness or lack of willpower. According to Harvard Graduate School of Education profess ors Robert Kegan and Lisa Lask ow Lahey, when we fail at a goal we have set for ourselves, it is likely that a type of psychological immune system is covertly at work, defending us from perceived threats. To arrive at lasting change, Kegan (who teaches Adult Development) and Lahey say you must dig deep to identify what may be in opposition to your goal. These hidden competing commitments are rooted in our individual world views and are represented through our 'big assumptions'—that is how we think things operate. Real change can only come as a result of us altering the way we think."

Kegan and Lahey lay out a process for overcoming these emotional obstacles in their book Immunity to Change: How to Overcome It and Unlock the Potential in Yourself and Your Organization, It is a four-column immunity map that helps you understand what feelings are at play and how you are sabotaging your efforts.

Before I share the link to a downloadable version of their immunity map. Let me point out, SOME of you are just not going to dig that deep and work toward understanding the resistance that keeps you from getting exactly what you want out of life. NO JUDGEMENT here, but it is ABSO-LUTELY imperative to be clear about your intent and resolve to take action! There's a joke that goes: If fifteen frogs are on a log and three decide to jump off in the water, how many frogs are on the log? The truth is fifteen frogs are still on the log. DECIDING to do something and ACTUALLY doing it are two entirely different things. For this reason, I simply want to offer another 'change agent' option to those of you who are not UP for quite an extensive self-excavating journey as the Imm unity to Change process will provide.

Try a Mini Quest.

I was employing this technique for years, and then heard Elizathe Guilbert, author of Eat, Pray, Love talk about it on Oprah's Super Soul Sunday program. Mini Quests, as she calls them, are goals through experiences you challenge yourself to partake in every day. Today, my mini quest was to make each person I came in contact feel loved and cherished. I did not quite succeed. Truth be told, I ended up working much longer than I was supposed to and missed a deadline on something because of the overtime—so the worry and frustration did start leaking out as the night wore on. I do not think anyone felt devalued or disrespected, but I did not leave everyone swimming in a lake of skittles and soft bunnies as I had hoped. My transparent share is to encourage you in knowing that change is a process and usually does NOT happen instantaneously nor overnight (Though I did go "cold turkey" on eating sugar at the beginning of December. Catch me in January to see how that journey goes.)

The great thing about Mini Quests is that they expire at the end of the day and you get to set out on a new one the very next morning. This is a goal-setting exercise that challenges you to live more fully and presently, and focus on things outside of yourself. It helps you find things around you for which you are grateful and helps you practice setting and meeting goals.

## Technology Tip

Protecting Your Identity

As we are now in the holiday season, many people will be shopping for gifts online or in a store. No matter how you choose to shop, there is always the risk that someone could access your private information. Your private information could include your security number, driver's license number or debitforedit card numbers. This article looks at some ways to protect your identity from being stolen.

Often, you will find emails in your inbox referring to clicking links that appear to be from a valid source, such as your bank or even a friend. When you are not sure if the email is safe, do not hesitate to call your bank or friend to verify the email. A large number of viruses are passed through suspicious links. Once the link is clicked, you may be asked to enter information such as your name and address. This could be the beginning of your personal information being sought. Again, before doing so, please validate the email by contacting the sender.

Another way to protect your identity is to never give your social security number to an unknown source. Sometimes you may receive a phone call from someone needing to verify information by asking for your social security number. Once you have given your social security number to an unknown source, you have just taken a risk of your identify being stolen. Never give your social security number to an unknown source.

The most widely used method of stealing identity is through debitoredit cards. Review bank/ credit card statements regularly, preferably once a week. Review charges and the location where the charge occurred. If you notice something that is not right about an ATM machine or a card terminal, do not use it. Be sure there are not any additional devices attached to the card terminal. If concerned that your personal information has been compromised, contact one the major credit bureaus to file a 90-day fraud alert.

Please take precaution regarding your identity, not only during the holiday season, but at all times.

Rich insights into the way to pray effectively are given in this lesson.

Jesus taught the disciples a model for prayer and perseverance in prayer. The Model Prayer is readily available for reading in the scriptures. The following are salient points from the text:

Jesus prayed in public and in private.

- Through prayer, we can tak directly with God and expect to personally hear from Him.
- The Model Prayer is a complete prayer in itself.
- 4. Praise opens the Model Prayer.
- 5. Where we pray does not matter.
- Content is important! God wants us to ask for His provisions, but He is not moved by repetition for the sake of repetition.
- 7. We must be consummate and continuous learners.

Prayer is the way believers communicate and form a personal relationship with God. The closeness of their relationship with God is directly proportional to the time they spend praying to Him.
