The call went out requesting gifts for kids in the community and St. John met the need. Thanks to the generosity and spirit of giving, many children, of all ages received gifts.








Showing appreciation to First Responders and medical personnel. A

The statue of the amazing educator and visionary, Dr. William Hooper Councill, had arrived and been installed. City officials, other dignitaries, and the sculptor were in attendance. The event was hosted by the William Hooper Councill Alumni Association members, and Chairperson, Mrs. Brenda Chunn. All had gathered to unveil and commemorate the statue.

Pastor Wright and members of St. John AME Church were present to witness the unveiling of the church's founder, Dr. Councill. Ms. Mariah Gullatte had been chosen to speak as a youth representative for the church. Ms. Gullatte spoke of her early experiences at St. John and having heard annually of Dr. Councill's accomplishments. She also spoke of young people her age, being the beneficiaries of Dr. Councill's legacy of educating one's self, building strong moral character through faith and Dr. Councill's aspiration for striving for excellence.

The park solidified Dr. Councill's impressive life in the Huntsville community. He is known for having established William Hooper Councill High School, in 1829, developing Alabama Agricultural & Mechanical University in 1875 and founding St. John African Methodist Episcopal Church in 1885. Historical markers stand on each site bearing witness to each of these outstanding accomplishments.

Community Engagement Prison Ministry Outreach at St. John AME Church

The Saint John AME Prison Ministry, partnering with the Women's Missionary Society (WMS) and Caregivers Ministry, provided Christmas holiday gifts to persons enrolled in the Alabama Parole and Probations - Day Reporting Center (DRC) post-release program. Due to COVID restrictions, a drive thru was set up at the Alabama Non-Violent Offenders Organization (ANVO) headquarters, located within the United Way building in Huntsville, Alabama. Lee Langston, ANVOO acting Director, and the ANVO staff presented gifts. The pandemic restrictions could not spoil a powerful ministry effort.

All praises be to God for a safe and blessing filled event. As Jesus says in the Gospel of Matthew 25:40, "Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you've also done it for me."

Persons in all three phases of the DRC program were eligible to receive blessings from God's representatives at St John.

DRC non-residential, three-phase program offers medium and high -risk probationers and parolees in the greater Huntsville area ac-

cess to services, including targeted drug treatment, substance abuse intervention and rehabilitation, cognitive behavioral therapy, educational training, assistance with employment and access to spiritual development and growth. The program requires participants to perform community service, while fostering opportunities for participants to positively transform criminal attitudes, behaviors, values and beliefs.

The program, started in 2016 via a \$687,176 grant issued by the Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance, is funded annually.

The DRC is an evidence-based program, modeled after the State of Georgia's network of DRCs serving both urban and rural areas of the state. Alabama's goal is to expand the program into a network of centers strategically placed to serve those areas of the state that would receive the most benefit. Birmingham, Montgomery, and Mobile also host DRC services.

COVID-19 and Your Taxes

The year 2020 presented a myriad of challenges, with the COVID-19 pandemic taking center-stage, impacting families around the world. For many families, COVID-19 restrictions, subsequent illness and effects, have placed an incredible strain on finances and tremendous stress on families. Notwithstanding the current stress that COVID has added to the finances of those persons affected, there is a distinct possibility that future medical and health traumas will be seen these same families when the scale of the pandemic is fully realized. With so little still known about the long-term impact of the Coronavirus on one's health, having a firm understanding of COVID financial implications, prioritizing spending, and using resources efficiently will be key to your financial stability.

From an economic standpoint, COVID-19 is having an enormous influence on the US Economy, even if it is not felt yet by everyone's household budgets. From the cancellation of religious gatherings, music and fine arts events, sporting events, as well as the closing of travel between the US and other countries, business as usual has been severely disrupted.

As a result of the pandemic, many employees, to include those in professional services, government contracting, acquisition and logistics, education fields - collegiate level down thru elementary education, have gotten use to teleworking. As a result, there may be secondary tax implications that need to be addressed. Let's look at some areas of interest.



Teleworking: For the most part, an employee will pay taxes on income earned in the state they permanently reside and the state where they work. However, with so many companies sending employees' home to work to prevent the spread of the novel coronavirus, it's possible many workers may end up paying taxes to two jurisdictions. This could happen if you've moved, even temporarily, but your income is still derived from work done for a company located elsewhere.

Unless you instruct your employer to withhold taxes for the appropriate states, you could get an unexpected tax bill, says Eileen Sherr, senior manager for tax policy and advocacy for the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants (AICPA). Working even one day in another state could trigger tax att on, Sherr said.

According the AICPA website, 16 states have reciprocity agreements with neighboring jurisdictions that exempt residents of a reciprocity state from income tax withholding. Most states will allow a taxpayer to apply for a credit for income taxes paid to another state. On its website, the AICPA has a state tax guidance chart for the pandemic.

Unemployment: Person X collects \$300 a week in unemployment benefits, <u>after</u> federal and state taxes. To make it more clear for the reader, unemployment benefits are taxed. Whether they should be is another story for another article. This writer's opinion is that taxation should be deferred or eliminated if another CARES Act or COVID strimulus bill is passed. Simply put, we've plenty of evidence



illustrating large corporations (or those with significant wealth) using the stimulus to their tax advantage. Eliminating federal or state taxes on stimulus payments or benefits is a measure that would level the playing field, while also putting much needed money back into the pockets of those in most need.

What you need to know: States are required to inform all new claimants of their responsibility to pay income tax on their unemployment benefits. Stall, and understandably so, many people stressed by their financial situation may not realize they have to elect to have taxes withheld or file estimated quarterly tax payments.

Why now? Up until 1979, unemployment benefits were tax-free. But the Revenue Act of 1978 set a threshold at which unemployment compensation would be taxed. Benefits were taxable only for single tax filers whose adjusted gross income exceeded \$20,000, or \$25,000 for joint filers.

There have been moments in our countries history where taxes were waived on unemployment benefits. As an example, for tax year 2009, the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act excluded the first \$2,400 in unemployment benefits from income taxes. With the economy in shambles, this tax release paid dividend for millions of Americans caught up in the massive economic downturn of 2008-2009.

Payroll Tax: For starters, I use the phrase, "What the government giveth, the government can taketh away". In the first few months of 2021, millions of workers could see a significant pay cut as companies recoup the coronavirus-related tax



break Trump authorized in an executive order signed Aug. 8. For armed-services members, the pandemic relief effort last year led to a temporary pause in collecting Social Security tax on military pay. As a result, in August 2020, the Defense Finance and Accounting Service stopped a 6.2% payroll deduction, providing a small financial boost.

The relief effort expired at the end of December 2020. Without intervention from Congress, beginning with January 2021 paychecks, the 6.2% Social Security deduction returns, and a process begins to collect the taxes that weren't paid in 2020. For service members, the collection will be spread over 12 months. For federal civilians, collections will be made in eight installments.

Home Office Deduction: Yes, you're working from your bedroom, but no, you can't take a home office deduction. Employees are not eligible to claim the home office deduction, even if an employer requires remote work because of COVID-19. The Tax Cuts and Jobs Act passed in 2017 eliminated employee business expenses on Schedule A. Independent contractors and the self-employed can still take a home office deduction.

Refund of 529 Fund: Concerned about the spread of the coronavirus, colleges have reversed housing decisions and have sent students home. But if you used money from a 529 college savings plan to cover the cost of housing and food, you'll need to put the money back to avoid paying income tax and a 10 percent penalty on the earnings.

A 529 plan allows contributions to grow tax-free. Here's the issue for fall education expenses: You can't keep the money; otherwise, it's considered a non-qualified distribution. Furthermore, you can't hold on to the money you took out this year to cover 2021 expenses. Distributions from a 529 plan need to match up with qualified expenses incurred during the same tax year. An account holder has just 60 days from the date of the refund to return the money to the 529 account without incurring taxes and the 10 percent penalty on earnings.

Additional Stimulus: With a second round of COVID relief stimulus underway, persons should be aware of the tax implications and expenses incurred, i.e. taxes. The is an old saying, "no good deed goes unpunished". As such, even the



best (or most responsible) of efforts from the 2020 Congress related to COVID relief arrives with a glaring wart. The new Presidential administration is also pledging added stimulus, likely with the same defects attached as related to taxability. Be aware of these consequences when preparing your 2020 Federal, State, and Local taxes. Shalom!



New Year's Resolve - New Attitude Towards Your Finances

So, it's the new year and with it comes the traditional New Years Resolutions. If you are like this author, perhaps a list of dues and don'ts has been published on the front of your refrigerator, on your cellphone, or on post-it notes in your office or vehicle describing what your resolution entails. A common theme when the calendar turns to the new year is to spend less, save more, and create, then stick to a weekly, monthly or annual budget. If these are parts of your resolution, here are some tried and true approaches to define a financial resolution, create and manage a budget, and reduce or eliminate the shock to your financial system.



Try a new name: Instead of calling it a resolution, call it a goal. Resolutions at the beginning of the new year most always fail. Why? We lack resolve. We

can't see the end game. After a few days or weeks of attention the usual grind of the work week, or the temptation to spend more, overwhelm the process. In addition, try naming your goal a specific outcome.

Just as the church is specific in establishing a budget for a building plan, the saver should identify what the desired outcome is. This approach may change a person's entire outlook. If the savings goal is to finance a new car, save for a child's college education, or take a trip to a destination of your dreams, name your goal after it. How about calling it "Hawaii Getaway" or "2021 Chevy Silverado." Being more descriptive adds a level of ownership and creates a target to shoot for, more so than the simple math or calculations.

Create a useful tracking document: In order to effectively track your expenditures, create a tracking file or download a file using your online software applications. If you prefer writing each expense down, a hard copy located near your filing station will suffice. If you are tech-savvy, applications such as Microsoft Excel or Google Docs will provide you useful templates that may be prefilled with most of the expenditures one would normally encounter.



Have fun with it! If you love a good competition, compete with yourself. Find ways to have a little extra money at the end of the month.
When you beat the budget and exceed your monthly savings goal you
present yourself a small opportunity to indulge. Say you beat your savings goal by S50 this month. A simple reward may be a \$20 meal at your
favorite restaurant or a new gadget from the electronics store. Again,
the goal is to hit your savings target, while also being able to treat yourself a bit after the goal has been attained. This simple indulging doesn't
take you off track. It's a reward for exceeding the plan.

Be realistic: If you plan on stricking to your budget, take a look at your historical data for each line-item expenditure. Try collecting data for a minimum of three years if possible. Identify trends such as the months

with the highest and lowest utility costs. Factoring in the high and low points of your expenditures provides a level of realism each month. Remember, the goal is to save a specific amount, but it doesn't have to be the same amount each month. Factor in months where you can save more due to a low utility cost or offset the high spend month thru savings in other categories.

Creating a budget shouldn't feel like rocket science. The four tips above provide an easy to execute framework that will move the savvy saver in a better financial position and more long-term financial security. Happy Savings!

Church School Lesson Overview - February 2021

February 1, 2021

Lesson Title: Call to Evangelize

Lesson Scripture: John 1:37-51; 4:25-42

Print: John 4:25-42

Devotional Songs: #221[], #258], and #243[]

Key Verse: Many Samaritans from that city believed in him because of the woman's testimony, "He told me everything I

have ever done." John 4:39 (NRSV)

In earlier verses of chapter 4 a conversation between Jesus and a Samaritan woman is in progress. The setting where the conversation takes place is at the well of Jacob. Here the woman has several things revealed to her. She is introduced to the concept of living water, she is made aware that one may worship God anywhere (in spirit and truth) versus on a mountain (Samaritan belief) or in Jerusalem's temple (Jewish belief), she is told of her past and present living arrangements and; she is also made aware that Jesus is the promised Messiah spoken of by the prophets. With all of this newly digested information, the Samaritan woman is full and takes the opportunity to return to her city to let others know of the encounter (an act of evangelizing).

While the woman is finishing her conversation with Jesus and before returning to the city, the disciples, returning from gathering food ask Jesus what is he doing talking with the woman and asks if he is hungry. He replies that the work that he was sent to do provides his daily nourishment. He indicates that a gathering will soon take place where there will be many seeking the salvation promised to the Jews and indicates that even though the disciples were not part of sowing in this effort, they will be part and experience a great harvest of souls for God. And as foretold, the crowd from the city comes to where Jesus is located not that some did not believe the woman but because some knew the scriptures and wanted to learn more first hand. Jesus spends several days evangelizing to the crowd and many are saved.

February 14, 2021

Lesson Title: Mary Magdalene: A Faithful Disciple Lesson Scripture: Mark 15:40; 16:1-9; Luke 8:1-3;

John 20:10-18

Lesson Print: Luke 8:1-3; Mark 15:40; John 20:10-18

Devotional Songs: #215[]; #251[]; and #243[]

Key Verse: The twelve were with him, as well as some women who had been cured of evil spirits. Luke 8:1-2 (NRSV) This lesson highlights the work behind the scene of women supporting the ministry of Jesus. It is noted that the women who usually supported from afar providing food and money to sustain Jesus and his disciples. And this lesson highlights one particular woman's love, devotion and dedication to Jesus. It is noted that Jesus drove out seven evil spirit from this woman, Mary Magdalene.

Mary Magdalene's love, devotion and dedication are further evident at the scene of Jesus' tomb when she discovers that Jesus is no longer inside. She is understandably upset even after the angels attempts to communicate that Jesus has risen but she then turns away and speaks to who she believes is the caretaker. Again, Jesus asks her why is she weeping and again she responds the same. Jesus then calls her by her name which brings her out of her grief and she immediately recognizes Jesus' voice and like most human seeking comfort wants to embrace Jesus. Jesus also immediately understands Mary's intentions and stops her by saying, " do not touch me for I have not ascended to heaven." According to the Life Application Study Bible commentary, Jesus knew that he had to ascend to heaven in order for the holy spirit to come (fulfilling scripture). Jesus then gives Mary instructions to go and tell the disciples what she has witnessed.

February 21, 2021

Paul has come to Corinth and he meets a couple, Aquila and Priscilla, who had just arrived from Italy because Claudius (Emperor of Rome) commanded that all Jews leave Rome. Paul and the couple decide to live and work together, both Paul and Aquila are both tent makers. It is noted that after a considerable amount of time spent with the believers at Corinth, Paul decides it's time to leave Corinth. Paul and the couple sails to Syria.

Upon arrival in the city of Ephesus, Paul separates from the

Key Verse: When (Lydia) and her household were baptized, she urged us, saying, "If you have judged me to be faithful to the Lord, come and stay at my home." And she prevailed upon us. Acts 16:15 (NRSV)

In Paul's continued travels to spread Christianity, he stops in the city of Philippi. And on the Sabbath, Paul and company decided to find a place of prayer outside the city near the river. Amongst the women worshipping there was one worshipper of God named Lydia. In the lesson text, Lydia is described as being from the city of Thyatira and a dealer of purple cloth. Research indicates that purple fabric during that time period was reserved for royalty, meaning that Lydia had some wealth because of the expense to make or dye fabric purple and to whom she sold her fabric. While Paul was talking, God opened Lydia's heart and she listened eagerly. In fact, she was so overwhelmed, that she and her whole household was baptized by Paul.

Lydia as a newly convert wanted to do something for Paul to show her appreciation, she indicated that if haul had judged her as being faithful to the Lord, she prevailed Paul to come stay at her home. Paul later accepts Lydia's offer after being released from prison and while staying with Lydia, Paul was able to meet and encourage many believers (both male and female).

In this series of lesson reviews, the common theme is that God's plan sometimes goes against what is consider normal.

In the above four lessons, the God-spirit interacts with the women of that hime to continue God's work of spreading the good news. As Paul concludes in this lesson, he states, "__ not many of you were wise by human standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth __ sometimes God uses the foolish to shame the wise and He uses the low-ly and despised in the world to reduce to nothing the things that are."

Bishop Richard Allen February 14, 1760-March 26, 1831



Richard Allen was a minister, educator, writer, and one of America's most active and influential Black leaders in 1794, he founded the African Methodist Episcopal Church, the first independent Black denomination in the United States He opened his first AME church in 1794 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. It is with pride that we celebrate 227 years of the founding of African Methodism.

St. John AME Church, Huntsville joined 2.5 million African Methodist Episcopal Church members, across live continents, twenty-three countries, and twenty episcopal districts in celebrating the birthday of the founder, Bishop Richard Allen on February 14th.

2021 BLACK HISTORY THEME: THE BLACK FAMILY: Representation, Identity, and Diversity


The black family has been a topic of study in many disciplines—history, literature, the visual arts and film studies, sociology, anthropology, and social policy. Its representation, identity, and diversity have been reverenced, stereotyped, and vilified from the days of slavery to our own time. The black family knows no single location, since family reunions and genetic-ancestry searches testify to the spread of family members across states, nations, and continents. Not only are individual black families diasporic, but Africa and the diaspora itself have been long portrayed as the black family at large. While the role of the black family has been described by some as a microcosm of the entire race, its complexity as the "foundation" of African American life and history can be seen in numerous debates over how



to represent its meaning and typicality from a historical perspective—as slave or free, as patriarchal or matriarchal/ matrifocal, as single-headed or dual-headed household, as extended or nuclear, as fictive kin or blood lineage, as legal or common law, and as black or interracial, etc. Variation appears, as well, in discussions on the nature and impact of parenting, childhood, marriage, gender norms, sexuality, and incarceration. The family offers a rich tapestry of images for exploring the African American past and present.



Founder's Day Observance Focused on Overcoming Hindrances

On Sunday, February 14, 2021, St. John held its first virtual Founder's Day observance. For almost one year St. John has faced the COVID-19 pandemic and in the process established that worship / The Church, is not confined within the walls of any building. In many ways this could be viewed as a fitting tribute to the founder of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, Richard Allen.

The 10 a.m. worship service combined commemoration of the founding of the AME church and black history. The Reverend Charles Glover
served as worship leader and offered prayer. Steward Marcus Hill read
scripture from Romans 8:35-29. The St. John Praise Team and musicians, led by Brother Reggie Pearson, provided inspirational ministry
through music. St. John youth, Anthony and Jessica Harbin, highlighted the lives of Founder, Richard Allen and his wife, Sarah Allen. This
served the combined purpose of educating, or reminding many, regardingthe courage, persistence, and selflessness involved in founding and
sustaining the church during challenging times.





The sermon focused on the importance of overcoming "hindrances" of any sort, whether in one's everyday life or spiritual life. Pastor Wright cited examples of Richard Allen's tenacity in purchasing his and his brother's freedom and subsequently walking out of St. George's church when he and others were not allowed to pray at the altar, due to their race. Allen led others in walking out of that church and developing a church out of a sense of social justice which was the foundation and the legacy of Allen and the AME Church.

Pastor Wright emphasized the importance that believers not be distracted by hindrances/situations that would discourage or interfere with efforts to achieve their goals. He highlighted two points. First, Don't Bock Up. He warned that by doing so, one can lose time, due to hate, negativity, associating with the wrong crowd, sin, among other factors. Secondly, Don't Bock Down. He urged those listening to have courage and refuse to back down despite hindrances such as fear of what others might say, or being 'shut out' by others. Rather, believers should "have courage and refuse to back down". Pastor Wright noted the words of the hymn, "God Will Take Care of You". Again, he referred to the great example of the founder of the AME Church, whose "story tells us to take a stand".

Pastor Wright stated that "We must resolve that we will not be side-tracked on our journey to the Kingdom of God". He returned to the question in the text, "What is hindering you?" He offered reminders and encouragement from scriptures and songs: "The Lord Will Make a Way Somehow... Weeping endures for a night but joy comes in the morning...! won't be stopped... Guide me o Thou Great Jehovah... God promises to never leave or forsake you...!" pressing on ..." Certainly, these words can inspire actions that makes believers "Unstoppoble".

With God, it is possible to be unstoppable. Whether it is overcoming slavery, prejudice; founding and leading an historic church/denomination that is known for advocating for social justice and tending to those who were critically ill; and laying the foundation for a time of perseverance in the midst of a present-day pandemic. The Church has expanded beyond the walls of any building—Unstoppable.

Health & Wellness The COVID-19 Vaccine and What We Should Know

Come this March 2021, St. John members will have been out of the church for one full year due to the COVID-19 Virus. No one would have imagined this time last year that the world would have been so devastated by this virus in the way that it has been. Schools-closed, jobs-gone, and restaurant dinning, a thing of the past. Vacationing, cruising, attending sporting events-not in this day and time. Sickness and hospitalizations on the rise in every state. Deaths, tragic loss of life, 500,071 in the United States alone. This virus has touched every aspect of life as we knew it prior to March 2020. Everyone has been told to "mask up," social distance, wash their hands frequently, and shelter in place. The demand for Clorox Bleach, Lysol Spray and hand sanitizer was in-



credible. And the only hope, second only to prayer, was the development and mass-production of an effective vaccine.

The former presidential administration having arrived late to the party, finally initiated "Operation Warp Speed," on May 15, 2020. It was to be a program designed to accelerate development, production, and distribution of an effective vaccine. The world listened attentively to every word uttered by Dr. Anthony S. Fauci, M.D., Director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, as he spoke explicitly regarding the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) regulations and guidelines to curb the spread of the virus.

Six companies had been assigned the task of developing the vaccines; (1) Nova, (2) Astra Zeneca; (3) Johnson & Johnson; (4) Sanofi and Glaxo Smith Kline; (5) Moderna, and (Pfizer-BioNTech). Then, on December 14, 2020, the first Coronavirus vaccine shots were given in New York City. As more vaccine was developed, states began receiving shipments.

Currently only two of the six are authorized COVID-19 vaccines. Vaccines from Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna have both received Emergency Use Authorization from the Food and Drug Administration for use in the U.S., meaning they can be made available to the public during the pandemic.

All FDA-authorized COVID-19 vaccines are covered at no additional cost during the public health emergency. Coverage applies no matter where the vaccine received, including both in-network and out-of-network providers, and includes instances in which two vaccine doses are required.

Due to limited supply, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has recommended that the vaccine be distributed in phases, beginning with the most at-risk. CDC recommendations beginning January 1, 2021:

Phase 1a includes healthcare workers and residents of nursing homes and other long-term care facilities.

Phase 1b includes frontline essential workers such as firetighters, police officers, correction officers, food and agricultural workers, U.S. Postal Service workers, public transit workers, grocery store workers, manufacturing workers and those who work in the educational sector (teachers, support staff, and daycare workers). Phase 1b also includes people age 75 and older.

Phase 1c includes people age 65-74 years old. Phase 1c also includes people age 16-64 years with underlying medical conditions, and other essential workers, such as those who work in transportation, logistics, food service, housing construction, finance; information technology, communications, energy, law, media, public safety, and public health.

Although the availability of the vaccine has been ramped up and more distribution cites are beginning to open, it is imperative that the public continue to adhere to the CDC regulations of wearing a mask at all times, social distancing and frequent

Senior Rx

The overall purpose of the Senior Rx program is to provide prescription drug assistance to persons 55 years of age and older by helping older adults receive free prescription drugs from pharmaceutical manufacturers. The Senior Rx program relies on the guidelines set forth by the pharmaceutical companies providing the drugs.

TARCOG contracts with the County Commissions in each of the TARCOG countries to implement this program. Senior Rx clients, or their family members or representatives, must make an appointment with the respective county Senior Rx office to file for medication assistance. Madison County Senior Rx Program contact number is 256-532-3345, physical address is 819 Cook Ave. Suite 137 Huntsville, Alabama, 35801

Eligibility

To qualify for our help in applying for no or low cost prescription drugs through programs offered by pharmaceutical companies, you must meet the following criteria:

Be a legal resident of the state of Alabama and apply in your legal county of residence. For seniors __

- Be 55 years of age or older.
- Have at least one chronic medical condition and taking daily medication for the condition.
- Have an income at 200% of the poverty level (Some pharmaceutical companies allow higher incomes, so please come in for an evaluation even if you feel your income may be too high.)
- Have no prescription drug coverage or insufficient drug coverage.
- Have a Medicare Part D plan but are in the coverage gap for services (donut hole) -or- have a Medicare Part D plan that
 does not cover your drugs.



Madame Vice President of the United States Namala Harris

Madam Vice President, Kamala Harris

Kamala Harris was born October 20, 1964, to a Black Stanford University professor and a Tamil Indian physician mother. In August 2020, Harris became the first Black woman, the first person of Indian descent, and the fourth woman in U.S. history to be selected for a presidential ticket by a major party, when she accepted the vice-presidential nomination with Democrat Joe Biden. In November 2020, Harris was elected as vice president, for a term beginning on January 20, 2021.

Harris was also the first California attorney general with Black or South Asian ancestry after defeating Republican rival Steve Cooley in the 2010 election for the position. Harris, formerly San Francisco's district attorney, was also the first woman to serve in the role. Kamala Harris sought the Democratic presidential nomination, announcing her intention on Martin Luther King, Jr. Day 2019, but dropped out of the primary race in December 2019.

Vice President Harris is a graduate of Howard University and a member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. She is married to Mr. Douglas Emhoff and they have two adult children.

General (Retired) Lloyd J. Austin, Secretary of Defense

General (Retired) Lloyd J. Austrin, III is the First African American to serve as the U.S. Secretary of Defense. He is the 28th Secretary of Defense. He was sworn in on January 22, 2021. He leads the Department of Defense, which is the largest employer in the world, comprised of over 2.1 million service members and civilians. The Secretary of Defense oversees the Defense Department and acts as the principle defense policy maker and advisor. He is a West Point graduate. He served 41 years in the military and retired as a 4 Star Army general. His last assignment was the Commander of U.S. Central Command.

March 7, 2021

Lesson Title: Prophet of Deliverance

Lesson Scripture: Exodus 12:28-50; Deuteronomy 18:15-22

Print: Deuteronomy 18:15-22

Devotional Songs: #323[], #258], and #243[]

Key Verse: "The LORD your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among you, from your fellow Israelites.

You must listen to him" (Deuteronomy 18:15).

This week's lesson comes from Deuteronomy 18 and is a highpoint of a block of instructions about many leadership posts that give guidance to God's people. The directives for a king when read provides a sense of the differences between a king in Israel compared to those kings who ruled over other nations.

The start of a new lesson and new quarter looks at "Prophets Faithful to God's Covenant." Christians often think of the prophetic book when they think of the prophets where things are divided into five Major Prophets books and twelve Minor Prophets books. Besides these prophets there were many others.

Deuteronomy ends with the statement that since it was written, "no prophet has risen in Israel like Moses, whom the Lord knew face to face".

March 14, 2021

Lesson Title: Prophet of Conquest Lesson Scripture: Joshua 5:13-6:27

Print: Joshua 5:13-15

Devotional Songs: #414[]; #251[]; and #243[]

Key Verse: "The LORD said to Joshua, 'See, I have delivered Jericho into your hands, along with its king and its fighting men" (Joshua 6:2).

In this week's lesson Joshua, the leader of the Israelites, got a message from the Lord about the winning of the promised land.

We normally do not think of Joshua as being a prophet, as that is overshadowed by his role as a military commander. His actions with the sword are remembered much more than his proclamations of God's messages to the Israelites.

The early Prophets are very different from the later Prophets like Isaiah or Hosea. Those among the early Prophets are concerned with God's guiding the people through His chosen leaders. Joshua was the first among these leaders followed by the judges.

March 21, 2021

Lesson Title: Prophet of Wisdom Lesson Scripture: 2 Kings 22 Print: 2 Kings 22:14-20

Devotional Songs: #77]; #272[]; and #243[]

Key Verse: "Because your heart was responsive and you humbled yourself before the LORD when you heard what I have spoken against this place and its people—that they would become a curse and be laid waste—and because you tore your robes and wept in my presence, I also have heard you, declares the LORD" (2 Kings 22:19).

This lesson looks at events that happened in the days of Josiah, king of the southern kingdom Judah who reigned 640-609 BC. He is described as a godly king and is known for his endless attempts to purify Judah's worship and the temple.

Josiah ordered that the temple be renovated. In the process of the renovation the Book of the Law was found within the temple. The book had been lost previously during the wicked reigns of Manasseh and Amon years earlier. The commentary speculates that in order to hide the guilt of their own abandonment of religious belief the idolatrous priests intentionally "misplaced" it.

March 28, 2021

Lesson Title: Prophet of Courage

Lesson Scripture: 1 Kings 18-19; Matthew 17:1-13

Print: 1 Kings 18:5-18

Devotional Songs: #412[]; #321[]; and #243[]

Key Verse: "I have not made trouble for Israel, Elijah replied. But you and your father's family have. You have abandoned the LORD's commands and have followed the Baals." (1 Kings 18:18).

This week's lesson highlights Elijah, whom God used to confront Ahab (a wicked king of Israel) and Jezebel (his ruthless wife). Elijah is the man with mettle who God had chosen, because the situation called for someone who would not back down to defiance of Israel'strue God.


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Lenten Season: A Time for Growth

Starting on Ash Wednesday and extending through Easter Sunday, Christians around the world use the Lenten Season as time to honor Jesus Christ through acts of elimination, i.e. removing something of personal value from their daily lives. These active displays of sacrifice underscore a commitment to Jesus Christ. As an alternative, some Christians choose to add things to their lives such as acts of kindness or volunteerism instead of fasting or giving up something of value. No matter the choice, these acts of kindness, sacrifice, or giving are more than respectable and highly commendable. They are necessary in respecting and honoring the significance of the season.

That being said, the season of Lent is more than just acts of sacrifice or obedience. The Lenten Season is a time for personal and spiritual growth. During the 40-day Lenten period, Christians should consider taking on a personal challenge and use this time to reflect inwardly, even as they look to the examples of Jesus. Designating this time for improvement and growth in all facets of life, to include spiritual, mental, emotional, tinancial, and physical well-being, is essential for personal and Christian growth.

Lenten season can be a time to reflect upon personal values and morals, of seeking ways to improve relationships and for addressing fears or anxieties that may be debilitating factors in our Christian walk. As God provides the believer with ample portions of grace and mercy each day, reflecting on the goodness of God each day of Lent aids in establishing a habit of seeking God continually, enhances prayer life, enables better study of God's Word and allows for deeper meditating on Godly principles and scripture. What are some things a believer should consider adding to their lives during Lent? Here are some recommendations.

Spiritual: As indicated earlier, a renewed commitment to reading God's Word is a great place to focus for enhancing spiritual; all growth. Adding extra time each day to study and reflect on scripture will go a long way towards setting a new personal standard. Expanding our prayer lives is also an area, being more deliberate in praying for others instead of ourselves.

Mental: Focusing on improvement intellectually through reading or viewing of material specifically targeting deficiencies that hinder one's daily walk. Also, focusing on improvement in areas that support ministry growth and effectiveness warrants consideration. Things that bring a person more confidence in leadership are also of interest.

Emotional: Taking time during Lent to discover ways to better manage emotions could be considered a welcome addition to Lenten activities. Being more patient or tolerant, specifically when the situation requires a dose of both, requires more emotional stability.

Financial: Are you a tither? Do you have a desire to give more? Are you looking to save more? During Lent, try increasing your giving each week. It may be only a few dollars each period, but it is not the amount, it is the commitment to be better. Try giving a bit more and saving a bit more. If choosing to give up that daily cup of Joe during Lent, try routing those savings into the offering plate or a savings account.

Physically: When was the last time a good stretch was part of the daily routine? Walking a mile? Riding a bicycle? During Lent, commit to a daily physical activity where there is the opportunity to look out in wonder at all God has created. No matter one's physical abilities, there are always areas that can be improved.

If fasting is not an activity which can be sustained over the 40-day period of Lent, consider adding a new challenge which will provide spiritual, mental, emotional, financial, or physical growth on this Lenten journey. Enjoy the season!

St. John African Methodist Episcopal Church Celebrating 136 Years of Worship

The History of St. John AME Church

And I say also unto thee, that thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church," Matthew 16:18

St. John African Methodist Episcopal Church is in the South Birmingham-Huntsville-Bessemer District of the Northwest Alabama Conference of the Ninth Episcopal District of the African Methodist Church.

The African Methodist Episcopal Church was the first major religious institution for African Americans. The church was founded by Bishop Richard Allen in 1787 in Philadelphia. The church began as a protest against racial injustice to worshipers of African descent at St. George's Methodist Church. The first organization was known as the Free African Society. In 1816, the church held its first General Conference and elected Richard Allen the first Bishop. Today the church has millions of members and twenty Episcopal Districts in North and South America, England, and Africa.

The Ninth Episcopal District consists of the state of Alabama and the presiding bishop is The Right Reverend Harry L. Seawright. The Ninth District was originally the Seventh Episcopal District. It was officially formed at the General Conference of the AME Church in 1868. Bishop John W. Brown was assigned as the first bishop. Between 1868 and 1920 the district was geographically recognized several times and at different times Alabama was attached with Florida, Georgia and South Carolina. In 1920, Alabama became the Ninth District. Currently the district has five conferences.

Bishop Henry McNeil Tumer organized the North Alabama Conference, beginning with St. Paul A.M.E. Church in Florence, AL, in 1878, currently known as Greater St. Paul A.M.E. Church. The North and West Alabama Conferences

were combined and the Presiding Elder Districts realigned under the leadership of Bishop James L Davis. St. John is in the South Birmingham-Huntsville-Bessemer District of this conference. The current Presiding Elder is Reverend Albert Hyche.



Dr. William Hooper Councill, FounderofSt. John AME Church

St. John Huntsville was organized by Dr. William Hooper Councill and others in 1885. The first church services were held in a barber shop on the corner of Miller and West Holmes Streets. Dr. Councill was ordained an elder in the A.M.E. Church. In addition to organizing St. John and serving as the first Pastor, Dr. Council was the founder and one of the most distinguished presidents of Alabama Agricultural and Mechanical University. In 1990 the first church building was erected on Church Street. Ministers serving St. John besides Dr. Councill included Reverends Patterson, Shelton, Goodlow, Todd, Brooks, Newell, Evans, Hill, Brice, Douglas, Cook, Thompson, Scott, Oliver, Woods, Lamar, White, Hughes, Howard, Stone, Dennis, Fox, Hereford, McCall and Clayborn. St. John's current minister is the Reverend Maurice Wright, II.

In 1971 the church moved into a newly erected facility at 229 Church Street. From this strategic location at the corner of downtown Huntsville, St. John opened its doors to the community. The many civic and cultural events hosted by St. John included NAACP meetings and programs, inaugural prayer service for the President of the City Council of Huntsville, graduation for the Phoenix Program, Greater Huntsville Interdenominational Ministerial Spouses Association services, voter registration, Alabama Democratic Conference meetings, Race Unity Programs, and the origination point for the NAACP Annual Martin Luther King Jr. March.

St. John continues to have a strong affiliation with Alabama A&M University through its members, outreach to students and financial support. Transportation is available for students who desire to attend worship. Five of the eleven presidents of Alabama A&M University have been members of St. John; the founder and first president, Dr. William Hooper Council, the eighth president Dr. David B. Henson, the ninth president, Dr. John T. Gibson, Sr., and the eleventh president, Dr. Andrew Hugine, Jr.

St. John has active ministries for members and the community. The church purchased 53 acres of land in northwest Huntsville in 2008 and an expansion committee is making plans for future use of this property. Strong emphasis is placed on the WORD-through preaching, teaching and Christian living.

St. John's motto is "Sharing the Word ... Serving the People."

With much anticipation, excitement, passion and great energy, St John AME celebrated its 136th Church Anniversary on Sunday, March 14, 2021. The annual service served as a continuing testament to the power of praise and the collective love St. John members have for the African Methodist Episcopal Church. Though attendance was limited inside the church due to ongoing COVID-19 restrictions, the celebration was lively, with enthusiastic and anointed praise, to include the online audience of worshipers. Online attendees provided social media commentary filled with love and praise for St. John and thoughts on the influence of the AME church in the Greater Huntsville Metro area, as well as throughout the South Birmingham—Bessemer District of the AME church.

From the outset, the service and those on program provided a spiritual spark and infectious spirit to the proceedings. Dr. Pamela Whitehead opened the event with a reading of announcements, followed by the St. John Praise Team performing a stirring rendition of "God's Grace", led by the powerful vocals of Sister Rosemary Wells. The Reverend Charles Glover inspired the worshipers with a powerful prayer, providing encouragement and lifting the Lord's name in praise. Steward Mar-

cus Hill's reading of God's Word from the Book of Numbers, Chapter 13, verses 30-33 was inspirational.

Pastor Maurice Wright, II introduced Presiding Elder, Bruce W. Hunter, sharing several moments that he and the Presiding Elder shared over the past year. The St. John AME family received Presiding Elder Hunter with rousing applause. Presiding Elder Hunter reflected on the circumstances faced one year ago as COVID-19 restrictions were starting to take hold. As the Praise Team sang the words, "God is the Joy and the Strength of my life" you could sense the Holy Spirit moving in a mighty way. "God is my ALL and ALL!! Hallelujah!

With an infectious smile, Bishop Seawright proceeded to the pulpit and greeted the St John family. He then reflected on his selection of Pastor Wright to lead the St. John family almost five-years ago. While attending the Annual Conference, he watched Pastor Wright direct the AME Connection Children's Choir. Right then the Lord spoke to him and he knew that the Reverend Maurice Wright, II was the right person to lead the St. John family. Speaking with excitement, the bishop shared as to how excited persons across the connectional church in Alabama are thrilled about the new St John AME Cathedral; a first of its kind in the state. With that Bishop Seawright presented the theme for the sermon, Do You See What I See?

The idea of building a new church is a wonderful reflection of God and His creativity. God is always doing something new. God allows us to do so many things anew. Bishop mentioned how we have the ability to be in fellowship and know that technology allows us to connect by the Spirit. It is a reflection of how God uses constraints like COVID as tools to help us grow. Bishop Seawright reminisced about all the pastors that had previously served St. John, speaking specifically of Dr. William

Hooper Councill and the Reverend Dr. Homer Littlefield McCall.

Per his sermon title, Bishop stated that, "Without a vision the people will perish, but with a vision the people will prosper."
The vision of Pastor McCall many years ago included the acquisition of the land where the new St. John AME Cathedral would stand.

Faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen.

Bishop Seawright stressed to the members, "Don't forget who brought you! Still give God the Holy Glory that He deserves." He said, "You'll have agitators and doubters. Don't' let them stop you!" Bishop reflected upon his own experience raising a new church in the early 1990s. The following year, after moving in, folks started to doubt, saying they did not want to be around when things failed. But, God made a way anew, raising up new folks to catch the vision of the new church and to support the work in resources and in prayers. God made a way!

Bishop drew parallels to when Moses asked 12 mento cross over the Jordan River and enter into the land of Canaan to inspect the surroundings and to observe what they would face if they crossed over. Of the 12, only Caleb and Joshua returned with a positive review. Unafraid, they told Moses they believed they could succeed on the other side. Caleb was unafraid to speak for the minority. Bishop inspired the congregation by saying, "It's a privilege to be able to speak for the minority. Thank God for the minority report!" If you stand up to defend a minority report and have the Lord with you, God will make a way. He will make it so.

Though the land was provided and the minority report was read, God still did not think it was the right time for the Israelites to cross over. They had to wait until the right time. As such, though the land for the new St. John AME Cathedral was purchased long ago, the time according to God's plan, was not right. There was a period to wait upon the Lord. Just as Moses was no longer alive when the Israelites crossed over into Canaan, Pastor McCali is no longer present as preparations are made to move into the new church. One plants, one waters, but God gives the increase. God had to wait on the right group of folks to gain the vision; folks who would move on the vision.

Thank God for those that look for something new; that are not afraid to provide the minority report, and who know to wait upon the Lord for the right time.

Bishop Seawright concluded his message by instructing the St. John family to "Hold On!"

- Stay on your knees!
- Pray for the Pastor and his family!
- Keep on making your sacrifices!
- Keep on paying your tithes!
- O Don't let nobody talk you out of your dreams and your vision!"
- There is no reason to doubt God.

With a fired-up congregation, Bishop closed saying "With a 65" birthday arriving on March 16", God has been so good to me!" Pastor Wright stepped forth, keeping the moment alive by leading the congregation in singing, I Will Trust in the Lord. The doors to the church were opened with the invitation to Christian Discipleship. Finally, the Pastor spoke passionately about giving with a cheerful heart and invited members to continue supporting the efforts of the building fund.

Bishop Seawright offered the benediction, encouraging the St. John family and thanking Pastor Wright for the opportunity to preach on a most joyous 136th church anniversary.

Women in History: Celebrating Captain (Ret.) Gail Harris

Women's History Month is a celebration of women's contributions to history, culture and society and has been observed annually in the month of March in the United States (US) since 1987. It is a dedicated month to reflect on the often-overlooked contributions of women to United States history. Captain Gail Harris has an extensive and rewarding naval and postnaval history.

Gail Harris was born on June 23, 1949, in East Orange, New Jersey, to James and Lena Harris, and grew up in Newark, New Jersey, along with her younger brother, James Jr., and younger sister, Annette. After high school she attended Drew University, in Madison, New Jersey, where she received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Political Science in 1971. In 1983, she earned a master's degree in International Studies at the University of Denver's Graduate School of International Studies (now the Josef Korbel School of International Studies), where former Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice was her classmate. Gail has also studied in the United Kingdom, Brussels and Belgium.



Captain (Ret.) Gail Harris

Gail's dream was born at age five while watching the 1944 film, Wing and a Prayer. Don Ameche, who portrayed a commander in the film, gave an intelligence briefing detailing the capabilities of the Japanese forces they were up against when the USS Enterprise aircraft carrier moved toward the Battle of Midway in the aftermath of the Pearl Harbor attack. Gail told her father, "Daddy that's what I'm going to do when I grow up." His encouraging response was, "This is America. You can be whatever you want."

Gail entered the US Navy on May 16, 1973, and was commissioned through Officer Candidate School, in Newport, Rhode Island. After an esteemed 28-year career in naval intelligence, she retired in 2001 as the highest-ranking African American female in the US Navy at the time of her retirement.

Her accomplishments in the US Navy Include many trailblazing firsts, breaking ground for women and African Americans in the military.

- In October 1973, she was chosen to be the test case for women in Naval Operational Aviation Squadron, where she served as the air intelligence officer for Patrol Squadron 47 at Moffett Field, California. This was her first assignment.
- At the end of 1976, she was requested by name to report to Kamiseya, Japan, to the Fleet Ocean Surveillance Information Facility and became the first female and African American female to be designated an Intelligence Watch Specialist in the US Navy as an Intelligence Watch Officer.
- In April 1979, Gail Harris became the US Navy's first female and African American instructor at the Armed Forces Air Intelligence Training Center at Lowry Air Force Base, Colorado. There she built up the US Navy's first course on ocean surveillance information systems and taught the Anti-Submarine Warfare and Soviet Surface Operations courses.
- In 1984, Gail was one of the first two women assigned to the Office of Naval Intelligence's War Gaming Team Detachment at the Naval War College, and she was chosen to be commander of the Soviet Union's Theater military forces, twice during the Global War Games.
- In 1988, Gail was requested by name to coordinate the Defense Department's Intelligence support for the 1988 Olympics

in Seoul, South Korea.

- In 1989, she was selected to head the Intelligence Department for Fleet Air Reconnaissance Squadron Two, in Rota, Spain, becoming the first female and African American to do so in the US Navy's largest Aviation Squadron. The mission was for the squadron to support US military and aircraft carrier operations with intelligence reports during the Gulf War.
- From 1992 through 1996 she served in the Middle East as the Intelligence Planner for the Commander of US Naval Forces Central Command where she also headed the US Navy's Iraqi Crisis Action Cell and Intelligence Watch Center during crisis operations in the Persian Gulf. She was also chosen to fill in as Acting Naval Attaché, Egypt, for a five-month period, becoming the first female attaché to a Middle Eastern country.
- For her last assignment, she was selected to develop intelligence policy for computer network defense and computer network attack for the Department of Defense.

After retaining from the Navy in 2001, Gail worked for Lockheed Martin as an intelligence subject matter expert from 2002 to 2006. She is currently a consultant, speaker and writer for various organizations nationwide. Gail is a role model for both military and civilian women and men.

Gail has always loved music. While in the Navy, during her assignment in Spain, she volunteered as a DJ for the Armed Forces Radio and TV Network. Shortly after she moved to Durango, Colorado in 2006 she continued to pursue her passion for music and became a DJ at the local KDUR radio station. For more than ten years, her show, Fire and Rain, played on KDUR 91.9 on Wednesdays at 6 PM. In 2019, she decided to study composition at The Julliard School in New York City so she could write music for her own Broadway-style musical.

In 2020 when the nation's racial tensions resulted in protests after the deaths of several African Americans at the hands of police, Gail began consulting with the Durango Police Department on solutions. She was invited to join the Durango Police Department's diversity, equity and inclusion group, an informal group offering the department feedback about hiring, promotion and recruitment practices.

Gail is the author of many publications, including her memoir, A Woman's War, published in 2010 by Scarecrow Press. Inc. Gail is the cousin of St. John member, Tami McGhee.





Dr. Jeanette Jones is recognized as one of 1000 Inspiring Black Scientists in America. This is no surprise to us! She received the University Distinguished Professor designation in 2017 from AAMU, President Dr. Andrew Hugine and the University Trustees. In the university handbook, the designation of "Distinguished Professor" is bestowed upon scholars who have achieved highly eminent status within their discipline. Given Dr. Jones' prominence within the national STEM arena and longstanding commitment to scholarly inquiry and publications, stellar record of sponsored research programs, targeted mentoring of graduate students and junior faculty and service contributions toward the advancement of Alabama A & M University (AAM U), she is most deserving of this recognition.

Having earned her Ph.D. in Botany/Medical Mycology in 1976 from The Ohio State University, Dr. Jones is a veteran member of an extremely exclusive and very elite group of African American women in STEM—in a very real sense, Dr. Jones is AAMU's own Hidden Figure. Through the efforts of Dr. Jones and other women in STEM, the numbers of women entering STEM careers have increased over the years. Throughout her 45 years of service to AAMU, Dr. Jones has

Tribute to Col. (Ret.) Earnest Charles (E. C.) Smith, Sr.

St. John's "Hidden Figure"

Earnest Charles (E.C.) Smith on the occasion of the 134th Church Anniversary. Colonel (Ret.) Smith was recognized as the last remaining member of the 1971 St. John AME Church Building Committee.

Colonel Earnest Charles (E. C.) Smith, Sr. transitioned this life on February 13, 2021. He was born in Pine Bluff, Arkansas and graduated from Jefflerson High School in 1950. Col. Smith served on active duty in the United States Army during the Korean War in 1953 and joined the Army Reserve afterwards. Col. Smith earned a Bachelor of Science Degree in Mathematics from the University of Arkansas in Pine Bluff in 1956. During the period 1956 to 1963, Smith taught 12th grade Mathematics at the same school from which he graduated. In 1963, he accepted a National Science Foundation Fellowship which he used to complete a Master of Science Degree in Mathematics from the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville in 1964.

In 1964, Col. Smith was recruited to NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center, Huntsville, Alabama where he took a position as aerospace engineer in the Astrionics Laboratory. There, he performed analyses and evaluations of the guidance, control, and navigations systems for the Saturn launch vehicles for the Skylab Program. He also was instrumental in the development and verification of the navigation system of the Lunar Roving Vehicle.

Over a long and illustrious career, Col. Smith earned many awards. He received the NASA Exceptional Service Medal in 1972 for significant personal contributions to the theoretical development, practical implementation, and operational support of the navigation systems for the Lunar Roving Vehicle on the Apollo 16 Mission, as well as several commendations and the astronaut's Snoopy Award.

Col. Smith, later assumed a Senior Executive Service position as the Director of the Astrionics Laboratory at the Marshall Flight Center in Huntsville until his retirement in 1999. Col. Smith remained in the Army Reserve during his tenure at NASA and retired as a Colonel that same year. In total, Col. Smith worked at NASA for 35 years and served in the Army Reserve for 33 years.

Upon arriving in Huntsville in 1964, he, his wife and three sons at the time, joined St. John AME Church under the leadership of the Reverend S. S. Hereford. Col. Smith served for many years as an adult Sunday School teacher, a Steward and a Trustee. Col. Smith was the youngest member of the building committee tasked with building a new St. John AME Church at 229 Church Street. The church was completed in the spring of 1971. He remained a member of St. John for many years. He later became a member of The Walking on Water Christian Ministry Church in Birmingham, Alabama where his son, the Reverend Dr. Karnie Smith is the minister.

Colonel Smith is survived by his wife of 68 years, Mrs. Bessie Matlock Smith. He also leaves to cherish his memory, four sons: LT. Colonel (Ret.) Earnest Smith Jr., Major (Ret.) Keith Smith, Reverend Dr. Kamie Smith and Dr. Cydale Smith; eight grand-children and thirteen great-grandchildren.

The lesson looks at Nehemiah, who is the king of Persia's cupbearer. The Israelites have been in exile for several generations and this is likely the only life known to him. Still, however, Nehemiah had a love for God and for his roots.

Nehemiah used his connection with the king when he returned home. After returning home he learned of the failed efforts to rebuild the city walls of Jerusalem by the returning Jews. Yes, this confirms the "It's who you know," saying, because the king granted resources to Nehemiah to go back to Jerusalem to rebuild/repair the wall surrounding the city.

Lesson Title A Plea for Restoration

Lesson Scripture: Lumentations 5

Print: Lamentations 5

Bevotional Songs: #97[]; #321[]; and #243[]

Key Verse: "Restore us to yourself, 0 Lord, that we may be restored; renew our days as of old" (Lamentations 5:21).

This week's lesson highlights Jeremiah, who is believed to be the writer of Lamentations at the base of Golgotha in a cave. Golgotha is recognized as the hill of Jesus' crucitizion. Jeremiah expressed the peoples' grief for the losses of several things: life, property, status and God's presence in their lives.

The author of the commentary described Lamentations as a compilation of thoughts and prayers, expressing the emotional strain that happens when witnessing the suffering and evil in the world. Jeremiah wept over the plight of his people and became known as the weeping prophet.

Resurrection Sunday Meditation: The Old Rugged Cross

Knock COVID-19 Out!

St. John AME Church partnered with Church Street Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America (CPCA) and Huntsville Hospital's COVID Clinics to provide the COVID Vaccine for members of each congregation. One clinic was held at Alabama Agricultural and Mechanical University and the second site was Church Street CPCA. Members from the church registered and showed up for their appointed time. The goal was to provide a vaccine for everyone who wanted one. All CDC protocols were followed: Everyone had to wear a mask, sanitize their hands and social distance. After receiving the vaccination, clients were instructed to wait 15 minutes before departing. Never too Early to Register to Vote!

Whew! Finally, the 2020 general electron is in the rearview mirror. The 2021 runoff electrons in our neighboring state of Georgia caught people's attention, taking the breath away from voters as the numbers were calculated. These were high stakes electrons with Democracy on alert.

AMEs across the country went to the polls in record numbers, casting their votes in support of "a more perfect union". Though many battled long lines, COVID-19 restrictions and limited accessibility to the polls, democracy for many, prevailed.



Massive voter registration efforts took place, with St. John AME members leading the way. By most measures, election 2020 was a great success at both the state and national level. Now that the data has been archived, how did Alabama voters do? The takeaways are as follows:

- According to the office of the Alabama Secretary of State (SoS), voter turnout in 2020 reached a record number, with over 2.3 million eligible Alabama voters going to the polls in November 2020.
- Alabama 2020 general election voter turnout increased by greater than 300 thousand voters over the 2016 general
 election cycle.
- Though this number exceeded the primary election cycle, more than doubling turnout, it still means that another approximately 1.1 million eligible voters chose to pass on voting during the 2020 general election.
- Per the Alabama SoS office, 1,176,315 persons voted in the March 3, 2020 Primary Electron, representing 33% of eligible voters.
- As such, this means approximately 2.35 million persons decided to stay home for the primary election season.

So, with all this increase in voter turnout, what is next?

Question:

- Did you decide not to vote in either or both the 2020 primary and general election?
- Wereyou eligible to vote?
- Did you miss a voter registration deadline?

If the answer was yes to any of the above, there should be an urgency to get started early and establish individual voting eligibility and get that registration taken care of well in advance of the next round of elections. Remember, it is never too early to register for the off-cycle elections, which consist of many state and local elections. Here are the procedures for getting it done.

To submit an application to register to vote, a person must meet the following requirements:

An individual must be a citizen of the United States.

- An individual must live in the State of Alabama.
- An individual must be at least 18 years of age on or before electron day.
- An individual must not be barred from voting by reason of a disqualifying felony conviction.
- For a list of felony convictions that currently disqualify a person from voting, visit Updated Version of Moral Turpitude Crimes.pdf (alabama.gov)
- An individual must not have been judged "mentally incompetent" in a court of law.

Please note, a person will be required to present valid photo identification when voting at the assigned polling place or by absentee ballot, unless exempted by law.

Also, during the 2020 election cycle, and with COVID-19 restrictions severely 2021 Alabama Voter Registration Verifihampering travel and the ability to gather in close-quarters, relief was given by the SoS in relation to use of absentee ballots. For future elections, the traditional


timelines and access to the ballot will likely be used, with COVID restrictions being eased so far in 2021.

For the 2021 electron cycle, state and local electron dates can be found at 2021 Electron Information | Alabama Secretary of State. These dates are important to remember as there is a penalty to voters that skip a number of off-year elections. This inactivity may cause a person to be unregistered, with no method of awareness.

Note, if a person is a registered voter, be on the look-out for a voter verification card from the Alabama Secretary of State's Office. This card will arrive in your mailbox periodically. This writer received the card illustrated to the right in the mail during the month of March 2021.

The front and back of the card are previewed. As a reminder, the card will only be mailed to a person's home of record from which they most recently voted. The mailing address is on the back of the card.

Why is this relevant? Well, if a registered voter has moved since the last voting election, they will need to contact the Secretary of State's office to correct their mailing address and receive a new voter registration card. Do not rely on someone receiving a card in error and placing "Return to Sender" on it and placing it back in the mail box. Do the right thing by taking the lead and contact the SoS office.



Lesson Title: Micaiah: Speaking Truth to Power

Lesson Scripture: 1 Kings 22:1-40 Print: 1 Kings 22:15-23, 26-28

Devotional Songs: #377 [], #258], and #243 []

Key Verse: Micaiah said, "As the Lord lives, whatever the

Lord says to me, that I will speak" (1 Kings 22:14).

The background of this lesson indicates that King Jehoshaphat of Judah came to meet with King Ahab of Israel to devise a plan to invade Ramon-Gilead (in Syria). The king of
Judah inquires if the King of Israel thought they could succeed. The King of Israel asks his four hundred handappointed prophets if the plan will be victorious. With a
unanimous response the prophets indicate that the kings
would succeed. The King of Judah then asks the King of Israel if he has chosen God's appointed prophet. The exchange
of conversation and King Ahab's reaction is noted below.

Micaiah the prophet comes before the kings and King Ahab asks Micaiah if their plan will be victorious, Micaiah responds, "Yes." King Ahab asks Micaiah under oath; majority of the time Micaiah has prophesized defeat for King Ahab. Micaiah responds a second time that the plan will meet with disaster. Micaiah relays a vision from the Lord where there is a camp around the Lord and it is being discussed as to how to defeat King Ahab. Many suggestions are discussed but the one that the Lord agrees upon is to allow a lying spirit, that resides amongst the king's prophets, to provide counsel when the king is making major decisions. King Ahab responds by placing Micaiah in prison on reduced rations of bread and water until King Ahab returns. Micaiah's final words as he is led away is: "...if King Ahab returns it will not be the words spoken by the Lord to me."

May 9, 2021

Lesson Title: Isaiah: Offering Hope for the Future

Lesson Scripture: Isaiah 29 Print: Isaiah 29:13-24

Devotional Songs: #464[]; #251[]; and #243[]

Key Verse: "And those who err in spirit will come to understanding, and those who grumble will accept instruction" (Isaiah 29:24).

Prophet Isaiah speaks on a future of hope via the promised one. The reviewer imagines that during this time the people have become so entrenched in the law that those worshipping God were only performing lip service; the purity of heart was absent. It became a standard practice where the created started to question the creator. The people of that time even thought and attempted to hide their plans from God; as if this was possible.

Is aiah prophesizes of a time of great wonders. A time where the deaf will hear and the blind will see. A time where the meek will increase their joy in the Lord and the poor will rejoice in the Holy One. And there will be peace and justice throughout the land. No longer shall Jacob be ashamed of his descendants; for he will see the work of Holy One in their midst and how they sanctify His name and fear the God of Israel.

May 16, 2021

Lesson Title: Jeremiah: The Suffering Preacher of Doom

Lesson Scripture: Jeremiah 37-38

Print: Jeremiah 38:14-23

Devotional Songs: #221[]; #272[]; and #243[]

Key Verse: "Jeremiah said to Zedekiah, "If I tell you, you will put me to death, will you not? And if I give you advice, you

will not listen to me" (Jeremiah 38:15).

In this lesson we encounter a conversation between King Zedekiah and the prophet Jeremiah. It appears that the king is in a dire situation where the forces of the king of Babylon is awaiting to invade the kingdom of Judah. The king arranges to meet with Jeremiah to inquire about his immediate future; being killed at the hands of the king of Babylon or by the Chaldeans. Prior to this meeting, the scriptures indicate that Jeremiah has been placed in several prisons and given limited rations of bread and water for speaking out against King Zedekiah and the people of Judah; for God had lost favor with His own. And before meeting with King Zedekiah, Jeremiah had to be brought out of mirk, which he had been suspended, at the current prison. The king asks Jeremiah as to how he can escape his predicament. Jeremiah indicates that no matter what he says, he will either be put to death or his advice will be ignored. The king swears that he will not allow Jeremiah to die but wants to hear what God has in store for the king. Jeremiah indicates that God has revealed to his prophet that if the king surrender to the king of Babylon, the king of Judah will live and he will not be given over to the Chaldeans but if the king does not surrender the king (and his army) will die, the women and children taken captive and the city will be burnt to the ground by the Chaldeans.

After giving counsel to the King Zedekiah, it is noted in the scriptures that Jeremiah is returned to prison.

May 23, 2021

Lesson Title: Ezekiel: Street Preacher to the Exiles

Lesson Scripture: Ezekiel 18 Print: Ezekiel 18:1-9, 30-32

Devotional Songs: #77[]; #321[]; and #243[]

Key Verse: "Know that all lives are mine; the life of the parent as well as the life of the child is mine: it is only the person who sins that shall die" (Ezekiel 18:4).

In this lesson, the prophet Ezekiel has a word from the Lord wondering why His children continue to repeat and live the words of the old proverb that indicates the parent eat sour grapes and the children's teeth are on edge.

A cross reference search of this proverb identified Exodus 20:5 as being one of the related scriptures that may have been crucial in the belief of the children of Israel. Not being a biblical scholar, it may be postulated that during biblical days, the children of Israel strictly followed the Law (also noted in the scriptures where the children of Israel were disobedient to God and the law). The Law was scripture that was passed down from generation to generation. And one of the earliest laws that was passed down was the Ten Commandments and in particular the one concerning God being a jealous god. Exodus 20:5 indicates anyone who wordshipped idols or other gods, that God will visit iniquities of the father upon the third and fourth generations of those who hate Him.

But God indicates through Ezekiel that His people have taken His commandments out of context. Ezekiel relays that God loves all His children unconditionally; each person is accountable for his/her own actions and only those who sin shall die. God then relays a more updated set of commandments that if man follows as a righteous man, man surely will live. Highlighted laws noted are: Do not eat upon the holy mountain; do not lift your eyes to idols, do not detile your neighbor's wife, do not oppress anyone, do not commit robbery, give bread to the poor and cover the naked, withhold one's hand from iniquity, expedite justice and, faithfully follow God's statutes and obey His ordinances. Ezekiel ends this lesson by relaying God's words, "__ cast away transgressions committed against me, get a new heart and a new spirit and live."

May 30, 2021

Lesson Title: Jonah: Fiery Harbinger of Doom

Lesson Scripture: Jonah 3

Print: Jonah 3

Devotional Songs: #355[]; #321[]; and #243[]

Key Verse: "When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil ways, God changed his mind about the calamity that he had said he would bring upon them" (Jonah 3:10).

We know the story of the prophet Jonah and how he attempted to flee instead of doing the work of God. While in the belly of the great fish, Jonah repents of his sins and vows that he will do as God has ordained. God speaks to Jonah a second time and directs Jonah to go to Nineveh and deliver the message that God sends. And so, Jonah goes to Nineveh, a vast city that expands a three day walk from one end to another. After one day of walking, Jonah cries out, "forty days more and Nineveh shall be overthrown", turns around and leaves the city to await its fate.

The people of Nineveh, who probably heard accounts of Jonah being swallowed by the great fish and now seeing the prophet in their midst, hear the words of Jonah and immediately start the process of atoning for their sins; dressing up in sack doth and sitting in ashes. The king of Nineveh makes a prodamation that every human and every animal will dress in sack doth and pray and cry out for forgiveness. And as noted countless times in the Bible, God sees and hears the sincerity of Nineveh's plea for mercy and holds back the calamity that is planned for the people of Nineveh.

According to <u>Black America Web</u>, Yale University history professor David Blight says that blacks in Charleston, South Carolina launched the first Decoration Day, in which they decorated the graves of dead soldiers, in honor of the Union's war dead on May 1, 1865.

On Monday, May 31, 2021, many Americans will pin a bright red poppy to their shirts as a sign of respect. In the United States, the poppy is worn on the last Monday in May, Memorial Day, to commemorate the lives of those who died tighting for their country. The poppies are handmade by veterans as part of their therapeutic rehabilitation and distributed across the country by the American Legion Auxiliary in exchange for donations that assist disabled and hospitalized veterans.





"When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place." Acts: 2.1.

Pentecost: Lifting the Holy Spirit before the People

We, as people of faith and informed believers, understand that the Resurrection was not the end of Christ's interaction with his followers on Earth. The 40 days that he spent after his victory over the grave culminated in an important message: the Counselor would come as God promised and the people should stay in the city until the Holy Spirit descended upon them (see Luke 24). His prophetic words were actualized when, in Jerusalem on that fateful day (Acts 2), the Holy Spirit filled the souls of the worshippers with power and the anointing. What does this mean for us in the life of the church? We must make Pentecost relevant!

As recipients of the Holy Spirit, we are afforded gifts and fruit that enhance our spiritual growth and uplift the church (1 Corinthians 12 and Galatians 5 respectively). Our constant prayer should be that the Holy Spirit empowers us to use God's gifts to bless his people and strengthen the church. For some, this may be a straight-forward task. For others, it may seem daunting.

To make the Holy Spirit meaningful to all worshippers, celebrate, commemorate, and consecrate special occasions that bring the entire Trinity before the people. Too often, we neglect God's Third Person by leaving Pentecost off of our church worship calendar and forgetting to teach on the subject.

Celebrate. Sing from the choir loft, read in church school, preach from the pulpit, and reflect in Bible study. Do all these things but do not wait until Pentecost Sunday to do so. Periodically, make Pentecost or the miracle that took place on that day a part of your worship or Christian Education calendar. Introduce a single element, e.g., Peter's sermon, or occurrence from the Pentecost narrative into some part of the church's year-round ministry. Distribute easy-to-read material after Resurrection Day to prepare the people for the Pentecost celebration.

Commemorate. On Pentecost Sunday, make the day meaningful with colors (red, gold, or white), symbols (dove or fire), and music ("Spirit of the Living God" or "There's a Sweet, Sweet Spirit") that will send a lasting message to the worshippers. In addition to the message, invite church school teachers to incorporate Acts 2 in each age level lesson, and plan some other special activity that young people and mature adults can enjoy.

Consecrate. Emphasize the holy nature of Pentecost and use this day (or the days before) to have intense, unitied prayer at the altar. Ask members to rededicate themselves and their ministries. Invite all believers to pray for clarity regarding God's call on their lives. Urge those who feel they have been called in any way to declare themselves before the Lord and offer their gifts back to God for God's use.

Let us not let Pentecost come and go without seeking ways to make the holy season more relevant to our church and our faith. We identify God the Father, God the Son, God the Holy Ghost with our words. Now, let us identify with each in our ministry.

Lesson Title: Why Do You Worry? Lesson Scripture: Matthew 6: 25-34

Print: Matthew 6:25-34

Key Verse: "For the pagans run after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them. But seek first His kingdom and His righteousness, and all these things

This lesson encourages us to seek God first so that we can place everything in perspective. Instead of worrying about materialistic gain, power, or prestige, believers should be focused on the promises of God. If God takes care of the simplest of animals, believers should trust that He will provide for us. God can provide for us better than we can provide for ourselves, so we need to make sure that job worries, financial problems, health and other concerns not in our control do not consume us. When life's uncertainties cause us to worry, we must trust in the sovereign God to provide for our needs.

In this lesson we see in the text a situation that caused fear of death.

Jesus used His miracles, which were signs that God's kingdom was breaking into the world, to help others. He focused on people in hopeless situations. God's promised rule over all restores His righteous purpose to destroy the sin-threat and the consequences of it. God's people would then live safe and secure in his presence for eternity.

Key Verse: "Immediately Jesus reached out his hand and caught him. You of little faith," he said, "why did you doubt?" (Matthew 14:31).

This week's lesson is set on the Sea of Galilee, where storms formed quickly as its western shore has steep hills. A storm coming from the direction of the Mediterranean Sea might not be seen until it is almost on top of boaters. Keep in mind that a small boat hit by high winds is in a dangerous situation.

Jesus' power and the disciples' limitation in their thinking were greatly displayed in the feeding of the five thousand. The disciples were witnesses to various events over a three-year period that should have instilled confidence in Jesus by this point. They should have responded to being let down, being blocked, and being in danger with faith in Jesus as His power could overcome every impossible situation. However, each new impossible situation, like the sudden storm in this lesson, became a new occasion for them to ask themselves whether or not Jesus was worthy of their trust. All Peter had to do was keep his eye on Jesus and not on the storm.

The COVID-19 pandemic brought about tremendous changes in the method of teaching students in the classroom. As a result, the students missed the individualized assistance provided by the classroom teachers. Virtual education became the norm. The COVID 19 pandemic seemed to have changed education forever.

The organization of Back-To-Basics (B2B) began on August 5, 2020. The B2B Team was organized in October 2020. The Team members were Mrs. Debra Weatherspoon, Co-Chair and WMS Director of the Young People's and Children's Division; Mrs. Cathy Brown, Dr. Sandra Harrell, Mrs. Rosemary Lamar, Dr. Thalia Love-Brown, Mrs. LauReen McDaniel, Mrs. LaVarne McReynolds, and Mrs. Anika Riley. The Team had support from members of the Ninth Episcopal District Technical Team, Conference WMS Presidents, Second Vice Presidents of the Conferences, and other leaders and members of the Women's Missionary Society. The Program began after intensive planning over a three-month period.

The B2B Virtual Tutorial Program was organized to provide instructional strategies that would keep students motivated and engaged, empower parents and guardians to stay connected in the educational process of children, and to provide on-going educational support for the children. Also, the Program provided an awareness of the Alabama Department of Education expectations of student learning in Pre-K and Grades K-5.

The mission of the Program was to utilize instructional strategies to make a positive impact on student learning and provide online experience and support for students, parents, and guardians.

A virtual 828 Parent/Student Meeting was held on Tuesday, January 9, 2021, from 10:00 a.m. until 11:00 a.m. The Program's mission, objectives, registration form, and parent/student responsibilities were discussed followed by questions and answers.

828 Tutoring began its first tutoring classes on Tuesday, January 12, 2021. The program met every Tuesday from 5:00 p.m. until 6:00 p.m. Tutors were present at 4:30 p.m. and the students were asked to be present at 4:50 p.m.

Thirty-eight students enrolled in the program with the greatest numbers in reading and math. The students were located throughout the Ninth Episcopal District, other communities, and as far away as Miamisburg, Ohio.

In addition, there were thirty highly qualified tutors assisting the students. The "call to serve" was wonderful because when we serve others, we are serving the Lord. Thank you, Lord, for showing us the joy and beauty in a life of loving service. "By love serve one another". Galatians 5:13 KJV







PTSD Awareness Month June

June is "National Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder Awareness Month," and is intended to raise public awareness about issues related to PTSD, reduce the stigma associated with PTSD, and help ensure that those suffering from the invisible wounds of war receive proper treatment:

What is it?

Post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) is a mental health condition that's triggered by a terrifying event — either experiencing it or witnessing it. Symptoms may include flashbacks, nightmares and severe anxiety, as well as uncontrollable thoughts about the event. Most people who go through traumatic events may have temporary difficulty adjusting and coping, but with time and good self-care, they usually get better. If the symptoms get worse, last for months or even years, and interfere with your day-to-day functioning, you may have PTSD. Getting effective treatment after PTSD symptoms develop can be critical to reduce symptoms and improve function.

PTSD Awareness Month June

The Four Symptom Types

Post-traumatic stress disorder symptoms may start within one month of a traumatic event, but sometimes symptoms may not appear until years after the event. These symptoms cause significant problems in social or work situations and in relationships. They can also interfere with your ability to go about your normal daily tasks.

PTSD symptoms are generally grouped into four types: intrusive memories, avoidance, negative changes in thinking and mood, and changes in physical and emotional reactions. Symptoms can vary over time or vary from person to person.

Symptoms of intrusive memories may include:

- · Recurrent, unwanted distressing memories of the traumatic event
- Reliving the traumatic event as if it were happening again (flashbacks)
- · Up setting dreams or night mares about the traumatic event
- Severe emotional distress or physical reactions to something that reminds you of the traumatic event

Symptoms of avoidance may include:

- Trying to avoid thinking or talking about the traumatic event
- Avoiding places, activities or people that remind you of the traumatic event

Symptoms of negative changes in thinking and mood may include:

- Negative thoughts about yourself, other people or the world
- Hopelessness about the future
- Memory problems, including not remembering important aspects of the traumatic event
- Difficulty maintaining close relationships
- Feeling detached from family and friends
- Lack of interest in activities you once enjoyed
- Difficulty experiencing positive emotions
- Feeling emotionally numb



So What is the General Conference?

The African Methodist Episcopal Church is a connectional organization. Each local church is a part of the larger connection.

The <u>Bishops are the Chief Officers of the Connectional Organization</u>. They are elected for life by a majority vote of the General Conference which meets every four years. Bishops are bound by the laws of the church to retire upon the General Conference nearest their 75th birthday.

Presiding Elders are the assistants, like middle management, whom the Bishops appoint to supervise the preachers in a Presiding Elder's District. A Presiding Elder District is one portion of an Annual Conference, which in turn is one part of the Episcopal District over which a Bishop presides. In the Presiding Elder District, the appointed Presiding Elder meets with the local churches, that comprise the District, at least once every three months for a Quarterly Conference. The Presiding Elder also presides over a District Conference and a Sunday School Convention in his or her District. At the end of an Annual Conference year, the Presiding Elder reports to the Bishop at the Annual Conference and makes recommendations for pastoral appointments.

Pastors receive a yearly appointment to a charge (church), on the recommendation of the Presiding Elder and with the approval and final appointment of the Bishop. The pastor is in full charge of the Church and is an ex-official member of all boards, organizations and clubs of that Church.

THE GENERAL CONFERENCE

The General Conference is the supreme body of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. It is composed of the Bishops, as exofficio presidents, according to the rank of election, and an equal number of ministerial and lay delegates, elected by each of the Annual Conferences and the Lay Electoral Colleges of the Annual Conferences. Other ex-officio members are: the General Officers, College Presidents, Deans/Presidents of Theological Seminaries; Chaplains in the Regular Armed Forces of the U.S.A.

The General Conference meets quadrennially (every four years) but may have extra sessions in certain emergencies.

2021 General Conference Information and Update Reprinted from The Christian Recorder, May 24, 2021

It's official! The 51st Quadrennial Session of the AME Church General Conference will be held July 6-10, 2021. The Connectional Lay Organization Biennial will open the morning of July 11 and close the afternoon of July 12, 2021. Please see ameclay.org for the latest information.

The General Conference will utilize the "Orlando Hybrid" model with meetings in two cities: Orlando, Florida, and Cape Town, South Africa. The "Orlando Hybrid" meeting design will decentralize the convention. Rather than meeting as one large group in one large room, we will meet in smaller rooms and multiple locations according to delegations. Each room and location will be virtually connected for all General Conference proceedings. Within each delegation meeting room (DMR), delegates will be able to use the speaker queue system to address the General Conference assembly as well as vote in real-time.

With the unfortunate, yet improving, situation of COVID-19, the question was raised, "How to best hold an in-person General Conference in the safest manner possible?" The answer to the question led to the development of a meeting plan with several goals in mind. First, provide an opportunity for a safer gathering to conduct the necessary business following CDC, Florida Department of Health, and local government guidance. Second, reduce the size of crowds gathered at any one time, in any place or space, to reinforce physical and social distancing. Third, institute CDC recommended measures to help control the possibility of a COVID-19 outbreak and minimize the impact if one should occur. Fourth, protect the AME Church and its membership.

Due to international travel concerns, the Cape Town International Convention Centre (CTICC) in Cape Town, South Africa location was added. AME Church leadership, delegates, alternates, chaplains, college deans and presidents, and paid observers from Episcopal Districts 1-13 and 16 will meet in Orlando, Florida, AME Church leadership and delegates from Episcopal Districts 14-15 and 17-20 will meet at the CTICC in Cape Town, South Africa.

In Orlando, there will be a General Session Hall in the Orange County Convention Center (OCCC) and separate meeting rooms for each Episcopal District delegation, chaplains, and paid observers. We will seat a maximum of 250 people in each room to ensure physical distancing guidelines. DMRs will be in the OCCC and partner hotels.

Attendees in the General Session Hall will include active and retired bishops and supervisors, active and retired general officers and their spouses, connectional officers (including the WMS and CLO delegates), the Judicial Council, members of the Board of Incorporators college deans and presidents, other guests, and program participants. Only credentialed delegates, alternates, and district leadership will be allowed in the DMRs.

In the General Session Hall and DMRs in both Orlando and Cape Town, seating will be limited to 50% capacity. In the DMRs, delegates will be seated at assigned classroom tables spaced to accommodate one person per six-foot table. Alternates will be seated in assigned chairs behind the delegation spaced six feet apart. Daily temperature and badge checks will be required for entry into all meeting spaces.

Meeting locations will be cleaned and disinfected regularly during scheduled breaks. Likewise, equipment will also be cleaned and disinfected regularly. This includes computers, projectors, sound systems, microphones, and voting machines, which will be individually packaged for each person.

Paid observers in Orlando will be seated in a separate meeting room and view the proceedings through a live feed from the General Session Hall. They too will be physically distanced and seated in assigned seats, though households will be allowed to sit together. Daily temperature and badge checks will be required for entry into this space.

Candidates for service will be challenged to campaign in new and different ways as COVID-19 protocols will not allow for the traditional campaign representatives in the lobby and halls of the convention centers and partner hotels. Pop-ups will only be allowed in designated areas. Candidates are encouraged to utilize the virtual vending platform and develop short videos to be

shared in Orlando and Cape Town. There are also two Eat and Greet the Candidates events in the current program schedule.

To stay abreast of up-to-date General Conference information on-site, a mobile app has been created. The app should be downloaded on your device(s) before arrival. AME Church leadership, delegates, and alternates will access all legislation, reports, other material, and information through a secure section on the mobile app. Paid observers are also encouraged to download the app before arrival where the agenda and other general information will be provided.

Various food and beverage options will be available in the convention centers and partner hotels in both Orlando and Cape Town. These include covered plated meals, buffet meals served by masked and gloved staff behind plexiglass barriers, and pre-packaged grab-n-go meals and snacks. Restaurants are open and operating safely. Many offer touchless payment options.

To minimize lines, registration times for AME Church leadership and districts will be scheduled in staggered time frames. Plexiglass partitions will be set up at each counter and physical distancing will be required while in line. Attendees will be able to view their badges in advance to help minimize changes on site.

Revisions, Rules, and Credentials Committees will meet in Orlando and Cape Town as scheduled. Committee members in Cape Town will join their Committees via Zoom. All applicable COVID-19 protocols will be followed. The Revisions Committee will begin its work on June 30, 2021. The Rules and Credentials Committees will meet July 3-5, 2021.

Our partner hotels have also instituted many health and safety measures to assist in minimizing direct contact and interaction with others. Some of these measures include keyless room entry via cell phone, housekeeping by request only, hand sanitazing stations throughout the property, and required face coverings in common areas. Self-parking is strongly recommended.

There will not be a vendor exhibit hall on-site for the General Conference. However, a virtual vendor option is being developed by the 11th Episcopal District.

COVID-19 protocols will follow CDC guidelines for meetings and large gatherings. The guidelines are being monitored and adjustments are being made accordingly. All attendees will acknowledge their understanding of these protocols and requirements for the General Conference and Connectional Lay Organization Biennial.

Healthcare professionals will be in place in Orlando and Cape Town during both meetings. They will manage all COVID-19 issues as well as other medical emergencies and health concerns; provide screenings, staff first-aid clinics, provide telehealth options, and offer other health and safety support.

One Year Later: What's Next? What Can We Do?

On May 25, 2021, members of St. John AME Church, Huntsville gathered for a "March for Justice" and reflection, remembering the life of George Perry Floyd Jr., who was tragically murdered by Minneapolis, MN police officer, Derek Chauvin, exactly one-year earlier, on May 25, 2020.

Concerned citizens and local activists from the greater Huntsville area listened to local criminal justice reform advocates, persons directly impacted by bad policing, and respected community leaders. St John AME, under the leadership of Pastor Maurice Wright, II, hosted the event, partnering with the United Women of Color, Huntsville Citizen's Coalition for Justice Reform (CCIR) and Black Lives Matter (BLM) Huntsville. Following the collection of inspirational speakers, all participants gathered for a peaceful march down Church Street to Big Spring Park, downtown Huntsville, for closing remarks.

Chris Brown, from the Huntsville Citizen's Coalition for Justice Reform expressed his excitement at the size of the crowd and informed the audience of why he joined CCJR, mentioning that, "My Lord and Savior Jesus Christ was murdered by the criminal justice system of His day, and I can not look away, and do nothing when our justice system today is still murdering people."

The video of George Floyd's death sparked massive protests across the United States and around the world. Calls for criminal justice reform and changes in the rules of engagement for police officers became a public outcry, particularly from communities of color that have been most targeted by the inequities in policing around the country. Calls for accountability and justice were daily occurrences, coming from every state in the union.

The summer of 2020 may have been the summer of protest, but black folks have been protesting for decades (centuries), asking when will police officers be held accountable for bad policing? Why are Black folks much more susceptible to injury (or death) at the hands of police? When will the playing field be leveled? When does accountability apply to those employed to protect and serve? Why is everyone not subjected to the same level of govern- Community Leaders and Residents gathered at St. John ance? Why are black folks always considered a threat to law enforcement? Being

frank, why are Black Americans more prone to die for infractions that could easily be managed with a bit more patience, forbearance, a small fine, probation or less?

Romans 13:1-14 reads, "Let every person be subject to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and those that exist have been instituted by God. Therefore, whoever resists the authorities resists what God has appointed, and those who resist will incur judgment. For rulers are not a terror to good conduct, but to bad. Wauld you have no fear of the one who is in authority? Then do what is good, and you will receive his approval, for he is God's servant for your good. But if you do wrong, be afraid, for he does not bear the sword in vain. For he is the servant of God, an avenger who carries out God's wrath on the wrongdoer. Therefore, one must be in subjection, not only to avoid God's wrath but also for the sake of conscience."

This is a powerful scripture, and most Christians understand the significance of good governance and the rule of law. Howev-

er, the challenge that communities of color face go beyond being subject to governing authorities. Even when black people are submissive and respectful, they are at much higher risk of injury or violence. That is why St. John AME came out in support of the March for Justice.

People of color demand the same rules of accountability be applied to those sworn to protect communities. They demand that police officers operate within the same confines of respect, sound judgement and good conduct. Yes, policing is often a very dangerous profession. However, gross misconduct, no matter the danger (or perceived danger) cannot be tolerated.

"Let every person be subject to the governing authorities." Please, all must be held accountable!

All of the death; All of the prayer. All of the protest; All of the politics. All of the critics; All of the hate.

It is a never-ending cycle of torture for black folks. When is enough... enough? It has been over a year since the tragic murder of George Floyd. Since then, many more black men (and women) have been senselessly killed at the hands of police officers, with situations escalating from what starts as routine actions. There is not any reasonable explanation for these killings, which happen all over the country, and with startling frequency.

Along with Floyd's tragic death, the death of Breonna Taylor galvanized the nation, generating high-intensity debate about policing of the black Local activist provided participants with testimonials and community. John AME, realizing the possibility of the church becoming a target for standing up to injustice, never the less stood firm in its commitment to march.

These tragic deaths of black men and women at the hands of police simply make no sense. Taylor was killed by police officers in her own home after plain-clothed officers stormed her apartment while executing a "No-Knock" search warrant against her former boyfriend. It was a senseless killing, unnecessary violence; and a gross injustice. Other heartbreaks include:

- Daunte Wright (2020): After being pulled over in Minneapolis, MN for a routine traffic stop, cops attempted to arrest him for an outstanding warrant. Moments later, he was dead.
- Rayshard Brooks (2020): Fell asleep in his car at a fast-food drive-thru in Atlanta, GA. In the process of being restrained by police, who said he had too much to drink, a struggle ensued. Brooks fled, was no longer a direct threat to officers, yet was gunned down by police, having been shot in the back twice according to the autopsy
- Daniel Prude (2020): While suffering from mental illness, was identified as being disoriented on a Rochester, NY street by

a local citizen. Law enforcement arrived; Prude was dead moments

- Atatiana Jefferson (2019): Jefferson was shot inside her Fort Worth, TX home by a police officer standing outside her window. A neighbor called police stating that the front door of her home was left open. An officer arrived on the scene; did not enter the house to investigate. Jefferson was killed within minutes.
- Stephon Clarke (2018): Clarke was standing in his grandmother's backyard in Sacramento, CA holding a cellphone. Police alleged that he was holding a gun and shot him more than 20 times.
- Botham Jean (2018): Jean was seated on his sofa in his Dallas, TX apartment eating ice cream. Jean was shot by off-duty police officer Amber Guyger after she entered his apartment, thinking (she said) it was hers and that HE was a dangerous intruder.

The list is long and tragic one. Each circumstance is unique, with some just plain bazaar, yet the end results are all to painfully familiar. Black people die at the hands of police much too frequently, without being given any benefit of doubt. That is why the March for Justice was needed. St. John AME answered the bell in keeping criminal justice reform in the local headlines, long after the massive protests have subsided. Though the cameras are gone, the challenges are still present. The struggle is real.

As the evening's protest ended, Bishop Seawright challenged protestors to be resilient, remain encouraged, to know that God is in control and to keep moving forward, not settling for the status quo. - 3. Faith, has believers making plans for the future.



August 1, 2021

Lesson Title: Salvation for All Who Believe

Lesson Scripture: Romans 10:5-17

Print: Romans 10:5-17

Devo tional Songs: #221[], #251[], and #243[]

Key Verse: "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord

shall be saved." Romans 10:13 (NRSV)

In this lesson Apostle Paul addresses how one has faith without seeing. In his discussion he makes a comparison between those born during Moses' time and those born during the time that Christ walked on the earth.

During the time of Moses, there was the Law. One was born under the Law, one was taught the law, one (hopefully) had faith in the Law, lived by the law and therefore salvation was granted to those who were faithful (unto the Law) unto God.

Those who experienced the life of Christ as a man were witnesses to miracles, were taught the teachings of Christ, knew of Christ's quest to bring salvation to man-kind, and knew of Christ's suffering, death and resurrection. Apostle Paul indicated Jesus taught that salvation was a two-phase approach; a belief of the heart and verbal confession of the mouth.

The first group's belief system was primarily a state of mind approach derived from custom and cultural prospective. Whereas the latter group had an emotional or state of heart approach in examining the spiritual relationship between God and man.

August 8, 2021

Lesson Title: Meaning of Faith

Lesson Scripture: Hebrews 11; 13:1-19 Lesson Print: Hebrews 11:1-8, 13-16

Key Verse: "Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the

conviction of things not seen." Hebrews 11:1 (NRSV)

This lesson, as noted by the key verse, starts out by giving us a definition of faith. Having faith means one believes in the unbelievable. Just imagine as it is recorded, God's creation, the worlds were from the Word. The lesson highlights four men who lived the definition of faith; Abel, Enoch, Abraham and Noah. Each man did the unthinkable, they lived their lives in faith and even died in faith believing in a heavenly future promised to them.

The writer of this scriptural text is relaying a message from the one who is faithful, Jesus Christ. This faithful one is the one who answered the call, (verse 6) "...Here I am ... I have come to do your will, my God" when God (who no longer desired and who was no longer pleased with burnt offerings and sin offering) looked around heaven for a sacrificial lamb to save man. As Jesus was crucified, He was the sacrificial lamb to atone for man sins. God forgave (and forgives) man's many sins and established a new covenant with man. Under the new covenant, man is ultimately responsible and accountable for his own sins and God will judge each man according to his/her works, those who are found worthy will be rewarded and those unworthy have a place in the lake of fire.

To those who are persecuted for following Christ, the messenger encourages us to continue to persevere even if it means being imprisoned for Christ. Continue to encourage one another concerning the love of God and continue to gather with one another. To those who continue to walk in darkness and those that continue to treat the blood of the covenant as an unholy thing, the messenger reminds those that God is avengeful God.







As a leader, Bishop Anne Henning Byfield serves as the 135th elected and consecrated bishop of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. Her historic election in the year 2016 represents the first time in the history of the AME Church, a person was elected who had a sibling on the Council of Bishops, Bishop C. Garnett Henning. She serves as the Bishop of the 16th Episcopal District, where she provides leadership to seven annual conferences representing fourteen countries, in the Caribbean, South America, and Europe. She is the Chair of the Global Development Council, Commission on Women In Ministry, and World Methodist Evangelism. She is also a Golden Member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority.

She has received numerous awards including the Jarena Lee Preaching Award; the Legacy Award for over 25 years of leadership in Pastoral Health Initiatives particularly in the HIV/AIDS community; one of eight religious history makers in the Indianapolis Community, one of the most 15 influential African Americans in Indianapolis and was named as one of its ten most influential pastors. She is a 2020 recipient of the Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference Beautiful Are Your Feet Award, recipient of the Indiana Christian Drum Major for Peace and Justice Award, among others.

She is a former adjunct faculty member for Christian Theological Seminary and conducts various mentoring and coaching groups. She is a former Assistant Director of Department of Labor Contract Compliance, Indianapolis. During her tenure she worked on or supervised numerous cases which desegrated Steel Mills of the United States and several fortune 500 Companies. As a Bishop she has established a vocational school in Haiti, re-established the AME Church in Cuba, planted or received ten churches; one of which is in Belize, where no AME Church existed, two are in Bahia, again where no AME Church existed, and dedicated four newly built churches and paid off the mortgage of the Episcopal Residence.

ATTENTION: The U.S. Department of Homeland Security is extending the deadline for the REAL ID (salled STAR ID in Alabama) to May 3, 2023, in response to COVID-19.

Effective May 3, 2023, every airtraveler will need a REAL ID compliant license/ID (STAR ID) or another form of identification for

domestic air travel. (See TSA's website for a full list of acceptable identification for domestic air travel.)

St. John AME HSV members, as the Federal Government has extended the deadline for getting the STAR I.D. it's easy to forget the new mandate or simply push out your timelines for getting the new identification card. With limited attention being paid to the new program, now is the time to act, while lines are relatively short and without an imminent deadline. Let's take a look at the STAR I.D. program.

What is the STAR I.D.?

"Secure, Trusted, And Reliable," STAR ID is part of a nationwide effort to improve the integrity and security of state-issued driver licenses and identification cards, which, in turn, will help flight terrorism and reduce fraud.

When did Alabama begin the states Pilot Program?

Alabama began a STAR I.D. pilot project in central Alabama Oct. 3, 2011, in the Driver License examining offices in Montgomery, Autauga and Chilton countries, and began issuing STAR I.D. statewide in early 2012. In order to comply with the Federal REAL ID Act, the Alabama Law Enforcement Agency developed the STAR ID program. STAR ID is a step beyond an ordinary Alabama driver's license or non-driver identification card and it meets all the requirements of federal law.

Applying for an Alabama Driver License or Non-Driver Identification Card

STAR IDs are issued originally to qualified individuals only at Alabama Law Enforcement Agency Driver License exam offices. County operated license offices will continue to provide renewals/duplicates for license, ID cards, and STAR ID. Once the provision of the REALID Act (STAR ID) goes into effect, individuals who do not have an unexpired U.S. passport will need an Alabama STAR ID to board commercial aircraft for domestic flights or to enter certain regulated federal facilities.

WHAT Documentation is needed to apply for the new I.D. Card?

To be issued a STAR ID, applicants must present <u>four documents</u> to verify identity/date of birth, Social Security number and address of principal residence. Below is a list of accepted documents in each category. Please read carefully. Applicants must verify their identity and date of birth by providing one of the following documents*:

- Valid, unexpired United States Passport
- Certified Birth Certificate
- Consular Report of Birth Abroad (Form FS-240, DS-1350, or FS-545)
- Valid, unexpired Permanent Resident Card (Form I-551) issued by Department of Homeland Security (DHS) or Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS)
- Unexpired employment authorization document (EAD) issued by DHS (Form I-766 or Form I-688B)
- Unexpired Foreign Passport with a valid, unexpired U.S. Visa affixed, accompanied by the approved I-94 form documenting the applicant's most recent admittance into the United States.
- Certificate of Naturalization issued by DHS (Form N-550 or N-570)
- Certificate of Citizenship issued by DHS (Form N-560 or N-561)

* If the applicant's name has changed from that displayed on the document produced (marriage, adoption, court order, etc), official documents verifying this change will be required.

Applicants must verify their Social Security Numbers by providing one of the following documents:

- Social Security card
- United States Military Form DD 214
- Medicare/Medicaid Identification Card (if Social Security Number is followed by the letter A)
- W-2 Tax Form
- Applicants must verify their address of principal residence by providing any two of the following documents:
- Valid Alabama Driver License or Identification Card displaying applicant's current address
- Voter Registration Card
- Residential Mortgage Contract
- Current Lease or Rental agreement for housing
- Proof of payment of residential property tax (Homestead)
- Previous year tax returns bearing applicants address
- Vehicle registration bearing applicants name and address
- Utility bill (Water, Gas, or Electric) less than 90 days old
- Any State or Federal Court documents indicating residence address
- School enrollment documentation
- Defense Department Form 214 (Report of Separation)
- Sex offender registration documents
- Current Homeowners insurance policy with name and address
- Social Security benefits statements/summary mailed to physical address
- U.S. or State Government check or other document mailed to applicants physical address
- Military Orders documenting duty station and place of residence.

*If utility bills or other similar documents feature the name of the applicant's spouse or parent, the applicant must produce a marriage certificate or birth certificate verifying residence address.

It may be hard to believe, but the country is roughly 15 months away from the November 2022 Congressional Mid-Term Electrons. The fallout from the November 2020 General Electron is still underway, with the January 6th capital riots having unnerved many who sought true democracy that reflects racial, ethnic and demographic representation. Simply put, voter suppression efforts are making a comeback, reminiscent of activity prior to Civil Rights Act legislation of the mid-1960s and featuring those old Jim Crow Eranarratives.

So, what can be done to ensure that the right to vote is available (and conven-

So, what can be done to ensure that the right to vote is available (and convenient) for every citizen, regardless of race, creed, or color?



Once registered, do not miss an election; vote regularly.

Ensure all personal voting criteria are met.

Know where your voting precinct is located.

Participate in local elections to ensure you remain eligible to vote.

Vote as if your lives depend on it!



Call local congressional representatives and encourage them to consider voting for the "For the People Act".

Do not let them off the hook and do not believe a single voicing of concerns does not make a difference.

Practice holding elected officials accountable.

Maketheir lives difficult in a respectful, yet tactical manner.

What is the "For the People Act"?

Originally introduced by John Sarbines (D), 3rd Congressional District, Maryland in 2019, the "For the People Act" is authored to expand Americans' access to the ballot box, reduce the influence of big money in politics, strengthen ethics rules for public servants, and implement other anti-corruption measures for the purpose of fortifying our democracy, and for other purposes. With the passing of Congressman and Civil Rights Icon, the Honorable John Lewis, there is a sense of urgency in getting this vital legislation passed.

When was the Act authored and presented?

The" For the People" Act was introduced as the first piece of legislation of the 116th United States Congress. The House of Representatives passed the bill on March 8, 2019 along party-lines (234-193). The bill has been viewed as a "signature piece of legislation" from the Democratic majority. However, it was blocked from receiving a vote by the then Republican-controlled Senate.

What are the key elements of the Act?

In addition to addressing Voting Rights, the bill addresses Election Security; Campaign Finance Reform; Ethics; Gerrymandering; and the Number of Federal Election Commissioners:

Key Voting Rights provisions include:

- Require states to offer same-day voter registration for federal elections and to permit voters to make changes to their registration at the polls.
- It would require states to hold early voting for at least two weeks and would establish automatic voter registration for individuals to be eligible to vote in elections for federal office in the state.
- Under the automatic voter registration provision, eligible citizens who provide information to state agencies (including state departments of motor vehicles or public universities) would be automatically registered to vote unless they opt out of doing so.
- The bill would also expand opportunities to vote by mail and would make Election Day a federal holiday.

- The bill would require states to offer online voter registration, which has already been adopted in 39 states and the District of Columbia
- The bill would establish criminal penalties for persons who "corruptly hinder, interfere with, or prevent another person from registering to vote" and for voter deception or intimidation (the bill would specifically "prohibit knowing and intentional communication of false and mislead-



ing information — including about the time, place, or manner of elections, public endorsements, and the rules governing voter eligibility and voter registration — made with the intent of preventing eligible voters from casting ballots*).

- . The bill would also authorize 16- and 17-year-olds to pre-register to vote in advance of their becoming 18.
- The bill would also prohibit the practice of voter caging and restrict the practicing of voter-roll purges by limiting states' ability to remove registered voters from the rolls and setting conditions for when they could do so.
- The bill would require states to obtain certain information before removing voters from the rolls and would prohibit voter purges from taking place less than six months before an election.
- The bill prohibits any person from communicating "materially false" claims meant to prevent others from voting 60 days before an election and compels the attorney general to correct such misinformation.
- The bill also requires election officials to timely notify any voter tagged for removal from the rolls and give them an
 opportunity to contest the removal or seek reinstatement of their registration.
- It also restores voting rights to felons who complete prison terms.

What is the latest?

In 2021, in the 117th Congress, congressional Democrats reintroduced the act as H.R. 1 and S. 1. On March 3, 2021, the bill passed the House of Representatives on a near party-line vote of 220–210, advancing to the Senate, which is split 50–50 between Democrats and Republicans, with Democratic Vice President Kamala Harris holding the tie-breaking vote. The bill had unified support in the Democratic caucus, but Senate Republicans blocked the bill with a filibuster on June 22, 2021, as it failed to obtain the 60 votes needed to invoke cloture after a party-line vote of 50–50.

Now what?

- Be attentive: Take time to monitor legislation affect voting rights in the State Capitol.
- Communicate: Exercise access to local officials to voice concerns with the lack of passage of the "For the People Act".
- Get active: Consider partnering with local nonprofits that support the expansion of voting rights.



2022 United States Elections

The 2022 United States electrons will be held on Tuesday, November 8, 2022. During the midterm electron year, all 435 seats in the United States House of Representatives and 34 of the 100 seats in the United States Senate will be contested. Thirty-nine state and territorial gubernatorial and numerous other state and local electrons will also be contested. This will be the first electron affected by the redistricting that will follow the 2020 United States Census.

The World Games Committee trusted Gullatte to design costumes that would reflect not just the mascots, but the Games experience. Vulcan, Birmingham's existing mascot, and Vesta, his companion created for the games, had to be creative, functional, and full of personality.

"They wanted me to create a design that really reflects who they are as people and bring out their inner character. I worked in aesthetics that show these are athletic games, so they had to be able to walk, turn, flip—I don't know if Vulcan is as athletic as Aubie, but I definitely had to consider the type of environment, space, and audience they will be for," Gullatte said. "Vulcan and Vesta are based on the era of gods and goddesses, and I wanted their costumes to reflect that time, so I brought in lots of natural textures and patterns while still getting creative with their designs."

In 2019, Gullatte applied to be the World Games mascot costume designer through the World of Opportunity program, an initiative established by the Birmingham Organizing Committee to engage local, small, minority, and womenowned businesses to provide products and services to the games.

Gullatte received her master's in Hospitality Management on Saturday, August 7, 2021. She is actively seeking employment that will combine her love for design and hospitality, with plans to one day open her own retail boutique.

Ms. Mariah Gullatte is a member of St. John AME Church. She has always been actively engaged in activities at the church. She has participated in the YPD activities, locally and on the district level. She was actively engaged in St. John's Liturgical Dance Ministry.

Lesson Title: Praise with Music Lesson Scripture: Exodus 14:1-15:21

Key Verse: "Who among the gods is like you, Lord who is like you - majestic in holiness, awesome in glory, working won-

ders?" (Exodus 15:11).

In ancient Israel's history, safely crossing the Red Sea was a crucial event. They were free and beyond Pharaoh's reach and influence. They responded to the new found freedom by bursting forth with joyous singing.

Exodus 15:11-21, from this lesson's text concerns their song. It is the first song in the history of this new nation and is a happy song of the victory that the Lord obtained for His people.

September 12, 2021

Lesson Title: Praise in Dance Lesson Scripture: 2 Samuel 6 Print: 2 Samuel 6:1-5, 14-19

Devotional Songs: #97 []; #27 2[]; and #243 []

Key Verse: "David and all Israel were celebrating with all their might before the Lord, with castanets, harps, lyres, tim-

brels, sistrums and cymbals" (2 Samuel 6:5).

This lesson is about the moving of the ark of the covenant to Jerusalem, David's new capital city. The ark is the nation of Israel's most sacred object that was an omate chest made to God's specifications around 1446 BC.

David was distracted as he secured his position as king the first seven or so years of his reign. After David secured his kingship, secured Jerusalem as his capital, and defeated the Philistines again, he turned his attention to the ark.

September 19, 2021

Lesson Title: Praise by Expecting and Following Lesson Scripture: Mark 10:46-52; Luke 18:35-43

Print: Mark 10:46-52

Devotional Songs: #424[]; #77[]; and #243[]

Key Verse: "'What do you want me to do for you?' Jesus asked him. The blind man said, 'Rabbi, I want to see™ (Mark

10:51).

In this lesson it is noted that there was not a reliable cure for blindness in Jesus' day and little was known about its causes. Many believed blindness to be a curse from God for sinful behavior. The parents' sins were thought to affect their children and thus they were born blind.

In the book of Mark spiritual blindness and sight are important themes. Jesus let it be known that there would be people who saw His works, but would not understand the good news that He brought. At a later point in His ministry, Jesus chided them for their failure to understand His person and mission. "Do you have eyes but fail to see?" (8:18)

September 26, 2021

Lesson Title: Praise for Salvation Lesson Scripture: Acts: 2:32-33, 37-47

Print: Acts: 2:32-33, 37-47

Devotional Songs: #25[]; #258[]; and #243[]

Key Verse: "They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to pray-

er" (Acts 2:42).

This lesson gives a dramatic example of how God can breathenew life into endangered people.

Luke a Gentile disciple and physician, wrote both the Gospel of Luke and the book of Acts. The author of the commentary refers to the Gospel of Luke and the book of Acts as Part 1 and Part 2, respectively. Peter was the one speaking in this lesson text. It is likely that many in his audience were in Jerusalem during Jesus' trials, crucitizion, and resurrection, as it was normal for those making the yearly journey to observe the Passover and the Festival of Unleavened Bread to hang around for the festival of Weeks. This latter became known as Pentecost.







Planning to retire? Here are ways to prioritize your retirement funding

A consequence of the current 18-month COVID era is the record number of persons that have chosen to retire a few years early instead of going back into the office during this great period of uncertainty. As many Americans assess their financial health and choose to retire a year or two early, they are immediately confronted with the question, "Which retirement funding should I use first?"

When considering retirement, early or not, retirees should consider the following questions:

- Do they have an employment pension?
- Are they Social Security eligible?
- Have they reached the threshold of 59 % years old, which allows them to tap into their 401K retirement account?



If any of the above apply to them, there are some things they should know to enable greater financial flexibility into their golden years and minimize the tax implications associated with retirement income.

A 2020 Northwestern Mutual study located at Newsroom | Northwestern Mutual - Planning & Progress Study 2020 found that 71% of U.S. adults admit their financial planning needs improvement. However, only 29% of Americans work with a financial advisor. Since the value of working with a financial advisor varies from person-to-person, is valued more as projected income targets grow, and because financial advisors are legally prohibited from promising returns, research indicates the people who do reach out to a certified financial planner feel more comfortable about their finances, subsequent retirement funding streams needed to satisfy basic retirement needs, and their ability to stretch the retirement dollar further through tax savings and priority use of income.

What should not be considered when planning for retirement?

Do not start with your investment income: When a person chooses not to with draw from their investments immediately, it gives their retirement accounts more time to compound interest. If they dive straight into the 401(k) or Individual Retirement Account (IRA), it could cost a person many years' worth of income in retirement savings. Whether they have mutual funds, a brokerage account, ETFs, stocks, or bonds, they are all taxable. Therefore, the retiree will have to pay capital gains taxes on withdrawals. Some investments also require them to pay taxes on distributions each year, like some mutual funds.

Try not to daim Social Security (SS) benefits at 62: If maximizing retirement savings is the priority, the prospective retiree may want to consider waiting longer to access SS benefits. Also, recall that SS benefits at age 62, 65 or 68 are not your maximum benefits. The maximum SS retirement benefit kicks in at age 70. If you claim before the age of 70, a retiree will not receive their full entitlement.

Do not withdraw from 401(k) or IRA before Required Minimum Distributions (RMD) begin: Though, a retiree can start to withdraw retirement income from your 401K or IRA, it may not be in their best interest. By law, a person is not required to withdraw until the age of 72. If a retiree has a path to age 72 without tapping into the 401K or IRA, they should choose that option.



Consider other alternatives to the IRA income: Since the retiree has paid taxes up front and ahead of Roth IRA contribu-

trions, they can take money out of the Roth IRA and it will not count as taxable income. The Roth IRA also will combinue to grow tax-free as they tap into their other accounts. Since a Roth IRA holds after-tax funds and the IRS does not need to tax it again, you also do not need to take RMDs. This account can keep growing for as long as you do not touch it.

So, what is the best path? Finding the best sequence for withdrawing money from a retirement account is not rocket science, but it does require the prospective retiree to carefully gauge the amount of income needed, the sources of income, age thresholds to reach and receive maximum benefit, and tax implications from the retirement accounts. Getting the most value out of retirement income is essential. If a financial planner is not available or is deemed too expensive, seek information from online resources, such as NerdWallet 5 Steps to Retirement Planning: A 2021 Guide - NerdWallet. By doing a little research, a new retiree can stretch the value of the retirement dollar a little farther, and that may make all the difference in the world.







September is Suicide Prevention Awareness Month

The Department of Defense (DoD) theme to the support the month is "Connect to Protect-Support is Within Reach."

September provides a dedicated space to have direct discussion and dialog to address the crisis of suicide among those who have served in the military. Celebration of the Life and Legacy of the Reverend Derwood Doyle Wilson



The Reverend Derwood Doyle Wilson

The Reverend Derwood Doyle Wilson was born on November 24, 1934 in Cuney, Texas to the late Taylor A. Wilson and Sim Wille Wilson. He was the fourth of seven children and was affectionately called "Lil Brother". He was educated in the public school system of Jacksonville, Texas and was a proud graduate of Fred Douglass High School, class of 1952. As a child, he attended the Rising Star Missionary Baptist Church and accepted the Lord as his personal Savior.

After high school, he attended Texas Southern University for two years and then he joined the United States Air Force. He served honorably for more than 20 years. During his time in the service, he served in Vietnam, Bermuda, Germany and North Africa. He served his country with distinction and was praised with dozens of honors, certificates and commendations.

In 1957, Reverend Wilson married the love of his life, Erma Teen Washington. They were married for 34 years before her passing. They were both faithful members of Emmanuel CO GIC and served under the pastorate of the Late Bishop R. E. Altheimer, Bishop T. L. Westbrook and Supt. Sherman David, Jr. In 1986, he and Missionary Wilson moved their membership to Emmanuel CO GIC under the leadership of Elder Larry and Missionary Jean Melton.

Under the leading of the Lord, Elder Wilson founded the Ebenezer Church of God in Christ, where he served until he was lead to unite with Roosevelt Heights under the leadership of Elder John Wayne Penton. In addition to his service in the local church and the Washington State Jurisdiction, he served as one of the housing coordinators of the Progress House and volunteered in other state and federal prison ministries.

Reverend Wilson believed in the value of hard work. He had several jobs throughout his lifetime. In addition to serving in the United States Air Force, he worked for Tam Engineering for more than 25 years. After retirement from Tam, he worked for The Tacoma News Tribune. He was skilled with his hands and had a unique talent for building special projects. In the summer of 2019, he and Brother Jesse Johnson dug up a portion of the yard because he needed more driveway space. When Brother Johnson went back to look at the progress being made, to his surprise, Reverend Wilson had dug up more space than was needed. In addition to working in carpentry he was



skilled in working with steel. One of the most prized possessions is a tool cabinet that he made more than 60 years ago, that he still used regularly.



In 2018, Reverend Wilson moved from Tacoma Washington to Huntsville, Alabama to live with his grandson, Maurice, due to declining health and unfortunate circumstances. He gladly united with the St. John AME Church and became affectionately known as "Grandpa". He served in the soup kitchen ministry, was active in the Fifty-Plus Axillary, and worked wherever he was able. When asked why he did not unite with a COGIC church, he simply replied there is only one God, and St. John likes to have church. Reverend Wilson was loved and admired by the members of St. John and was faithful in his service to the church. He loved to dress up. Each week, the members would wait to see what he was going to wear to service and he always exceeded expectations.

Reverend Wilson was the kind of man who believed in doing things his way and on his terms. He loved to travel and would often talk about the many cruise expeditions he experienced. In 2019, "Grandpa" decided to trade in his CRV for a big truck, as he called it. He drove to Chicago to visit his grandchildren: Jessie and Dominique; and then to Texas

to visit his sister Debra, and brother Robert. He then ended up driving to Georgia to visit his brother, Marvin also. 

The Annual Conference in Review

Wednesday, September 8, 2021, Opening Day of the 12th Session of the Northwest Annual Conference



First of all this writer, would like to thank Pastor Wright and the Board of Stewards for entrusting the delegates with the responsibility of reporting the actions taken at the annual conference. Also, Steward Abbiegail Hugine's support as the alternate delegate was greatly appreciated.

Dr. Daniel K. Wims, newly elected 12th President of Alabama Agricultural & Mechanical University

Long-time Provost to Take Leadership Helm

The Alabama A&M University Board of Trustees voted 7-4 Saturday, October 2, 2021, in favor of Dr. Daniel K. Wims as the 12th president of Alabama A&M University. The trustees reconvened at 8:50 a.m. October 2 to conduct in-person interviews of Presidential Search Finalists and to select the new president of the University. President Andrew Hugine, Jr., will retire from the post on December 31, 2021. Dr. Wims is an ordained itinerant elder in the Northwest Alabama Conference in the 9th Episcopal District and serves on the staff of St. John AME Church in Huntsville, Alabama where the Reverend Maurice Wright is the pastor.

Dr. Wims has over 20 years of progressive administrative experience in various governmental and higher education organizations. Wims formerly served as the executive vicepresident and vice-president for academic affairs, and professor of agricultural sciences at The Fort Valley State University.

Other positions Wims held include assistant vice president for student affairs and associate professor at South Carolina State University; director of the Division of Agricultural Sciences and associate professor of agricultural sciences at Florida A&M University; director of institutional research and assessment and assistant professor of agricultural sciences at Alcorn State University; director of the Small Farm Research and Resource Development Center and assistant professor of agricultural sciences at Southern University.

Wims expressed his gratitude for being part of the interview process. He said his strints on national councils and major enterprises, extensive work with college presidents, service on accreditation teams and experience coming through the academic ranks has helped to prepare him for the University presidency.

Wims said that AAMU made decisions long ago to invest in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) programs, even at the doctoral level. During his period as provost, Wims said AAMU has sought to continue and expand its STEM focus. However, Wims' presidency will stress artificial intelligence in cybersecurity, push data analytics, improve coding capabilities among a wider range of students, and recruitment Servant Pastor of St. John AME Church, and Dr. Andrew Hugine, Jr. of faculty in big and alternative energy.

Other key areas of concentration, he said, will include campus-wide commitment to student retention; a renewed focus on community college transfers; investment in placement and institutional advancement; growing the University despite a brief period when there is a smaller pool of high school graduates; and increasing state and federal support via relationships.

Dr. Wims received the B.S. degree in agronomy in June 1987 from The Fort Valley State College, and the M.S. degree in agricultural extension and education with an agronomy concentration from The Ohio State University in 1989. He earned the Ph.D. degree from the University of Maryland-College Park in agricultural extension and education with a cognate in higher education administration.

Historic marker honoring the six African American women voters in the state of Alabama

Lifting as they climbed: Celebrating Huntsville's First Black Women Voters

Following the ratification of the 19th amendment in 1920, women from across Alabama prepared to register for the vote. All women were required to meet the provision of Alabama's 1901 Constitution, deliberately designed to prevent Black Alabamians from voting.

In Madison county over 1,300 women registered for the vote. Only six were Black women.

Huntsville's first Black women were educators, business owners, philanthropists, and community volunteers. They were also the mothers of the national Civil Rights movement. The six women were, Mary Wood Binford (Jordan), Ellen Scruggs Brandon, India Leslie Herndon, Lou Bertha Johnson (a member of St. John AME Church), Dora Fackler, and Celia Horton Love) McCrary.

A historic marker honoring these six women was dedicated on Sunday, October 24th in the William Hooper Council! Memorial Park. Sponsors of the marker were, The Historic Huntsville Foundation, The William Hooper Councill Alumni

Association, The Alabama Humanities Alliance and the City of Huntsville. Celebrating the event were the honorable Kay Ivey, governor of the state of Alabama, the honorable Tommy Battle, mayor of Huntsville, Mrs. Yvonne Lowery-Kennedy, and Dr. Hemdon Spillman.

Lesson Title: All People Praise God Lesson Scripture: Revelation 7:9-17

Print: Revelation 7:9-17

In this lesson, Apostle John is sharing a vison that he has had. In the dream he sees a multitude gathered around a throne giving praises to the lamb sitting on the throne. And he asks who are these who are dressed in white robes? The elder in the vision replies that these are the ones from all nations who have come through the great ordeal. And as written in this text and repeated in Rev 21:4-6, "And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain; for the former things are passed away."

In reviewing the lesson, concerns arose as to the definition of the great ordeal and the identification of the multitudes that made it through the great ordeal. Only God can answer these concerns but as believers, by faith, believers are hoping that no matter how small or great their tribulations are, only by faith would they overcome. And that once they had won the victory, God would allow them to wash out earthly pains, sorrows and deaths stains in order for their robes to be as white as ever and allow them to experience pure love forever as they give Him praise.

November 14, 2021

Lesson Title: Praise for God's Eternal Reign

Lesson Scripture: Revelation 11.
Print: Revelation 11:15-19

In Apostle John's continued vision, each of six angels were tasked to sound their trumpets. And each trumpet caused some form of calamity upon the earth (Revelation 8:6 — 9:20). But in this lesson text, the seventh angel sounds his trumpet declaring that God's wrath against sinful man was complete and God has been victorious and has established His kingdom over all of the kingdoms of the earth. Those in His heavenly court, the twenty-four elders fall upon their

faces and sing praises of His victory acknowledging the time has come to judge sinful man and to reward His servants (prophets, the saints and those great or small who fear His name).

November 21, 2021

Lesson Title: Rejoiding in Heaven Lesson Scripture: Revelation 19 Lesson Print: Revelation 19:1-8

Devotional Songs

Key Verse: "Let us rejoice and exult and give him the glory, for the marriage of the Lamb has come, and his bride has made herself ready." Revelation 19:7 (NRSV)

The vision does continue. In this lesson, Apostle John records the reactions of God's great victory over the greatest civilization on earth, "the city of Babylon (the whore)." Revelation 17-18 describes the power of "Babylon," its relationships with other kings, its great demise in one hour and the reactions of those afar who either wailed or celebrated "Babylon's" destruction.

Apostle John, in Revelation 19 recounts the celebration held in God's honor. Great multitudes shout out praises highlighting the power of God, and the twenty-four elders and the four beasts fall onto their faces giving praises to God for avenging the blood of His servants. There comes a voice from one throne, acknowledging the greatness of God and indicating all servants, great or small, should offer praise to God. The multitudes respond by acknowledging the sovereignty of God and indicates that it is time for the marriage of the Lamb, for the bride is ready and is adorned in fine linen made up of the righteous deeds of the saints.

November 28, 2021

Lesson Title: Good News for All Lesson Scripture: Acts 10:34-47 Lesson Print: Acts 10:34-47

Devotional Songs

Key Verse: Then Peter began to speak to them: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him." Acts 10:34-35 (NRSV)

In this lessen Apostle Peter has been sent via a spirituallyled vision to Caesarea to speak with a God-fearing centurion named Cornelius. Apostle Peter's vision centered around Jewish-Gentile relationship and the key issue of whether

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Gentiles were entitled to salvation.

Apostle Peter speaks that God does not show any partiality. He indicates: "that God sent a message of peace which was spread by Jesus throughout Judea; that God allowed Jesus to heal "all those" oppressed by sin and God allowed "all" to witness even the death of Jesus on the cross; that by His death and resurrection, Jesus did command the apostles to preach and testify that He is the one ordained by God to judge the living and dead; and, that anyone who believes in Him receives forgiveness of sins through His name." It is noted in closing that as Apostle Peter was speaking the gift of the Holy Spirit fell on the crowd (Jews and Gentiles) and his response is, "how can one withhold water for baptizing these who have received the Holy Spirit?"



Reflections on a Life Well Lived



Miss Nina Marie Johnson December 17, 1993-October 5, 2021

Miss Nina Marie Johnson transitioned this life on October 5, 2021. She was the daughter of Mr. Ronald Johnson and Mrs. Erica Davis-Johnson.

Nina confessed hope in Christ in 2009 and joined St. John AME Church under the pastorship of the Reverend Dr. Homer Littleffield McCall.

She actively participated in the Liturgical Dance Ministry, the Young Peoples Department (YPD), iThrive-Arise Ministry, and served as a volunteer in the Soup Kitchen.

She was educated in the Huntsville City School System, graduating from Lee High School in 2012. She went on to earn an Associates Degree in Culinary Arts and Hospitality Service from J. F. Drake State Technical College in 2015. She enjoyed being of service to others. She trained to become a certified nursing assistant (CNA). With this certification she gained employment with Huntsville Hospital.

Pastor Wright preached a beautiful eulogy entitled, "Living a Hyphenated Life." He stated that hyphens are connectors; they connect one thing to something else. And that hyphens usually mean that there is more to come. More for Nina would be living life eternally.

This analogy helped to explain Nina's living this earth at the age of 27. Her earthly work was done, and she could go home early. AMEN

She leaves cherished memories of her presence on this earth with her parents, step-mother, grandmother, siblings, nieces, nephews, aunts, undes, many friends, church family, and coworkers. She was loved immensely and will be greatly missed. Her last words were, "Tell them I love them."

Laypersons Challenged to Love Mercy, Walk Humbly, Do Justice and Love Kindness on Lay Witness Sunday

Officially, the Connectional Lay Witness Day was designated for observance throughout the AME Church on the 2nd Sunday during the month of October, at the Eleventh Biennial Session, in 1969. Lay Witness Sunday provides laypersons with the opportunity to witness about their faith in Jesus Christ and their commitment to fulfilling His mission in the world. This day was established for laypersons to carry out morning worship services at their respective local churches.

On the second Sunday in October, October 10, 2021, the laypersons of St. John AME Church, Huntsville, led the worship service. The Quadrennial theme approved by the Connectional Lay Organization (2017-2021), "Laity Walking Humbly with God to Do Justice and to Love Kindness," was the theme for the service. The scripture reference was "And what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, to love kindness and to walk humbly with your God?" (Micah 6:8 NASB).

Working within the guidelines of the CDC to reduce the risk for worshippers and to slow the spread of COVID-19, the service integrated in person participants and prerecorded virtual participants. Sister Pamela Whitehead gave announcements for the week. Sister Erica Harbin, first vice-president of the St. John Lay Organization, was the worship leader. Brother Reginald Pearson, director of Music and Christian Arts at St. John and musicians led the music for the service. Their music was augmented with the opening hymn, "Layman Hymn," recorded by the Connec-

Brother Clifton Miller, chaplain of the St. John Lay Organization, offered the morning prayer. Sister Patricia Grier, secretary of the St. John Lay Organization, read the scripture from Micah 6:6-8. The occasion was given by Sister Claudinette Purifoy-Fears, St. John Lay Organization. She informed worshippers of the purpose of Lay Witness Sunday and highlighted the mission of the Lay Organization. She noted that the Lay are instruments of God's peace and emphasized that Lay persons should execute their mission with love, kindness and strive for service to all mankind. rector of Lay Activities of the St. John Lay Organization. This litany was written by Evelyn Welch Graham (11th Episcopal District Director of Lay Activities, 2003).

The speaker for the service was introduced by Sister Abbiegail Hugine. She introduced Dr. Andrew Hugine, Jr. from a special viewpoint that only a lifelong friend and wife of almost 49 years could do. Dr. Hugine is a son of the parsonage of the AME Church, has served in church leadership at the local, district and conference levels. He began his career as a mathematics instructor, has served in various administrative positions in higher education including former president of South Carolina State University, and is currently the 11th president of Alabama A&M University. They are the parents of two adult children and grandparents of three wonderful grandchildren.

Dr. Hugine brought an informative, inspirational, and challenging message as he highlighted how the church, the Lay, can carry out its mission. He related the AME church's mission and the theme for this Lay Witness Sunday, focusing on justice. He

gave four areas where the church should walk in justice.

- The Lay must be concerned about the less fortunate. Do good. He highlighted issues of concern for those who do not have safe drinking water as well as the disproportionate employment and income ratios of blacks and whites in the state. He said the Lay must be concerned and adopt as their theme song "If I Can Help Somebody."
- 2. Lay must have a spirit of discernment to see that economic problems are political problems. It must be involved politically on issues such as health care racial discrimination, youth violence, and childcare. Elected officials must be held account a ble and voter education drives must be expanded. He referenced Zachariah 7:8 as he highlighted the need to stop oppress sion.
- 3. Dr. Hugine stated that the Lay must address issues facing families and children. He supported his statement that families are under attack with numbers that state 29% of children in Alabama live in poverty. He noted that there is too much exposure to violence. He challenged the Lay to help with the instruction of children and to promote education. He gave examples of the AME colleges and universities that the church has sustained over the years. Dr. Hugine gave a plan that he calls the Nehemiah giving plan for higher education to support HBCU institutions. The plan would entail the 2,000,000 HBCU graduates giving \$100 per year. This plan would result in 200 million dollars for HBCUs a year and a billion dollars over a five-year period.
- 4. Using an acrostic, he gave the final challenge for what is required of the Lay to "do JUSTICE."
 - J Jesus teaches love, love of each other
 - U Understand the issues and problems
 - S-Service
 - T- Truth
 - I Integrity
 - C-Commitment to change
 - E Equity for every man and woman.

Around October 2020, after suffering from what I thought was hip pain, to name one of my physical issues, my primary care doctor referred me to a specialist at Huntsville Hospital.

Several weekends prior to my appointment had been filled with excitement! My son, daughter, husband and I had celebrated my husband Bobby's birthday! The next day, we drove to visit my in -laws in Mississippi for a day trip. This was meaningful to me because I would be afforded the opportunity for the first time ever to visit my Dad's gravesite on his birthday to clean his headstone.

My Dad had been a World War II Veteran and had the traditional veteran's headstone which is susceptible to growing moss and attracting other sediment. After he passed, I usually sojourned to the cemetery 1-3 times a year when we traveled to visit my in-laws. I would say a prayer of thanks to God for giving me such a wonderful Dad, reflect in quiet, meticulously clean two headstones, and leave flowers or some other memorabilia like flags. (The cemetery is actually a pretty quiet,

peaceful place unlike some other places you visit). My Dad would have celebrated his 111th Birthday on August 30, and 20 years had passed since he had moved to heaven!

As my daughter and I cleaned the headstones, we chatted about my Dad and my grandmother who is buried two plots away. We removed dirt and grime from the WWII letters and other indentions on his headstone. I remember hoping my daughter could later in life, perhaps, appreciate the significance of what we were doing that evening. My heart was filled because Samantha was with me. My son Collin was away in college and was not with me on this visit. However, he was with me the last time I was there to place some American flags for Memorial Day Holiday, and he wanted me to be certain to bring the proper cleaning supplies on my next visit. So, I had strategically gathered rags, soap, and a toothbrush from home and filled a container with water once we arrived at my in-laws home. Smiling with gratitude, I was thankful for the opportunity to posthumously serve my Dad on his birthday!

We returned home to Alabama late that night, and two days later I attended a scheduled appointment at the medical building adjacent to the hospital. After leaving the appointment and exiting the building, I was briefly mentally absorbed with thoughts about my doctor's visit when I noticed a car pull toward the curb. A lady exited her car, and she retrieved a wheelchair. So, I continued toward my car in the parking garage, and I HEARD HIM! The HOLY SPIRIT whispered, "See if they need some help". And for about three to five seconds, I quickly thought ... "I should be responsible and not delay going back to work... BUT on the other hand... I CLEARLY and REALLY should be a HELPFUL CHRISTIAN!" I decided work could wait! I KN EW I HAD TO follow what I am certain was GOD's VOICE through the HOLY SPIRIT whispering, "Help them!"

So, I turned around and pleasantly approached the nicely dressed, attractive woman and with genuine concern asked, "Would you like me to wait with your husband while you park your car?" I thought back to times when my mother was likely in the same situation, having to take my elderly, wheelchair bound Dad to an appointment by herself. The compassionate woman asked her husband if he wanted me to wait with him, and he said, "I'll be ok." Knowing the right thing to do, I confidently said to the distinguished looking seniors, "Ma'am, I'll wait here until you park your car, just in case it takes a while. I don't mind." I didn't know how long it would take because it was close to 10am, and the parking lot was beginning to fill because more patients and employees were entering the building. My conscience would not allow me to leave the gentleman waiting alone, so the woman told her husband I had volunteered to wait with him while she parked the car.

You may be thinking: this is weird... Lady, I may not have asked for your assistance either But, I don't think the couple minded or felt threatened because I was quite polite and professionally dressed. So, the lady entered her car and drove through the entry gate of the multi-level parking garage to find the nearest available parking space, if she was like everyone else entering the garage.

As she pulled away, I remember asking myself, "What type of small talk might I have while we wait? The gentleman seems really quiet." I quickly reflected on my numerous visits to the nursing homes in Texas. I usually visited with the Nursing Home Ministry at my previous church at least twice a month if not more often. I immediately remembered two subjects strangers are comfortable discussing. So, I asked the gentleman, "How are you enjoying this beautiful weather?" You see, it had been terribly cold in the mornings, and today it was comfortable enough to wear a light sweater. The man replied, "It's nice." I commented I was glad the weather seemed to be getting warmer.

Then I asked him the question that would bring about an astounding answer, "Are you from around here?" He said no and told me where he had lived, and then he made a statement that caused my mouth to literally drop as I froze in my steps with chill bumps. He said, "I attended Rust College before I came here to Alabama A&M University!

I stood in unbelief and asked myself, "Dare I ask him?" I slowly uttered the question, "Did you know a man named Kinzell Lawson?" By the man's age, I thought it was possible, just possible he may have known my Dad! And ... he replied, "Yes, I knew him!"

Rust College is a small HBCU in the town of Holly Springs, Mississippi, and everyone on campus knew everyone, especially my Dad! Coach Lawson, as everyone called him, talked to everyone, anywhere, and most people on the campus and in the town knew each other because the population was so small. Besides, my Dad could engage any stranger — anytime - and anywhere, even on a road trip at a rest stop - but that's another story.

My Dad had been an instructor, a coach, and was the athletic director when this gentleman was at Rust College. Like other employees at small colleges, he wore many hats during his 20 year tenure at the college. As the former athlete talked, the gentleman who had been rather subdued in the parking lot had become quite engaging with a stranger, his former coach's daughter. By this time we were in the lobby of the hospital after his wife parked the car and went to meet someone in the building. The gentleman glistened and reminisced about other players and shared a few stories and photos of former teammates, which I was surprised he had in his cell phone. He also told me about another coach cutting him from the team. My Dad had asked the coach why this particular player had not been at practice and inquired where that boy was... and my Dad told the coach, "Go get that boy, and put him back on the team!" In terms of fondness, allof my Dad's players were referred to as "his boys". They were not his biological children, and they were not just athletes recruited to win games for the college. My Dad truly cared about the trajectory of their lives. He knew sports provided a training ground of sorts for their futures.

My Dad had a few gifts: One was the ability to engage anyone, of any age, in conversation. Another was teaching science and math. His memory was unparalleled. But, his passion was sports! He LOVED ball-sports: football, basketball, baseball, softball, tennis, and billiards. He recognized raw athleticism and could mold a young man (or woman) into a competitive athlete if they provided the tenacity for practice. During Coach Lawson's career, he guided numerous young men (too many to count) to enroll at Rust College to become not only skilled athletes but also college graduates.

At the medical building, I met yet another man who had been positively impacted by my Dad. Although, he only knew my Dad for a year or two, that's all it took for him to remember Coach Lawson.

The president of the college canceled the football program at Rust College, and another coach seized an opportunity for himself and several players to go to Alabama A&M University which is about 3 hours away from Rust College.

December 5, 2021

Lesson Title: Justice and Obedience

Lesson Scripture: Deuteronomy 5; 10; 27; 28-1-2 Print: Deuteronomy 5:1b-3; 10:12-13; 27:1-10 Devotional Songs: #377[], #251[], and #243[]

Key Verse: "Now, Israel, what doth the Lord thy God require of thee, but to fear the Lord thy God, to walk in all His ways, and to love Him, and to serve the Lord thy God with all thy heart and with all thy soul, to keep the commandments of the Lord, and His statutes, which I command thee this day for thy good?" (Deuteronomy 10:12-13).

In this lesson God's requirements are for our good with limits on our freedoms being in our best interest. The intent is that believers accept His will and become a blessing for the world to see. A time can be seen when God's people are reminded and they are called to make a just society to reveal the just God they served.

December 12, 2021

Lesson Title: Justice and Kindness Lesson Scripture: 2 Samuel 9 Print: 2 Samuel 9:1-7, 9-12

Devotional Songs: #77 []; #27 2[]; and #243 []

Key Verse: "David said, is there yet any that is left of the house of Saul, that I may shew him kindness for Jonathan's sake?" (2 Samuel 9:1).

In this lesson there is a comparison made between Samuel, who was well-respected throughout the land and his sons, who did not receive the same esteem. The Israelites insisted that Samuel provide them an earthly king, as the other nations had. They tired of the abuse from Samuel's sons. They pushed back against God's desire for them to be priestly, holy nation that God ruled. The Lord did as they wanted and Saul was chosen as king. Saul, however, was not obedient to God's commands and the Lord rejected him. Samuel anointed David to be Saul's successor.

December 19, 2021

Lesson Title: Justice and Righteousness

Lesson Scripture: Isaiah 9:1-7

Print: Isaiah 9:2-7

Devotional Songs: #525[]; #77[]; and #243[]

Key Verse: "Of the increase of His government and peace there shall be no end, upon the throne of David, and upon His kingdom, to order it, and to establish it with judgement and with justice from henceforth even for ever. The zeal of the Lord of hosts will perform this." (Isaiah 9:7).

The commentary takes a high-level view of this lesson text, which is frequently called The Book of Immanuel, as its focus is on the promised blessing of God's presence with us. Back then there was an immediate need for God's divine presence because of a war where Syria and the northern kingdom of Israel teamed up against Judah, the southern kingdom.

Lesson Title: Justice and Deliverance


Lesson Scripture: Psalm 84

Welcome Back to In-Person Worship

The last time members of the congregation were in the sanctuary for worship was March 17, 2020 for the 135th church anniversary. It was overcast outside, but the spirit was high on the inside. The Right Reverend Harry L. Seawright, Bishop of the Ninth Episcopal District was the speaker for the occasion. Following the service, everyone joined the pastors outside with umbrellas as the dedication of the 5t. John historical marker took place. Afterwards, everyone proceeded to the Board of Realtor's building for a "Downhome Country Sunday Dinner" to end the celebration. What a great memory.

Then came the pandemic...COVID-19. A virus, Highly contagious, People dying. No cure in sight. Nothing like it since the Spanish Flu of 1918. Lock down. Shut down. Closed until further notice. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDQ) announcing conflicting information daily, the federal government making light of the situation and misinformation being aired constantly.

Churches across the district were shuttered. Pastors had to learn a new way of meeting the spiritual needs of the congregation. A new delivery system had to be devised and quickly. And at this time, December 2021 almost two years into a pandemic, the church is preparing to again welcome the year 2022 via ZOOM.

However, as the great news of an effective vaccine became available and hundreds became fully vaccinated and boostered-up, it was time to visit the possibility of returning to the sanctuary...safely.

The seating was designated to accommodate up to eighty persons, at least seventy persons were in attendance.

The Hill family led the congregation in the second Sunday presentation of Advent. The Pastor led the congregation in the sermonic hymn, Farther Along as he recounted the memories of he and the

Caregivers Prayer and Respite Ministry's Annual Caregivers' Appreciation Month Workshop



November-National Caregivers Appreciation Month By B. A. Johnson

November is National Family Caregivers Month, a time to recognize the 40 million Americans who take care of loved ones — helping them live independently at home where they want to be. What family caregivers do is extraordinary — adult children, taking care of parents; husbands and wives caring for their spouses; mothers and fathers caring for adult children. They deserve the utmost gratitude and support throughout the year and most

especially during the month of November when the nation traditionally give thanks. Together – family caregivers spend 37 billion hours each year providing unpaid assistance to their loved ones – a contribution valued at \$470 billion. They help with bathing and dressing, driving to appointments, preparing meals, managing medications, handling finances and so much more. Many are also juggling full-time and/or part-time jobs, and some are still raising their own families. Without a doubt, family caregivers are the backbone of our healthcare system.

The Caregivers, Prayer and Respite (CPR) Ministry at St. John AME Church was established in 2015, under the auspices of the Steward Board's Congregational Care. The goal was to support members of the congregation who were caregivers and their families. For the past six years, the CPR Ministry, has organized workshops to provide valuable information to caregivers. The St. John CPR Ministry has partnered with Mrs. Donna Gullatte, Agent, with the Madison County Cooperative Extension to provide workshop information and speakers of interest. The CPR Ministry works collaboratively with the St. John Soup Kitchen to provide a hot, delicious meal to the sick and shut-in members and their caregivers on the third Tuesday of each month. Sometimes, it is just the little things that go a long way. The goal of the CPR Ministry, is also to let caregivers know that they are not alone and that there are many resources available to them in the community. The CPR Ministry serves as a contact for caregivers in accessing community resources.

Many issues dealing with elder care have been addressed during these workshops. Previous topics have ranged from legal issues, to insurance issues, to Medicare provisions, to in-home and nursing facility concerns. And what has been discovered is that attendees for the workshops have either been caregivers, are currently caregiving, or are about to become caregivers.

The last two annual workshops were held virtually due to the pandemic. The Annual Caregivers Appreciation Workshop this year was also held virtually on Saturday, November 13, 2021. Mrs. Donna Gullatte organized the event through the Alabama Cooperative Extension System. The presenter for the occasion was Mrs. Chanda Crutcher, Director of the Legacy Center located in Huntsville.

The theme for the event was "Living Your Legacy: Know. Plan. Live." Mrs. Crutcher's first question was, "In what quarter of life are you living right now? Twenty-Twenty-Five, you're in the first quarter. Twenty-five to fifty, the second quarter of life; Fifty to seventy-five in the third quarter and seventy-five and above the fourth quarter." The quarter of life you are in determines how you should begin planning for the next quarter. Just like a football game, if the home team is behind in the 3rd quarter, they still must plan until the bell sounds.

Which quarter are you in? If an individual finds themselves in the 3rd quarter, they have just enough time to successfully plan for the 4th quarter. Mrs. Crutcher offered these suggestions for planning for the next quarter.

- 1. To live successfully in the fourth quarter a person must be physically strong to prevent falls.
- 2. To live successfully a person should maintain some level of physical activity at least 3-4 times a week.
- 3. The high usage of medication is a major indicator of pre-morbidity. Have your pharmacy evaluate all your medications at

least once a year to prevent negative medication interactions.

- To live successfully create situations for new experiences, make new friends, form new habits, and learn new hobbies or a new skill.
- 5. To live successfully a person must realize their own value and how their life impacts others positively.

Mrs. Crutcher emphasized that practicing these five principles enables better coping skills for caregivers, because while the caregiver is caring for the loved one, they are also caring for themselves.

Pre-planning in the third quarter is essential. How an individual finishes strong, depends on the pre-planning which has taken place early in the game. Mrs. Crutcher stipulated that these items should be in place as early as the second quarter of life, but certainly by the third quarter. They were:

- A Last Will and Testament...put your wishes in writing and re-visit the plan annually.
- A Durable Power of Attorney...who is going to speak for you in the event you can not advocate for yourself?
- Advanced Directive for Health Care...allows an individual to have personal input into one's health decisions.
- A "POD" (Paid On Death Certificate) obtained from the bank. A POD Certificate gives a designated individual access to an individual's financial accounts immediately upon death.

Mrs. Crutcher ended the presentation with this thought from, Mrs. Thelma Fuqua "Live as long as you're living and walk into your fourth quarter with excitement." Each attendee received a gift bag stuffed with informational booklets, and home health aides as a thank-you gift for their participation.

The Caregivers Prayer and Respite (CPR) Ministry meetings are held on the first Monday of each month at 6:00 pm. For the past two years meetings have been held via ZOOM. New members are always welcome. Sister Abbiegail Hugine serves as the chairperson for the CPR Ministry. The CPR Ministry is currently recruiting a secretary. If interested please contact Sister Hugine.

The Legacy Center believes in the value of intergenerational engagement, everyone should be afforded the opportunity to live as long as they are living, and in the power of community to provide the answers necessary for the vulnerable to thrive.

January 2, 2022

Lesson Title: Justice, Vengeance, and Mercy

Lesson Scripture: Genesis 4 Print: Scripture Genesis 4:1-13

Devotional Songs: #450[], #251[], and #243[]

Key Verse: "The Lord said, "What have you done? Listen; your brother's blood is crying out to me from the

ground." (Genesis 4;10).

This lesson examines the first murder recorded in the Bible. Cain, a murderer is engaged in a long conversation with God and is allowed to live with the knowledge of his actions. The readers learn of God's reply to this brutal killing.

January 9, 2022

Lesson Title: Hagar and Ishmael not Forgotten

Lesson Scripture: Genesis 21:8-21

Print: Genesis 21:8-20

Devotional Songs: #355[]; #272[]; and #243[]

Key Verse: "And God heard the voice of the boy; and the angel of God called to Hagar from heaven, and said to her, "What troubles you, Hagar? Do not be afraid, for God has heard the voice of the boy where he is. Come lift up the boy and hold him fast with your hand, for I will make a great na-

non of him." (2 Samuel 9:1).

This lesson examines God's response to Abraham and Sarah's yearning to have children by allowing Abraham to impregnate Hagar, who was a slave woman, Ishmael's birth caused challenges for Abraham, for Sarah, and for Hagar. Abraham found himself in a situation to either honor Sarah's request to send Ishmael and Hagar away or allow mounting family friction.

January 16, 2022

Lesson Title: The Laws of Justice and Mercy

Lesson Scripture: Exodus 23 Print: Exadus 23:1-12

Key Verse: "You shall not follow a majority on wrongdoing, when you hear witness in a lawsuit, you shall not side with the majority so as to pervert justice; nor shall you be partial

to the poor in a lawsuit." (Exodus 23:2-3).

God commanded that the system of justice treated everyone fairly in various situations like accusations, charges, prosecutrons, and verdicts. The system was to not include false allegations and ill-will. God's system of justice allowed compassionate care of the environment, of animals, and of servants.

January 23, 2022

Lesson Title: Justice, Judges, and Priests

Lesson Scripture: Deuteronomy 16:18-20; 17:8-13; 19:15-21

Print: Deuteronomy 16:18-20; 17:8-13

Key Verse: "You shall appoint judges and officials throughout your tribes, in all your towns that the Lord your God is giving you, and they shall render just decisions for the people." (Deuteronomy 16;18).

This lesson focuses on a court system that God provided israel that is copied in many countries today, allowing for a decision by a court to be appealed to judges who are seated in a higher court. The role of the judges was fulfilled by the priests and this is the main difference between the courts God established in Israel and modern courts.

Key Verse: "Remember that you were a slave in Egypt and the Lord your God redeemed you from there; therefore, I command you to do this." (Deuteronomy 24:18).

The focus of this lesson was on the society which God established for the Israelites, It was very different in that all laws (e.g. civil, criminal, or family) aimed to produce the idea of community governance. Everyone was to be treated fairly. Moses passed on God's edicts to judges, to leaders, to employers, and to farmers.
